## Under Seven Percent Lid

# Board Looks at Preliminary Budget

The Wayne-Carroll school district may be able to live with the seven percent lid, according to a preliminary budget presented Monday night at the regular meeting of the school board.

Supt. Dr. Francis Haun explained the proposed budget shows a 5.94 percent increase but that the effective increase would come somewhere in the neighborhood of 6.2 percent.

The proposed 1979-80 school budget amounts to \$1,684,768 as compared with 1,479,358 for the 1978-79 school year. The new budget includes a new program for pre-school children in special education.

Supt. Haun said \$4,875 in budgeted for the program as there are two known students in the pre-school section of special education. He pointed out the figure allows for one more student if the need arises.

The budget is geared for the seven percent lid imposed by the legislature except for new provisions this year which allows for exemptions for the pre-school program, fuel, electricity and social security.

Supt. Haun said the main items of concern will be plant operation and fuel which are blowing the top off of the budget.

The summary of the proposed budget, which will not be adopted until the August meeting, shows (figure in parenthesis, 1978-79 figure):

Ed. \$1,000 (\$500); Supt. Haun explained the lid calculation for the budget is based on anticipated

receipts. They are: Homestead, \$21,495; Pro Data Motor Vehicle, \$4,500; State Aid, \$70,000; Apportionment, \$20,000; Special Education (General), \$30,000; Driver Education, \$3,600; Lunch, \$4,000; Vocational Education, \$3,400; Ins. Prem. Tax, \$19,000; HS Tuition, \$240,700; Special Education Tuition, \$16,000; Local Taxes, \$908,425 for a grand total of \$1,391,120. A seven percent increase would amount to \$97,378.

## Saturday Night Fire Destroys Allen Fertilizer Plant

A fire Saturday evening destroyed the Allen Farmers Co-operative fertilizer plant with the estimated damage being placed between \$150,000 and \$200,000 by Rex Fisher, general manager.

Fisher said that if the wind had been from the east, it would have destroyed the elevator as well.

approximately 200 tons of fertilizer in the plant at the time of the fire.

Fisher said the alarm was turned in at 11:15 p.m. by Kevin Hill who noticed the smoke. According to Allen Fire Chief Jerry Schroeder, the fire had a good start by the time the department arrived on the scene.

The fire destroyed the blending plant and toppled two 100 foot legs. There was rolled up their hoses about 3 a.m.

The original plant was built in 1962 and has been remodeled since then, according to Fisher. Fisher said the cooperative was formed in 1915.

## Board Approves Window Project

The Wayne-Carroll board of education Monday night voted to tackle all of the windows that need replacing in the Wayne Middle School, rather than just half as first proposed.

Marra Home Improvement company, Wayne, was the low bidder on the initial 92 windows outlined in the initial bid. The bid was \$33,400.

Dennis C. Hirschbrunner, professional engineer for Bruce Gilmore and Associates, Columbus, presented the new rates after reviewing the current rates.

The windows will be bronze, providing insulating panel and thermal insulating glass. Moore said this type of windows is cheaper and faster to obtain. He estimated a ten week delivery date.

Moore also told the board his organization would carry a bank interest note for one year to do the entire project of 191 windows.

Supt. Dr. Francis Haun told the board the school could pay about \$48,000 this year. The total cost of the window replacement is estimated at \$69,000.

The window replacement is designed to add fuel efficiency to the building.

## Playground Equipment Plan Gets 'Go-Ahead' by Board

A move to provide school playgrounds with equipment that not only is fun to play on but is designed to build perceptual motor skills, was given board approval Monday night at the regular meeting of the Wayne-Carroll board of education.

Luff said the present equipment is old and "dangerous," pointing out mishaps on swings, slides and merry-go-rounds.

The board authorized Don Koeng, Wayne wrestling coach, to develop a preliminary master plan for the elementary and middle schools and present it to the board at a special session set for 7 p.m. on Monday, June 18.

