### Wayne Site of Northern Nebraska Office

First District Congressman Elect Doug Bereuter Friday announced that Wayne has been selected as the site for a Northern Nebraska office as a part of his

"constituency service" program. The announcement was made in conjunction with several other announcements by Bereuter during a news conference held in

the community room of the Columbus Federal Savings and Loan building. Bereuter said the office, which will be located in the Columbus

Federal building, is expected to be open sometime in March of next year. It will be manned by a member of his staff. The staff member has not yet been

selected, he said. In making the announcement, Bereuter said he has long felt that the northern area of the first district has been too far removed

from the district office in Lincoln. "Actually," Bereuter explained, "the northern regional office is a part of my campaign promise to maintain close ties with constituents in the first district."

The Northern Nebraska office is an "experiment" according to Bereuter. "We selected Wayne because of its location. Population was not a factor."

He said with two growing communities on the east and west of Wayne, the community of Wayne is an ideal location. Bereuter was referring to Norfolk and South Sioux City in indicating the growth communities.

He also said the all-weather Wayne municipal airport, which he had used several times during campaign swings through northern Nebraska, was a deciding factor in picking Wayne as the site of the Northern Nebraska office.

Bereuter also said he plans to have a "mobile office" which will be manned by another member of his staff and which will travel from community to community within the district to give taxpayers in the district an opportunity to express their views and concerns.

"I expect to be back in the district every other weekend, depending upon the work load in Washington," Bereuter pointed out. "When I am in the district, I will travel with the mobile office as much as possible to personally meet constituents."

The former state senator from Utica, said the "mobile office" concept has worked well in Western Iowa. "And we expect the regional office in Wayne to become a permanent part of a 'constituency service' program."

Bereuter said he feels too many congressmen do not make themselves available to constituents and are "out of touch" with the real problems in the district. "I don't intend to let that happen in the first district."

Since agriculture is the major industry in the first district, Bereuter said he plans to name a farmer to serve as liaison between his office and farm organizations and groups. The person will be named in the near future, he said.

The district office, which will be operated by Larry Fauss, will be located just four blocks from the Capitol Building at 1045 Case Street in Lincoln. See OFFICE, page 9

### Tax Forms Now Ready

Wayne County Assessor Doris Slipp this week announced assessment schedules for 1979 personal property taxes, are now available.

Mrs. Slipp said Nebraska has self-assessment for its taxpayers and the law requires all owners of taxable personal property to list and assess their property.

She said the property shall be assessed to the owner as of Jan. 1, 1979 at 12:01 a.m. She said the schedules must be completed, signed and in her office by March 1, 1979.

Mrs. Slipp said penalties are provided by law for omitted property and for failing to meet the March 1 deadline. She also pointed out that failure to receive notice from the assessor does not exempt a taxpayer from filing a personal or business schedule if they have taxable property.

Wayne Mayor Wayne Marsh was forced to adjourn the regular city council meeting Tuesday because of not enough council members present to make a quorum.

The council will reconvene at 5 p.m. Friday, in the council chambers in city hall. Four council members — Cliff Givn, Larry Johnson, Darrel Heier and Leo Hansen — were present for the Tuesday meeting.

Five members had to be present to have a quorum which is mandatory before any official action can be taken by the council.

Mayor Marsh did conduct public hearings which were advertised for the Tuesday meeting. There were no opponents present to speak out against a proposed Class C liquor license for Terry Luft, doing business as "The T.P." (formerly Nu Tavern).

There were no opponents to proposed rezoning of lots 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12, block 2, Wright's Addition to Wayne.

