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Former AFS Student Finds Wayne Is Home

"Mid pleasures and palaces though we may roam,
Be it ever so humble there's no place like home."
J. Howard Payne

Alain Guillot-Pingue, an exchange student at Wayne-Carroll High School during the 1975-76 school year, has found considerable truth in J. Howard Payne's quotation. He traveled several thousand miles recently roaming the United States, showing up on the doorstep of his American home in rural Wayne Saturday.

MUCH TO THE delightful surprise of his American "family," the Dwaline Rethwischs, Alain returned for a brief visit enroute to New York. He arrived, along with a companion from Tunisia, in the states Aug. 10.

As is the case sometimes with surprise visits, no one was home when Alain arrived at the Rethwisch farm some three miles west of Wayne. So, after waiting for three hours, Alain trekked to the farm home of his American "uncle," the Lowell Rethwischs, and stayed there Saturday.

Dwaline and Carol Rethwisch, gone for the weekend, returned Sunday.

THREE YEARS older (now 21), a little wiser, better educated and sporting a reddish beard, Alain was "at home" Monday afternoon reminiscing with his American "mother" about times gone by. Alain is between semesters at the University of Liege in Belgium where he is studying law. A regulation of the American Field Service (AFS) prevented him from returning to Wayne for three years after his previous visit.

"They (the AFS) don't want them (exchange students) to become immigrants," Mrs. Rethwisch explained. The AFS also forbids Alain from visiting other parts of the country while a student here under their auspices three years ago.

AS A RESULT, he and his friend have traveled the country extensively, seeking the country's pleasures and palaces and experiencing the nation in a larger perspective.

The pair arrived in the states and began a haphazard trip (airfare was too expensive) from coast to coast. The first stop was Niagara Falls, then to north of Quebec, Canada. Most of the New England states were included in the self-made tour, and Boston and Cape Cod were among their favorites.

The two, notably naive about the hazards of hitchhiking in America, took to the road via their thumbs and visited Kent State University. From there they journeyed to Long Beach, Calif., to San Francisco ("real nice but a little weird") and then a long bus trip to Lincoln.

IT WAS THEN that Alain parted from his friend and headed north to Wayne where he stayed until Tuesday. The Rethwischs drove him to Lincoln to catch his bus to Chicago. While in Lincoln, he visited the Rethwischs' oldest son at the University of Nebraska.

In Chicago, Alain met up with his buddy and the two continued their bus trip to New York where their flight is scheduled to take them home Oct. 4.

Alain said he was thoroughly impressed

with America during his first visit three years ago. He fell in love with the Midwest and the Rethwisch family and saved his money for his return trip.

"MY EXAMS (last spring) turned out well," Alain explained. So, he worked as a cashier at a supermarket and then in after-sales service in July to earn enough money for airfare.

Although most of the 1976 seniors have gone, Wayne-Carroll High "still has the same young American kids. Nothing has changed," he said.

Alain said he was recognized almost immediately by his former teachers, and found that several of his 1976 classmates have brothers and sisters who are easily recognizable.

About his former school-away-from-school, Alain lamented that "It's pretty sad Wayne High is doing poorly in football."

ALAIN ALSO was saddened by the lack of any type of AFS program in Wayne now. The program was disbanded unexpectedly about a year after Alain was here.

There's no place like home to Alain, especially when he can travel several thousand miles and feel as much at home in America as he can in his homeland.

"I like the Midwest best," he explained. "Maybe it's because I feel at home here."

Frank Abagnale Jr., a nationally known security consultant, will deliver a presentation entitled "To Catch a Thief" at 7:30 p.m. Monday in Rice Auditorium on the Wayne State College campus.

Sponsored jointly by the Chamber of Commerce and Wayne State College, Abagnale will provide information on fraud and the con artist for persons who come into daily contact with the public, particularly small business persons.



Abagnale has been dubbed the "World's Greatest Con Artist" (retired). He has impersonated a copilot, an attorney, pediatrician and a college professor. He has served six months in a French prison, escaped three times from U.S. authorities, served about four years in a federal penitentiary and passed \$2.5 million in bad checks in 24 countries and 27 states.

He has lectured all over the U.S. and was in Omaha last year. He will provide the latest information on check cashing, counterfeit money, credit cards, collection techniques, tricks of con artists and the use of color copiers in making counterfeit money and other negotiable instruments.

Abagnale has appeared on the "Tonight Show," "The Today Show," "Good Morning America," and "Mike Douglas" television programs. "To Catch a Thief" is presented by the Nebraska Business Development Center (NBDC) at Wayne State College.

Council Opts to Sell Industrial Land

Flood insurance, a land option in the Industrial Park and final reading of a garbage license fee ordinance were tackled at the regular City Council meeting Tuesday night.

A motion was approved to give a 90-day option to Wayne Industries to sell 8.2 acres of land to a potential manufacturer. John Nigh, president of Wayne Industries, said the industrial group is representing a client who wishes to remain anonymous.

THE LAND, valued at \$2,750 an acre, will be sold if and when the manufacturer chooses Wayne as a town in which to locate. The land is located north of National Nebraska Fiberglass Corp.

An ordinance increasing fees charged to Class A and B garbage haulers was passed 5-2 after its first and second readings were held at the two previous council sessions. Voting against passage were Cliff Ginn and Sam Hepburn. Class A fees go from \$100 to \$200.

The council also voted to amend an ordinance section dealing with Class B haulers. The original ordinance raised Class B fees from \$10 to \$15 annually, but it was decided to hike that fee to \$25. The vote was 5-2 and voting against it were Hepburn and Ginn.

THE ORDINANCE becomes effective upon publication in The Wayne Herald.

Rich J. Leonard, representing the Federal Flood Insurance Administration, explained the federal Flood Insurance Program in which the city currently is participating.

After listening to Leonard's speech, the council decided to ask the federal government for permission to shift the floodway slightly to the east. This will remove some land in the Industrial Park from the flood plain.

Additional information on Wayne's participation in the Flood Insurance Program will appear in Monday's issue of The Wayne Herald.

In other action, the council amended its existing agreement with Nebraska Public Power District involving a reduction in the amount of electricity sold by the city on a yearly basis.

