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WARM WEATHER last weekend and the first part of this week combined with rain showers to melt the snow cover, turning feedlots and county roads into mud-mires. Rain showers were predicted for Wednesday, continuing through today (Thursday).

More Rain Expected

Spring, Thaw Arrive on Schedule

Spring and the spring thaw both arrived on schedule. Weekend temperatures in the 50's made a major dent in the snow cover. The runoff from the snow plus rain showers turned feedlots and county roads into mud-mires. More rain was expected in the area Wednesday and Thursday.

The situation was compounded as the ground was saturated before the thaw and the rain. While area farmers are fighting the mud, the warmer weather and rain are helping to erase the memory of a bitterly cold February.

According to the preliminary climatic summary for February, 1979 as compiled by the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources, monthly temperatures averaged 9 to 15 degrees below normal.

The average low for the Wayneland area was about one

degree below zero. The average high temperature was approximately 21 degrees. The temperature was about 13 degrees below normal for the area.

The lowest reading in the area came on Feb. 1 and 16 when the temperature plunged to a minus 25 degrees. The warmest day was Feb. 19 when the temperature reached 37 degrees.

All reporting stations reached ten degrees below zero or lower

some time during February, with most sites recording sub-zero temperatures on ten or more days.

February precipitation was below normal in most divisions. Precipitation fell intermittently during the month in the form of snow, rain, drizzle, freezing rain, freezing drizzle and ice pellets.

The Wayneland area received about .44 of an inch of precipitation.

Property Tax Forms In Mail This Week

The first days of spring aren't going to be a bed of roses for many residents in the Wayne land area.

Doris Stipp, Wayne county assessor, this week mailed out property tax forms to some 5,000 property owners.

The main reason there might be some misgivings when property owners assess their tax assessment is that it will be 100 percent valuation as compiled Jan. 1, 1978.

Mrs. Stipp explained that the property owners had a 30 percent rollback on their property taxes in 1978.

The rollback was ordered by the state board of equalization. Mrs. Stipp said all of the counties were required by law to have the tax computed by the

Pick Former Herald Staffer As Part of Bereuter 'Team'

A former Wayne Herald staffer has been appointed assistant director coordinator for the Northern District office of First District Congressman Doug Bereuter.

The office will be located in the Columbus Federal Savings and Loan Building, Wayne.

Dan Vodvarka, 26, who covered sports and sold advertising for The Wayne Herald from July, 1975 to August, 1977, will accompany Cong. Bereuter to Wayne Friday for an open house at the new office to be held from 11 a.m. to noon.

'Projects in Situation' Parks Project by WSC Students

Students in a spring Wayne State College art class will be making their works to the Wayne area playground through a project approved Feb. 27 by the Wayne city council.

The course, entitled "Projects in Situation," will provide for the construction of two new playground designs, which will be placed on permanent sites in two Wayne parks.

Participants in the WSC course, offered May 7 to May 25, will construct the equipment, designed earlier by WSC students E. Duane Isenberg and Sandi Wriedt.

The new playground equipment, when completed, will reflect the heritage of Nebraska. The plans call for one group consisting of a log cabin type structure with a wooden bridge and a log wagon, while a second set of equipment will consist of wooden spoons forming small buildings for children to climb through.

WSC art instructor Pearl Hansen said the course and the projects will serve a number of purposes. "They are designed to provide WSC students with the opportunity to learn while making useful projects for the community. They are also designed to provide attractive playground equipment for the children."

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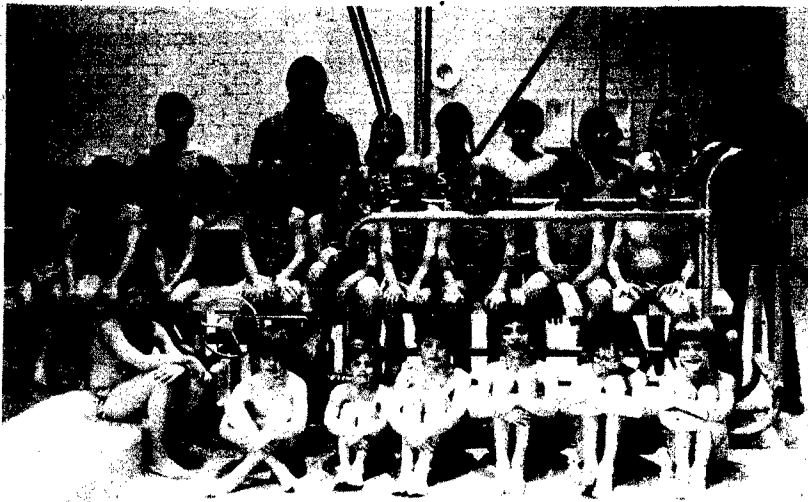

WHAT DOES THE FUTURE hold in store for high school athletics? This week I heard that a boy decided to try out for a girls volleyball team. I wasn't able to find any of the details but this forms an interesting situation.