#### Appreciation Coffee

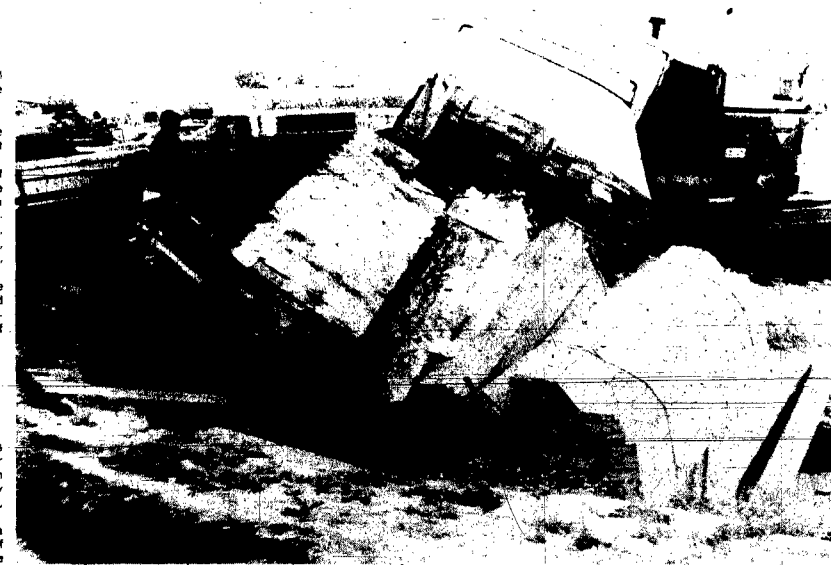

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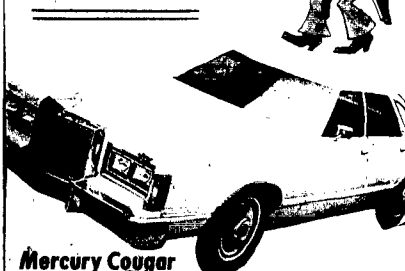
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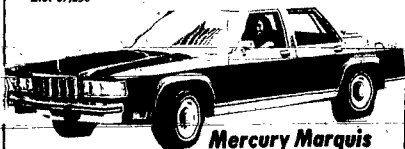

# New Laws For Anglers

Nebraska anglers will have several new regulations facing them on Jan. 1 when the 1979 fishing regulations go into effect, according to the Game and Parks Commission.

One of the regulations deals with a change in number of hooks permitted for ice fishing on waters east of Highway 281. The change restricts the number of lines to a maximum of five with two hooks per line. Elsewhere ice anglers will still be able to use a maximum of 5 hooks per line or 15 hooks total with a maximum of 15 lines.

Another change has to do with fishing tournaments or contests held on state owned or controlled waters. The new regulation requires organizers of the event to provide written notification to the Game and Parks Commission at least 30 days prior to the tournament or contest date. Such notification must include a list of the contest rules, location, and the dates of the contest.

For more information, anglers should obtain a copy of the 1979 Nebraska Fishing Guide, available at permit vendors and Game and Parks Commission offices across the state.

## Register Boat Every 3 Years

Boat owners in Nebraska will only be required to register their boats once every three years, beginning in January, rather than once a year as in past years, according to reports from the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission.

Another change requires Nebraska residents to obtain their new boat registrations from their county treasurer, rather than from the Game and Parks Commission as has been the policy in the past. Nonresidents who normally register their boats in Nebraska rather than their home state may register at any Nebraska county treasurer.

Registration forms are available at all county treasurers, county clerks, hunting and fishing permit vendors, most boat dealers, and Game and Parks Commission offices in Alliance, Bassett, Lincoln, Norfolk, North Platte and Omaha.

Boat owners may mail or take the completed application form and registration fee, according to class of boat, to the county treasurer of their county of residence.