CURRENTLY, the city is under contract to sell to NPPD 14,500 kilowatts a year. However, due to machinery breakdowns the city has not been able to provide that capacity.

The new contract reduces the amount of power to be sold to 13,050 or 90 percent of the plant's capacity. The change will be effective Jan. 1.

Emergency. After learning that if a federal grant was not allocated by Sept. 30 it would be taken back by the government, the council

approved a motion adding an emergency item to the agenda.

Dennis Herschbruner, an engineer with the city's engineering firm, said the Senior Citizen's Center is without male and female restroom facilities for handicapped persons.

THE CITY has been in receipt of a grant but that money has to be earmarked by Sept. 30 or it will be lost. As a result, the council opened bids on construction of remodeled restroom facilities. Bids were received from Christiansen Construction of Pender and Otte Construction Company of Wayne. Low bid was by Otte Construction (\$4,800) and the council awarded the contract to them. The other bid was for \$5,580.

The grant will provide 75 percent of the cost, while the city share will be 25 percent.

An ordinance involving advertisements for bids also was approved. Previously, the council was not required to seek bids on equipment, projects, etc. if the estimated amount was \$5,000 or less. That figure was raised to \$7,500.

ERNA KAREL, representing the Wayne Recreation Board, provided the annual report. After expenses and deposits were compiled, a balance of \$8,944 was left. The council also approved, upon recom-

mendation of the Chief of Police and the City Administrator appointment of a new police officer.

James Willer is the new officer. From LeMars, Iowa, Willer is a former member of the military police while serving with the Marine Corp.

City Clerk Bruce Mordhorst read a letter from former residents Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Watson who live in Omaha now. They sent a check for \$24 for use of Henry Victor Park while passing through here recently.

All council members were present except Darrel Heier and all actions were unanimous unless noted otherwise.

Industrial Book Promotes Wayne Area With Facts

Wayne has received a supply of industrial fact books compiled by local citizens and the Nebraska Public Power District (NPPD).

Gary Van Meter, Chamber of Commerce executive vice president, said the books will be presented to businesses and industries seriously interested in the Wayne area.

NPPD has compiled detailed and up-to-date information on economic, business, industrial, civic, human and physical assets and resources for Wayne and the state of Nebraska, Van Meter said. Working with NPPD's area development

specialist Mort Hough were the Wayne Chamber, Wayne Industries, Inc., along with individual assistance from both city and county department heads Van Meter, who also manages Wayne Industries, coordinated the plan locally.

The book, which took five months to complete, contains information vital to industrial prospects. Van Meter said. It outlines recreation facilities, housing, communications and travel facilities, churches, schools, hospitals, municipal operation and facilities, utilities, labor, employment, trade areas and many other factors.

Vietnam 'Boat People' Expected To Arrive in Wakefield Sunday

Two families of refugee "boat people" from Vietnam are expected to arrive in Wakefield Sunday.

Resettlement into Wakefield will be sponsored by the Milton G. Waldbaum Co. under the auspices of the Lutheran Family and Social Service of Nebraska (LFSS). "Recently, a call went out for communities and individuals to help provide assistance in resettling displaced persons from Vietnam into Northeast Nebraska," said Dean Hughtson, representative of the Waldbaum Co. In explaining how his company became involved.

THE WALDBAUM Company contacted Keith Schmode of LFSS, regional consultant for Lutheran Immigration Resettlement Service, and agreed to become a sponsor.

In addition, members of the Salem Lutheran Church and other area residents have agreed to be involved in the resettlement process.

According to both Hughtson and Schmode, a company and community making a joint commitment to such an endeavor is rather unique.

"No government money is expended for this effort," Hughtson explained. "Social service and government agencies arrange transportation and 'loan' air fare to refugees. However, these costs must be repaid."

The two families settling in Wakefield contain 19 individuals.

THE CHUNG SI family consists of parents, a son and his fiancée, three other sons — ages 19, 11, and 5; and three daughters — ages 23, 17, and 5.

The Lem Sen family consists of parents; five sons — ages 26, 17, 11, 9, and 1; and two daughters — ages 16 and 5.

Only sketchy biographical material is available, according to Hughtson. Both families were from small towns and currently are on an island off Indonesia.

THE CHUNG SI family have been plastic workers; the Lem Sen family have worked in a hardware store, fruit market and as fishermen.

The families will reside in large mobile homes located at Big Red Farms. "Due to limited housing available for large families in the city of Wakefield, two large trailers were purchased for the families to rent from the company," Hughtson said.

"Individuals in the families desiring employment with the company will have the same opportunities as other community residents have for securing employment," Hughtson continued.

"It should be noted that the families will be self-sufficient soon," he said. Plans to assist the refugees include

training them in English, social customs, driving automobiles, etc.

Dr. and Mrs. Tien Huu Nguyen of Laurel and Hughtson met Thursday evening with a group of Salem Lutheran Church members to coordinate welcoming efforts.

HUGHTSON, DR. TIEN, and the Rev. Robert V. Johnson emphasized that while housing, employment, clothing and food must be provided, love and compassion are the most important elements in the resettlement process.

Hughtson noted that besides the "obvious advantages to the company and community of new faces, new employees and new taxpayers, these families will give Northeast Nebraskans an opportunity for a wider view of the world."

Persons interested in helping the Chung SI and Lem Sen families should contact Salem Lutheran Church.

ACCORDING to Hughtson, the possibility of Waldbaum sponsorship of two additional families within the next year remains tentative.

Siren Tests This Friday

The city of Wayne will conduct the monthly testing of Civil Defense sirens at 1 p.m. Friday. Sirens will be allowed to run only one minute with a three minute pause between each siren test. Sirens will be tested in the following sequence:

Alert (used for tornado or other natural disaster warning) — both high and low sirens on for one minute.
 Pause — three minutes.
 Attack — both high and low on for 10 seconds, off for 10 seconds, continuing for one minute.

Normal time sequence for each of the sirens would be a full three minutes. Since this is for testing purposes only, we will shut them off after one minute each so that the public can quickly determine the difference between test and an actual warning. If this were a test, the public should immediately take shelter upon hearing either the alert or the attack signals given.

