The winner will receive a traveling trophy along with a whole bevy of gifts from See SEARCH, page 8

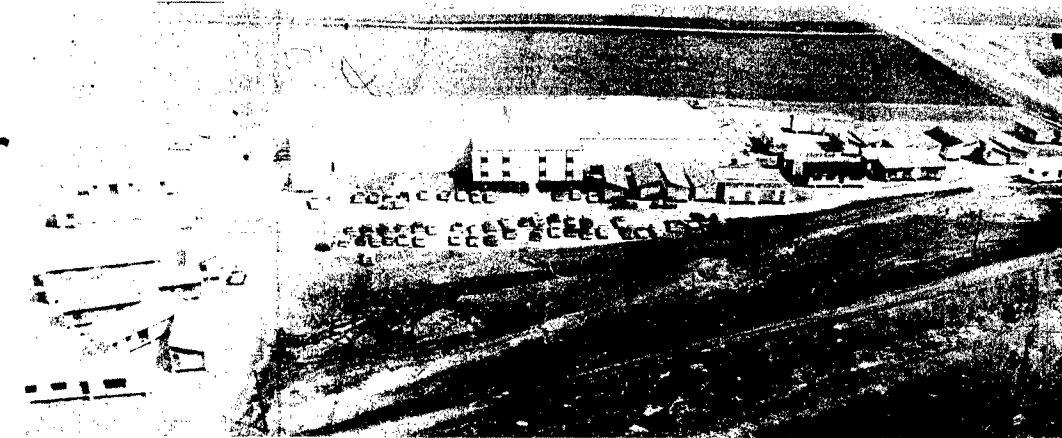
### Thirty from Allen To be Graduated

### First Anniversary This Month

## Excellent Year for Heritage Homes

The candles will be shining brightly when Heritage Homes of Nebraska, Inc., celebrates its first anniversary sometime this month.

The firm opened its door May 24 with a ribbon-cutting ceremony by former governor Val Peterson. There were 14 employees.

Rod Tompkins, president of the Wayne based company, said the acceptance of Heritage Homes during the past year has been "excellent."

He said there continues to be a big demand for quality built houses. "We have been told we are building the best homes between Chicago and Denver and we can't help but agree with them," Tompkins said as he tried to explain the quality of Heritage homes without seeming arrogant.

Tompkins said the first year's production of some 110 units seems to lend itself to the validity of the quality and acceptability of Heritage homes.

The Wayne plant is surrounded at the present time with some 20 pre-sold homes which are to be delivered to a four state area — Nebraska, South Dakota, Iowa and Kansas. Tompkins said Heritage Homes hopes to be part of a big subdivision in Casper, Wyo in the near future.

There are some 105 persons on the line at Heritage Homes, producing three and one-half homes every week, which amounts to approximately 5,000 square feet of homes every five days.

Tompkins said he plans to have a work force of 100 by September to meet the anticipated demand. "All of our homes are pre-sold and custom-designed before they are built," he explained.

Tompkins said there are 42 basic floor plans from which to choose. He said custom changes are made to the personal desires of the purchaser. "We haven't built two homes alike since we first opened our doors about a year ago."

The president said the modular concept of home building is not only a better way to construct a home, it saves money for the home-buyer. . . up to five to ten percent depending upon where the home is to be located, as close as Wayne or as far away as Casper.

He commented that the customizing of the homes is probably one of the outstanding features of the Heritage Home concept of building.

Tompkins said construction costs have not yet been much of a factor in construction. He said the high interest rates have kept building materials from going out of sight price-wise. He said materials cost will probably remain fairly stable until Fall.

"Now is a good time for people to pick out their Heritage home."

As a matter of record, Tompkins said the average sized Heritage home has been 1,440 square feet.

"We are planning some sort of observance on or near our anniversary date," Tompkins said. "We want people to view our homes under construction so they can see firsthand the quality of construction."

Plans for an observance will be announced in the near future.

### \$570,000 City Bond Sale is Approved

Some \$570,000 in bonds will be put up for open bids according to action taken Tuesday night by the city council.

The bonds are for a combination of improvement projects in 1977 and 1978, including sanitary, water and storm sewer extensions and street improvements.

Phil Lorenzen of Mid-America Bank, Omaha, and fiscal agent for the city, said a prospectus has been mailed to some 75 bond dealers.

