# Weather Radio Operational Wednesday, Officials Advise

An innovation by the federal government is receiving an almost unanimous taxpayer approval for a change.

Paul Woolard, official in charge of the National Weather Service office in Norfolk, said tests are being conducted on a weather alert radio that is designed to give weather forecasts, weather updates and more importantly, advance warning in the event of severe weather.

"We have been testing for several days and asking persons hearing the broadcast to write us to find out our coverage," Woolard explained. "We've had hundreds of letters with most of them stating to the effect the weather radio is the best thing the government has done for them for a long time."

Woolard said the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) weather radio, which operates on a frequency of 162.55 megahertz, probably will be operational Wednesday.

He said besides the regular forecasts, the

tape will be updated every hour to advise listeners of the latest developments in the weather.

"We are going to have what we are calling 'NOW' casts which will give the immediate weather," Woolard stated. He said these special "NOW" casts will advise of time elements in certain weather conditions and will also be beneficial to area farmers in that they can plan their farming activities according to the latest weather information.

Woolard gave as an example cases of a rain front is moving into an area, they will be able to advise persons tuned to the station when they have to go outside and roll up their windows and in the case of farmers, they will be able to plan having activity by listening to the broadcasts.

"We're excited about the radio and the response to it," Woolard stated. "We've received letters as far away as Sioux Falls, S.D. and from houseboats with ship to shore radiol on Lewis and Clark lake."

The topics of these sessions are: Nutrition for Sheep, Parasite Control and Production Management.

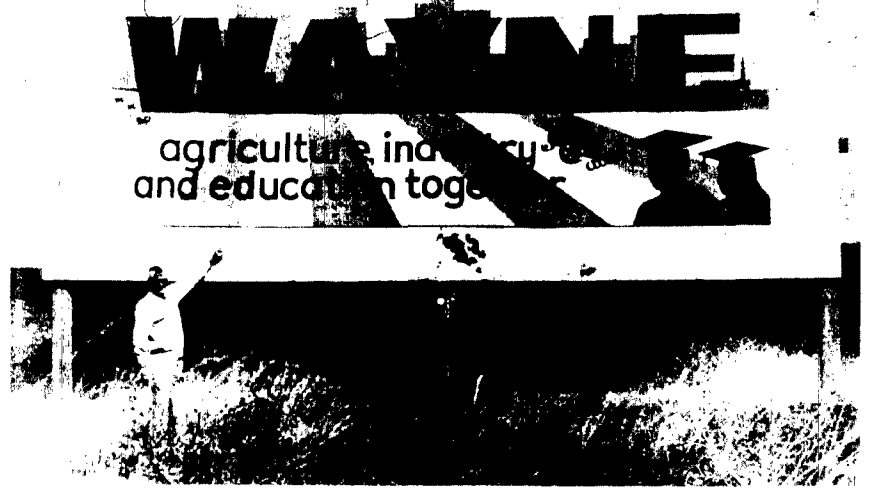

temperature this week which should lend itself to planting of corn. He said the optimum ground temperature for planting is about 55 degrees.

From all indications, there is going to be a lot of corn planted in Wayne county this year as the federal feed grain program sign-up, which ended April 30, shows only about one half of the farmers in the county are participating in the program.

The Wayne County ASCS office reported a total of 425 farms with a normal crop acreage of 72,822 acres signed up in the set aside program.

Last year, some 738 farms were included in the sign up with a normal crop acreage of 124,520 acres.

There were a total of 1,233 farms eligible for the program in both years, according to the ASCS office.

ASCS officials pointed out those participating in the set aside program are eligible for price support loans, and disaster payments or deficiency (target price) payments.

One of the reasons given for the relatively small sign up is the size of the price supports and farmers are looking for another bumper crop this year.

While many farmers have completed applying chemicals to their cropland, unpredictable rail and trucking services have made predictions about Nebraska's fertilizer supplies impossible, according to state soil and fertilizer experts.

The experts said the next 15 days will be critical for getting preplant fertilizers onto fields they said that if farmers are not able to apply their fertilizers by then, they will have to settle for side dressing application after plant emergence.

They pointed out that although preplant application is about ten percent less effective than side dressing, looking at all of the factors, such as added time and costs for putting on fertilizers after crop emergence, "both types of application are about equal."

They recommended that annual or biannual soil tests be run to determine if and how much fertilizer is needed on a field. They said that no rule of thumb can be made about applications, as types of soils and fertilizers used vary from region to region.

They added that farmers wishing a soil test should contact their county agent for the proper sampling procedure.

Donors must be in general good health, between 17 and 66 years of age (Iowa and South Dakota require 17 year olds to have written parental consent), eat an adequate meal before donation, never have had hepatitis, jaundice or cancer and undergo a mini-physical exam prior to donation.

Commander Lorenzen and VFW Auxiliary President Neva Lorenzen opened the program which had Eldon Sperry as master of ceremonies.

