First, Second Degree Burns

Laurel Man Injured in Explosion

A Laurel man is listed in fair condition from first and second degree burns he received Wednesday following an explosion and fire at the Laurel Ready Mix plant.

Leon May, 33, owner of the plant, is in St. Luke's Medical center, Sloux City, Ia., for treatment of serious burns on his arms and hands. He also had

less serious burns on his face, according to a hospital spokesman.

Laurel Fire Chief Melvin Olsen said the resulting fire from the explosion gutted the east half of the plant.

Olsen said May was working under a tractor-loader inside the plant when the blast occurred about 10:30 a.m.

A puddle of gasoline that leaked from the loader's gas tank apparently ignited when an electric light being used fell to the ground and landed in the gasoline, Olsen stated.

Two employees, Gerald Matlack and Chuck Hintz, pulled May from from beneath the vehicle.

Laurel firefighters extinguish

ed the blaze and May was taken to the Sioux City hospital by the Laurel rescue unit.

Olsen said the contents of the plant's east side were destroyed. Olsen said he did not have a dollar estimate of the damage. The loss was partially insured.

The state fire marshal's office will not be asked to investigate, Olsen stated.

Ten Percent of Day's Purchases

Church Tithing Day Set Tuesday by Merchants

Wayne merchants will greet the Easter season with a Church Tithing Day, according to Marle Rise, chairman of the Wayne Retail committee.

Participating merchants will set aside 10 percent of purchases made Tuesday to be distributed to churches in 17 communities.

Rise said customers who shop

the participating merchants are asked to take their purchase receipt and write the name of the church and the community in which it is located on the back and deposit it into a Tithing Day box which will be marked as such.

Customers who wish to keep their receipts may use a official

slip provided by the Wayne Chamber of Commerce, Rise explained.

Rise said the promotion pertains to cash purchases only and the receipts must be put in a tithing box in the store where the purchase was made.

He said at the end of the day Tuesday, merchants will count

the receipts (or slips) in the tithing boxes. Ten percent of the purchases will be forwarded to the churches designated.

Rise said customers can't recognize participating merchants by a window poster which shows the silhouette of a church with a large "10 percent" inscribed beneath it. Only those merchants displaying the poster will be included in the special promotion. Rise said this particular promotion has been elected to demonstrate the spiritual development of the community as well as showing appreciation to customers for their patronage.

Also scheduled for Tuesday is the award-winning Benson high school showband which will perform in downtown Wayne beginning at 11 a.m.

The band will start marching at 8th and Main and will continue to 1st and Main.

The band will help to welcome spring to Wayne as its mascots, a bunny and a carrot, will greet youngsters along the parade route and hand out candy which will be provided by the Wayne Chamber of Commerce.

The band will have lunch at Wayne State College and have a tour of the campus.

The spring concert completes the activities of the 1978-79 WSC

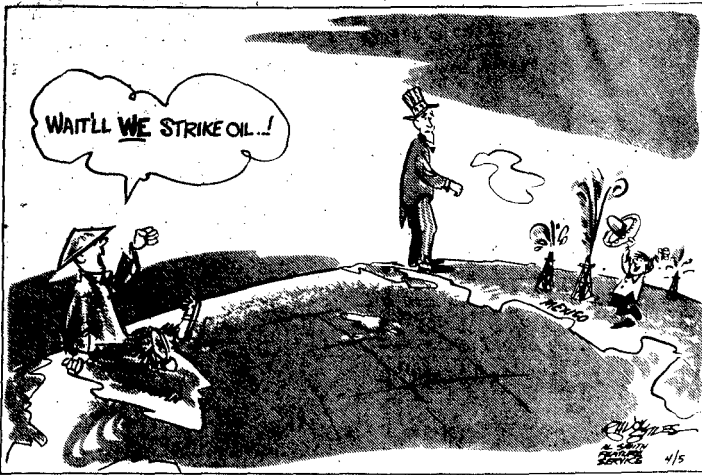

YOU AND YOUR CAR

Spring is upon us so it's time to get out the garden hose. Not just for the garden, but for the automobile. The Automotive Information Council says a garden hose is the best way to clean away winter's mud, road salt and other grime from the under parts of the car.

This is especially important in the areas under the fenders because those areas tend to hold dirt, and even the power jets at car washes do not reach all those surfaces.

Turn the nozzle to full force and saturate the under-fender areas. Then use an old broom or brush to loosen up and remove the sludge. Spray again until the surfaces and crevices are clean.

It's a moderately messy job but well worth it because those areas are breeding grounds for rust if left unattended. Mud will hold the moisture and road salt will have a field day.

Newer cars are far less prone to rust than earlier models because of the use of plastic fender liners, galvanized metal, zinc primers, sealers and other advance treatments, but even those cars need care in the fight against corrosion, adds AIC.

Paints and bright metals also are more durable but they, too need protection, especially after long winter.

A good coating of wax not only will improve the appearance of the car but will protect the finish from the rays of the sun and will make it easier to wash and keep clean.

Before waxing, car owners are advised to touch up any scratches, again to impede rust. Car dealers and auto supply stores have small containers of touch up paint to match the finish of almost every car model, and the paint is easy to apply if directions are followed.

Spraying and waxing pay big dividends, says the Automotive Information Council, which adds: Take care of your car and it will take care of you.

or eight other agencies of state government.

