# Saunders And Anderson Earn State Track Berths



LAUREL STATE qualifiers are Brad Saunders in the shot put and Dennis Anderson in the 3200 meter run. Both placed second in Class C districts at Wayne State College Thursday, with temperatures in the mid 30's and drizzle throughout most of the day.

Laurel's one-two punch of Brad Saunders and Dennis Anderson came through in the clutch in Class C district track at Wayne State College, Thursday. The pair qualified in the cold rainy weather for the Nebraska State Track Meet Friday and Saturday in Omaha.

Saunders, who has led the team in most invitational this year, qualified in the shot put with a toss of 53-3, breaking the school record by one inch. He finished second in the event behind powerful Mike Tranmer of Lyons who recorded a distance of 54.3.

Anderson displayed the running style that has been his trait this season and finished second in the 3200 meter run with a time of 10:28.02. Dave Hamm of Oakland-Craig and formerly of Wayne, won the race in a time of 10:22. Anderson placed third in the 1600 meter run with a time of 4:57.0. Hamm also won that event in 4:53.5. Saunders placed fifth in the discus at 129.2½.

Emerson-Hubbard won the team championship with a total score of 88 while West Point finished in the runnerup spot with 79.5 points and Hartington was third. Laurel scored 28 points to finish ninth and Wakefield and Winside tied for 10th with 18 points in the 13 team field. The top two individuals in

each event qualified for state and the first place teams in the relay events also qualified.

Jeff Carlson placed third in the 100 high hurdles and Jerry Obermeyer was third in the 800 meter run to lead Wakefield in scoring. Mitch Pfeiffer who placed third in the 165 meter hurdles and Brian Foote who was fourth in the pole vault led Winside's scoring.

For many of the events it was a day of upsets. State rated individuals in the high jump, discus, 100 meter dash and 200 failed to qualify for the State Meet. The rules book was consulted throughout the meet with disqualifications in several relay races for exchange zone violations.

## Eight Earn NAIA District II Honors

NAIA District II honors were bestowed upon eight members of the Wayne State baseball team earlier this week by a committee made up of coaches in the district. Those eight players helped lead WSC to a 19-20 record (as of Thursday, May 10).

Named to the "All Star" team were Wayne High graduates Mike Meyer and Bill Schwartz, both freshmen at WSC, and sophomore Brian Blatchford of Ponca.

Receiving Honorable Mention were seniors Neil Blohm, Allen Dewey, Edgar, Omaha; Steve Kleinsmith, Omaha; Bernie Minarik, Elkhorn and junior Jeff Williams, Blue Hill.

Schwartz, who also played well as a defensive end for the Wildcat football team, carried a .406 batting average into the

District II playoffs. His .406 average is the best for WSC in addition to leading in hits with 41 and tied for the lead in doubles with 9. Schwartz trails only Blatchford (.28) and Williams (.27) in RBIs with 24. Schwartz was named as designated hitter.

Meyer is the number two hitter for the Cats, at .254, and is the top active player in fielding. From his catcher's position he has had 141 put outs, 17 assists without a single error.

Blatchford, who came on strong after a 5 for 5 performance in the WSC 22.5 win over Peru State, is third in hitting for the Wildcats with a .333 average. He leads the team in RBIs with 28.

Neil Blohm has been a jack-of-all trades for Wayne State this year. Blohm pitched his way to a 3-1 record, and a 2.19 earned run average. He also has played in the field and was a pinch runner on numerous occasions, from which he became the top

WSC base stealer with 5. Dewey Edgar, also a pitcher, currently has a 3-3 record and a 2.91 earned run average.

Steve Kleinsmith, who made the District II "All-Star" team last season, performed well for the Wildcats in centerfield. Kleinsmith is batting .282 while second on the team in hits with 35, and tied with Schwartz in doubles with 9.

Bernie Minarik carries a .309 batting average and follows only Schwartz and Kleinsmith in hits with 30. Minarik has smashed five homers this season, the same as Schwartz and Blatchford. Minarik has also been a standout academically at WSC. He will attend Creighton Law School in the fall.

Junior Jeff Williams has really come on strong in the second half of the season, and is currently hitting .329. Williams is the top WSC homerun hitter and was recently rated in the top 15 in the nation with 8. Williams trails only Blatchford in RBIs with 27.

"We've had a good season and played some really tough opponents like Nebraska, Missouri Southern and defending NAIA champs, Emporia State," coach Steve Anson said. "We'll have a good group returning next year."