He said he expects the interest rates will be about 6 percent but with open bidding, it See SALE, page 8

### Bruce Jorgensen with the Nuclear Regulatory Commission

## Story of Three Mile Island Incident as Told by Former Wayne High Grad

(Editor's Note: Bruce Jorgensen, son of Dorothy and Arland Aurich, Winside, and a 1965 graduate of Wayne High School, was a member of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission Region III Office of Inspection and Enforcement which helped to investigate the nuclear incident at Three Mile Island near Harrisburg, Pa. He is with the NRC office in Glenelg, Ill. (Chicago area). He will be moving to South Haven, Michigan this summer where he will be "On-Site Inspector" at the Palisades nuclear plant. He was graduated from Doane College in 1969 and spent two years in the army. He received his masters degree in nuclear science from Columbia University, New York. He and his wife, Connie, have two daughters, Inger, 8, and Alicia, nearly 5. In a letter to his parents, Jorgensen gives the following account of the Three Mile Island incident.)

On what was needed from us. We did that, and then my section chief and I drove to the site and walked into "Trailer City" at about 9:30 p.m.

Our first view of the site, as is anybody's was of the large hyperbolic natural-draft cooling towers. Rather, the light strings running up the sides of the-towers to define their presence to aircraft. The towers are visible from several miles away, in Middletown, which seemed totally deserted as we passed through. Except for police cars (two of which followed us through town) on duty to enforce a curfew and prevent possible looting in the abandoned town. There was no traffic.

We parked along side the highway just across the Susquehanna river to the east of the site and walked into "Trailer City" at about 9:30 p.m. Trailer City was founded in the first couple of days after the incident and had grown by April 2 to some 25 or so units. A daily newspaper, "The Trailer City News," was already in publication.

The NRC was occupying two trailers (we would later expand to four) and we reported to the trailer being used by the Office of Inspection and Enforcement people. Since I had worked in environmental

radiological monitoring for several years, I was immediately put on a small task force which was preparing a summary of environmental radiation monitoring data for a Tuesday morning briefing for President Carter.

We assembled results and statistics on results of analysis being performed on samples collected around Three Mile Island (TMI) by several agencies. I was set to work on getting information relative to types, numbers and results of analysis of samples collected by the licensee and his contractors.

This took some running around Trailer City to find and talk to the right people and get a chance to look at the detsheets. Some of the people involved didn't appear to have slept much in about four days, and the place was a beehive of activity even at 2 or 3 a.m. Tuesday.

I also processed through the licensee's badgeing process that night (getting badge No. 1665. Before I left, there were in numbers over the 3,000 mark) and was issued a thermoluminescent dosimeter (TLD) for personnel radiation exposure monitoring.

It was later discovered I'd been given the same TLD number as another individual and I had to be issued a new one on Wednesday night about midnight, which delayed me an hour in getting on site.

We finished our briefing paper about 6 a.m. Tuesday and I went off duty at about 7 a.m. When I returned Tuesday night about 9 p.m., I was sent on site to cover operations in the Unit 2 control room.

Since the number of cars "on the Island" was being restricted, a shuttle bus service was being operated to carry people back and forth between the plant and Trailer City. Actually, two bus rides were required; one shuffling from Trailer City to an outer access control point on the Island, and another going from there in to the plant.

At the plant entrance (as at the outer checkpoint), badge numbers were checked, then air masks (respirators) were issued to everyone entering. At times, there weren't enough respirators for everyone who wanted to enter the plant. Lines formed at the plant entrance and as one person exited and dropped off his respirator, the person at the front of the line picked it up and entered. For a couple of days at least, the lines were

common around 8 a.m. when the day shift was coming on.

The work in the Unit 2 control room (actually in the shift supervisor's office adjacent to the control room) consisted of maintaining communications at NRC's Region I and NRC headquarters as well as with NRC personnel in the trailers at Trailer City.

For several days, an ordinary phone hookup was used and someone had to sit with the receiver to his ear continuously. On about Wednesday, April 4, a speaker-phone system was installed, which took care of the problem.

Teams of two people provided control room coverage, one handling communications and the other interfacing with licensee personnel and others to gather information and answers to questions and to collect routine data on various plant parameters and plant status for relaying the information to headquarters, Region I and the trailers.

For example, every hour or so, a runner was made on the plant process computer to obtain data on temperatures, pressures and levels in the various compartments. I spent two days (nights, actually) working in the

control room.

Starting Thursday night, I was assigned as the Office of Inspection and Enforcement representative on a procedures review group which had been formed to provide NRC input to new procedures which were being written specific to the conditions in which the plant found itself.

A maxim of nuclear-electric industry is that personnel errors can be minimized by providing highly trained people, by providing well-written detailed procedures, or both.