Girls have been trying out for boys football, basketball, wrestling, baseball, track and golf in recent years and finally the tables have turned. It was time for boys to take a step in the opposite direction and try out for girls athletics. But this "role switching" may be a step in the wrong direction for athletics.

My personal opinion is that girls sports are for girls and boys sports for boys. Any mingling of the two sexes in these athletic programs is defeating the purpose of organized sports.

If the courts rule that this boy can play volleyball (and they could after often ruling that girls can participate in boys sports), then it may be the beginning of a new system in high school athletics. If boys, who didn't make the football team, try out for volleyball, girls athletics, as we know them now, are through.

There are qualified boys who will take over girls positions on the volleyball

squads, eventually leading to coed volleyball or boys volleyball. If high schools open up new sports — boys volleyball, girl golf, girls football, girls wrestling — schools will not be able to afford sports programs. This may sound extreme and hopefully athletics will never reach this point, but what does lie ahead?

If this situation never comes into existence perhaps there will be one team in each sport. Imagine, no more boys or girls athletics. From now on, high schools would form the best possible team in each sport. This means there would be one football team, one basketball team, one wrestling team, one track team, one volleyball team, one golf team, one baseball team. Boys and girls would compete head to head for positions on these teams. Most of the teams would be male dominant and girls would be back where they were many years ago — without athletics.

Girls have been striving for equal rights in everything but if they keep insisting on being completely equal, girls athletics will be destined to doom.

Hopefully, people will understand that boys athletics were formed to provide competition between boys, and girls athletics to provide competition between girls. Then, high school sports programs will exist the way they were meant to be.

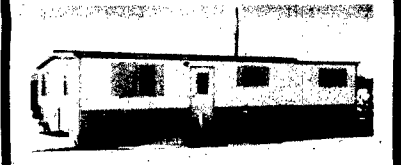

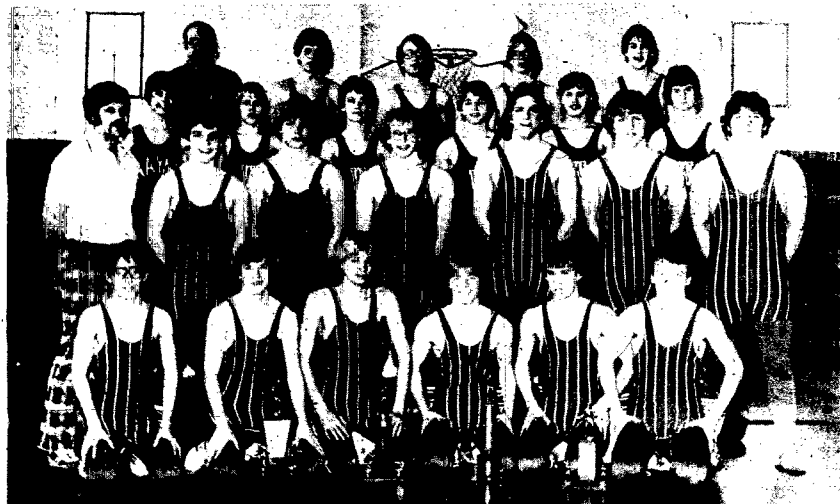

- 1 teaspoon grated Orange Rind
- 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) melted Butter
- 2 to 3 cups of Day-Old Bread Cubes (1/2 inch)

Scald milk. Beat eggs slightly and combine with honey, salt, grated orange rind and butter. Add to milk. Measure bread cubes into buttered 1 1/2 quart baking dish. Pour custard mixture over bread cubes and allow to stand 5 minutes. Stir gently.

Set in a shallow pan of hot water and bake in a 350 degree oven about 40 to 45 minutes, or until a knife inserted in center comes out clean. Remove from oven. Cool then chill.

Serve with sweetened whipped cream, ice cream, or any sauce. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

Nebraska Farms Follow National Trend The Numbers Are Down, The Values Are Up

Nebraskans need to give more credit to the farmers and ranchers for recently establishing wildlife habitat areas on their land according to Benny Martin, state conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service.

"While the economic pressures of the early 1970's may have caused the farmers and ranchers to put wildlife areas

into production, many people forgot these farmers and ranchers are individual business people. And, as individual businessmen they need to make a profit to stay in business.

"Since the crop prices have fallen, some farmers and ranchers are returning marginal cropland back to wildlife areas," said Martin.

During 1978 in Nebraska there were 256,462 acres of land returned to wildlife wetland and upland habitat management areas, according to SCS figures.