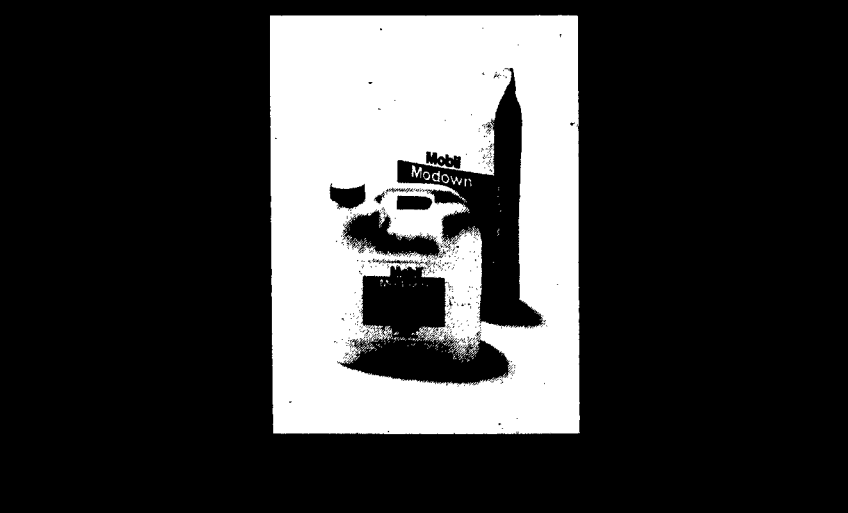

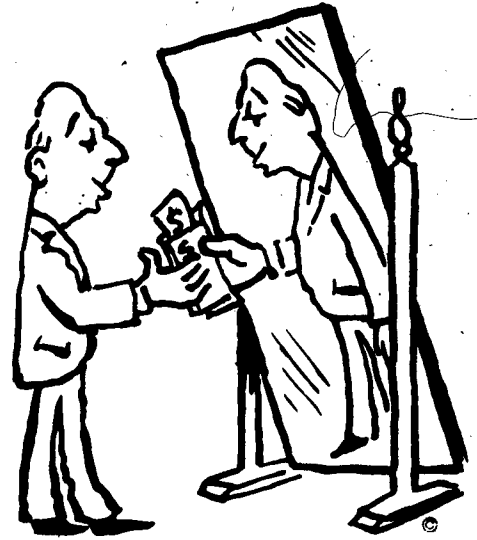

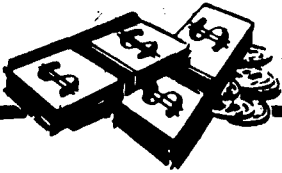

### Envelopes Must 'Measure Up'

"Use up your small and undersized envelopes and cards before July 15," Wayne Postmaster Wilbur Giese reminds customers. That is the date when the Postal Service's new size standards become effective.

The Wayne postmaster said that after July 15, envelopes and cards measuring less than 3 1/2 inches high or 5 inches long will be returned to the sender if mailed.

Postmaster Giese said that because the envelope and greeting card industries have had more than three years to prepare for the new standards, few retailers should still be selling undersized pieces.

"Many consumers, however, are likely to still have smaller envelopes and cards in their supply of stationery," Giese said.

The regulations also prohibit flimsy cards. In the future they must be at least seven-thousandths (.007) of an inch thick. An official postal card, for instance, has a thickness of nine thousandths of an inch.

Undersized pieces and flimsy cards are being banned because they can become trapped in other mail, tear and jam mail processing machinery. As a result, the letters of others can also be damaged.

The standards also affect oversized and odd-shaped pieces of mail, Giese said. For first-class mail weighing one ounce or less, there will be a surcharge of 7 cents for pieces more than 6 1/2 inches high or 11 1/2 inches long.

For more information, the postmaster suggests customers check with a post office window clerk.

Baptist Church. It remained there following the fire in 1884. Some \$2,500 in insurance money was used to build a frame building as the owners of fire-damaged courthouse still were obligated to furnish a courthouse.

In 1882, the owners of Crawford and Browns' Addition to Wayne, donated the present site of the courthouse to the county, with the stipulation that the courthouse be erected within 20 years of the date of the deed and "in no case, no courthouse of the value of \$5,000 shall be erected" on the site.

According to records, there were attempts made during the ensuing 20 years to build a new courthouse but it was not until near the end of the period was approval granted by county voters.

The county issued \$25,000 in bonds and let a contract of \$26,000 exclusive of fixtures. The present building was completed at a cost of about \$32,000. The sheriff's residence and jail is located on the site.