Procedures are commonly written to aid in accomplishment of those things which are expected to be needed. In the case of Three Mile Island, the plant had been stabilized in a condition other than that given by the normal starting place for existing procedures.

Further, some plant instrumentation was considered unreliable and additional instrument failures were occurring. This meant that it might not be advisable to try to get the plant from its existing conditions to some other conditions by normal means. In fact, even some of the normal finishing- See INCIDENT, page 8

## Varsity Wildcats Edge Alumni 29-26

Sophomore quarterback Rick Lade passed for four touchdowns Saturday to lead the Wayne State varsity football team to a 29-26 victory over a determined WSC alumni team in Memorial Stadium at WSC.

Lade connected on TD passes of 47, 6, 7 and 20 yards and had 179 passing yards on the day. He led the varsity in passing in the 1978 season with 1,236 passing yards.

The combination of Dave Miller and Maurie Minkten kept the alumni's hopes alive. Miller, who holds the four-year passing record of 2,218 yards set between 1972-1975 at WSC, rushed for one TD and passed for another for 170 aerial yards Saturday. Minkten holds a number of WSC passes receiving records for his 1973-74 career. He grabbed three passes for 104 yards and one TD Saturday.

The alumni played aggressive ball from the beginning when quarterback Miller hit Minkten for a 47-yard pass on the second play of the game. After exchanging possessions, Miller carried the ball on a one-yard run for the first score of the game at 5:56 remaining in the first quarter. The conversion run by Mike McMahon, a '76 WSC grad, was good, making it 8-0.

The varsity scored next with 14:07 remaining in the first half on Rick Lade's 47-yard pass to freshman Pat Maxwell. Tail back Bob Barry ran the conversion to tie the game.

**LAUREL COACH SCORES** The alumni were quick to recover, however, as Nick Danze, a '75 grad and football coach at Laurel High, intercepted a Lade pass and ran 45 yards for the second alumni score. The pass

conversion attempt failed. Bob Barry caught a 6-yard Lade pass with 4:13 remaining in the second quarter for the final score of the first half. The PAT by sophomore Bart Emanuel was good, making it 15-14.

The varsity scored twice in the second half — once on a seven-yard pass from Lade to Maxwell with 3:34 remaining in the third quarter and again on a 20-yard Lade pass to junior Jeff Ingram. The Emanuel PAT's were good on both attempts.

**LEWIS PLAYS END** The alumni scored their two final TDs in the fourth quarter. Miller hit Minkten with a 16-yard pass with 8:42 remaining in the game and Stan Lewis, a former Cleveland Browns and Seattle Seahawks player, and a '72 WSC grad, set up the final alumni score. Lewis caught a 28-yard pass from Miller with

points for procedures normally used were being determined to be undesirable.

What all of this added up to was a need to prepare many new procedures designed to enable plant operators to cope with possible additional failures (there were new "emergency procedures") or to take the plant to some other condition by way of the most desirable course (these were "specific operating procedures").

In all, some 30 or more new emergency procedures and perhaps 100 or more special operating procedures were prepared in the first two weeks after the incident. Of course, most of these were never used, but some were.

My function during the week or so I sat with this group was to review proposed procedures to ascertain whether a specialist in radiation protection should also check the procedure; to determine if any existing license conditions would be violated and, if so, to advise NRC's licensing group; and to evaluate procedure instructions against my judgment of what was practicable and safe.

In those cases where license conditions might be violated, a decision would then be made as to whether it was desirable to approve the procedure anyway. That is, did the existing requirement provide less margin of safety or was it even, perhaps, meaningless under the circumstances. Fortunately, few of these questions came up, though this was a difficult determination.

License requirements are typically (and were in this case) a function of operating "mode." Existing plant conditions, while stable and while perhaps the most prudent available, did not fit well into any one of the several operating "modes" defined in the license.

After about a week with the procedures review group, on April 10, the production rate of new procedures had dwindled and the midnight shift staffing for procedure review was deleted.

Starting April 11, I was shifted to days to provide operations support at one of the NRC trailers. I did this for three days (till noon on April 13) being on the receiving end of data transmitted from the control room, maintaining a liaison with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and assisting the NRC night shift supervisor as necessary.

This assistance included hustling about for several hours on April 11 making arrangements for a visit to the site by one of the NRC commissioners.

Starting at midnight April 13, I went back on nights and back to Unit 2 control room, replacing a fellow from the NRC Atlanta office who was sent home when it was learned his house was flooding in the rain storms hitting Georgia.

