He commented the district has had bob descriptions since 1970.

According to the job descriptions, the specific duties of custodians are:

— Assume responsibility for cleaning and maintenance of assigned buildings and grounds

Provide for safe conditions
 of all equipment and playground
 apparatus.
 Keep plumbing and electrical fixtures in first class condi-

tion.

— Perform such snow and ice removal tasks as needed. Promptly report all broker

ery of packages as needed.

— Provide for building security.

— Report regularily to director relative condition of furnace.

— Perform with dispatch special tasks assigned by the building principal.

Job Description for House-keeper:

— Assume responsibility for cleaning rooms, office and hall-ways in buildings.

— Cleaning windows.

— Perform with dispatch such special tasks as may be assigned by a supervisor.

Dr. Haun said the housekeepers are responsible to and under the direction of custodians.

The wage scale for custodians range from \$3.45 an hour to \$3.95 an hour. Wage scale for house-keepers range from \$2.90 an hour to \$3.45 an hour.

October was an up and down month weatherwise, according to the monthly geological and natural resources survey by the conservation and Survey the son of the Institute of Agricul-ture and Natural Resources According to the summary, temperatures averaged one to two degrees below normal over most of the state during Octo

ber In the Northeast division, which includes most of the Wayneland area, the average daily maximum temperature for the month was about 68.5 degrees with a daily average minim of 36.5 degrees. The average for the month in the division was about 51 degrees which is a departure of minus 15 degrees from the normal Avalanche of Votes

the division was about 51 degrees which is a departure of minus 13 degrees from the normal. The warmest day in the division was 89 degrees on Oct. 20 with lowest inghttime reading leveling off at about 24.5 degrees on Oct. 7 and 23. October precipitation was befow normal in all divisions throughout the state. The range was 36 percent to as much as 69 percent below normal for the state. The Wayneland area was a four one inch short of the norm for the month of October. According to the survey, the area received less than three-quarters of an inch of precipitation. The lack of moisture caused weather observers to term the weather as being "extremely dry" during the period.

About 50 percent of the reporting stations in the western half of the state receiving precipitation of 124 inches or less during the two-month period of September through Cotober, 1978.

tion of 124 inches or less during the two-month period of Septem-ber through October, 1978. The Northeast division was down about one-half an Inch from the normal precipitation in the area as calculated from April through September.



Motorists in the Wayneland area have hied a try or two at winter driving but the worse is still to coine and with the Thanksgiving Day weekend coming up, it is time for caution.

In fact, traffic safety officials are suggesting this weekend would be an excellent opportunity to "Light Up Your Life" by turning on your headlights during daytime driving as well as night-time.

The Nebraska Highway Safety Proram (NHSP) is aiming its "Lights on"
ampaign toward the Thanksgiving Day

The campaign was initially kicked off in October. It was initiated in an effort to remind motorists to become more safety-connectous and alert when they drive.

The campaign was deemed necessary when fatalities started to mount steadily during the month. During the first 17 days in October, 28 persons died in traffic accidents. By the end of the month, 42 fatalities were recorded as compared to 21 for the same period last year.

The campaign seems to have done its job. During the first 16 days of November, 7 fatalities were caused in traffic accidents as compared to 21 during the same period last year.

up, officials fear the traffic fatality count may increase. Last year, four persons died in car accidents during the four-day weekend.