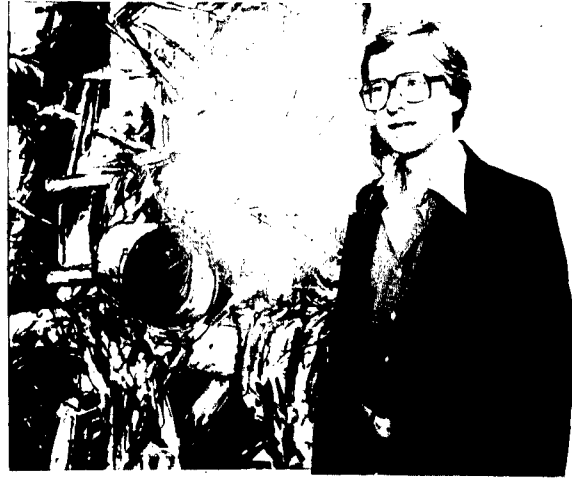

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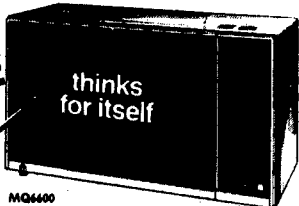
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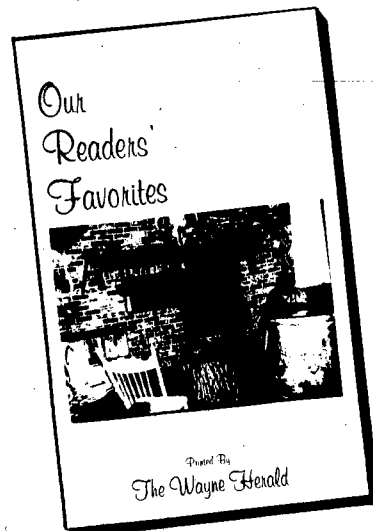

Barry Breaks Record But Wildcats Lose Home Opener

Wayne State College tailback Bob Barry set a WSC career rushing record Saturday early in the second quarter but that was hardly enough to stop Midland Lutheran College from handily defeating the Wildcats 24-9 before a Parent's Day crowd that jammed Memorial Stadium.

Barry rushed for 75 yards in the game, 70 yards in the first half, giving him 3,049 yards in his career. That mark exceeds Sam Singleton's 3,003 yards set in 1970.

The Wildcats, now 1-1-1 on the season, had difficulty maintaining sustained drives against a stubborn Midland defense and sputtered defensively as well, allowing the Warriors 340 yards total offense, 257 of that on the ground.

Midland struck early in the game, scoring in only three plays on a 36-yard touchdown run by junior fullback Larry

Diller. The PAT by Henry Schollmeyer was good, giving Midland a quick 7-0 lead.

The Cats responded quickly, however, bouncing back on their first drive of the game and scoring on a 43-yard pass from junior quarterback Rick Lade to sophomore Pat Maxwell. The PAT by Bart Emanuel was good and the game appeared to be living up to its billing as a wide open offensive battle with 10:51 left in the first quarter.

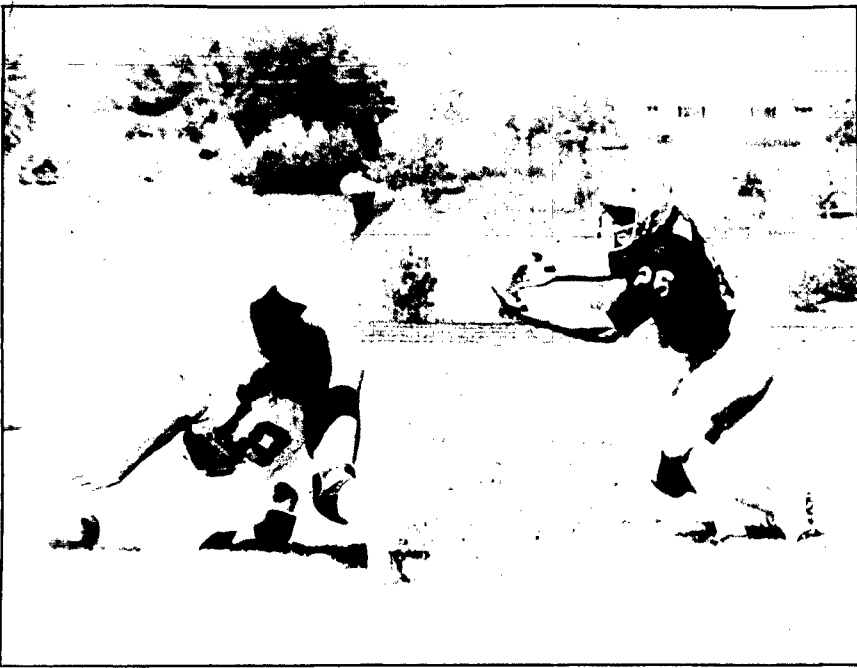
Midland scored again in the second quarter on a 33-yard pass from Doug Lanik to Grandee West. The PAT made it 14-7. West, who entered the game District 11's (NAIA) leading receiver had three other receptions on the day for a total 83 yards.

Leading 14-7 at the half, the Warriors scored on their second possession of the third quarter as Dave Nettles raced 24 yards for a TD. Schollmeyer connected on

the PAT and later on a 45-yard field goal with :49 remaining in the third quarter for the final Midland scores.

The Wildcats were unable to mount a touchdown scoring drive in the second half, but earned a safety after a 41-yard Maxwell punt pined the Warriors deep in their own territory. WSC middleguard Steve Hawkins, stopped Midland's Kent Beckman in the end zone for the two-point play, the second safety for the WSC defense this year and the final score of the game.

Wildcat head football coach Del Stollenberg said he was displeased with his team's performance. "We played poorly and I really don't know why," he said. "We thought that with Parent's Day and the first home game our kids would be ready. Maybe it was just too much of a change, too much hoopla. Our kids obviously didn't take Midland seriously enough."

