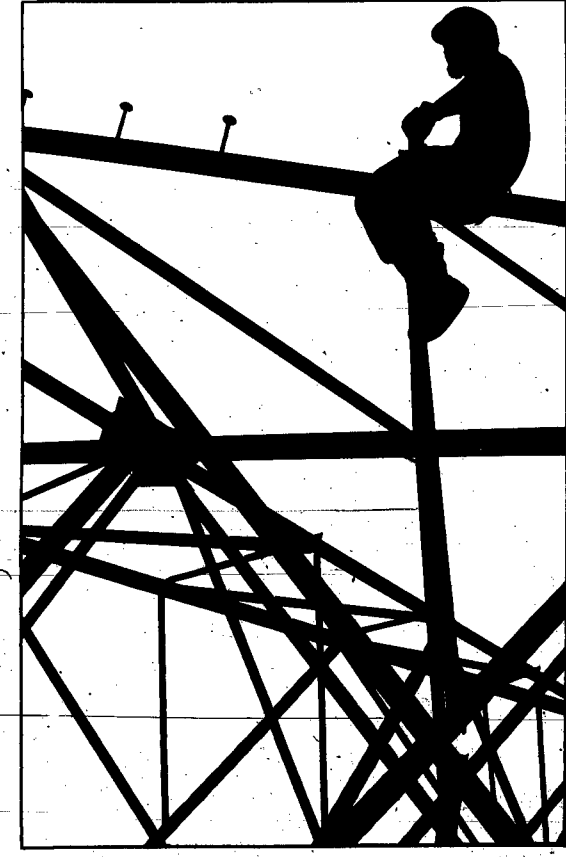

Better Ag Prices Good Indicator

Thanks to improved grain and livestock prices, Nebraska farmers and ranchers are showing the best statistical indicators that they have had for a number of years, greatly improved over a year ago.

Agricultural statistics have to be viewed in terms of averages. For example, a favorable crop and livestock report doesn't mean just for an individual farmer who has just lost his crop to a hailstorm or to a rancher who lost cattle and had a reduced calf crop because of last winter's severe weather.

Farming and ranching is an uncertain business. Conditions change with surprising rapidity. The bad news of fuel shortages, high prices, grasshopper plagues and severe storms usually take precedence in the nation's press to a degree that non-farmers are thoroughly confused about how the nation's food supply system operates, and how the U.S. can actually be the world's most dependable food supplier.

There is good news in the most recent roundup of Nebraska Crop & Livestock Reporting-Service figures. They indicated

that on June 15, the index of prices received by Nebraska farmers and ranchers for all farm products was 252 which means that they got \$252 for the same products for which they received \$100 in 1967, and \$211 on June 15, 1978. That's a gain of \$41 in one year. Their average on June 15 compared to a national farm product average index of 243... a year ago the national index was 217.

To keep these figures in perspective, however, consider that the national index of "prices paid" by farmers also increased dramatically in the past year, from 213 on June 15, 1978 to 240 on June 15 of this year. That means that what cost a farmer \$100 in 1967 cost \$213 a year ago and now costs him \$240. That \$240 includes production items; family living items, interest, taxes and wage rates. The biggest increase in the "prices paid" index came in production items, which went from 218 a year ago to 248 this year.

The favorable news in this ratio index is the indication that for the past year, the farmer's returns kept pace with his inflated costs. With rising energy costs, this situation may not continue for very long.


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grain exports raised wheat prices for Nebraska farmers to an average of \$3.45 per bushel on June 15 as compared to \$2.57 the same date in 1978. The average corn price was figured at \$2.47 per bushel as compared to \$2.22 the previous year and grain sorghum at \$3.91 per cwt compared to \$3.34 last year. Soybeans at \$7.38 per bushel compared to \$6.50 last year.

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The statistics are not all rosy but they are not all gloom either. They indicate why good farm and ranch managers continue to weather financial problems and maintain the necessary optimism to keep operating successfully.

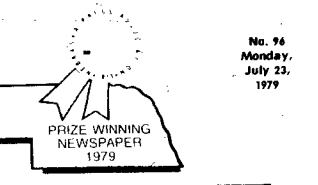

News of Note around Northeast Nebraska

DR. Joel Christiansen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Christiansen of Pender, has been named superintendent of schools for the Mead Public Schools for the 1979-80 school year. He served as principal in the Aurora Public Schools, Aurora, Colo., prior to attaining the position at Mead.

BEEHMER High School's non-resident tuition was set at \$4,900 as the District 55 Board of Education met July 2. The high school tuition was previously \$4,200. Junior High non-resident tuition was raised from \$1,995 to \$2,335 and elementary from \$1,264 to \$1,800.

R. Bruce Henning has announced his retirement as county judge in the Ninth Judicial District, effective Sept. 4. The nominating commission will hold a public hearing in Madison on July 30 to ponder candidates to fill the vacancy.

