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New Laws For Anglers

Nebraska anglers will have several new regulations facing fitem on Jan. 1 when the 1979 fishing regulations go into affect, according to the Game and Parks Commission.

One of the regulations deals with a change in number of hooks permitted for ice fishing on waters east of Highway 281. The change restricts the number of lines to a maximum of How with two hooks per line. Eisewhere ice angler's will still be able to use a maximum of 5 hooks per line or 15 hooks total with a maximum of 15 lines.

Another change has to do with fishing tournaments or contests held on state owned or controlled waters. The new regulation requires organizers of the event to provide written notification to the Game and Parks Commission at least 30 days prior to the tournament or contest date. Such notification must include a list of the contest rules incettain, and the dates of the contest

Man-bite-dog News

A federal regulatory agency recently made man-bite-dog news in the Nation's Capital: Instead of issuing a new regula-tion, the agency eliminated hundreds of regulations condemned as obsolete or downright silly. In all, 928 regulations were dropped by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), including one on the proper design of toilet seats, which will the dying day (OSHA's, not the regula-tion's)."

Actually, the action is really little more than a preliminary skirmish in a ploger and far more important battle against regulations with an inflationary impact on the economy, which have been targeted for strack by President Carter in_bis, anti-inflation campaign. It is widely conceded today that federal regulation adds at least visits of 1 percent to the rate of inflation. In OSHA's case, elimination of the minor regulations is only the topol-the iceberg – many more standards should be deteed or modified an ew ones under considera-tion need to be screened to eliminate new inflationary expense.

Inflationary expense. For example, OSHA is working on a noise limit standard for U.S. workplaces which could add billions to costs of

REGRARD L. LESHER President Chamber of Commerce of the United States WASHINGTON — The law of supply and demand is one law that has stood the test of time. Whenever governments fool around with it, history tells us, they fail. This is the said history of wage and price controls.

controls. The Romans, plagued by war debts and a vast bureaucracy, tried wage-price controls in 314 A.D. and, according to Lactantius, the historian, "much blood (was) shed upon very slight and trifling

Lactantius, the historian. "much blood (was) shed upon very siight and trilling accounts..." In the Revolutionary War, while their soldiers aimosh-starved at Valley Forge. American farmèns sold at "reasonable rates" to,the Brijbah rather than accept lower pricks-imposed by the continental Congress and legislatures of the colonies. And when controls were tried as recently as 1971-74, instead of slowing' inflation, they distoried prices, created shortages and black markets and bottled up market forces that, when unleashed, explosed in double-digit inflation. But like eichemiss of old, there are formulas and theories. President Carter has chosen to experiment with a system of voluntary wage and price guidelines, establishing 7 percent as the celling on wage increases, give or take an exception, and a complex formula for price declera-tion.

Whatever the merits of wage and price controls in reducing inflation, voluntary guidelines certainty will not work. If ignored, This is why President Certer, in his recent anti-inflation television address, orged American workers to enlist as "volunteer's" by accepting the pay stan-dards. 



NOTICE TO WAYNE COUNTY TAXPAYERS The State of Nebraska has self-assessment for its taxpayers. The law requires all owners of taxable personal property to list and assess their property. This property shall be assessed to the owner as of January 1, 1979 at 12:01 a.m. Personal property schedules must be completed, signed, and in the office of the County Assessor by March 1, 1979. Penalties are provided by law for omitted property and for filing a scheduled after March 1, 1979. Schedules are available at the office of the County Assessor. Failure to receive notice from the Assessor does not exempt you from filing a personal or business schedule if you have taxable property.

1979 Individual Property Schedule The following personal property must be assessed: livestock, portable buildings, The foll improvements on leased land, motorized boats, motors, airplanes, unlicensed motor vehicles and any leased or consigned taxable personal property in your custody.

1979 Nebraska Business and Professional Property Schedule Professional Property Schedule The following personal property must be listed: leasehold improvements, leased or consigned personal property in your custody, portable buildings, improve-ments on leased land, motorized boats, motors, airplanes, unlicensed motor vehicles, furniture, fixtures, tools and equipment. All equipment and fixtures teal be listed with acruisition date and shall be listed with acquisition date and

cost. Also household property in fur-nished rental units must be listed.

An improvement statement must be filed with the County Assessor prior to commencing improvements or altera-tions. Mobile homes and cabin trailers located on your property must be reported.

Failure to do so by April 1st, 1979, is waiver of exemption. Wool Prices

Announced Support prices of \$1.15 per pound for 1979 marketings of shorn wool and \$1.943 per pound for mohair were announced today by Ray Fitzgeraid, Administra-tor of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agriculture! Stabi-lization and Conservation Ser-vice.

Putted wool will continue to be supported at a level comparable to the support price for shorn wool through payments on un-shorn lambs.

As in the past years, shorn wooi payments will be based on a percentage of each producers returns from sales. The percen-tage will be that required to reise tage will be that required to raise the national average price re-ceived by all producers for shorn wool in 1979 up to the support price of \$1.15 a pound. Currently shorn wool prices are averaging 75 to 80 cents a pound.

Any mohair payments will be calculated in a menner similar to woot However, mohair pay-ments for 1/29 probaby will not be necessary as it appears that the average price received by producers in the open market will be helder than the subpoort ervce