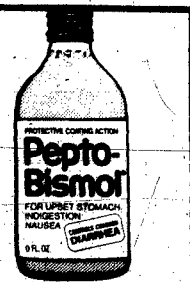

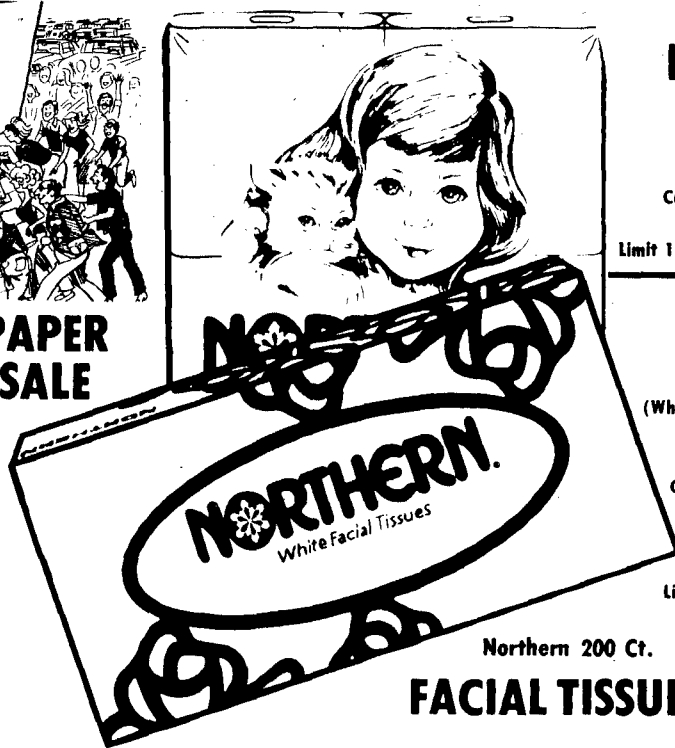

### Gives Dates For Program

Sign-up period of the 1979 Feed, Grain program will be Feb. 15 through April 16, according to information released by the Wayne County ASCS office. Advance diversion payments will not be made. Final payment will be made shortly after acreage reports are made and compliance determined.

The final dates to report crops and land uses are: May 15 for fall-seeded crops and July 15 for spring-seeded crops. The dates the set-aside acres cannot be grazed are April 1 through Sept. 20.

The minimum set-aside required is 10 percent for corn and grain sorghum and 20 percent for wheat and barley planted. No payments for the minimum, officials stated. The minimum set-aside will make the farm eligible for price support grain loans, low yield booster payment and deficiency payments.

Officials explained that to earn diversion payments, an operator will be required to set aside an additional 10 percent of the corn or grain sorghum planted. They also pointed out a 1978 producer who participated in the additional set-aside for payment was restricted to 1979 plantings. In 1979, there is no restriction to prior year acreages. Any corn or grain sorghum producer meeting NCA requirements may earn set-aside payments.

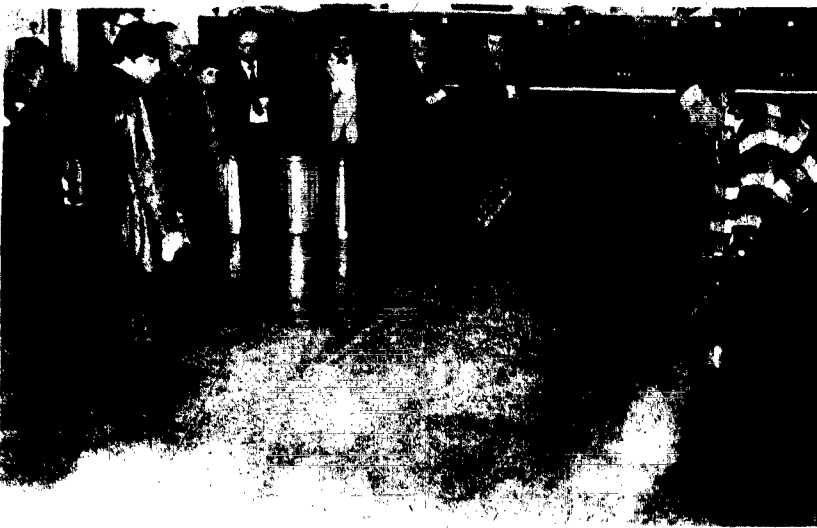
The target prices for 1979 crops are increased. Deficiency payments would be raised. The targets are: Corn, \$2.50 bushel; barley, \$2.40 bushel and grain sorghum, \$2.30 bushel. Loan rates on 1979 crops will be the same as 1978 crops, officials stated.

### Planning a Party? 'Sobering' Statistics

Persons preparing for a New Year's celebration this year should keep in mind these 'sobering' statistics.

