Give Energy Act time to work

The National Energy Act of 1978 and its natural gas pricing provisions have been criticized by those who say it has failed in its mator purpose: to stimulate energy production while at the same time protecting the American residential energy consumer from exorbitant price increases

The aggressive support by President Carter of the Natural Gas Policy Act (NGPA). The centerpice of the National Energy Act, was the significant first step loward a realistic national energy policy. As to the criticism of the legislation, which became effective only last December, it is far too early to make judgments on the extent of its faulture or success However, the legislation does represent a major commitment on the part of the federal government to develop an energy policy national in scope, definite in purpose and equilable in implementation if promises to deliver more domestic energy, benefiting consumers by helping reduce higher-cost off imports and by helping to stem the tide of rising inflation which is harming the U.S. economy Critics of MGPA contend that the Act is not going to stimulate more natural gas production.

production.
The facts contradict this claim. Even at this early date the indications are that passage of the NGPA is playing a significant role in encouraging the production of gas energy from domestic outbooks will be

production of gas energy from domestic onshore wells.

The planned investment by the gas production industry for drilling, exploration and production is now rising sharply—197 figures are running 14 a percent over 1978 figures — indicating a determination by the industry to boost gas production.

Gas well completions during the first several months of 1979, after the NGPA was law were up nearly 33 percent over the same period in 1978, before the Act was law. In 1978, deep well dirilling was up over dipercent from the previous year as gas producers anticipating passage of the sepanded their exploration citors.



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Need to Bag **Bagworms Now**

The bagworm is a unique little insect that can cause -severe injury to all evergreen trees and shrubs. It is known to feed on more than 90 kinds of ornamentals, but does not pose a serious threat on deciduous types of trees and shrubs.

trees and shrubs.

It overwinters in the egg stage inside bags formed last year. Light intestations on small trees can be reduced by picking off the bags and destroying or taking them to the landfill. This must be done soon, as eggs may begin hafching in early to mid-June.

Several sprays are effective after eggs hatch. They are most useful when small bagworms are feeding in mid to late June, and July. After the bags are more than an inch föng, control is difficult.

Because most home owners rake up dead leaves from around trees in the fall, ferti-tizing becomes even more im-portant. Without the leaves, trees lose many nutrients which would normally be refurmed to the soil as leaves decompose.

TICKS

I've had several reports of ticks being especially numerous this season. The American dog or wood tick is the species usually found in grassy or brushy areas. The first two life stages of this tick feed on rodents or rabbits, the third or adult stage will feed on most marmals—dogs and men This tick is capable of transmitting spotted feere but the possibility is slight.

Precautions to prevent being bit include: 1) When entering a tick intested area, use a good repetitent such as deed or sulfur dust around frouser legs and shoe tops. This is not a sure repellent but may help. 21 Examine the body after being in intested areas, especially hairy regions and the head, investigate any feeling of something crawling on you. 31 Remove clothing and leave them out door for a day after refurning the strength of the skin and remove with a gentle, steady puil — do not jerk Treat the bite site with any antiseptic to prevent local infection.
