Finding jobs for graduates

During that period, Strain said, high school vocational numbers nearly quadripled, "Hising, from 14,446 to 57,267. Post-secondary enrallment rose from 724 to 15,840 and adult education enrollment from 16,476 to 27,397.

The public high school students in vocational programs increased from 16 percent in 1994 to 55 percent in 1978. The state Education Department's goal is to have 60 percent of all high school students in vocational covactional coverament's goal is to have 60 percent of all high school students in vocational covers by 1982.

The board-was-told_distributive educa-

tion — on-the-job training — has an enrollment of 50.4 percent males and 49.6 percent females. The number of females enrolling in traditionally male trade and industry courses is gradually increasing, risingle least year, from 4.8 percent for Strain's report indicated vocational education graduates generally have a lower unemployment rate than others in their age category.

About 6 percent of high skhool graduates from vocational programs last year could not find a job. The average unemployment rate for students in the same age group is 20 percent.

The report indicated only 4.8 percent of community callege vocational graduates who wanted jobs failed to get them.

The federal government provides most of the aid local school districts receive through the state Education Department for vocational education.

GAS TAX BILL READVANCED

The bill calling for boosting the state gasoline lax from 9.5 to 10.5 cents per getion is back in the Legislature.

The measure was advanced once before-but was recalled by the Revenue.

The state is allocated a little more than half the state gas tax revenue, and the balance is divided evently between counties and cities.

Keyes also tried to earmark the additional \$10 million for matching with federal tunds for bridge repair and construction. He said the federal government will make available millions of dollars, on an 80-20 match basis, to states to that worn out and inadequate bridges can be replaced or upgraded.

Several of his colleagues on the committee said counties wishing to participate in the bridge program will still be able to do so with their share of the extra gas tax revenue.

Sen. Vard Johnson of Omaha said the bill should have been killed because if

Al this writing, a bill that would legalize use of Laetrile in treatment of cancer remains stuck in the Public Health and Wetlare Committee.

During a recent hearing, the medical community continued its opposition to the legislation with several doctors arguing.

that Laetrile — a derivative of apricot pits — is an unproven freatment. But families of cancer patients said passage of the bill would save them money because they must travel to illinois or Oklahoma to obtain the drug. They also said insurance companies would be more likely to pay health benefits for use of the drug if it were legalized.

Recognizing agriculture myths

NEBRASKA FARM BUREAU FEDERATION BY M.M. VAN KIRK, DIRECTOR OF INFORMATION

The economic and political status of the U.S. farmer and rancher might be better understood if more of the myths concerning agriculture were laid to rest. Recently Dr. Paul Gessaman, associate Recently Dr. Paul Gessaman, associate professor of ag economics in the University of Nebraska's Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources, gave a talk at the "The Great Plains: Perspectives and Prospects" symposium in which he commented on some of the myths which have surrounded the Great Plains and its people from pioneer times to the present.

According to a resume of his speech, he said that while the people of the Great Plains may pride themselves on their. "rugged individualism." He have as much at stake in governmental activity as anyone. He said the idealized image of the plains, as seen in literature and the media, of a society where citizens have freedom of economic pursuit and succeed on their own initiative is a direct conflict with a modern, complex society.

Dr. Gessaman said that "people articulate the values of rugged individualism, while they practice something very different." And he said that the modern agricultural system is dependent on government intervention and group processes to make it work. "The result is a contributing desire for government intervention to alleviate price and or income problems in the Great Plains." Gessaman moted that even in pioner days when individualism was a way of life and they was a "built in" conservatism that things should be left as they are with government interventing as little as possible, the early farmers and ranchers with government at strong sheriff, frade restric-

tions, protection of their land, education al opportunities, mail service and more — all from the government. What has changed since pioneer days is the scope

au opportunines, man service and infore all from the government. What has thanged since pioneer days is the scope of services demanded from government and how people view governmental activity.

Gessaman's comments may stir some resentment from people who like to continue myths and preserve images but coasionally we benefit from taking a good look at ourselves and our inconsistencies. People would like to control inflation only in those places where it hurts them. Their cost of Ilving and their costs of production. But they like higher wages and higher prices for their products which are the Illusionary dangers of the inflationary spiral.

Our ploneer grandfathers and great-grandfathers did look at government land grants to railroads to encourage them to build lines to move their products to market, land grants for universities to educate their descendants, location of Army posts and troops to protect them from Indian raids and to stabilize the frontier, bridges to be built across the big rivers, school lands to be set aside for the support of public education.