Nearly half of all traffic related fatalities in the U.S. are alcohol related. Drunk drivers kill more than 27,000 men, women, and children each year and they injure about 2,350,000 others.

Nebraska's statistics are a little under the national level. Even so, in 1976, 40.9 percent of all the fatal accidents in the state were alcohol related, and in some Nebraska counties the figure is more than 50 percent.

Most likely to be involved in alcohol related accidents are 14-27 year olds, so this group is particularly advised to make some important decisions about safety over the holidays.

The National Council on Alcohol offers these hints for the host and hostess when serving liquor.

1. Don't double up! A lot of people count their drinks. But if you serve doubles, they'll be drinking twice as much as they can handle. Doubling up isn't generous. It's rude.
2. Don't rush refills. Wait until the glass is empty before you offer another drink. And then don't be in a hurry --

especially if someone seems to be coming up empty too fast.

3. Give more than a drink. Introduce two people who don't know each other. Get a conversation started. Give someone a compliment -- or a laugh. You have more to give than just drinks. A host or hostess is not just a bartender.

4. Keep 'em nibbling. Not just later on, but while your guests are drinking. That's important, because it slows down the rate at which alcohol is absorbed into the bloodstream. It also slows down the rate at which people drink.

5. Offer soft drinks. One third of the adult population chooses not to drink at all. And many others who drink socially sometimes prefer not to suffer a choice. And when someone says "no, thanks -- don't push it." There are 9 million Americans for whom even one drink is one too many.

And finally, if someone drinks too much at your house, you are responsible. That's what it means to be a host. See that he gets home safely, but don't let him drive. And don't think you can sober someone up in a short time with a cold shower or black coffee. Only time can sober him up. It will take about one hour for every drink he's had. So sometimes it's best to let the guest "sleep it off" instead of going home

New improvements on real estate and additions including irrigation as well as the removal of improvement must be reported to the county assessor not later than March 1, 1979.

Mrs. Stipp said an assessor will be located at the Wayne county courthouse from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. every day except Saturdays and Feb. 19.

Assessors will be located in the following towns: Hoskins, Jan. 8 and Feb. 2; Winside, Jan. 9 and Feb. 5; Carroll, Jan. 10 and Feb. 6; Sholes, Jan. 11 and Feb. 7.

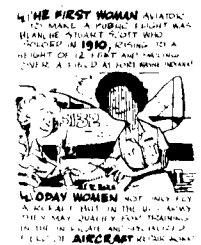

Marshal, Wally Barnett; Harris Owens, crime commission, and Donald Levenberger, budget administrator.

During the news conference at which the appointments were announced, Thones said he may declare a moratorium on new state construction because of concern that increased while he was going over the preliminary review of his first budget proposal. He must submit his budget to the Legislature less than a month after he is sworn in.

**More Litter Control Talk**  
The question of how to control litter is back in the news.

Those who led the successful effort to kill the bottle bill that was on the general election ballot last November have released details of their counter proposal, but it came under almost immediate attack. Several spokesmen for the Sierra Club, which was among groups that wanted a law requiring mandatory deposits on soft drinks and beer containers, said they would fight the proposal if it is introduced during the 1979 legislative session.

Meanwhile, the Litter Control Task Force said it would study the suggested legislation to determine if there are parts of it which it can support.

The bill was prepared by Nebraskans for Freedom of Choice, which includes retailers, distributors and bottle and can manufacturers.

The task force was established by state environmental control Director Dan Drain to find out if opposing factions in the controversy could get together and work out a compromise.

Members of Nebraskans for Freedom of Choice were invited to serve on the task force but decided not to participate so they could back their own plan.

The NFC is proposing a program that would emphasize education, enforcement of litter laws and recycling. It has been estimated their plan would require \$700,000 in tax money.

A bill similar to what the NFC is suggesting was vetoed by Gov. J. James Exon earlier this year.

The plan is modeled on a Washington state law, which according to Robert Warrick of Meadow Grove, a Sierra Club spokesman, isn't working very well.

Some members of the task force, which includes many veterans who favored passage of the bottle bill, said their recommendations may not be ready for introduction in the Unicameral this year.