The work was about the same thing this time around, but conditions had changed somewhat. The plant had been through several de-pressurizing evolutions to remove potential gases trapped in the cooling system; security had tightened up; cars were being permitted on the island; respirators were no longer being issued to every person entering the plant and, in general, a feeling of routine had been established.

I stayed on control room work till the end of my shift at 8 a.m. Monday, April 16, when I processed out and caught a plane to Chicago.

That's the story. It was somewhat interesting, but not exciting work. And I did acquire a tee-shirt printed with "I Survived 3-Mile Island." Meanwhile, Connie had to take care of a bunch of details on the new house by herself and I missed Easter with the family.

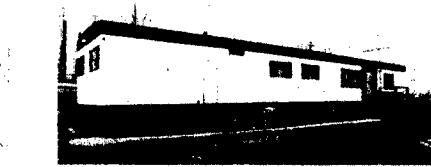

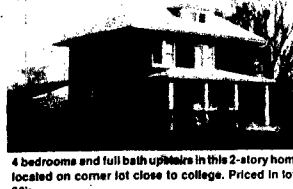

# Solons tackle litter problem

**LINCOLN** — The problem of how to cope with the problem of litter is before the state's lawmakers again.

Last fall, voters refused an attempt by a coalition of various interests to have the state adopt a bottle bill — a proposal that triggered heated objections from some segments of commerce and industry whose spokesmen said such legislation would not solve the litter problem.

This year's anti-litter measure, sponsored by Sen. John DeCamp of Neligh, would, he said, provide a reasonable compromise acceptable to both sides in the bottle bill controversy.

The Neligh lawmaker wants to impose a tax of \$50 on each \$1 million in gross sales of many products that contribute to litter. The tax, which would be assessed at the wholesale and manufacturing levels, would generate \$500,000 to \$750,000 annually, DeCamp estimated.

Some of that money would be used in programs designed to clean up litter.

One question DeCamp could not answer was how much it would cost to collect and administer the tax.

Among litter-producing items that would be covered by the tax would be food, tobacco and paper products — but not newspapers and magazines. Beer, wine, liquor and glass and plastic containers would also be covered by the tax.

DeCamp said a recent survey by pollster Joe B. Williams indicated Nebraskans refused to endorse the bottle bill because they desired a more comprehensive litter control measure.

At this writing, the DeCamp bill had received preliminary approval from the lawmakers.

Sen. Steve Fowler of Lincoln, arguing the legislation contained a number of ambiguities, tried to kill it. He also said the bill was discriminatory in that it would tax Nebraska industries whose products are not the sole cause of litter.

## APPROVE LOAN BILL

The Legislature has given its final approval to a bill that would increase the size of small loans and stretch out the repayment period for the borrower.

Under provisions of the measure, the amount of a small loan could be as much as \$7,000, more than double the current \$3,000, and the repayment time on loans

of more than \$3,000 would be expanded from 36 to 60 months.

The payback period for a person who borrowed \$3,000 or less would remain 36 months.

The bill provides for the following interest rates: 24 percent on loans up to \$1,000; 18 percent on balances between \$1,000 and \$5,000, and 15 percent on balances between \$5,000 and \$7,000.

The measure had some opposition. Sen. Ernest Chambers of Omaha tried to kill it, and Lincoln Sen. Steve Fowler said it authorized increases "far beyond what we should allow" a special industry.

Another Lincoln senator, Don Wesely, said the bill "gives away too much" to an industry that does not need that much help to survive.

But Sen. John DeCamp of Neligh took an opposite view. "The bill will be a national model in the area of small loan legislation," according to the Neligh senator.

## DRINKING BILL STALLED

After first debate, the bill proposing that the drinking age be changed from 19 to 21 was stalled in the Legislature.

There were nine senators absent or excused when the vote for first-round

approval of the bill was taken. Twenty-three lawmakers voted for the proposal but two more supporting ballots were required.

Sen. Ralph Kelly of Grand Island, who has been attempting to get similar legislation enacted for three years, said he would try to get the Unicameral to take another look at the bill.

While arguing for raising the drinking age, Kelly said he realized that step alone would not make the problem of teen-agers' illegal drinking disappear. But he said it would be of some help.

He added there has been a sharp increase in the number of alcohol-related traffic fatalities since the state lowered the drinking age. In addition, Kelly said, teenage drinking is harmful to the youths, physically, psychologically and morally.

Opponents countered that most 19-year-old drinkers are responsible young adults. They also claimed raising the drinking age would not prevent youths from finding ways of procuring liquor.