Luff and other interested parties toured schools in Omaha and came back with pictures to show to the board. The equipment used in the Omaha schools was made of redwood treated lumber, specially treated tires, a swinging bridge which are designed to "search and explore."

The board will review the plan and make an on-site inspection to acquaint themselves with the space and planned location of the pieces of equipment.

Becky Kiedel, president of the Community Council, was on hand and Kay Marsh, a member of the Council, were present for the meeting.

Elementary Principal Dave Luff and Middle School Principal Richard Metteer will assist Koeng with planning.

Mrs. Kiedel congratulated the board for being "sensitive to the needs of the children" and that a creative playground for all children would "substantially enrich their curriculum for motor perception."

# Former Wayne Resident Gets \$1,000 Endowment

A former resident of Wayne has been named the Kenneth Williams Scholarship Award winner at Florida Atlantic University (FAU) in Boca Raton.

Kenneth E. Jones, son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl R. Jones of Cape Coral, Fla. formerly of Wayne, received the \$1,000 Endowment Award during commencement exercises June 9.

Jones is a nephew of Eveline Thompson and Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Perry, all of Wayne, and Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Junk of Carroll.

Jones was one of two students to receive the award, which was

established in 1972 to honor retiring FAU president Williams through a \$50,000 endowment fund. The awards are given annually to two baccalaureate candidates, one on the basis of scholarship and the other for leadership qualities.

Jones, 30, has earned a perfect 4.0 grade-point average and has been named to the President's Honors List every academic quarter since he entered the University in the fall of 1977. He is a member of Phi Kappa Phi honor society.

A major in art in FAU's College of Humanities, he has been active in art programs at the University and in the community, and his work has been exhibited frequently.

Primarily interested in sculpture, Jones has worked principally in constructed sculpture with cement and steel. One of his abstract subjects, eight feet in height, may soon be on display on the FAU campus near the sculpture studio.

Jones plans to tour the United States to exhibit his work at open air art shows and ultimately to open an art studio of his own.

A veteran of the Vietnamese War, he served in the U.S. Air Force from 1968-72 and earned his A.A. degree in 1975 from Edison Community College in Fort Myers, Fla.

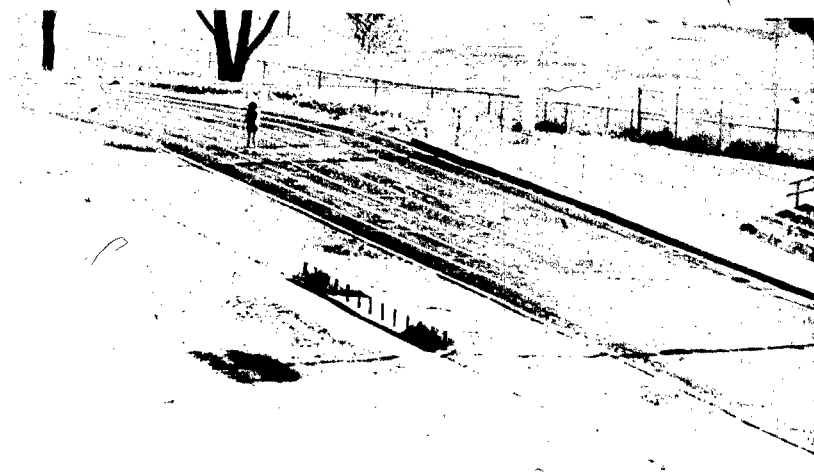

## Many Trees Damaged By Lightning Strikes Each Summer

Many trees are lost or damaged each summer from lightning strikes. Lightning injuries to trees are extremely variable and appear to be governed by the voltage of the charge, the moisture content of the part of the tree struck and the species of tree involved.

The woody parts of the tree may be completely shattered, then may burn. A thin strip of bark running parallel to the wood fibers down the entire length of the trunk may be burned or stripped off.