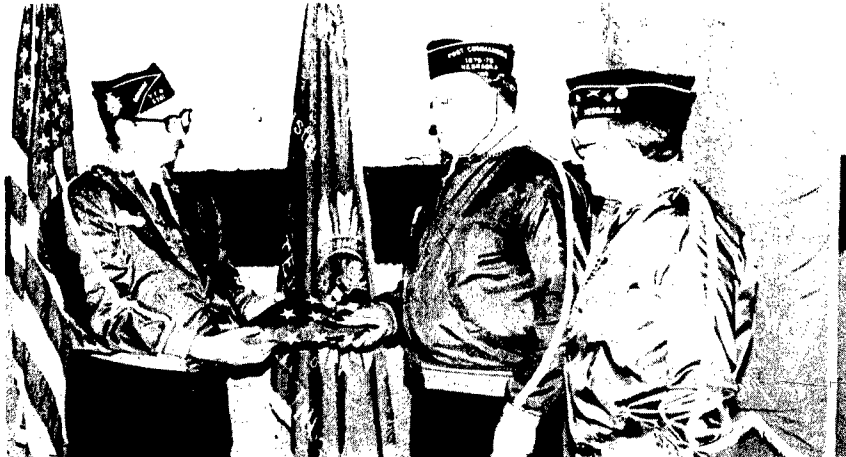
Wayne Denkla, Wayne county veterans service officer, was the featured speaker.

# The Exon Diary

While having to adjust to many changes in Washington, one of the biggest is news coverage. With a limited number of reporters to cover individual senators it becomes a struggle to get in-depth news back home. Such was the case during last week's flurry of votes on budget amendments.

It began with the headline "Exon opposes balanced budget amendment!" I was not voting against a balanced budget. I was voting against Senator William Proxmire's ill-conceived and irresponsible attempt at a balanced budget. Fortunately for the country it was rejected on a vote of 67 to 23.

Had it passed there would have been a substantial reduction in defense spending leaving the U.S. in a perilous position. It would have cut into the farm program emulating the 200 million dollars set aside for research. It would have meant an even greater hardship for those on Social Security. It would have raised unemployment by 400,000 and cost taxpayers an additional 2 billion dollars in unemployment compensation. The ill-thought cuts would have likely thrust this country into a serious recession or even a depression.

Proxmire attempted to cut another 28.8 billion dollars from the Budget Committee's recommendations and do it this year. As a member of that Committee and after working day and night on our package for weeks, we had already cut 11 billion dollars from the President's recommended budget, and a billion below that recommended by the House of Representatives. These were well

thought-out reductions and not a meat-axe approach. We had balanced the benefits against the costs in every case and designed it to have a balanced budget phased in over a two year period which would give the economy time to adjust. This country did not reach serious deficit financing overnight and it cannot responsibly be corrected by an ill-conceived quick fix.

Our recommendations were under constant fire from a small number of Senators but each time they emerged intact with the more thoughtful Senators rejecting those irresponsible attacks.

As a fiscal conservative I was in pretty good company in voting on the side of the Budget Committee. Included were such nationally known fiscal conservatives as Barry Goldwater, Sam Haysakawa, Strom Thurmond, John Tower and Robert Dole. We may not agree on all issues, but this time we were on the same responsible side.

There were even senators who voted for the irresponsible Proxmire amendment who said they knew it was a meat axe approach and here should be a better way. A pretty strange admission indeed when the fate of the Nation lay in the wake of their vote. Thank goodness they weren't in the majority. Those 23 senators knew so little about the budget and the way it functions that they simply did not know what they were doing. Fortunately there were 67 others who did!

What finally was accomplished with my leadership in the Budget Committee and on the floor was the first recommended balanced budget in 19 years. We are making progress despite ever increasing demands of the spenders.

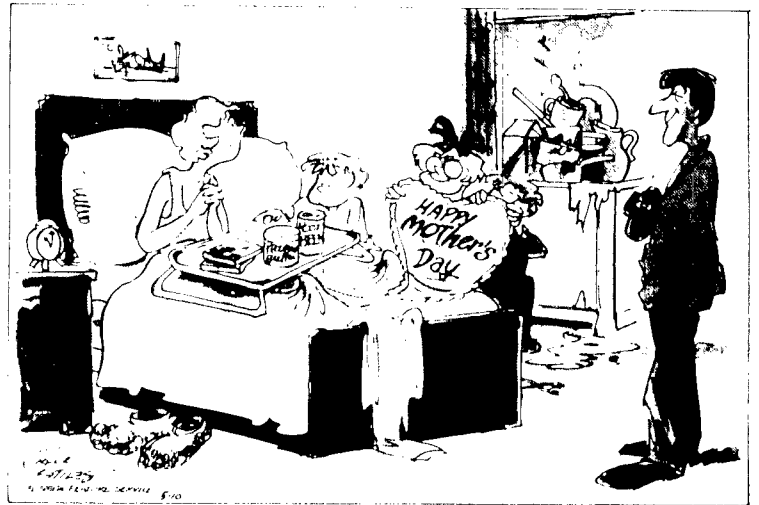

## Unicameral Review

As the return of spring rouses nature from its winter sleep, the lawns here in the Capitol city are greening up, the trees are budding and the flowers are bursting forth in bloom, all making our Nebraska more beautiful.