The continuation of the disagreement between those favoring and opposing

bottle bill legislation concerns Drain. He noted very strong feelings are involved. "The polarity between those groups is still as far apart as ever, if not farther apart than before the task group was formed," Drain said.

One task force member, Gerald Grauer, an engineer with the state Roads Department, said the litter problem must be defined before a solution can be found. He said the department spent more than \$70,000 on litter collection on the state highway system during the 1978 budget year.

The task force asked Drain to conduct a sampling of litter so the group would have a better idea of the scope of the trash problem.

**Water Debate Continues**  
How to go about updating Nebraska's water plan continues to provoke debate, some of which was aired recently during a hearing conducted by members of the Legislature's Public Works and Appropriations committees.

A blueprint for a plan devised by representatives of various state agencies was criticized by some of those testifying.

Several questioned the advisability of creating a council representing eight state agencies to help in coordination of the

planning. Others wondered about the need of a citizens advisory committee, arguing the 24 natural resources districts should be in position to offer all the data needed for water planning.

There were, however, others who testified they favor a joint approach to planning but that the blueprint should have defined in more detail how each of the state agencies would be involved.

A representative of the Wildlife Management Institute, Keith Harmon of Firth, said the blueprint should have wider dissemination and up to 60 days should be allowed for comment on it.

Harmon said he did not want the public excluded from offering ideas and added he was not satisfied natural resources districts would assure sufficient public involvement.

**Predicts Possible Delay**  
State Sen. Loran Schmit of Bellwood told delegates to the recent Nebraska Agricultural Council meeting the Legislature may delay property tax relief laws scheduled to go into effect during the next two years.

Schmit noted there are nine new state senators and he did not know how they will vote. "But I feel sure we have lost some of

the support for property tax relief that we once had," he said.


The Legislature has exempted farm equipment from personal property taxes starting in 1978-79, business inventories in 1979-80 and livestock in 1980-81.

Schmit told the delegates he favors shifting the cost of government to the sales and income taxes. "Whenever possible so that everyone contributes to the cost of government,"

**Advised Delay**  
Governor James Exon had cautioned governors in four nearby states, which with Nebraska make up the Old West Regional Commission, not to proceed on plans for a school of veterinary medicine until after it has been determined what Gov.-elect Charles Thones and the 1979 Legislature do.

Exon said he believes the proposal to establish a regional school, which probably would be in Lincoln, is sound. If the proposal is not good for Nebraska, "then it certainly is not good for our sister states," the governor said.

Thones has said he is bothered by the preliminary cost estimates for the school. Estimates given to a legislative committee is that construction costs alone would total \$28 million.

## Man-bite-dog News

A federal regulatory agency recently made man-bite-dog news in the Nation's Capitol. Instead of issuing a new regulation, the agency eliminated hundreds of regulations condemned as obsolete or downright silly.

In all, 928 regulations were dropped by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), including one on the proper design of toilet seats, which will remain a source of embarrassment until its dying day (OSHA's, not the regulation's).

But as noted by one newspaper editorial commending the agency, elimination of 928 regulations is "only a step toward compliance by the bureaucracy with President Carter's orders to get ride of 'nutcase' standards."

Actually, the action is really little more than a preliminary skirmish in a bigger and far more important battle against regulations with an inflationary impact on the economy, which have been targeted for attack by President Carter in his anti-inflation campaign. It is widely conceded today that federal regulation adds at least 1/2 percent to the rate of inflation.

In OSHA's case, elimination of the minor regulations is only the top of the iceberg — many more standards should be deleted or modified and new ones under consideration need to be screened to eliminate new inflationary expenditures.

For example, OSHA is working on a noise limit standard for U.S. workplaces which could add billions to costs of employers.

OSHA also is aggressively promulgating sweeping health standards and apparently is going to insist on a zero-risk concept regardless of cost to industry.

In addition, it is moving into labor-management areas not originally intended, which also impacts on costs that must be passed on to consumers.

Meanwhile, other agencies are showing no signs of letup. The Federal Trade Commission is proposing new rules covering sale of used cars; the Consumer Product Safety Commission wants upholstery in furniture made fire-safe from smokers; tough air pollution standards face the auto industry, etc.