The internal tissues may be severely burned without exter-

nal evidence, or part or all of the roots may be killed. The upper trunk and branches of evergreens may be killed outright, while the lower portions remain unaffected.

In crowded groves, trees close to the one directly hit may also die. In many cases, grass and other vegetation growing near the stricken trunk will be killed. So-called "hot bolts" with temperatures above 25,000 degrees Fahrenheit will make an entire tree burst into flames, while "cold" lightning can make it literally explode as it strikes at 20,000 miles per second. On occasion, both types apparently cause no damage, but months later the tree dies from burned roots and internal tissue damage.

Tall trees or those growing alone in open areas and trees with roots in moist soils or those growing along bodies of water are most likely to be struck. Though no species of tree is totally immune, some are definitely more resistant to lightning bolts than others. Birches, for example, are rarely struck, whereas elm, maple, oak, pine, ash and cottonwood are commonly hit. The reasons for the difference in susceptibility is not

clear. Some authorities attribute the variations to the composition of the trees. Trees high in oils (birch) are poor conductors of electricity, whereas trees high in starch content (ash, maple, oak, etc.) are good conductors. In addition, deeprooted or decaying trees appear to be more subject to attack than are shallow rooted or healthy trees.

It is commonly believed that lightning never strikes twice in

the same place. This is not true, for some trees have been struck by lightning as many as seven times, judging from the scars on their trunks.

To repair an injured tree, inspect it carefully before attempting to fix the damage. Many trees are severely injured internally or below ground, despite the absence of external symptoms and will soon die regardless of treatment. Do not undertake expensive treatments

until the tree appears to be making a good recovery.

Where external damage is not great or where the tree is particularly valuable, several immediate measures are justifiable. Tack on and cover with burlap any long thin pieces of bark that have been split or lifted from the sapwood. Carefully remove shattered limbs and torn bark. Place fertilizer around the root area to stimulate vigorous growth.

## America's 20th century pioneers

It's a story that deserves to be told. For our purposes, let us pick it up in 1966 when they arrived in British Columbia as immigrants from the Netherlands. Things seemed bleak at first; they knew no one, he had no prospects for work, and only enough money to afford lodging in a third-rate hotel where they were told they must sleep on the floor. But they did have hope, and each other, and an enthusiasm, spirit and discipline — indeed a total commitment — to realize their shared dream of eventually becoming Americans and living a better life in the United States.

Today, the Waliszewicz family, Herman, his wife, Vera and their three sons, Max, 15, Lehman, 13, and David, 12, have already realized that dream and much more. Indeed, they are living proof of Harry Emerson Fosdick's belief that free democratic societies are strong and endure because "there are extraordinary possibilities in ordinary people."

It didn't take Mr. Waliszewicz long to locate his first position as a project engineer for the Park and Tilford Company in British Columbia, nor for him and his wife to save enough money to make a down payment on their first, very modest home. By 1969, his engineering abilities earned him a better offer from the Arthur G. McGee Company in Cleveland, and the family jumped at the chance to live in the United States. . . and in a better home. But they only stayed there a year, as Herman's reputation had already caught the attention of the U.S. Industrial Chemicals Company in Tuscola, Illinois.

Today, they live in nearby Champaign, Ill. Herman now works as group leader of USICC's engineering division. Vera works too, selling jewelry in Robson's, a downtown department store. Thanks to all their work and sacrifices and promotions, Herman and Vera now own two homes — their present residence in Champaign, and their former home in Cleveland which they rent. That's pretty impressive after starting from scratch just 13 years ago. But it's really just the beginning of this family's amazing story.

You see the Waliszewicz sons, Max, Lehman and David, not to be outdone by their parents, bought a home themselves in 1977 for \$40,000. How did they do it? Each one saved nearly every cent he earned over a four-year stretch delivering papers; then they combined their savings and pledged the entire amount toward an \$8,000 down payment. Of course Dad did have to chip in with the

final \$1,800, but the boys have already paid half of that back. The brothers now rent the house, make the necessary repairs with a little help from Mom and Dad, and use the money from the monthly rent payments to meet their tax and mortgage obligations. And that leaves them free to start saving again for their next anticipated investment — a college education. In the interim, they will have gained a practical education most people don't get until they're 30.