Western Invades Wildcat Country, Saturday

Hoping to rebound from last Saturday's 24-9 loss to Midland Lutheran College, the Wayne State College football team hosts Missouri Western State College Saturday in both team's conference opener with a 1:30 p.m. kickoff scheduled in Memorial Stadium.

An added attraction at this week's game will be the half-time performance of about 1,200 high school musicians from over 16 area marching bands participating in this year's Band Day celebration. The festivities will also include a parade through Wayne at 10:30 a.m.

The Griffons of Missouri Western own an undefeated record after three outings hav-

ing defeated Dana College 44-0, Concordia College 33-14 and Evangel College 37-20.

"Missouri Western is what I would call a big play team," Wildcat head football coach Del Stollenberg said. "They like to go for the home run ball whether it be on the ground or in the air and of course they've got some good skill people."

Two of those talented skill people have already given up posing defenders' fits in 1979. Quarterback Mike Solomon is the Central States Intercollegiate Conference's leading passer after three games having completed 25 of 47 passes for 479 yards and six touchdowns. The biggest surprise for the Griffons

has been the running of sophomore Rodney Stephenson, the fourth leading rusher in the NAIA after three weeks. The skilled halfback has run for 381 yards in 43 carries this season after gaining only nine yards in two games in 1978.

The Griffons also have an impressive defensive unit ranking thirteenth in total team defense in the NAIA and eighth in rushing defense. The Griffons have allowed only 36 yards rushing per game.

Wildcat quarterback Rick Lade could provide Wayne State fans with a second record setting performance in two weeks. Last week senior tailback Bob Barry established a