The real problem I have with this bill is that we are using the old government remedy of throwing more money at a problem without knowing what we are doing.

The Legislature has absolutely no idea of who is currently receiving the nearly \$2 million dollars that is being expended through these various agencies, nor do we have any statistics to show what we have accomplished.

Instead, we receive reams of paper indicating what age is being served, what race is being served, what type of profession is being served — but all without any firm understanding of what that service is, who specifically is providing it, what their abilities are and, most importantly, what, if anything, they are achieving.

My basic belief is that until a person decides he is tired of being an alcoholic and wants, of his own volition, to change, there is very little anyone can do to help him. More preventive and educational

measures should be funded as a preventive measure.

Although there was a great deal of debate in support of the position I had taken, when the vote was recorded, only five members of the legislature had voted to indefinitely postpone this issue.

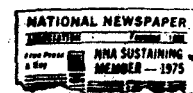

Wayne State Claims Men's, Women's Track Titles

The cold weather did not slow the Wayne State men's and women's track teams, as they each won their division in a meet held at WSC Friday.

The Wayne State men captured the team title with 80 points, more than the University of South Dakota at Springfield. Morningside College won the third place battle with 42, while Buena Vista finished fourth at 27 and Dana came in fifth and last with 18.

The Wildcat thincats were in a tough battle throughout the meet and the outcome was not decided until the final event.

USDS was tied with WSC at 69 with only three events left, the four-by-400 meter relay, the 5,000 meter run, and the triple jump.

Less than three seconds separated the top two finishers in the four-by-400 meter relay, with USDS taking first with a time of 3:29.17 and WSC second at 3:32.05. The third place team, Morningside, was nearly 15 seconds behind Wayne State.

Gerry Steinauer and Mark Baumert finished first and third respectively in the 5,000 meter run, while USDS' Bockelman came in second. Wayne State picked up nine points compared to four for USDS in this event, making the score WSC 80, USDS 77 with only the triple jump left to finish.

The Wildcats had no one in contention in this event, leaving USDS a shot at the team title should they have a finisher in first or second. However the best USDS could get was fourth place and two points, allowing Wayne to remain in first place.

Many of the events were as close as the 100 meter dash, where first and fifth place were

separated by only two tenths of a second.

The closest field event was the shot put, with WSC's Jeff Houtnold finishing in second place, only three fourths of an inch behind the top throw of 46.34.

USDS's Ekeren was the only double winner, taking the javelin at 158.1 and the discus at 141.3.

Wayne State picked up five first place medals: Dave Heuser in the 1500 meter run at 4:11.55; Ed Blackburn in the 110 meter hurdles at 15:39; Dan Warnke in the 400 meter run at 51.94; Gerry Steinauer in the 5,000 meter run at 16:34.84; and John Frick in the pole vault at 13.7.

The Wayne State women found

the going much easier in gliding to their first place finish.

WCS won both the four-by-100 meter relay and the four-by-400 meter relay.

Sally Schwede and Laura Peter were double winners for the Kittens.

Schwede captured first place in the 200 and 400 meter runs, and also took second place in the

high jump, clearing 4-10.

Peter won firsts in the distance races, the 1500 meter run and the 3000 meter run.

Other first place finishes by Wayne State were: Mary Jo Christen in the 110 meter hurdles at 17.74; Pam Frank in the discus with a toss of 105' 4"; and Sue Fricke in the shot put at 38' 9".

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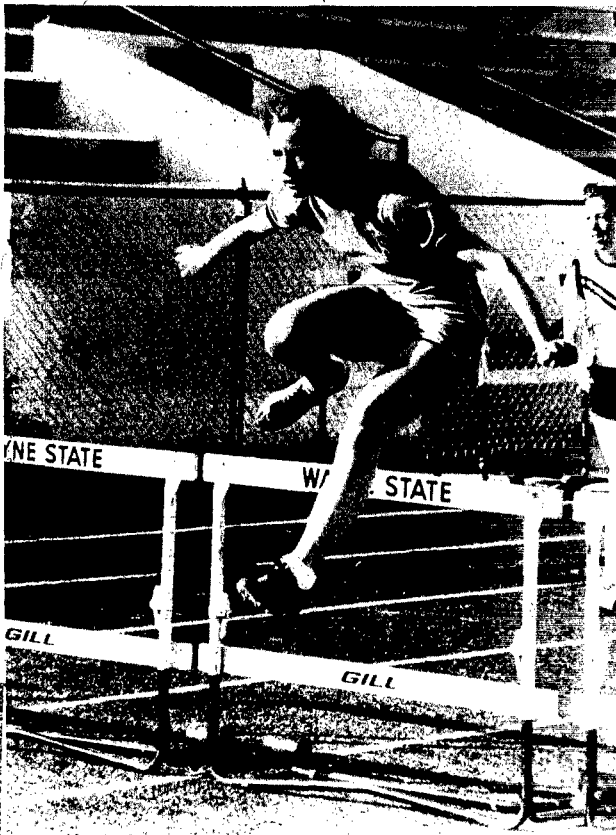
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HURDLING TO a first place finish in the 110 meter hurdles is Mary Jo Christen of Wayne State College, in Friday's track meet

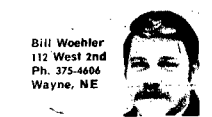