One of the most outspoken opponents, Sen. Gerald Koch of Ralston, said one of the best things that could be done to combat abuse of liquor by young people would be to have adults set a good

example in their drinking habits.

Too many adults, many of them getting along in years, "stumble out" of drinking establishments on Friday and Saturday nights and then look for another place where they can drink some more, Koch said.

Gov. Charles Thone has said he would advocate changing the law which allows those 19 years old to drink. But he also said he would sign a bill raising the age if the Legislature approves the change.

## LID BILL ADVANCES

The 1978 lid on spending law enacted during last summer's special session continues to spark debate in the Unicameral.

A heavily amended bill proposing significant revisions of the law has been given 26-7 second round approval by the lawmakers.

Spokesmen for many political subdivisions have labeled the law passed last summer unfair or unclear, or both.

That legislation essentially provides for limiting to 7 percent annual increases in the property tax-funded portion of a local government's budget.

That was changed in the bill before the

senators this session so that the 7 percent would apply to a local government's entire budget, including both local property tax and state tax revenues. However, some exceptions were allowed.

One of the last amendments approved before the 1979 bill was moved to just one step short of final consideration would exempt expenditures for such things as insurance and pensions, as well as fuel and utilities, from the 7 percent limit.

Another of the amendments adopted would permit a government subdivision to replace the 7 percent budget increase limit with the average of its previous three budget increases. If the subdivision's population increased by 5 percent or more.

When all of the amending had been completed, Sen. John Murphy of South Sioux City, said, "You've just blown a hole in the lid big enough to drive a tank through."

Sen. Vard Johnson of Omaha disagreed, arguing the measure still contained "a strong workable lid."

Several of the senators said they still had some questions that had to be answered before they would be ready to make a final decision on the merit of the bill.

# OBSERVATIONS

## Three Mile Island Incident

Three Mile Island and its residents are back in the news with a billion dollar suit filed on behalf of the residents by F. Lee Bailey.

The incident has created many impressions regarding nuclear energy. It has made people more aware of nuclear energy and, in some cases, distrustful of it.

Bruce Jorgensen, former Wayne High graduate who is now with the Nuclear Regulatory Commission, reported a personal account of the incident in a letter to his parents, Dorothy and Arland Aurich, Winside. The story appears on the front page of today's Herald.

Jorgensen presented a factual, detailed account of the incident. But he also expressed some personal comments which we feel are a part of the story of nuclear energy and its part as an energy source.

Jorgensen's comments:

It will probably be some time before the exact details of what led up to and what went on during this (Three Mile Island) incident are known. Meanwhile, the press and public are suddenly vitally aware of and interested in what happened — but I think they lack the patience to acquire the technical knowledge necessary to understand the facts when they

are known.

All kinds of theories are floating around, some of them being spouted as 'gossip'.

I'm not certain how much excitement was created by the media as opposed to simply being reported by the media. I do know it was a gigantic story for what seemed like a long time — yet nobody even got hurt, much less killed.

Some reporters did run a "body count" of people from the area who were killed in traffic accidents (there were two or three) — blaming not automobiles or drivers but the nuclear plant. Also, a little boy was drowned in Baltimore (where he was visiting relatives, I think) and he was felled up against the plant. (End of comments.)

As a member of the media, we can recognize the circumstances under which the reporters were operating. We're certain that many detailed the facts as given to them. We're also certain that a few used these same facts for sensationalism purposes.

Whatever the case, we do not believe nuclear energy should be discouraged as an energy source. After all, the Indians thought the world was coming to an end when they encountered troops using gun powder — Chuck Barnes.

## Wear the poppy proudly

This week various American Legion auxiliaries in the Wayneland area will be out selling the traditional American Legion poppy.

Wearing an American Legion poppy honors the more than one-half million Americans who died and nearly one million who were wounded during both World Wars, the Korean conflict and the Vietnam encounter.

Poppy Day first originated after the first World War when soldiers, returning from Europe in 1918 had memories of the wild poppies that bloomed in the battle fields of France and, of course, Flanders Field.

Hospitalized U.S. veterans in Minnesota first produced memorial poppies in 1922.

In 1922, the American Legion adopted the poppy as the memorial flower. In 1921, the American Legion auxiliary adopted the poppy as its memorial flower and continued through the years, pledging that 100 percent of poppy sales contributions would go to welfare work for service men and members of their families.


The poppies are made by veterans in hospitals and workshops in 48 states. These disabled veterans are paid for each hand-made poppy they make and the materials are furnished free by the American Legion auxiliary in the states where the hospitals are located.