Our office got a taste of just how businesslike these young landlords are when we called the Waliszewicz family. The boys weren't here — probably out delivering the Champaign News-Gazette or fixing a faulty faucet in their house — but they did have their own recording which beeped, and then courteously requested us to leave our message.

When we did talk to the boys, we got a feeling of their responsibility, their motivation, in essence — their character. "You have to always make sure everything is right," said 12 year old David about his house. Lehman told us that when he's feeling "happy" he can deliver his papers in 15 minutes. (He admitted he takes longer when he knows they're having spinach for dinner.) ## Give Energy Act time to work

The National Energy Act of 1978 and its natural gas pricing provisions have been criticized by those who say it has failed in its major purpose: to stimulate energy production while at the same time protecting the American residential energy consumer from exorbitant price increases.

The aggressive support by President Carter of the Natural Gas Policy Act (NGPA), the centerpiece of the National Energy Act, was the significant first step toward a realistic national energy policy. As to the criticism of the legislation, which became effective only last December, it is far too early to make judgments on the extent of its failure or success. However, the legislation does represent a major commitment on the part of the federal government to develop an energy policy national in scope, definite in purpose and equitable in implementation. It promises to deliver more domestic energy, benefiting consumers by helping reduce higher cost oil imports and by helping to stem the tide of rising inflation which is harming the U.S. economy.

Critics of NGPA contend that the Act is not going to stimulate more natural gas production. The facts contradict this claim. Even at this early date the indications are that passage of the NGPA is playing a significant role in encouraging the production of gas energy from domestic onshore wells.

The planned investment by the gas production industry for drilling, exploration and production is now rising sharply — 1979 figures are running 14.4 percent over 1978 figures — indicating a determination by the industry to boost gas production.

Gas well completions during the first several months of 1979, after the NGPA was law, were up nearly 30 percent over the same period in 1978, before the Act was law.

In 1978, deep well drilling was up over 60 percent from the previous year as gas producers, anticipating passage of NGPA, expanded their exploration efforts.

The bill facilitates plans to bring natural gas from Alaska to the lower 48 states by exempting from its incremental pricing regulations the huge gas reserves at Prudhoe Bay. Now the engineering, financing and regulatory clearance phases of the Alaskan gas pipeline project are underway; by the mid-1980s the 4,800 mile pipeline should be completed, bringing new gas supplies to the nation's consumers.

Industry studies predict that the NGPA will stimulate significant increased production of gas — nearly 8.5 trillion cubic feet through 1985.

It is also important of note that increased gas prices are predicted to rise because of NGPA only about 3

percent per year, plus inflation, between now and 1985. The combined average during that time will likely be in the 10 percent range per year. If efforts to arrest inflation are successful, this will, of course, be less.

In fact, the share of disposable family income spent on gas for householding is forecast to decline — from 1.5 percent in 1977 to 1.4 percent in 1985, according to an analysis by the American Gas Association. In fact, the average American family is spending the same proportion of its disposable income for gas heat today as it did in 1960. And by 1985 it is estimated that family will be spending an even smaller proportion.

The cost of all energy is going to rise, but passage of the natural gas provisions of the energy bill mean that clean, efficient gas energy will remain the consumer's best buy and that increased supply will be available.

Within the next few years, it will be increasingly recognized that the NGPA was the first step toward ensuring that America will have affordable and available gas energy far into the future.

Young farmers and ranchers, particularly those who have prospects for inheriting and carrying on the family farming and ranching operation, have a tremendous stake in supporting repeal of the so called "carryover provision" in the 1976 Tax Reform Act.