"Our records indicate that there are more than 4.1 million acres of wildlife habitat now in the state. The Habitat Program, sponsored by the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission,

has been a real incentive to landowners to develop wildlife areas," said Martin.

"The Commissions' Habitat Program will pay cost-sharing money to the landowners for either keeping existing wildlife areas or setting aside present cropland and returning it to a wildlife area. The cost-sharing program is administered through 21 of the 24 Natural Resources Districts with much of the planning for the wildlife areas and contact with the landowners being carried out by SCS.

Youth Tractor Permits Ready

Boys and girls, 13-16 years of age, may take the necessary examination from the Nebraska Department of Motor Vehicle examiners to apply for a Nebraska Permit for Implement of Farm Husbandry. The exams will be administered Saturday at the Northeast Station near Concord from 9 a.m. to 12 noon.

This permit is required by state law for any youth age 13-16 driving a tractor on a Nebraska roadway for his parents or for anyone else. The cost of the permit is \$2 and is good until age 16. Application blanks for this permit are available in the Wayne, Cedar, Dixon, Dakota and Thurston County Extension Offices.

A temporary permit is also available, which is good for six months. The temporary permit can be obtained through the County Treasurer.

Sulfa Levels Tested From Feed Samples

The level of sulfonamide residues in pork carcasses continues at near the 10 percent mark of those sampled, and emphasis is on surveying producers to assess the nature of the problem relating to residues in withdrawal feeds.

This word comes from Bill Ahlswede, Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources extension swine specialist. "About half of the sulfonamide residues detected are low levels, indicating that the pigs were withdrawn from medicated feed, but still had access to low level sources of sulfa drugs prior to slaughter," Ahlswede explained.

Ahlswede said a major

effort is underway by the Nebraska Cooperative Extension Service to determine if withdrawal of withdrawal feeds is a major problem. "The national survey is designed to determine the scope of the problem and not to find violators of sulfonamides in withdrawal feeds," Ahlswede emphasized.

As part of the national testing program, Ahlswede is collecting 300 feed samples from Nebraska pork producers. Samples from four types of operations are needed to make the study meaningful, he said.

The four categories are those farmers which feed rations containing sulfa drugs, those which feed rations not containing sulfa drugs, farms which feed customally mixed feeds and farms which mix their own feeds.

"Pork producers who supply

feed samples for testing will receive the test results," Ahlswede stressed.

As an easy way to get the samples delivered, the swine specialist suggested that producers bring a feed sample to him at the Midwest Market Hog Show at Fremont, March 31.

The sample should consist of about a cup of withdrawal feed. Producers who mix their own feed are asked to bring a sample of their protein source as well, either soybean meal or commercial protein.

Producers bringing samples to Fremont will be asked to fill out a short questionnaire which will be used in the analysis of the test results on a national basis.

"Results will be kept confidential and written assurances have been received that test results will not be used for regulatory purposes," Ahlswede concluded.

"The Soil Conservation Service tries to plan for wildlife habitat areas whenever we can," said Martin.

"In addition to working with the Habitat Program, we designed over 1,400 farm ponds, 4300 acres of farmstead windbreaks and 69 miles of field windbreaks last year. In most cases these conservation practices serve a dual role in controlling erosion, plus providing food and cover for wildlife too," he said.

"The job of using our agricultural land for man and keeping wildlife areas available for the animals is a constant challenge. The federal and state agencies in working with the landowners to meet this challenge so that men and animals can survive together, harmoniously said Martin.

PRUNE FRUIT TREES SOON

Before bud break this spring, fruit trees need their annual pruning. Annual maintenance pruning of trees in the home fruit garden keeps trees healthy and productive. Usually it is necessary to remove only a small amount of wood each year if the trees have been annually pruned.

Trees that have not been pruned for a number of years require more drastic pruning. Tree height can be lowered five feet each year. Always cut immediately above an outward-growing lateral limb. In addition, two or three large limbs may be removed each year to open up the tree.

Remove water sprouts and damaged or diseased wood first. Keep in mind the overall structure of the tree and develop main structural branches on all sides of the tree. Looking down on top of the tree, branches should radiate out like spokes on a wheel with the main trunk as the hub.

Narrow crotches are weak and should be eliminated during the pruning process. Main structural branches on dwarf trees should be spaced five to six inches apart vertically on the main trunk. Tie a strip of cloth around branches to be saved to aid in pruning.

The Wayne County Extension Office has an excellent bulletin on pruning fruit trees.

The general practice of sheep producers is to overfeed their ewes during cold winter months. It is true, ewes need more energy when it is cold, but normally producers are feeding too much anyway.

The last six weeks of gestation is a critical time, and energy should be increased to meet the demand of fetal growth. In no way does this concern poorly or undernourished ewes, but ewes that receive a maintenance ration.
