

LINCOLN — Enactment of the Kemp. th bill recently introduced in Congress suid have favorable Impacts upon the hibratic Economy, according to Dr. anse R. Schmidt, assistant professor nd research associate at the University Nebratics Lincoin's Bureau of Business

of Nebreeks-Lincoln's Burresu or ourmes-Research, Writing in the February issue of "Business in Nebraska". Schmidt noted that the spirit of the Kemp-Roth bill is related to there of Catifornia's Proposition 13 and the, "Idd bills" currently being discussed in Nebraska. Kemp-Roth calls for large cuts in Faderal personal income tax rates, moderate cuts in corporate income tax rates, and limitations on tederal spending. In the area of taxas, the bill provides for a 30 63 percent cut in personal fax rates over a three year neridd.

i personal tax rates over a three year eridd. Proponents of the bill believe that the urmant tax structure imposes an exces-live burden upon the economy, causing auring and investment to be below the aluas needed for long term economic rowth. They also advocate lower fax also advocate lower fax abs of purposes of improving the roductivity of workers. Over the long intro growth in productivity will help sep the initiation rate down. Opponents of Kemp-Roth contend that be tax cut's called for are too large and ould cause a sizeable increase in the iderail deficit. They fear that such an spension in the deficit would contribute o high initiation. Schmidt noted that millar fears were expressed over the emedy-Johnson tax cuts in the early

With the decline in federal war takes, revenue collections from the state personal income tax would decline autilital decreases would be collections. Schmidt says that over the long term, he higher income levels resulting from Kemp-Roth's passage could uposaibly rovide the same amount of income tax evenue that would be collected under the current federal tax rates. Despite the positive influences of Kemp-Roth, it could contribute to infla-tion during the first few years following enactment, Schmidt concludes.



Winter sports in Lincoln, 1897

Outdoor winter sports in Nebraska have changed remarkably little since ploneer days. Although horse-drawn sleighs have been replaced by snow-mobiles, sledding and ice skating are as opoular now as they were around the turn of the century. The Dec. 11, 1897. 