Currently, there are some 10 bills introduced in Congress to accomplish this repeal, including one by Nebraska 3rd District Representative Virginia Smith. Most farm fathers and mothers are interested in seeing a son or daughter and her husband take over the farming operations if they are inclined to do so, and as a matter of practicality, family help and inheritance is the only way young people can get a start in the high priced, high capital investment business of farming and ranching.

Here is what this "carryover provision" is all about. While the Tax Reform Act of 1976 provides tax relief for estates, especially those involving a farm or small business, one provision establishes a new, cost basis carryover on property for estate taxes.

That provision was that when heirs sell inherited property, the value of such property for tax purposes will be either the original purchase price or the fair market value as of Dec. 31, 1976, whichever is greater.

For farmland, the appreciation in value will be prorated by a straightline apportionment method based on the amount of time the property was owned before Jan. 1, 1977. The less time such farmland was owned before the provision takes effect, the greater the appreciation will be taxable.

Under the old law (still in effect because Congress has delayed implementation of the provision until Jan. 1, 1980), the tax basis of inherited property was

"stepped up" to its fair market value at the time of the decedent's death. Later, when an individual sold this inherited property, taxes were paid on the difference between the selling price and the "stepped up" value of the property. Any appreciation before the inheritance was not taxed as income.

Those who oppose elimination of the "carryover provision" have argued that such action encourages retention of wealth. Actually, heirs will be more reluctant to sell inherited property because of the prospect of increased capital gains taxes. It is well recognized that the big increases in land values which have occurred annually since 1972 have largely been the result of inflation rather than the land's increase in productivity and earning capacity.

Suppose a young farmer's father purchased his farm for \$60,000 and died when it was worth \$120,000, leaving it to the son. Assume that the son after a number of years of ownership and operation decided to sell the farm for \$150,000. His gain over what his father paid for the land would be \$90,000, but his gain over the farm's value, when his father died and he inherited it, would be only \$30,000.

The way the law is written, it must be determined what the fair market value of the land was on Dec. 31, 1976 and this feature was held by some as a "fresh start" when the law was passed. Farm organizations opposed that provision then and pointed out the growth of inflation and problems that are piling up as the years pass and farmland values double and triple.

The "carryover" will have to be figured out not only for the land but for buildings, machinery, etc. and such calculations can become potential night mares as adequate records become more difficult to produce with every year that passes. The legal entanglements and expense are easily visible.

Reportedly, White House sources have said President Carter would veto any bill that repealed "carryover" or again postponed a solution. The carryover provision was not practical in 1976 and with inflation intensifying, it makes less logic now. The best answer is to eliminate it from the law before it takes effect.

## At the Front in France: 1918

Luther Swanson of Oakdale served as a lieutenant in the Army Engineers during the First World War. Some of his letters have been preserved in the State Archives at the Nebraska State Historical Society. The one which follows gives a vivid picture of the constant shellfire and sticky French mud which plagued the soldiers in the front-line trenches:

"At the front (Northern France) "E" Co., 1st U.S. Eng. Army Expeditionary Force, Feb. 24, 1918

"Dear Folks: This is Sunday, but not a day of rest, as we work straight through every day getting ready for the German offensive that is coming. The men have one day off in seven, to get cleaned up and rest, but the work has to go on, so one seventh of the men are off each day and the officers never.

"Fritz is sending over a few tonight and the sentry in front of our dugout is down in the entrance hugging the wall. Our fair city here has been pretty thoroughly shot up already and getting more so every day. Every house here is in ruins and nothing left but heaps of stone with a few walls left standing, except for the chateau, which isn't as badly knocked to pieces as the rest of the town. The house next door was all gone but the chimney, which was still standing unhurt up to last night. I was going to get a picture of that chimney, but last evening a shell got it so that's gone too.

"The material yard, we call it the dump, where the little toy railway, unloaded our material, gets shelled about twice a day. After the storm is over the lieutenant in charge goes out and gets his men out from whatever they're hiding under and starts them at work again.