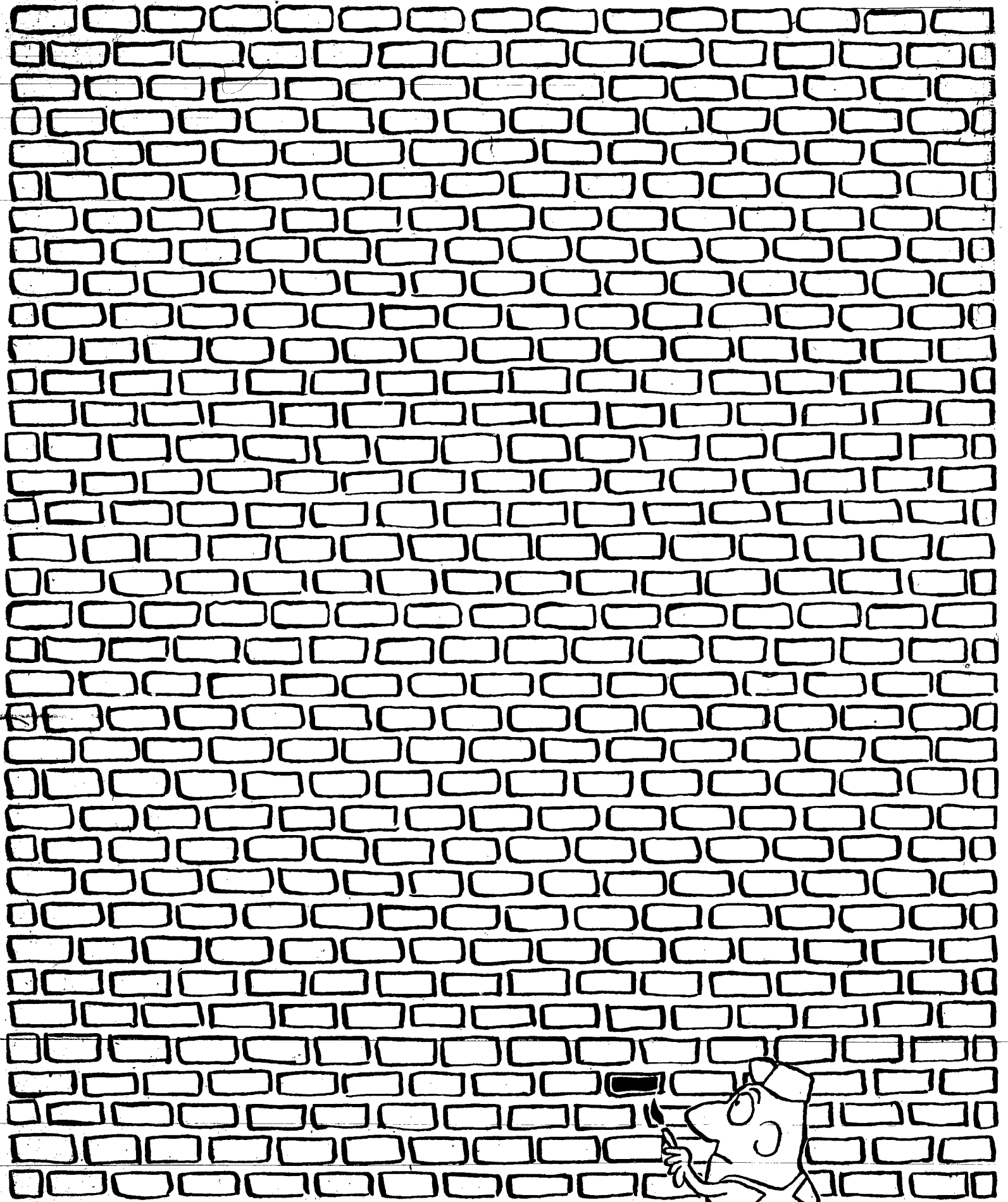

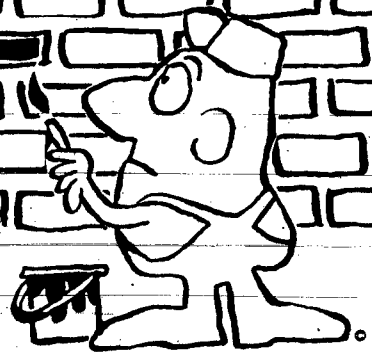

Laurel Homecoming Activities Begin

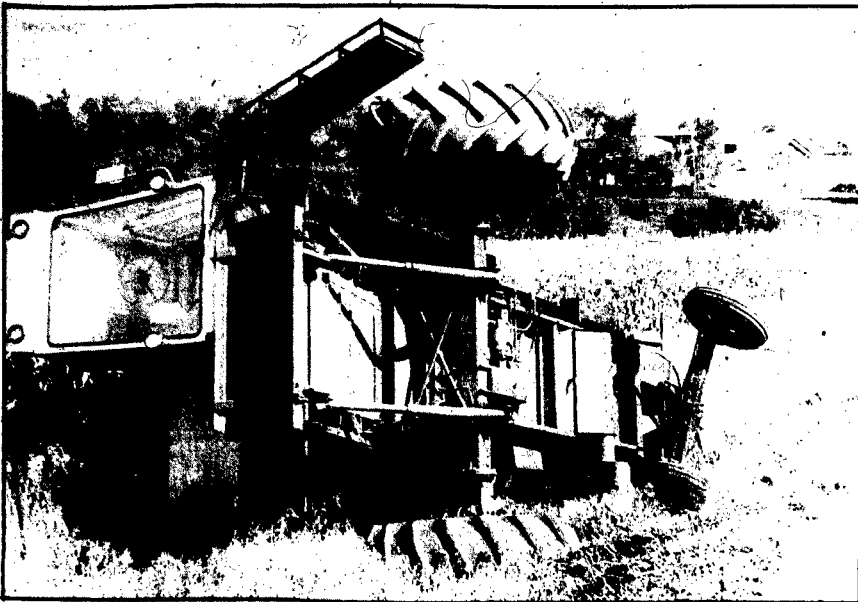
Homecoming activities at Laurel Concord High School will come to a peak today and tomorrow with a full schedule of festivities.

Medicare Can Pay Expenses

Medicare can help pay the expenses of a hospital stay for people who have this protection. Dale Branch, social security district manager in Norfolk said recently.

When Medicare hospital insurance can cover a hospital stay, it will pay for all covered expenses for up to 90 days in each benefit period except for the hospital insurance deductible, currently \$160. For the next 30 days, hospital insurance pays for all covered services except for \$40 a day.

Covered services include semi-private room and meals, routine nursing service, special care units, drugs furnished by the hospital, operating and recovery rooms, rehabilitation services, x-ray and other radiology services, and lab tests.

Hospital insurance does not

cover personal convenience items, private duty nurses, and extra charge for a private room unless medically necessary, and the first 3 pints of blood received in a benefit period.

In addition, Medicare medical insurance can help pay doctor bills and some other covered expenses during a hospital stay. Branch said. Medical insurance can cover doctor's visits and services of a surgeon. Medical insurance generally pays 80 percent of the reasonable charge for covered services after the \$60 annual deductible is met.

More information about how Medicare helps with the cost of health care can be found in the leaflet, "How Medicare helps during a hospital stay," or in "Your Medicare Handbook." Copies of either publication can be obtained at the Norfolk social security office.

Revenue Topic Norfolk Event

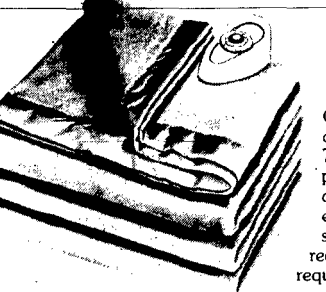
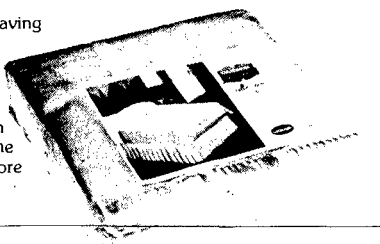
State Sen. Erloy Hefner announced this week that the Legislature's Revenue Committee will be holding a public hearing on Monday, Oct. 1, starting at 10 a.m. at the Villa Inn in Norfolk on Legislative Resolution 42.
This resolution directs the Revenue Committee to study the effects of spending limitations which have been placed on local governments and alternative methods of providing property tax relief. Hefner said he believes that more sales and income tax money will have to be used to relieve property taxes. The Revenue Committee, of which Hefner is a member, is studying a preliminary draft of a bill that would accomplish this.
All interested persons are invited to express their views at this hearing.

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Farm Grain Might Fit Storage Space

Large scale disappearance — sale and movement — of grain this past spring and summer, coupled with substantial increases in storage capacity (both commercial and on-farm), could mean that bumper feed grain and soybean crops in Nebraska this fall might — just might — fit storage space available around Oct. 1.

But this equation — even if estimated figures are within tolerable limits of accuracy — is theoretical because amounts of grain in some Nebraska locales and feasible storage located elsewhere do not or will not, match up.

This "iffy" situation report emerged from a meeting of the Nebraska Grain Storage, Marketing and Utilization Committee, which grappled as usual in its analysis with a number of intangibles — such as frost dates and harvest conditions — which promise to cloud the issue until last bushels are safely under cover — or piled on the ground.

However, the committee, chaired by Dr. Don Hamway, Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources extension agronomist, seemed to agree on two major facts:

"Everything points to bumper crops," following release of anticipated yield figures by the Nebraska Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. In fact, some observers feel predictions compiled by chief statistician Jack Aschwege and staff may be "conservative." (Over the 10-year period, 1968-77, official USDA crop production estimates as of Sept. 1 logged the following record: corn — estimate too low eight years; too high two years; Sorghum — too high six years; too low, four years; Soybeans — too high, six years; too low, four years; Wheat — too high, nine years; too low, one year.)

The transportation snarl — with the nagging shortage of grain cars now a year-round phenomenon — is a major factor in the possible buildup of a monumental glut of grain in the marketing pipeline. And the strike against the Rock Island Railroad on top of the strike-bound grain outlets in the Duluth, Minn., area adds to shippers' woes just as harvest is set to begin in the western Corn Belt.

The committee was told that if disappearance of grain in storage this year between June 1 and Oct. 1 approaches the 300 million-plus mark, this could mean storage space and the new fall supply would balance out on the books.