More than 25 million of these poppies are distributed throughout the country under supervision of the American Legion auxiliary.

Through the poppy program, more than \$300,000 are paid annually to disabled service men and women who make the memorial flowers. All contributions received from the Poppy Day sales go directly to aid disabled war veterans and their families.

Poppy Day, an annual memorial to the war dead and disabled veteran, is sponsored by the American Legion and its auxiliary.

When you are asked to contribute to the poppy campaign, we urge you to do so and to wear the poppy proudly to show that you care about those who sacrificed themselves to perpetuate the freedoms we now enjoy. — Chuck Barnes.

### HONOR TO PIONEERS

These words on the north side of the Capitol Building remind us of the hard work our forefathers endured to settle the land we now live from and enjoy. With the shortage of gasoline and diesel fuel this spring, our farmers may be considering alternate methods of tilling the soil and sowing the crops.

Aware of those shortages the Legislature advanced a gasoline promotion bill from first-round debate by a 26-5 vote. This bill includes a one-cent-a-gallon hike in the state tax on motor vehicle fuel, which would make it 10.5 cents a gallon. LB 571, introduced by the Agriculture Committee, would allow the state to enter into lease agreements with counties or cities that decide to build plants for the manufacture of alcohol. This alcohol would be mixed with unleaded gasoline in a 10:90 ratio to create a gasohol.

Proponents remarked that grain alcohol can be an invaluable fuel extender and, additionally, provide a new market for grains.

The introducer said that local governments would finance the plants through the sale of revenue bonds. The increased fuel tax would be used to retire these bonds only if they couldn't be repaid solely through the revenue generated by the plant. The tax money would go into the Highway Trust Fund and would be used to build and repair roads. However, it could be transferred to the alcohol plant fund if needed. The Governor's office would have the sole responsibility of reviewing and awarding the contracts of these plants.

Amendments are being drawn so that private industry may lease these plants from the local government.

Opponents argued that there are studies which show that it takes more energy to manufacture alcohol than the product provides. Others said that they felt the fuel tax was the wrong vehicle for funding it. Also, that there is a bill, LB 121, before the legislature now to provide five grants of a maximum \$300,000 each to construct six alcohol plants in our state. This money would be appropriated from the general fund. The Governor had provided for two of these grants in his budget. If LB 571 is approved, I'm sure that the Legislature will not attempt to pass LB 21.

Most of the senators agree that something needs to be done on this issue. Also, that if the production of gasohol is not feasible now, with the rising cost of gasoline, it soon will be.

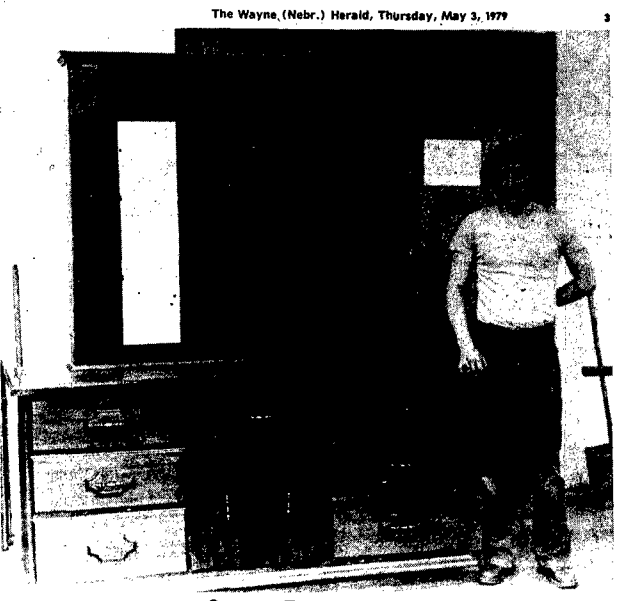

## Insecticide Survey Shows—

### Most Handled Safely

A survey of more than 1,300 farmers in Nebraska and three other Cornbelt states has shown a high percentage handled corn rootworm insecticides in an approved, safe manner. However, a few did handle these toxic materials in ways in which accidental poisoning of humans and livestock could occur.

Robert E. Roselle, Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources extension entomologist, said the study involved 1,315 farmers in Nebraska, Iowa, Illinois and Indiana, of which 20 percent stored pesticides in a hazardous situation. This translated into 10 percent which stored pesticides in a barn, 5

percent in a garage and 5 percent on a truck. "Any of these storage areas invite tragedy," Roselle warned. "They (pesticides) can easily be mixed with feed or picked up by children."