## Need to Bag Bagworms Now

The bagworm is a unique little insect that can cause severe injury to all evergreen trees and shrubs. It is known to feed on more than 90 kinds of ornamentals, but does not pose a serious threat on deciduous types of trees and shrubs.

Overwinters in the egg stage inside bags formed last year. Light infestations on small trees can be reduced by picking off the bags and destroying or taking them to the landfill. This must be done soon, as eggs may begin hatching in early to mid-June.

Several sprays are effective after eggs hatch. They are most useful when small bagworms are feeding in mid to late June, and July. After the bags are more than an inch long, control is difficult.

Products readily available for home use to control bagworms are diazinon, Cygon, and Orthene. Use strictly according to the labels.

## Trees Need Attention

Trees are an integral part of most home landscapes, but they often are neglected until they begin to do poorly. By then, it can be too late.

Most trees need fertilizer, especially if growing under adverse conditions, such as poor soil or subsoil, or are surrounded by asphalt or concrete, or choking on air pollution. Applications of fertilizer improve trees' general vigor. This increases their overall resistance or recovery from insects, disease and other adverse conditions.

Fertilizer also enriches the soil, which allows the tree to more efficiently make and use the food it produces.

Because most home owners rake up dead leaves from around trees in the fall, fertilizing becomes even more important. Without the leaves, trees lose many nutrients which would normally be returned to the soil as leaves decompose.

## This and That... from YOUR COUNTY AGENT

### TICKS

I've had several reports of ticks being especially numerous this season. The American dog or wood tick is the species usually found in grassy or brushy areas. The first two life stages of this tick feed on rodents or rabbits, the third or adult stage will feed on most mammals—dogs and men. This tick is capable of transmitting spotted fever but the possibility is slight.

Precautions to prevent being bit include: 1) When entering a tick infested area, use a good repellent such as deer or sulfur dust around trouser legs and shoe tops. This is not a sure repellent but may help. 2) Examine the body after being in infested areas, especially hairy regions and the head, investigate any feeling of something crawling on you. 3) Remove clothing and leave them outdoors for a day after returning home.

If a tick is attached, remove it by grasping the head next to the skin and remove with a gentle, steady pull. Do not jerk. Treat the bite site with any antiseptic to prevent local infection.

If ticks are numerous in lawns, or for small areas mix two level tablespoons of 50 percent wettable powder to a gallon of water or use as a foliage spray.

### IRRIGATING ALFALFA

About 3.5 inches of water are required per ton of alfalfa if a two-ton cut of alfalfa is the objective. Then apply seven inches of water for each cutting of alfalfa.

### PRUNING EVERGREENS

Evergreens may benefit from pruning. Pruning evergreens is done to maintain the natural form of the tree, to prevent the tree from growing too wide or tall or to develop more dense foliage.

Pruning evergreens is not difficult. The important thing to remember is to use sharp equipment. It is best to prune regularly and make pruning cuts on the current season's growth. If branches are cut back beyond live foliage, new needles will not be produced and the branch will die.

Austrian pine should be pruned.

## Farmers Agree to Cooperate In Using Solar Energy

Ten Nebraska farmers have agreed to cooperate with the USDA, US Department of Energy and the UNL Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources Cooperative Extension Service to demonstrate the technical and economic feasibility of using solar energy to heat livestock buildings.

The project is intended to demonstrate the results of four years of solar research by the DOE and USDA and is funded in part by a \$173,700 grant from these agencies, according to Gerald Bodman, IANR extension agricultural engineer and project manager.

The project, according to Bodman, is a three year study designed to examine the econ-

omics of solar heating in swine, dairy and poultry production buildings.

Information obtained from the demonstration will be equally applicable to small and large scale operators," he noted.

"The project will be looking at what kind of incentives will be most successful to encourage the user to install a solar heating system."

Extension specialists from the UNL departments of agricultural engineering, ag economics and animal science, including swine, dairy and poultry production specialists will focus on the performance of the animals handled in the solar heated facilities, he said and also on what portion of the total heat

requirement can be produced by the solar units.