Where will it end?  
The Chamber of Commerce of the United States has an answer which it has recommended to President Carter and his White House inflation fighters. It recommends:

- Freezing budgets of regulatory agencies and their staffs for fiscal 1979 and 1980.
- Establishing a credible central control within the government over the thousands of regulations pouring from dozens of agencies.
- Requiring cost-versus-benefits analysis to justify regulations.
- Refusing to implement a new regulation unless an old one of at least equal cost to the economy is removed.

The Chamber estimates that such actions would reduce price inflation by 1/2 of 1 percent in 1979 and 1980.

For starters, White House inflation watchers should consider OSHA.

more than is justified on a true comparability basis.

Federal pay, according to the Chamber, averages 42 percent higher than in private industry, based on official U.S. Commerce Department survey data showing federal pay averaging \$17,404 compared with \$12,220 for state and local government workers and \$12,244 for those in private industry.

The Chamber also recommended that the President appoint a neutral commission — excluding representatives with possible conflict of interest — to review the system and recommend changes to eliminate overpayment, which in the Chamber's study amounts to \$14 billion a year.

Taxpayers would welcome an impartial study.

## Lincoln to Sandhills...horseback

In October, 1903, Mr. and Mrs. J.B. Parker, of Lincoln, rode horseback from Lincoln to the Sandhills ranch near Dunning, Blaine County, a distance of 282 miles. It took seven days to reach the ranch, where they remained for eight days. The return trip took six days. Parker considerably overweight, hoped to lose 75 to 100 pounds while lounging along in the saddle.

During the 504-mile journey, Mrs. Parker rode a Kentucky Thoroughbred but Parker, who had once ridden the range, was mounted on a "regular western horse" that he had purchased in South

Omaha. Mrs. Parker's riding outfit consisted of divided skirts, sweater, cowboy hat, and riding shoes, while Parker wore an ordinary business suit and cowboy hat. Both used regulation cowboy saddles. Their route was planned so that there would be no camping out or stopping along the roadside for meals. They ate their meals and slept at hotels.

Seated on a pillow at his place of business, Parker described their recent ride to a reporter for the Omaha Daily Bee's supplement, the "Illustrated Bee" (copies of which are in the newspaper files of the Nebraska State Historical Society). Excerpts follow:

"The times when I got tired were when night was coming on and we would meet some man on the road, and he would say it was three or four miles to the next town. We would jog along, come in sight of the town and then find it was six or seven miles away. ... When the train would pass us I had visions of home and of the greatness of the iron horse.

"We had fine weather nearly all the way (but at Dunning, Neb. we met back a sand storm. ... the sand cut our faces. ... It was impossible to make any headway against it.

"One night we rounded into Lincoln at 6:30 and found nothing there but a section house. Not even a place for our horses. ... There was nothing here (in fact not a peep on the line or four miles to the next town) and hills, rain and snow. Then the stars came up I believe it was the darkest night I ever saw. We had nearly a little trail to follow in the sand, and we ran into a

## Stands Time Test

**WASHINGTON** — The law of supply and demand is one law that has stood the test of time. Whenever governments fool around with it, history tells us, they fail. This is the said history of wage and price controls.

The Romans, plagued by war debts and a vast bureaucracy, tried wage-price controls in 314 A.D. and, according to Lactantius, the historian, "much blood (was) shed upon very slight and trifling accounts."

In the Revolutionary War, while their soldiers almost starved at Valley Forge, American farmers sold at "reasonable rates" to the British rather than accept lower prices imposed by the continental Congress and legislators of the colonies.

And when controls were tried as recently as 1971-74, instead of slowing inflation, they distorted prices, created shortages and black markets and bottled up market forces that, when unleashed, exploded in double-digit inflation.

But like alchemists of old, there are those who still persist, forever trying new formulas and theories. President Carter has chosen to experiment with a system of voluntary wage and price guidelines, establishing 7 percent as the ceiling on wage increases, give or take an exception, and a complex formula for price devaluation.