He cited these other survey results, indicating a lack of precaution in handling, storing and dealing with pesticides:

— Two percent stored granular insecticides near animal feed, a definite and serious hazard. Every year, livestock are killed when pesticides are accidentally mixed with feed.

— Five percent moved more than a 1-day supply from storage to the field. A dangerous situation may develop if the supply remaining after one day's work is not returned to proper storage.

— Twenty-five percent did not wear gloves, and 12 percent did not wear long-sleeved shirts when transferring pesticides from storage to the field. This invites skin contact, absorption and possible reaction.

— Forty-five percent tore open bags rather than cutting them. Bags opened in this manner are more likely to leak granules, and are more difficult to close.

— Eight percent of farmers simply brushed off spilled granules, or did nothing. Any material spilled on the skin should be washed off with soap and water as soon as possible.

— Thirty-three percent spilled granules on the ground, and of this group, 23 percent did not clean them up. Spilled granules must be cleaned up or buried in the soil immediately. Some of the materials are highly toxic, and spilled granules would present a hazard to livestock, humans and wildlife.

— Eighty-five percent did not empty the hopper boxes after each day of application. Live stock have been killed by licking hopper boxes that contain pesticides. Children may find granules left in boxes an inviting play toy, leading to a possible tragedy.

— Thirty-five percent stored applicators in the field at the end of each day — a definite potential hazard.

"Accidents are caused by people, not pesticides," Roselle stressed. "With a little planning before using pesticides, nearly all accidents can be prevented. Farmers can use these common errors as a checklist, before using any pesticide."

"If these mistakes are avoided, the number of tragedies could be reduced to near zero," Roselle concluded.

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### Conservation Tillage Saves Moisture

"Many of Nebraska's water problems could be reduced if we would not only make our irrigation systems more efficient but also provide more storage of the rainfall we receive," according to Bill Reinsch, Soil Conservation Service agronomist.

"If we could save just two inches of rain that falls on our agricultural land, we would be storing more water than we pump for irrigation each year," added Reinsch.

To help save the moisture, Reinsch recommends that some type of conservation tillage system of leaving the crop residue on the fields after harvest and in

the spring will make it easier for the soil to take in more moisture.

"The fields don't look as clean with conservation tillage, but many farmers are now finding out it results in quite a savings.

Farmers and many researchers are discovering conservation tillage yields are at least equal to conventional tillage plus it saves fuel, money, and time with fewer trips across the field. More moisture remains in the soil because it is not plowed. The residue keeps the rain from compacting the soil and this allows more moisture to go into the soils for crops," said

Reinsch. According to SCS, reduced tillage, minimum tillage, mulch tillage, no tillage, till-plant, discing, and planting are all forms of conservation tillage. However, to have any effect, a minimum of 1500 pounds of corn or sorghum, or 750 pounds of small grain or soybean crop residue must be left on the soil surface after planting.

"Conservation tillage methods are not without some problems though," added Reinsch. "Insects and weeds once controlled by deep plowing tend to thrive in undisturbed soil and crop residue. Farmers who fail to control this problem and don't choose the proper insecticides and herbicides may have problems."

Conservation tillage not only can save more moisture, but also is a cheap effective way of See CONSERVATION, page 7.

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### Dairy Show Dates Set

The dates and locations of the 1979 district dairy shows have been set, according to an Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources extension dairyman.

P.H. Cole said the show classes and general rules for the shows will be the same as for 1978 contests.

He said that all animals must have an official health certificate, which indicates that the animal was negative to tuberculosis and brucellosis tests within 60 days of the show date. If the animal is less than 20 months old, it must have official calfhood vaccinations.

Cole explained that the district dairy shows serve as qualification contests for the Ak-Sar-Ben dairy show, to be held in September. Those showing purple or blue ribbon entries at the district level may compete at Ak-Sar-Ben.

Cole stressed that the exhibitors and animals competing at Ak-Sar-Ben must be the same as those shown at the district contests.

At each district show, a district dairy queen will be chosen. District winners will compete for the title of Ak-Sar-Ben dairy queen.

The dates and locations of the 1979 district dairy shows are: July 12 — Hemingford, fair grounds; July 13 — North Platte, fairgrounds; July 27 — Weeping Water, fairgrounds; July 28 — Beatrice, fairgrounds; July 31 — Fremont, Christensen Field (west on Military Road to Ridge Road); Aug. 1 — Beaver City, fairgrounds; Aug. 3 — Grand Island, Fonner Park; Aug. 6 — Norfolk, sale barn; Aug. 7 — South Sioux City, Atokad Park.

