After Ordinance Approved

Flood Insurance Here Nears Reality

Flood insurance subsidized by the federal government will be available to certain Wayne residents, businesses and manufacturers in the near future.

The city council approved a flood insurance ordinance at its regular meeting Tuesday which provides that certain building requirements be met within what is called the flood plain.

RICHARD J. Leonard, representing the Federal Flood Insurance Administration, briefed the council on the program. Passage of the ordinance is the first step in implementing the Flood Insurance Program here.

According to Leonard, the city has certain responsibilities once the flood plain has been established. A map drawn up by the city's engineers outlines the flood plain which roughly follows Dog Creek north of Wayne to the east, and then Logan Creek east of the Municipal Airport west to about

ways to help make this year's drive a success at the first breakfast.

Twenty-five years ago, during the first United Way Campaign in Wayne, residents were asked to donate \$4,580. This year, Dickey said the board of directors has adopted a budget of \$15,230 to help support nine agencies. He went on to say that this year's goal is a hike of \$1,130 over last year's amount.

THE INCREASED costs are due mainly to the rising costs of operating the nine different agencies supported by United Way and administering the United Way program.

Chairman Ditman pointed out that the majority of this year's money will be returned to the city in the form of its recreation program and the like.

A total of 48 percent of the planned \$15,230 budget will go to the Wayne Recreation Program, Mid America Council of Boy Scouts and the Prairie Hills Council of Girl Scouts.

DITMAN POINTED out that these three agencies alone touch the lives of nearly every family in the city.

A complete breakdown of the agencies which the United Fund helps support is as follows:

Wayne Recreation Program, \$4,000; Mid America Council of Boy Scouts, \$3,500; Prairie Hills Council of Girl Scouts, \$2,920; Salvation Army, \$1,400; Wayne Senior Citizens, \$800; Arthritis Foundation, \$800; Cystic Fibrosis, \$300; Florence Grifflinton Home, \$250; and American Red Cross, \$200.

Only about seven percent of the total goal, or \$1,000, is budgeted for a contingency fund and administration of the campaign.

Board members are optimistic the goal will be reached by Oct. 24, the date set for an all school dance to involve students at Wayne-Carroll High School in the campaign. The dance will follow the Hartington-Cedar-Catholic and Wayne football game.

All receipts from the dance will be donated to the Community Chest fund. Helping coordinate the dance are Wayne-Carroll seniors Jeff Zeiss and Penny James.

How much is a fair share for a Wayne Citizen to give the Community Chest? Ditman said residents this year are being asked to donate a half day's pay.

"Residents might ask how many dollars is it worth to give a youngster a year's experience in one or more activities in the Recreation Program, or in Scouting, or in the Red Cross-sponsored swimming and lifesaving classes," he added.

Grant Ellingson is assisting Ditman with this year's drive, and Marilyn Carhart is doing the leg work as secretary of the organization.

Board members involved in the drive include Pat Gross, Merle Rise, Randy Pederson and Ed Carroll, who will cover the business district; Fred Webber and Doug Livemore, Wayne State College; LaVon Beckman, Wayne public schools; and St. Mary's, Doug Sturm, government offices, and Wilma Moore, Anna Mae Wessel and Vernele Ellingson, residential.

Blood Bank Visit Oct. 4

Siouxland Blood Bank will accept donations at Providence Medical Center from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 4. The last six donors are scheduled at 2:30 p.m.

Donors must be in good general health, must be between 17 and 66 years of age, must have eaten an adequate meal before donating blood, must never have had hepatitis, influenza or cancer, and must undergo a mini physical exam prior to donation.

The Blood Bank collected 58 pints of blood in its July visit and hopes to surpass that goal in October. A spokesman said because of the amount of heart surgery, blood is needed badly.

Pair Jailed After Hoskins Bank Hit

Two teen-agers, Kevin D. Wehrer, Norfolk, and Douglas L. Schulz, Pierce, have been charged on two felonious counts after the Commercial State Bank in Hoskins was robbed of about \$4,300 Thursday afternoon.