The West would not have been won and settled so rapidly without these things, and this fact doesn't take a thing away from the courage and fortitude of the pioneers.

Theirs was a simpler like bounds by the realities of time and distance.

Theirs was a simpler life bounded by the realities of time and distance. The terrible bilizzards of the late 1870's and early 1880's that wiped out some of the great open range cattle ranches of the time were over and done with before government agencies and people outside the area even realized that a disaster had occurred.

Homesteaders starved out on 160 acres of land in Western Nebraska and Kinkaiders gave up on 640 acres in the Sandhills because such units were impractical in a low-moisture area and there was no agency of government to rush in to attempt to save them. Neighbors picked up their lands and made them into more workable units and became the "rugged individualists" who survived and prospered. Myths notwithstanding, the good guys didn't always win, a handshake never was as good as having a man's signature

was as good as having a man's signature on a contract, and it has always been most helpful for anyone wanting to farm or ranch to inherit or marry the basis for getting started.

WASHINGTON — Are you lired of
seeing your local laxes go up each year,
even though the level of services might
stay the same? Did you know that there
are many alternatives which could
provide your community with an almost
surefire way of reducing your tax burden
— to cite but one, a privately run fire
department? Research published by the
Local Government Center in Santa
Barbara, Cal., indicates communities
now contracting with private fire departments have cut the cost of their fire
protection roughly in half.
Two communities that have proven this
concept are Scottsdale, Artz., and Elk
Grove Township, Ill. In Elk Grove, the
owner of the American Emergency
Services Corporation, Gary Jensen, estimates he can save \$6,000 each time he

buys a fire truck without decoratie chrome. The tradition, of course, has been for fire departments to use spiffy chrome-plated trucks which must be polished by idle fireflighters at additional taxpayer expense in anticipation of the next parade.

In Scottsdale, the owner of the Rural Metro Fire Department, Lou Witzeman, not only avoids chrome trucks, but factory-built equipment as well. Witzeman has found his company can build its own equipment for under half the regular cost.
Witzeman has also developed other

Witternan has also developed other ingenious ways to cut unnecessary costs without sacrificing efficiency. In a story appearing in TWA's-February edition of Ambassador magazine, Witzeman said 80 percent of all fires are the kitchen or brush fire type and can be extinguished with less than 300 gailons of water. So the developed what he calls an "attack truck," which is basically an oversited, specially equipped pick-up truck with a 300 gailon pumper. The truck can be operated by one person, and it is the first piece of equipment Witzeman sends to a fire. If the fire is too big, he has additional equipment on the scene within minutes.

A brown fur collar adorned his cost. On the little linger of his left hand specified an ine-carat diamond, and he Wore the diamond bell buckte, "America" Champlon Cowboy' centred with a 10-carat rock." Accompanying Tom was his "wonder horse," Tony, taken directly—from the Train 10 quarters in the Cybeium, "probably the largest and best stable a horse ever fad." The star himself was lodged at the Hotel Fontenelle.

Criginal plans had called for Tom to proceed from Union Station to the World Herald building in downlown-Omaha for an open air meeting with young tans, who were invited to appear in cowboy costumes and participate in a roping contest. But an April snow storm unexpectedly struck the city and the event was postponed until the following Monday afternoon. On Easter Sunday, April 8, Tom and his party braved snow and freezing temperatures to attach services stomaha's First Presbyterian Church. The building was thronged by persons trying to catch a glimpse of the movie Idol. That afternoon he opened his week-long engagement at the Crybnum.

The next day Tom made his iong milicipated public appearance at the World Herald building at 15th and Farnem Streets. The April 10 World Herald reported his riumphal procession

from the Orpheum: "Motorcycle officers under capilans and sergeants in cowboy hats and with big handkerchiefs about heir necks, formed the escort from the theater to the corner. On the corner itself police officials and patrolinen made the block ready for the coming. The street was kept open from noon, with patrolinen along it, moving the cars from the sidelines. A great sea of faces lined both Fiffeenth and Farnam Streets on both sides. Windows of surrounding office buildings were crammed and jammed with faces; Shortly after the stroke of 4 there went up a cry 'Here he comes! Here comes Tom! There's Tomy!"
Following his arrival, Tom mounted a platform beside Omaha major Jim Dahlman. Dahlman himself boasted a cowboy background. PRINE FRUITTREES SOON
Before bud break this spring, truit trees need their annual pruning. Annual maintenance pruning of trees in the home fruit garden keeps trees healthy and productive. Usually it is necessary to remove only a small amount of wood each year if the trees have been annually runed.