Whatever the merits of wage and price controls in reducing inflation, voluntary guidelines certainly will not work if ignored. This is why President Carter, in his recent anti-inflation television address, urged American workers to enlist as "volunteers" by accepting the pay standards.

For those who accept, the President promised, the government would make up the difference if inflation exceeds 7 percent with a year-end tax refund.

The plan, called "real wage insurance," requires Congressional approval. The idea is not new among economists and in academic circles: It is a form of the tax incentives plan known as Tax-based Income Policy, or TIP. Such policies attempt to use the tax code to induce business or workers to hold down prices or wage increases.

There are two approaches — the carrot and the stick. The President has extended the carrot to employees.

While the Administration has not yet decided on many of the details, the plan would work something like this: Groups of employees would be eligible for refunds if their employers certify compliance with the pay standards. The refund would be the excess of the Consumer Price Index over the pay standard, based on a formula of 1 percent of the first \$20,000 of income for each percentage point over 7 percent. A worker earning \$10,000 who accepted a 7

percent increase would receive a \$200 refund if inflation rose to 9 percent (a distinct possibility in 1979). There would be a top limit of \$600 on rebates. Only employees in groups adhering to the standard would be eligible for the refund.

In my judgment the idea won't fly.

— Inflation accelerates further in 1979, due say to an increase in oil prices, the rebates could cost the Treasury as much as \$12 billion, increasing rather than reducing the budget deficit. Working like cost-of-living escalators, the rebates could end up perpetuating inflation.

— The more successfully the plan works, the more it behaves like mandatory controls — with all their evils — by encouraging wage settlements at or near the standard, thus putting a floor under inflation.

The administrative effort, involving millions of workers, thousands of employers and incredible auditing problems, would be enormous, creating new pressures to expand the bureaucracy to handle it.

Is the plan fair? No again.

It will probably exclude the self-employed and those earning less than \$4 an hour.

It shortchanges workers whose union contracts are renegotiated in 1979.

And it shortchanges those with higher incomes who would be entitled to more than the \$600 maximum rebate.

Plus it pays back cheaper 1980 dollars. It's not a solution to inflation. It's a national lottery. Our answer is to forget controls and guidelines and to work to reduce government spending and the federal deficit, offsetting some of the deflationary impact with a major tax cut in 1979. That will keep the economy moving.

Only the big tax spenders lose that way.

Howard Wiegiers, professor of forestry, fisheries and wildlife in the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources, said jobs are available in national forests, national parks, wildlife refuges or research laboratories.

The program, which is sponsored by the IWL in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Interior and the U.S. Forest Service, is in its 16th year.

Wiegiers said that in addition to a desire for a conservation career, each applicant should have shown a potential for leadership and scholastic ability, must be in good health and, in some cases, be physically capable of field work.

He stressed that applicants must be 18 years old by June 15, 1979, and he said college students are not eligible.

Students applying must submit the following material for consideration:

A complete U.S. Government Form 171, which is available from local Federal Job Information Centers listed in the phone directory.

— A transcript of student's high school record.

— A written recommendation from an adult, other than family, indicating the applicant and his or her qualifications for the program.

— A letter from the applicant indicating his or her college and career plans, activities in high school, previous conservation-oriented work, both paid and volunteer, and reasons for seeking employment in the program.

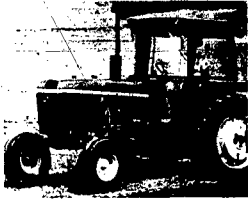

Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District has paid approximately \$352,000 to landowners to install conservation practices on their land. This amount is a result of two programs, Land and Water Development Assistance Fund and the Lands for Conservation.

