Memorial Chairman Reports \$750 Donations To Cancer Society

Mrs. Fred Gildersteeve, memorial chairman for the Wayne County Unit of the American Cancer Society, reports that contributions since Sept. 1, 1978 in Wayne County totaled approximately \$750, and will be credited to the 1979 campaign.

Mrs. Gildersteeve said the Wayne County Unit is grateful to families and individuals of Wayne County who are using the memorial program as a means of honoring those who have died of cancer. "This 'living memorial' is an expression of love and devotion to the deceased is most fitting," said Mrs. Gildersteeve, adding that through such remembrances and donations programs of research, education and service will eventually lead to the control of cancer.

Memorial contributions are received year around by the local unit. The name of the deceased is inscribed in the "Nebraska Living Memorial Book," and the gift is promptly acknowledged both to the donor and next of kin.

"The rapid growth of memorial giving in Wayne County reflects greater public awareness of the need for more resources in the widening fight against cancer," said Mrs. Gildersteeve. "When loved ones fall victim to cancer — which strikes one out of two families — all of us feel the impulse to do something about it. We want to strike back. Help us through memorials and support of the Spring Crusade to put an end to the disease."

HOW DOES YOUR KITCHEN RATE?

The worksheet below helps you measure work and storage areas in an effort to get an accurate reading on how efficient your kitchen is. A rating of poor or only fair may mean that its time to remodel your kitchen. And if you're going to remodel, now is the time to do it. Allied Lumber's gigantic kitchen cabinet sale is now on with saving up to 35 percent. Fill in the below worksheets and see how your kitchen rates.



1. Work Triangle Good Fair Poor

Measure the distance from sink to range _____; from sink to refrigerator _____; from refrigerator to range _____. If none of these distances is less than 4' or more than 7', check "good;" if less than 4', check "poor;" if more than 9' (and none less than 4'), check "fair."

2. Counter Space Good Fair Poor

Check "good" if there is at least 30" counter space on each side of sink, at least 18" on opening side of refrigerator, and at least 18" adjacent to range, plus a mixing counter of at least 36" (preferably 42"). The mixing counter space may include the space requirements at other centers. Check "fair" if the counter space is just slightly under. If any center is completely lacking a counter, check "poor."

3. Storage Space Good Fair Poor

Measure wall cabinet shelves in feet _____. Measure all base cabinet widths in feet _____; add 50 percent and write new total _____. (This allows for extra storage depth at bottom of cabinets.) Add wall cabinet shelving and adjusted base cabinet total _____. If the total storage is less than 50', check "poor." If the total is just over 50' and there is not less than 20' in wall or base cabinets, check "fair." If the kitchen totals well above the 50' minimum, check "good."

4. Drawer Storage Good Fair Poor

The equivalent of four drawers at least 18" wide qualifies as "fair." More than the minimum may be checked as "good" and less as "poor."

The above covers basic flaws in kitchens. There are unusual problems pertaining to relationship of the kitchen to adjacent rooms, door swings, traffic through kitchen, window placement, lighting and plumbing that are difficult to list in a questionnaire. Just describe below any special problems in your kitchen.

Also list any personal likes or dislikes — for instance, open shelves, certain decorating colors or styles.
