



**A Change in the Weather**

SOME THREE inches of wet snow fell in the Wayneland area Thursday night and Friday morning, followed by arctic air Saturday and Sunday which pushed temperatures to near the zero mark. Most of the snow cover was melted Friday and it went into the ground before the weekend freeze. Cut wood piles are becoming more evident around residences as supplemental fuel. No fuel shortage is expected this winter but area residents are doing what they can to conserve energy with supplemental fuels.

**Little Precipitation**

**Weather Bounces Around During Month of October**

Weather is becoming more noticeable as the Wayneland area was caught up in a fringe area of a winter storm last weekend with about three inches accumulation. It wasn't all bad news as the weather warmed Saturday melting the snow cover and providing more topsoil moisture before the ground freezes.

October was an up and down month to the weatherwise, according to the monthly geological and natural resources survey by the Conservation and Survey division of the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources.

According to the summary, temperatures averaged one to two degrees below normal over most of the state during October.

**Avalanche of Votes For Yuletide Royalty**

The votes continued to cascade into the ballot boxes for the 17 Yuletide Princesses to be named in Northeast Nebraska.

All of the communities included in the search for Christmas royalty had candidates when the first balloting was counted.

Contest officials said there is still time to enter candidates from the 17 area communities. Area shoppers can help the candidate of their choice as they receive 1,000 for every \$1 purchase in participating stores.

A revised tally of the early voting shows Leslie Meier with 26,000 votes and Brenda Meier with 9,000 votes. Both girls are from Wakefield.

Andrea Tooker, Wayne, was omitted from the first list of candidates. She received 31,000 votes.

Amy Husmann, candidate from Pilger, was incorrectly listed as Amy Pilger in the first release.

The votes are being counted and an update on the balloting will be included in Thursday's Wayne Herald.

**Truck Parking Is Discussed**

The city attorney Tuesday night was directed by the city council to draft an ordinance providing semi-trailer truck parking for one hour on residential streets in Wayne.

The council previously had passed an ordinance banning truck parking on residential streets. However, an appeal at the last council meeting prompted the council to consider the one hour limit.

The council also was told that a site near the city salt shed at South Nebraska Street and Fairgrounds Avenue is being examined for possible overnight lighted parking for trucks.

**For Alleged Violation of Fair Labor Act**

**W-C School District Named in Suit**

A charge by the U.S. Labor department that the Wayne-Carroll school district is in violation of the equal pay division of the Fair Labor Standards Act, has caught school administrators completely unawares.

Supt. Dr. Francis Haun, who was attending a meeting in Lincoln when the suit was filed Thursday in U.S. District court in Omaha, said the school is investigating the charge but that he is not able to come up with an answer.

The complaint named the school district as defendant and alleges that the defendant had "Repeatedly and willfully discriminated within its establishment located at Wayne and Carroll, between employees on a basis of sex by paying wages to housekeepers in such establishments at a rate less than the rate at which it pays wages to custodians of the opposite sex in such establishments for equal works on jobs the performance of which requires equal skill, effort and responsibility, and which are performed under similar working conditions."

Ken Olds, attorney for the school district, brought the matter to the board's attention at its regular meeting last Monday night.

"Mr. Olds has contacted the regional administrator's office in Kansas City, but he could not get any additional information, even who brought the complaint," Dr. Haun stated.

Dr. Haun said the district has tried to be in compliance with the labor department's regulations regarding discrimination and wages. "In May, 1973, we had Floyd Wilson, division chairman of the department of labor, Kansas City, meet with Northeast Nebraska school superintendents regarding the Fair Labor Act. He told us then that if we had separate job descriptions for the employees, we would not have any trouble with discrimination or wages," Dr. Haun told the Herald. He commented the district has had job descriptions since 1970.

According to the job descriptions, the specific duties of custodians are:

- Assume responsibility for cleaning and maintenance of assigned buildings and grounds.
- Provide for safe conditions of all equipment and playground apparatus.
- Keep plumbing and electrical fixtures in first class condition.
- Perform such snow and ice removal tasks as needed.
- Promptly report all broken glass.
- Do such pickup and delivery of packages as needed.
- Provide for building security.
- Report regularly to director or relative condition of furnace.
- Perform with dispatch special tasks assigned by the building principal.
- Job Description for Housekeeper:
- Assume responsibility for cleaning rooms, office and hallways in buildings.
- Cleaning windows.
- Perform with dispatch special tasks as may be assigned by a supervisor.

Dr. Haun said the housekeepers are responsible to and under the direction of custodians.

The wage scale for custodians range from \$3.45 an hour to \$3.95 an hour. Wage scale for housekeepers range from \$2.90 an hour to \$3.40 an hour.

**Celebrates 100th Birthday Wednesday Maude Auker--Truly a Living Legend**

"If you ever want to be noticed, live to be 100," says Maude Auker.

Maude, who will celebrate her 100th birthday this Wednesday, will be the focus of the entire Wayne community. The Wayne city council last month approved a resolution which sets aside Nov. 22 as "Maude Auker Day" in Wayne.

Mayor Freeman Decker, who made the request for the resolution, said it is designed to recognize and pay tribute to Mrs. Auker for her 100 years.