1. Land and Water Development Assistance Fund was set up to pay a portion of the cost of installing soil and water conservation practices on private land. Thus far in fiscal 1979, \$235,000 has been paid on a cost-share basis for con-

struction of conservation practices. The following is a list of those practices:

- Terrace Systems
- Diversion
- Sod Waterways
- Water Impoundment Dams
- Sediment, Water or Erosion Control Dams
- Permanent Native Grass Seedings
- Conservation Tillage
- Irrigation Water Conservation
- Windbreak Restoration and Establishment
- Animal Waste Control Facilities
- Forest Tree Plantations
- Permanent Wildlife Habitat

These are Federal Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) practices which are cost shared, with funds administered by local ASCS Offices. Each ASCS Office is allocated a certain amount of cost-share funds, with a limit of \$2,500, paid to individual landowners. This limit will be raised to \$3,500 for 1979. Lower Elkhorn NRD cost-share funds can not be obtained until application is made for ACP funds. If ACP funds are exhausted or the limit is reached, NRD funds can be obtained at the same rates. Cost-share rates are set by county ASCS committees, and may range from 30 percent on low priority practices to 90 percent for high priority practices.

2. Lower Elkhorn NRD established the Lands for Conservation Program in 1977 as an added, incentive for landowners, to construct terrace systems. \$117,000 has been paid to landowners in fiscal 1979 at the rate of \$40 per acre. Under this program, the terraces must be constructed between June 1 and September 1. This will spread out the construction work which is usually concentrated in the spring and fall, so that more work can be done. In addition, the landowner may raise a small grain crop such as oats.

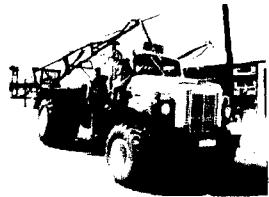

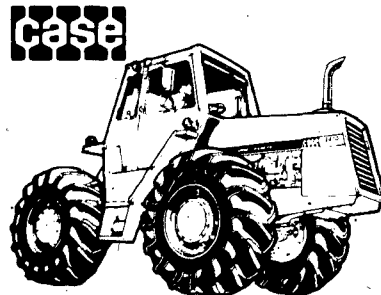

L.B. 450 Nebraska Water Conservation Act  
The Nebraska Water Conservation Act, passed by the legislature in 1977, has provided \$500,000 for cost-sharing water and soil conservation practices on private land. The program is administered by NNRC with NRD's submitting projects for funding. Each NRD has been apportioned \$20,800 with the money to be used for terraces, water impoundment dams, grade stabilization structures and irrigation re-use pits.

Lower Elkhorn NRD has obligated its apportionment for three projects.

1. Robert Ramm received cost-share funds for two small water impoundment dams in Stanton County.

2. Adolph Eillinghausen's project consisted of a small grade stabilization structure and 5370 feet of pushup terraces with tile outlets.

3. The remaining funds have been obligated, with construction to take place in spring of 1979.

The Nebraska Water Conservation Program is a much needed source of additional funds for applying soil and water conservation practices to the land. In future years, more funds from all levels are necessary if progress is to be made in controlling soil losses and cleaning up our water.

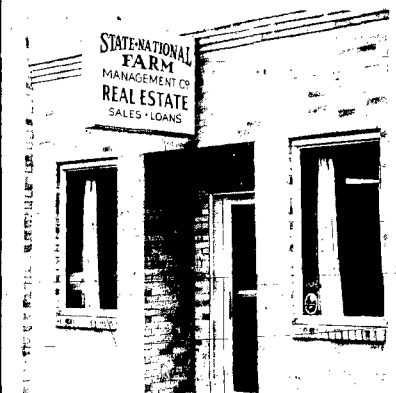

Landowners wishing to order Clarke-McNary trees should contact your local SCS Office as soon as possible. These seedlings cost \$17.25 per hundred and can be used for several purposes, including windbreaks and wildlife habitat. Orders were accepted beginning November 1 and supplies of some species are already short or exhausted. Hackberry, honeylocust and lilac are sold out while green ash, austrian pine, ponderosa pine, and all shrubs are in short supply.

The seedlings may be planted by the landowner or NRD tree planters will plant and spray them at a cost of 20c per tree with a minimum charge of \$45. Contact your local SCS Office for more information, or to order trees.



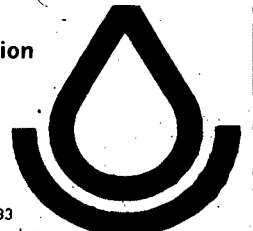
