A recommendation to combine the water and sever systems for tiscal purposes will be made by City Administrator Darrett Brewington at the city council meeting Tuesday night. Brewington said both water and sewer are going to require upprading and will require a revenue bond issue. He explain-ded that by combining the two systems, it will make a more "palatable" bond issue and will be of benefit to city taxpayers.