OUT OF OLD NEBRASKA

In this space age almost anything seems possible. Some purported "outerspace" objects intruding into the earth's atmosphere sent the Air Force into a 12-year investigation of the mysterious sightings — its UFO Blue Book Project, 1947-69. Roger Welsh, UNL professor, in the spring issue of "Nebraska History" (publication of the Nebraska State Historical Society) writes of a much earlier preoccupation with supposed sightings of space ships in 1897.

Now comes Everett Sutton, Benkelman, one of Nebraska's better known amateur historians and the author of Dundy County's State Centennial history in 1967, with a still earlier account of celestial goings-on. A long-time Burlington agent, now retired, Sutton dug into his voluminous files, which he began assembling as a youngster early in the century, to produce the following May, 1884, account from a copy of the "Nebraska Nugget," Holdrege:

"STRANGE PHENOMENA — Has Auld Nick's Aerial Bicycle Made a Lunge? And Escaping His Hands Fallen to Earth, This Mundane Sphere? A Red Hot Machine from the Nether Element? The Startling Find of Some Dundy County Ranchers?"

"About 35 miles northwest of Benkelman, Dundy County, on the 6th of June a very startling phenomenon occurred. It seems that John W. Ellis and three of his herdsmen and a number of other cowboys were out engaged in a round up. They were startled by a terrific whirring noise over their heads, and turning their eyes saw a blazing body falling like a shot to the earth. It struck beyond them, being hidden from view by a bank.

"He rode at once to the spot, and it is asserted, saw fragments of cog wheels, and other pieces of machinery lying on the ground, scattered in the path made by the aerial visitor, glowing with heat so intense as to scorch the grass for a long distance around each fragment and make it impossible for one to approach it. Coming to the edge of the deep ravine into which the strange object had fallen, they undertook to see what it was. But the heat was so great that the air about it was fairly ablaze and it emitted a light so dazzling that the eye could not rest upon it more than a moment.

"The heat from this strange wreck was so intense that a cowboy named William son fell senseless from gazing at it too close quarters. His face was blistered, and his hair singed to a crisp. His condition is

said to be dangerous. The distance from the aerolite was nearly 200 feet. The burned man was taken to Mr. Ellis' house, cared for as well as circumstances would allow and a doctor sent for. His brother, who lives in Denver, was telegraphed for...

"Finding it impossible to approach the mysterious visitor, the party turned back on its trail. Where it first touched the earth the ground was sandy and bare of grass. The sand was fused to an unknown depth over a space about 20 feet wide by 80 feet long, and the melted stuff was still bubbling and hissing. Between this and the final resting place there were several other like spots where it had come in contact with the ground, but not so well marked.

"It being impossible to investigate further at the time, messengers were sent out to neighboring ranches and many came to see the strange sight that night at which time the light emitted from it was like the blazing rays of the sun and too powerful to be borne by human eyes.

"On the morning of the 7th another visit was paid the luminous curiosity. In the party was E.W. Rawlins, brand inspector for this district, who came into Benkelman at once, and from whom a full verification of particulars were obtained. The smaller portions of the vast machinery had cooled so that they could be approached, but not handled.

"One piece that looked like the blade of a propeller screw, of metal in appearance like brass, about 16 inches wide, 3 inches thick and 3 1/2 feet long, was picked up on a spade. It would not weigh more than five pounds, but appeared as strong and compact as any metal. A fragment of a wheel with a milled rim, apparently having had a diameter of seven or eight feet, was also picked up. It seemed to be of the same material and had the same remarkable lightness. The aerolite, or whatever it is, seems to be about 50 or 60 feet long, cylindrical, and about 10 or 12 feet in diameter.

"Great excitement exists in the vicinity and the round up is suspended while the cowboys wait for the wonderful find to cool off so they can examine it. MR. ELLIS WILL go to the land office to secure the land on which the strange thing lies so that his claim to it cannot be disputed. The country in the vicinity is rather wild and rough, and the roads are hardly more than trails."