"Bin sellers have been busy lately," according to reports from the State ASCS office. It is estimated that 50-million bushel capacity storage has been added on Nebraska farms this year. However, in a report submitted to the committee, Harold Rademacher of the State ASCS office noted that not all storage is

usable. From 10 to 20 percent capacity is involved in "turn-around," not available for a time when grain is moved out and new grain moved in. And some bins cannot be filled completely because different types of grain must be kept segregated.

The way grain comes into storage — fast, slow, or erratic — will have an effect on the ability of transportation's ability to handle the flow. And the timing of the first killing frost and conditions during harvest will be big factors, the committee agreed.

It was noted that harvest conditions have been ideal the past three or four years, and that producers may be coming lulled into a complacency. Harvest conditions in 1978 were nearly perfect, and are not likely to be duplicated.

A report compiled by the Nebraska Public Service Commission, and presented by Eric

Rasmussen, was not overly optimistic, at one point predicting that "we will see a record amount of grain on the ground this year."

The report cited continuing shortages of grain cars, both boxcars and hoppers. Car turn-around at ports has been slow, and in the case of at least one railroad, Burlington Northern, cutbacks in fuel allocation have forced some curtailment in service.

On one recent day, the report said, Chicago & North Western had 44 boxcars and 46 hoppers on order in Nebraska and furnished no boxes and four hoppers.

Embargoes of grain usually routed to the Twin Cities and Duluth, Minnesota have diverted more grain to the Gulf ports and Pacific Northwest.

Adding to the woes of grain movement in Nebraska, it was reported, is the moving of South Dakota grain by truck into Nebraska shipping points, such as

Fremont. This was triggered by another major railroad casualty, the founding Milwaukee Road. Truck traffic between South Dakota and Nebraska is up, the committee was told, because of the inability of the Milwaukee to move grain into Minnesota terminals.

Northeast and north-central Nebraska may experience more serious grain storage problems because of better crop yields the past 2-3 years, and pressure of grain coming in from South Dakota. Producers may be penalized as much as 30 cents a bushel in communities where transportation is not available.

This may be offset somewhat in northeastern Nebraska because many farmers still harvest grain as ear corn, allowing more flexibility in storage.

Robert Anderson, executive secretary of the Nebraska Grain & Feed Dealers Association, warned that the industry can no longer look to the federal government for help. "We (the trade) must deal directly with the railroads," he said. The settlement toward railroad deregulation is resulting in no orders from the Interstate Commerce Commission to railroads to release cars for grain-hauling, he explained. He also said he "sees no relief" for elevators off mainline tracks.

Trends over the past few months have been toward grain cars moving directly to consumers and users (millers and processors), without going through terminals.

Another development is the growth in the number of private, or non-railroad owned cars to haul grain. Even country elevators are acquiring their own cars, but a problem looming in the future is lack of power (locomotives) to pull them, the committee was told.

While railroads' investment in coal trains is at the expense of grain hauling equipment, it was suggested that the profitability of hauling coal might indirectly, or ultimately, improve grain hauling capability because of the railroads' overall enhanced financial position.

The high stakes of being able to move its grain is emphasized by the state's growing proportion of total U.S. grain production. The committee was told that Nebraska now accounts for

10 percent of the yearly U.S. corn production. While corn crop yields and total production continue to rise, the state's share keeps pace at the 10 percent level.

It was pointed out that an increase in acreage devoted to grain production, such as Sandhills land put under center pivot irrigation, and Nebraska's expanding irrigation development is not comparable in other states, except for the western part of Kansas.

Possible pitfalls facing farmers, even those with storage on their farms, were underlined. Because two-thirds of total storage is now on farms, the committee warned "the burden of carrying grain (maintaining quality) is now on the farmer's back."

Dr. Tom Thompson, IANR agronomist specializing in crop drying technology, warned that an early frost or cool, wet fall could result in large volumes of high moisture grain. Whereas last year's optimum harvesting conditions allowed grain to dry in the field, adverse conditions this fall could force the use of high temperature drying. Pressure on fuel supplies and lack of storage to turn over grain during the drying process could cause problems. Thompson said. Also looming as a possible problem is an adequate supply of diesel to carry out an orderly harvest.

Extension entomologist, Dr. David Keith, said corn borer problems could be severe in southwestern Nebraska, noting that the "answers are not in" (in regard to overall corn borer infestations). Corn borer damage could contribute to ear drop. And stress could set the stage for stalk rot. "It's too early yet to tell," he said.

Dr. John Watkins, extension plant pathologist, said there is more rust on Nebraska corn than in past years. Because it did not occur until late in the season, it is not much of a problem, he added.

"Firing" of some stalks is not rust but typical scorch, he said. Sorghum does not show much disease around the state, he said. Bean leaf beetle infestation of soybeans was more widespread than usual.

Soybeans Up From Year Ago

Nebraska producers and handlers had 6.6 million bushels of soybeans on hand Sept. 1, 1 percent more than a year ago but 21 percent below the record level set in 1969. The Sept. 1 five-year (1974-78) average is 6.04 million bushels. Growers had 2.98 million bushels on hand, 4 percent more than a year ago. Mills and elevators had 3.65 million bushels, or 1 percent less than the Sept. 1, 1978, stocks.

The Sept. 1 carryover of old crop soybeans into the 1979-80 marketing year totaled 173 million bushels, up 8 percent from last year and 68 percent above 1977. Soybeans stored on farms in the dairy division are up 3 percent from last year and 86 percent above 1977. On farm storage accounted for 35 percent of the soybeans stored in all positions. Off farm stocks at 113 million bushels were 10 percent above last year and 60 percent above two years ago.

Poisonous Gases From Ensilage

As the ensilage season begins, farmers are reminded of the potential dangers of gases produced by ensilage fermentation.

Rollin D. Schnieder, extension safety specialist in the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources, warned this week that certain gases from ensilage fermentation can be toxic to humans.

Schnieder explained that one of these gases, methane, is dangerous because of its explosiveness. The biggest problem with methane occurs within the first two weeks after ensilage is placed in the silo. Methane production declines considerably after a few months.

He further explained that carbon dioxide, completely odorless and also frequently toxic, can suffocate persons or animals if the silo is not adequately ventilated. The carbon dioxide masks oxygen in the air so the lungs cannot receive enough oxygen.