It is in this environment that the Legislature is considering two anti litter bills this year. LB 120 and LB 497. LB 120 a comprehensive litter bill, was given first round approval by only 25 votes last week. This bill was amended so funds for anti litter programs would be raised by a special tax on industry rather than by the general fund money originally proposed. Another amendment contained language that would make the state eligible for several million dollars in federal funds to combat litter in Nebraska.

A tax of \$150 on each one million dollars would be placed on litter producing goods sold in the state at the wholesale level. Supporters of the bill estimated that it would raise from \$500,000 to \$750,000 annually.

The State Environmental Control Council would draft rules and regulations to carry out the provisions of the law.

LB 497 is known as the Nebraska Voluntary Litter Reduction Act. It increases the penalties for littering. No tax would be levied by any local government or state government agency. A fund would be created to be known as the Litter Voluntary Control Fund. Any person, private corporation, manufacturer and wholesaler would be able to contribute to this fund.

This bill appeared on the consent calendar and was allowed only 15 minutes for debate. It was not advanced as time ran out. The introducer said he will try to bring it up later in the session. Neither bill seems to have very much

strength. Opponents argued that they would rather have a bottle and can deposit bill.

LB 172, the certificate of need bill for health planning in our state, was recently debated on general file. The Legislature must act on this federally mandated legislation or else face the cut-off of federal funds for certain programs. Its purpose is to determine if a new health facility, new health service or new health care related equipment are needed before it is built, initiated or purchased.

After a three hour fight on the floor, the stronger of two different proposals was adopted by a 25-9 vote. Opponents said this bill as amended is unacceptable and would be very costly, especially to small rural hospitals. Less restrictive amendments are apt to be added on select file the next stage of debate.

**Leading Child Specialists Speaking at Symposium**

Today's children are growing up faster, and often in a climate "inhospitable" to children, according to two leading child development specialists.

Dr. David Elkind, an internationally known authority on child development from Tufts University, and Dr. Edward Zigler, director of the child study center at Yale University, will speak on today's child rearing challenges during the second national symposium on Building Family Strengths at Lincoln May 16-18.

Elkind will make a case for what he calls today's "hurried" children. Although children are rarely spoiled today, as they were in the 1940's and 1950's, Elkind said they are forced to grow up faster.

At a very young age, he said, children are pushed to excel by parents, teachers and others, in everything from Little League to school.

He attributes increased alcohol and drug abuse, juvenile delinquency, teen suicides, and teen pregnancies at least in part to pressure to achieve more earlier—academically, socially and sexually.

Social forces, including more divorces, more working mothers, and television, combined with the emphasis on achievement, also are partly to blame for the generational conflicts we're seeing now, Elkind said.

Some young people direct their anger outward and engage in activities that hurt them and that are designed to hurt the parents as well, he added.

Zigler calls American children neglected, pointing to problems of child abuse, poor maternal and child health care, and inadequate mental health and

day care services.

He said the health care of children and pregnant mothers "constitutes a national disgrace," noting that a child born in Hong Kong has a better chance of survival than one born in Newark.

An estimated two thirds of the nation's 60 million children receive inadequate health care, and 2,000 children die from child abuse annually, he added.

"What is needed is not just a piece of legislation to remedy the problem of child abuse or a short lived program to improve the prenatal care of a few pregnant mothers, but rather a new commitment, both public and private, to improve the national climate for child rearing," he said.

Zigler advocates improved delivery of maternal and child health care, a reallocation of social services budgets to "give

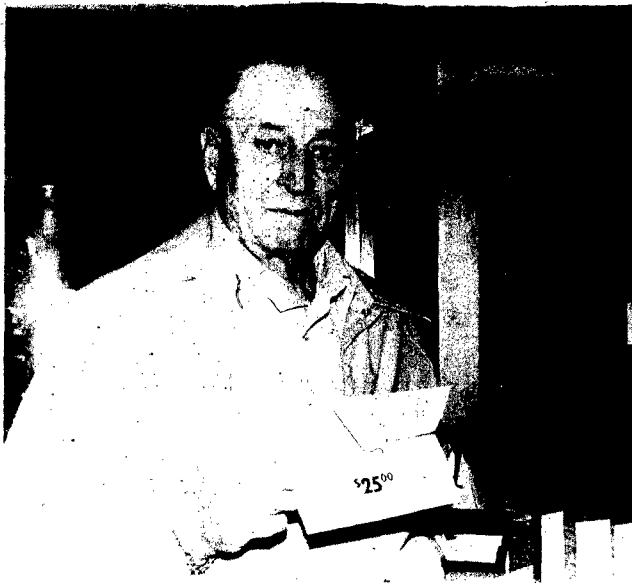