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## Pasture Ground Needs Management

What is the most misused and neglected crop in Northeast Nebraska? Many people would answer this question by saying pasture — especially bromegrass pasture.

Northeast Nebraska has many acres of bromegrass — much of which could be made more productive by following good

management practices such as fertilization, weed control and rotational grazing.

Grazing trials in Cedar County showed that one pound of beef was produced for each pound of nitrogen applied. At today's beef and fertilizer prices, this could be the best bargain around. Other trials have shown that nitrogen and phosphorus are the only two nutrients needed for bromegrass in this area.

For most bromegrass pastures, the application of 60-80 pounds of nitrogen with 20-30 pounds of P2O5 per acre will double and in some cases triple forage production. This fertilizer should be applied as soon as possible.

Fertilization combined with rotational grazing will produce additional gains. For best results the bromegrass pastures need to be rested at times during the growing season.

A simple rotational grazing system would be to divide a pasture into three parts and graze each part for about ten days. This system would allow the other two parts to rest for 20 days.

Electric fence can easily divide a pasture but water may be a problem.

If pastures are overgrazed or poorly fertilized, weeds may be a problem. The key to weed

controlling erosion, said Reinsch.

To measure the amount of residue left on a field: collect air-dry residue from three one-square yard plots selected at random, collect all residue down to the soil surface, shake out any stones or soil, weigh all three samples and record the total weight in ounces, multiply the weight by 100 and you will have the amount of residue per acre.

Crop yields can also be used to determine the amount of crop residues. For each pound of corn produced there is one pound of residue. For each bushel of small grain produced there is 100 pounds of residue.

Additional information on conservation tillage can be obtained from the local Soil Conservation Service Office.

**WRAPPING NEWLY PLANTED TREES**

Wrapping newly planted trees is a good way to protect smooth-barked trees.

Control — can cause severe injury to maple, linden, ash and fruit trees unless the main trunk is wrapped, while rodent feeding on the main trunk near the tree base also can cause serious damage.

To prevent these two types of injuries, aluminum foil, paper tree wrap and a commercially available plastic coll wrap are effective. Commercially available paper tree wraps also aid in preventing borer attack on certain trees, as well as preventing cats from sharpening their claws and puppies from chewing on the bark.

**BARE SPOTS ON LAWNS**

Bare spots on lawns are a problem with many homeowners. May thinned areas can be recovered through a good fertilizer program, but not all of them.

If the area is larger than the distance between the little finger and the thumb, fertilizing alone won't do the job. These spots should be raked.

To reseed effectively, rake the thinned area to remove debris and to loosen the surface soil. Sprinkle seed into the open spot and tamp down with a rake. This will help ensure good seed and soil contact.

To reseed the surface soil moist until germination begins.

**WEED CONTROL REMINDER**

Apply pre-emergent herbicides for crabgrass control in late April. Where spotted spurge has been a problem, use Dacthal.

Fertilizing and weeding at the same time is an easy and efficient way to do it. But it is important that you clean up the lawn, apply materials according to label directions, and water.

There are many combination products from which to choose. Fertilizer — chemical combinations used for pre-emergence crabgrass control are very effective when applied in early spring before crabgrass emerges, usually in early May.

Fertilizer — chemical combinations used for broadleaf weeds such as dandelions have additional considerations. Products that contain herbicides such as 2,4-D will do the best job if the weed has emerged. The leaves should be wet so the granules stick to the leaves and the chemical can then be absorbed. That's the way 2,4-D type chemicals work best.

The other choice is to apply the lawn fertilizer separately; then spray the dandelions with a recommended 2,4-D formulation or similar product after the weeds are up.

**TANWEED (Swamp Smartweed)**

Description — Tanweed is a perennial, reproduced by rootstocks and occasionally by seed. The rootstocks are very large and tough, sometimes reach 1/2 inch in diameter. These rootstocks creep along under the ground, send up new shoots at nearly every node, store large quantities of food materials and are capable of providing new plants even if broken up in small pieces. The stems grow one to four feet tall, have large broad, smooth leaves and are topped by a single spike of rose-colored flowers. The plant seldom produces seed.

Control — Use one quart of 2,4-D ester plus one pint of Banvel when growing vigorously. Retreatment will be necessary. On crops use lower rates of 2,4-D ester plus Banvel.

Special Remarks — Tanweed is usually not as competitive with growing crops as other perennial weeds like Hemp Dogbane and milkweed. Infestations merit control measures, however.