"Energy to heat ventilation air accounts for 70 to 80 percent of the total energy cost in animal housing units," Bodman explained. "There is no way to eliminate that cost. The producer has to manage energy use so it's most efficient and make sure he's not overventilating."

During the first year of the project, emphasis will be placed on design and installation of solar collectors at individual production sites, he said. Monitoring of the project will begin upon completion of construction at each site he said, and continue for two years. Deadline for completion of the installations is May 1980.

Bodman emphasized that livestock producers participating in the demonstration will contribute a minimum of 50 percent of the cost of the solar systems.

The project is a cost sharing endeavor between DOE/USDA and the states, he said, and it is a requirement of the contracts that the University contribute no more than half of the cost of the solar systems.

In finding participants for the demonstration he said, it was necessary to locate individuals who had expressed an interest in solar energy for heating their livestock buildings, and who were willing to invest their own money.

He said in the case of producers who are constructing a new building or modifying an existing building for the project the cost of construction, other than installation of the solar system, will be theirs.

Nebraska is one of nine states earmarked for solar demonstrations. Other agricultural oriented solar research at UNL

began in July, 1975 and includes a solar swine growing finishing house and a solar powered irrigation and grain drying system at Mead and a solar modified open-front swine growing finishing building on a private farm near Wahoo.

## Crop Yield Potential Determined by Seed

Crop yield potential is determined by the seed you plant. Nothing you do will increase this inherent potential. Everything that happens after planting serves either to maintain the potential or to reduce it. Pests, inadequate fertility, or drought at a critical stage are among recognized yield depressants.

Eliminating such problems helps growers to approach their yield potential but will not send yield beyond the built-in potential level.

When looking at a field of thousands and thousands of plants, we sometimes forget that the harvest from that field depends on the cumulative per-

formance of each individual plant. How far will each plant fall short in realizing its potential? That's what finally determines yield. Anyling that prevents 10 kernels from developing on each of 24,000 ears cuts per acre yield by almost three bushels.

Only 10 to 12 percent of the weight of a corn seed is in the embryo or germ and most of that is stored nutrients. Yet the tiny remainder is a miniature plant, which has the potential to develop into a full grownassel plant eight to 10 feet tall with 35 to 37 full-sized leaves in 60 to 70 days.

As a seed germinates and starts growing, the young shoot grows upward toward the soil surface. When the tip reaches light, it splits and allows the first leaves to unfurl. Every thing above-ground plant will ever be is inside that toothpick sized seedling. If all goes well, its production may approach its potential.

About the time the shoot

breaks through the soil surface a second (permanent) set of roots will begin to develop one or one and a half inches below ground level. This becomes the "crown" and several rows of ranks of roots may develop from this point upward on the stalk. This permanent root system soon takes over to nourish the plant as it grows and develops.

Just above the crown area of a corn seedling is the all important growing point which contains in miniature every above-ground plant part that will eventually develop. There are several cells representing each future leaf, a few representing the eventualassel and even some that will become ear shoots. As long as the growing point remains below ground level, the future plant is well protected from freeze, hail damage, and other weather-related damage.

The growing point is easy to identify. Simply split the stalk with a knife and look for a white colored Christmas tree-shaped structure. A dead or damaged one will be brown or black and may show the first evidence of rot and deterioration.

The growing point location is critical in case of late spring freezes, floods, hail storms, or attacks by certain insects. If anything damages or kills the

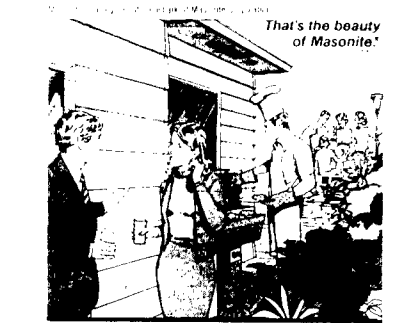