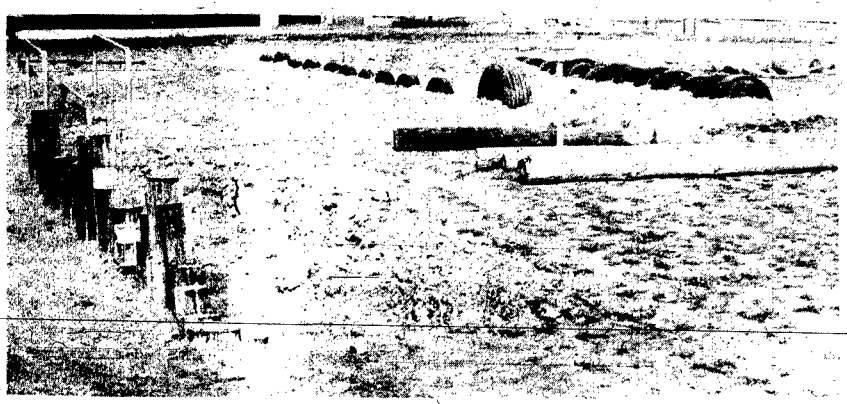

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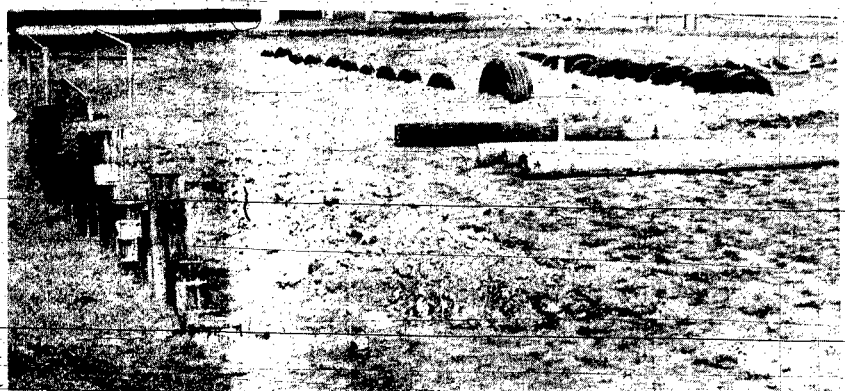

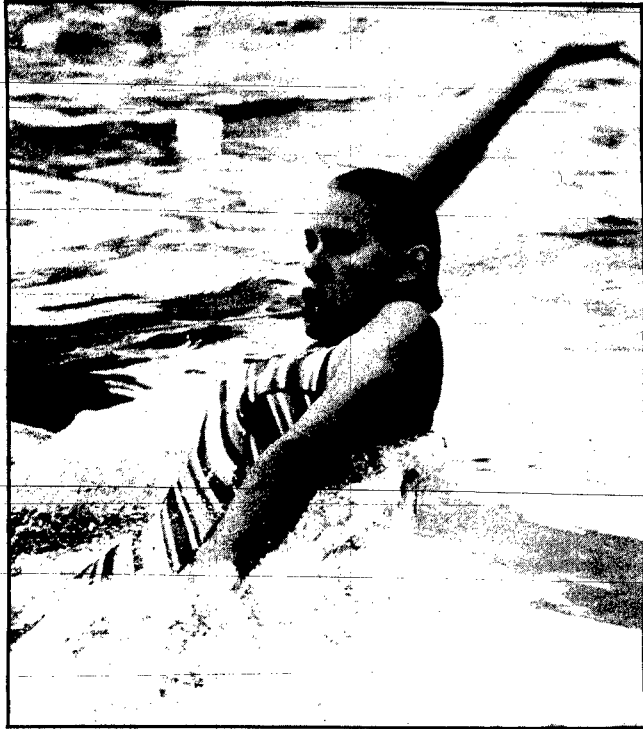

Coach Carroll And Kittens At Salina Basketball Camp

Accompanying Wayne State College women's basketball coach Helen Carroll to the Heart of America Advanced Girls Basketball Camp in Salina, Kan., July 22-27 will be five of the Wildkittens top 1979-80 prospects.

Lisa Draper, Lisa Curtis, Lori Cadwell, Debra Emanuel and Mariene Mogensen will all take part in the camp, headed by Marymount College basketball coach Ken Cochran and Colorado State University women's basketball coach Ann Matlock. The camp features advanced techniques of offensive and defensive basketball along with the chance to compete against some of the Midwest's finest high school seniors and college players.

Four of the girls making the trip represent what Carroll describes as the best recruiting season in WSC women's basketball history. Draper and Curtis, both from Council Bluffs, Iowa, are top recruits. Curtis was a five sport standout at Lewis Central High School and was also named Honorable Mention to the Iowa Girls All-State Basketball Team.

The other Council Bluffs product, Draper, was "Female Athlete of the Year" at Abraham Lincoln High School. The 5'11 Emanuel from North Bend may provide the Wildkittens

with some front line depth while Cadwell, from Dallas Center, Iowa, should help in the back court. The 5'7 guard was selected most valuable player at Dallas Community High School last season.

According to Carroll, the value of the camp is to get the girls, especially the Iowa players who have played the traditional six-women game, "excited about playing defense." Draper and Curtis both played

almost exclusively on the offensive side in high school. "That, plus playing a week of five-on-five should give them some valuable exposure, especially when you consider the competition that this camp will provide," coach Carroll added.

The fifth woman making the trip, Mogensen from Cedar Rapids, played volleyball at WSC last season and hopes to earn a spot on the Wildkitten basketball squad in 1979-80.