If farmers note a yellowish brown vapor at the surface of the silage they should suspect the presence of nitrogen dioxide. Schnieder said the compound can mix with the moisture in the lungs and cause lung interior irritation. Symptoms of pneumonia frequently occur after exposure to the vapor.

The nitrogen dioxide gas can appear at any time while the ensilage is in the silo. Schnieder said a yellowish brown liquid

running from the silo is an indication of the presence of nitrogen dioxide.

The most harmful effects of nitrogen dioxide may not be immediate, but may occur within two to three weeks after exposure, Schnieder said. Symptoms of the pneumonia, which can be fatal, include coughing, or burning and choking pain in the throat or chest.

Another gas which may be present, according to Schnieder, is nitrogen tetroxide. Although usually found in small concentrations, the gas can cause nausea.

"This is the gas that escaped into one of the space capsules during its return to earth and made one of the astronauts sick," he said.

A safeguard against the effects of these gases is aeration of the silo. Schnieder said. Leaving the top open or running a blower for 30 minutes before a person enters the silo will reduce the danger. Most of these vapors are heavier than air and accumulate at the surface of the ensilage, he said, so it is important that all safety precautions are taken.

Schnieder noted that there has been an increase in the amount of anhydrous ammonia used for ensilage storage this year. He recommended using proper protective equipment when handling the chemical to ensure safety.

Grain Comment Period Extended

The comment period on U.S. Department of Agriculture proposals for the 1980 corn, sorghum and soybean programs has been extended to Oct. 1, according to John Goodwin, acting administrator of the department's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS).

Goodwin said the period was extended from Sept. 18 because of changes in the 1979 feed grain supply use situation and continuing transportation difficulties. Current legislation requires the department to announce the 1980 feed grain program no later than Nov. 15, but department officials hope to make their decision before then.

Chemical Application Can Help Control Fall Weeds

A number of factors "tip the scales" in favor of applying chemicals in the fall to control several types of weed pests, including fall weeds, musk thistle and weeds in alfalfa.

That's the word from Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources extension weed specialist John D. Furrer and Alex Martin, who urge farmers and homeowners to take action in September or October before a hard freeze.

The same application rates of recommended herbicides can be used in the fall as in the spring to effectively treat field bind weed, dandelions, chickweed, shepherds-purse and other species that make fall growth, according to Furrer and Martin. Knocking-out weeds allows turf grasses to fill in "vacated" areas in the lawn, applications of chemicals do not endanger ornamentals and trees as much in the fall, and fall treatment can make weakened weeds more susceptible to winterkill, the agronomists explained.

A good fall control program on musk thistle can eliminate the need for spring control, the University of Nebraska-Lincoln specialists stated. This is because the plants that would flower next summer are already growing this fall. Success of a fall musk thistle spray program depends on growing conditions and the herbicide use, the specialist advised.

As a rule of thumb, musk thistle plants that are green and actively growing are readily controlled, while plants suffering from dry conditions are not controlled as easily. Musk thistles should be sprayed after Oct. 1 to control rosettes and seedlings that have germinated this fall.

Fall is the best time to carry

Canada thistle can be treated in the fall after harvest of crops like soybeans and silage corn using one quart 2.4-D plus one pint banvel.

Roundup may be used as a spot treatment for Canada thistle in barley, corn, oats, sorghum and wheat. It is a "spot" treatment only. Roundup will kill the crop in the treated area also. Take care to avoid drift outside target area.

Treatment must be made prior to heading of small grains and sorghum, initial pod set on soybeans, and silking of corn. Do not apply when the crop has set seed.

For control of perennials, the weeds should be treated in the optimum stage of growth.

Roundup should be applied at the rate of one gallon per 100 gallons of spray solution. According to the label only hand held gun equipment can be used.

A copy of the label must be in the possession of the user at the time of roundup application for spot treatment.

Control

In pastures or waste areas, use one quart 2.4-D plus one pint banvel in fall rosette stage or early bud in spring. If Canada thistle is treated in corn fields use 1/2 pint 2.4-D amine plus 1/4 pint banvel per acre. Avoid tillage five weeks before and one week after application. Plan to treat for several consecutive years.

Cost Share Funds Available For Conservation Practices

Landowners who have been considering installing soil or water conservation practices on their land, should contact local SCS offices soon. Cost sharing funds are now available from three sources:

1. Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) funds are administered by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in each county. ACP funds may be used to pay up to 90 percent of the cost of approved conservation practices. These include such things as terraces, dams, conservation tillage, wind-break establishment, permanent cover and others. Funds are limited to \$3500 per cooperator.

2. Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District cost share program compliments the ACP program by funding some of the same practices. The NRD makes funds available for terrace systems and dams at the same rate as ACP in each county. In addition the NRD will cooperate on projects which require more than the \$3500 limit of ACP.

3. Nebraska Water Conservation Program administered by the Nebraska Natural Resources Commission, cost shares 75-90 percent on terrace systems and dams. These funds can be used in combination with the other two programs.

In fiscal 1979 these three programs made approximately \$730,000 available to landowners in the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District to install conservation practices on their land. All three programs are funded again for fiscal 1980, however the demand for cost sharing continues to outweigh available funds. For this reason, requests should be made soon.

Your local Soil Conservation Service office is available to help plan and design conservation practices. They can also assist landowners in applying for cost-sharing from any of the three programs.

Landowners may receive cost share funds for dams and terrace systems from any one of three programs available in the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District



TREES USED WISELY CAN BE VALUABLE CROP

Nebraskans can observe good land management practices by growing both field crops and forest crops.

This is the message from Dr. Mike Ferrill, state forester. Ferrill, head of the Institute of Agriculture's department of forestry, fisheries and wildlife, stresses that although 215,000 acres of potentially commercial forestland have been lost in Nebraska the past 22 years, tree cutting does not have to stop. "Trees are a renewable resource," he points out, "and should be utilized just like corn and wheat." However, the concern is the loss of forested acreage to some other land use alternatives, he adds. "The total removal of trees from the land is absolute. The end result is no trees," Ferrill says.