The Wayne Chamber of Commerce will put out the Welcome Flag in honor of Mrs. Auker's birthday.

On Wednesday, several relatives will gather at the Wayne Care Centre, where Maude has resided for the past three years, to help her mark the occasion.

Mrs. Auker received three postmarked birthday greetings last Friday from the White House, all containing the same message. They were signed by Rosalyn and Jimmy Carter and read, "You have our warmest congratulations and best wishes."

Maude, whose 100 years of age is evidenced only by the neat head of white hair and a face kindly etched by a century of time gone by, said, with a sparkle in her eye, "No wonder the postage keeps going up."

Maude was born Nov. 22, 1878 on a farm near Red Oak, Ia. She came to Wayne with her family when she was a small girl.

She attended rural Wayne county schools and graduated from Wayne high school in ceremonies held at the old Opera House. She said her graduating class was one of the largest with four boys and four girls.

In honor of the 90th anniversary of her graduation from Wayne high school, the Wayne board of education presented her with the Distinguished Citizens award during graduation ceremonies held in the spring of 1977.

Maude attended Professor Pile's Teacher Training school for one year. Afterward she taught at a rural school near Carroll for two years for \$28 a month. She taught one year in Dixon county and for five years in District 57 in Wayne county for \$40 a month. Her room and board was \$5 a month.

At the Carroll school, says Maude, during the winter months each pupil brought a pint of coffee, some sugared, some creamed -- some strong, some weak. It all went into a common coffee pot and put on the stove at 10:30 a.m. By noon there was hot coffee with a "syrup pail" lunch.

Maude "doesn't drink coffee though and says she believes that's one of the reasons she has lived to see a century come and go. She also credits her long life to never sitting between meals and always keeping busy."

Maude, who enjoys a good card game, still manages to keep herself and those around her busy.

Years ago, Mrs. Auker wrote for several small newspapers including *The Wayne Herald* for 14 years. At 100 years of age, she continues to write. Maude See LEGEND, Page 10

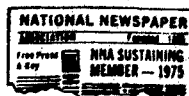

Another Voice for 'Black Elk'

Another voice is speaking for 'Black Elk' Speaks' and people are listening.

Janet Pass, a sophomore student at Northeast Technical Community College who plans to attend Wayne State College, has made literature come to life for others in her American Literature class which has been studying John Neihardt's reflections on the 1890 massacre at Wounded Knee.

Miss Pass, who is a member of the Rosebud tribe, told her fellow students of Indian history and traditions and shared her family's experiences.

Her paternal great-grandmother Beauvais was killed while fleeing on horseback from the Wounded Knee battle. Miss Pass's grandmother, who was a small girl at the time, was with her mother when she was killed.

Since her grandmother could speak very little English, Miss Pass said it was difficult for her to communicate about the incident with her grandmother, but she said her father saw to it that the story was passed on.

Miss Pass said that following the battle, her grandmother

moved from Wounded Knee to Mission, S.D., where she raised ten children. She noted that her grandmother followed many of the Indian traditions during her life at Mission, including the custom of going off alone into the woods to bear her children.

Miss Pass's mother's family, the Raymonds, also has an intriguing history. The Raymonds were the first white settlers in the Keyapaha valley near Miltboro, S.D. in the 1800's.

Although Miss Pass was born at Mission on the Rosebud reservation, her family moved to Norfolk when she was very young. She said that she was given an Indian name which means "Blizzard Woman" because she was brought up with definite "awareness" of Sioux customs and traditions. She added that most traditions were not practiced in her immediate family after their move to Norfolk.

Miss Pass said it was her father who was mainly responsible for instilling an awareness of the family's history and traditions. Before his death, Miss Pass's father made a tape recording of phrases in the native Lakota language. She recalled that the family did hold a traditional Indian wake with the relatives in Mission at the death of her father.

Miss Pass has a special interest in both past and current Indian affairs. She plans to enter Wayne State College when she completes her coursework at NTCC in December. She hopes to someday continue her education in Indian studies.

Although Miss Pass said she has not felt bitter about the treatment of the Indian, she does feel that "better understandings and agreements are needed between the United States and the Indian people."

Miss Pass showed her classmates a "Ghost Dance" costume, which she made especially for the presentation to the class. The "Ghost Dance" was performed by the Indians at the time of the Wounded Knee battle in hopes to raise the Indian to the new world and leave the white man behind.

In a health planning update, the Greater Nebraska Health Systems agency director said health systems agencies are in the spotlight to reduce waste and inefficiency and bring about a more equitable health care system for all segments of the population.

It was pointed out by agencies that have been organized and structured to represent the "grass roots" in the planning and decision-making process which directs and guides the future growth of the health care delivery system in Greater Nebraska.

He explained for health planning to succeed, all elements of the community must become involved. The GNHSA, the director stated, believes in the right of rural residents to receive high quality health services within reasonable geographical proximity.

The director pointed accessibility must be balanced with restraining unreasonable increases in cost of providing these health services. To find these balances, the director said, is the challenge facing GNHSA.

The director explained the guidelines and standards have been and will be developed at the national, state and local levels to guide the decision making of the HSA's. How accurately these guidelines and standards will reflect the situation in Greater Nebraska is the critical question.