Ferrill says that he is not necessarily saying that forestland should not be converted to alternate uses — "land should be producing the best crop possible." However, he says, "Good land management techniques should be followed. Many acres of cleared forestland result in marginal cropland.

The more than 200,000 acres of trees lost were on forestland and do not include shelterbelts and windbreaks, Ferrill says. Many older shelterbelts in Nebraska were not properly

designed and are in need of rejuvenation. "If shelterbelts are removed, they should be replaced to meet current land use patterns and needs," he recommends. "Again, I am stressing replacement, but not necessarily in the same location as the original stands nor of the same width."

There is no doubt that enough seedlings should be planted to ensure the perpetuation of the one mature tree removed, Ferrill says. These seedlings may need 50 to 100 or more years to replace the original tree. The life span of many Nebraska tree species is variable, Ferrill says. This life span ranges from as low as 20 years to as high as 250 years for some species.

Ferrill says that it boils down to advocacy of cutting trees, but according to a definite plan to prevent net losses in acreage of trees and removal of all big trees.

Nebraska Now Has Its Own Map Office.

Have you ever wanted a particular map or chart, but didn't know where to find it? A newly established Nebraska Map Information Center may solve your problem.

Dr. Rex Peterson of the University of Nebraska Conservation and Survey Division will manage the new office, which was created by the University of Nebraska Institute of Agriculture, University Board of Regents and the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS).

Initially, the new Map Information Center, to be located in Lincoln, will concentrate on supplying information on maps, charts, aerial photographs and satellite imagery relating to Nebraska.

When fully operational, the Map Information Center will provide the public with access to map information held by federal, state and private agencies.

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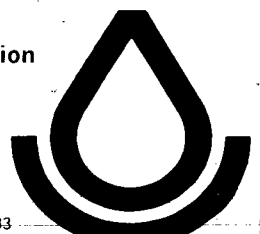

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Pork Producers Face Losing Market

What should pork producers do these days when production costs exceed market prices? Wait out the low prices? Or sell out now and plan to start up again when conditions improve?

"While most producers are probably not considering such drastic action as selling out, they are no doubt exploring methods of dealing with the anticipated low market prices in the next few months," said Dr. Larry Blitney, extension farm management specialist in the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources.

Although swine production has traditionally been the most profitable livestock enterprise on Nebraska farms — Blitney calls it the "mortgage lifter" — low profits and losses do occur periodically and we're in one of those periods now, he said.

"In the past we spoke of a 'hog cycle' with about one year out of four being a down year. It's not easy now to explain a situation like we currently have, but producers have been steadily increasing production the last several years. In fact, economists have been predicting an oversupply situation for the past two years, and it's finally arrived," Blitney said.

Current prices for No. 2, 200-

220 lbs. market hogs at Omaha are a little under \$40 per hundredweight, Blitney said, while total production costs for an established producer are about \$41 per hundredweight. For a less-established producer with few facilities, production costs will probably be greater, he added.

"Individual producers will feel the financial pinch in varying degrees, depending on their production system, efficiency and financial reserves. The financially leveraged producer with new facilities and a specialized enterprise will be pinched hard," Blitney said, while a producer with other facilities, financial reserves and diversified farming operation has some built-in shock absorbers.

Generally, a producer should continue production in the short run as long as his total revenue exceeds his variable costs, Blitney advised. Variable costs are those which wouldn't occur if production were discontinued. For the hog producer, these include feed, utilities, veterinary services, medicine, marketing expense, feed processing, miscellaneous operating costs and interest on operating costs. Labor may also be a variable cost for some producers, he noted.

As an example, Blitney said a Nebraska farrow-to-finish producer may have variable costs per hundredweight of hogs sold as follows: Feed, \$23; non-feed variable costs, \$5.50, and labor, \$3. So his variable costs would be \$28.50 or \$31.50 per hundredweight depending on whether labor is a variable or fixed cost. These costs are less than current market prices, so a producer should probably continue production, rather than incur the costs involved in selling out and then starting up the operation later, he said.

He added that predictions are that market prices will be lower as slaughter increases later this fall, so producers should keep on top of market prices and update their production decisions.

But he warned that the principle of discontinuing production when total revenue is less than variable costs needs to be applied carefully, and all costs need to be considered. "The feeder pig finisher who has no contract for a steady supply of feeder pigs is most likely to follow this principle. If he can't see a positive return over variable costs, he doesn't pay the asking price for feeder pigs," the economist said.

The producer with a breeding herd is less likely to discontinue production in the short run, even when returns are less than variable costs, Blitney pointed out. "If he intends to get back into the hog business at a later time, the start-up costs could be substantial. Working back into a multiple farrowing schedule and possibly a crossbreeding program with several sow herds at a time when prices are higher could be costly." Rehiring and training good personnel represent additional costs, he added.

Such producers may want to cut back from 100 percent of capacity, however, and may want to sell their market hogs at lighter weights, depending on the relationship between feed prices and market hog prices, Blitney said.

He noted that "periods of low market prices painfully separate the inefficient from the efficient producers." Farm enterprise records have shown ranges of pigs weaned per sow per year of less than 10 to more than 16 among producers in a given county, Blitney said, and a range in pounds of feed per pound of hog sold of 3.40 to 4.80 for farrow to finish operators. Differences in total production costs of 100 percent have also been observed, he said.

"Even an inefficient producer will make money when market prices are high, though the efficient producer makes more. When prices are down, an efficient operation can make the difference between continuing in business and having to sell out."

So producers are well advised to work on building their efficiency during this slow period, he said, and suggested the following:

Evaluate the ratios fed to hogs and determine the "least cost" feed formulation for your operation. An AGNET program called FEEDMIX (reference: Swine), available through county extension offices, can help with this.

Tighten management of your breeding herd so you aren't carrying unproductive animals. Adjust feeders to minimize loss.

Plan for greater building use efficiency.

Explore marketing strategies which may increase the market price received.

Be on the lookout for cost saving techniques — any additional savings are crucial at this time.

If producers do decide to cut back on production, Blitney concluded, it's a good time to remodel facilities, rodent proof buildings and work on reducing disease problems.

Lucky Lads and Lassies