The armed robbery took place shortly after 1 p.m. The pair was apprehended and arrested a few hours later at the Schulz residence near Pierce.

BOTH ARE charged with theft by unlawful taking and with use of a firearm to commit a felony. They are being held in Wayne County Jail after County Judge James Duggan set bail at \$150,000 each Friday.

Judge Duggan also set preliminary hearing for 2 p.m. Thursday. The suspects appeared in County Court Friday afternoon at a hearing to set bond and appoint lawyers.

Prosecuting attorney will be Budd Bornholt (also Wayne County Attorney), while defense attorney for Schulz will be David Domina of Norfolk and John Addison of Wayne for Wehrer.

the building at the time so the suspects asked to see the bank's vice president for a loan.

After visiting with vice president Jim Miller, the two were informed they would not be given a loan. One of the men drew a .22 caliber revolver and said they would like to make a withdrawal anyway.

Miller directed the suspects behind the counter and gave them all the money available, \$4,300. They ordered employees of the bank onto the floor and later into the bank's vault.

WITNESSES say the men walked out the front door, up the street and to their blue and white pickup which was parked near an alley about a block away.

Bank employees let themselves out of the vault and notified authorities.

The suspects reportedly were seen by Hoskins residents earlier that day and had been in a next-door bar the day before. Ironically, employees of the bank had been briefed the day before on proper procedures in case of a robbery. Law enforcement officials said the two were construction workers and were familiar with the Hoskins community. Tips from witnesses led authorities to the quick arrest.

Board Votes Facility

A \$208,000 contract for construction of a new Wayne State College (WSC) maintenance building was approved Friday by the Nebraska State College Board of Trustees at a meeting in Peru. The 80 X 120 foot building, to be located on East 14th Street across from Providence Medical Center, will house WSC transportation services and maintenance equipment. Construction will be completed by the low bidder, J.H. Hesse Company, Norfolk, and is expected to begin this fall. Plans call for the metal structure to be aesthetically compatible with the surrounding area.

The board also gave preliminary approval to a computer services contract through Burroughs Corporation for new computer equipment at WSC. The new equipment is expected to increase WSC's academic and administrative computing capabilities by about 300 percent at no additional cost. The target date for complete installation of the WSC computer equipment is late winter or early spring, with the conversion process beginning immediately. Final board approval of the contract is pending legal review.

In other business, the board reaffirmed an earlier commitment to provide land for a new building for the Educational Service Unit (ESU) No. 1. The board reaffirmed its original position indicating a willingness to make land from WSC available to ESU pending further discussion and review by the board of trustees and ESU. In other action the board: Approved a request allowing WSC to accept \$416,752 in HEW funds for student Basic Education Opportunity Grants for 1979-80. Voted to allow WSC to accept a \$100,000 grant from the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU). The grant will be used for a general education academic evaluation program. WSC was selected recently by AASCU as one of 10 U.S. colleges and universities to participate in the program, which is expected to yield general education models for other colleges and universities to follow in the 1980s. The next board meeting will be Oct. 26 at Wayne State.

OSHA: What Price Non-Success

by U.S. Chamber of Commerce

Since its inception in 1971, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) has cost American taxpayers almost \$1 billion, and American business and industry have spent an additional \$25 billion to comply with its regulations.

Has the money been well spent? Congress gave the agency an immense and incredibly difficult task — to regulate safety and health conditions in millions of U.S. workplaces, none exactly alike, ranging from huge steel mills and refineries to computerized offices and small machine shops. Virtually all employers are affected.

In essence, Congress asked OSHA to dispense wisdom — to create a workplace utopia where no one was supposed to slip and fall, get hurt or get sick.

OSHA ran into early criticism — over rules requiring U-shaped toilet seats and no ice in drinking water, for example. Then came a long string of regulatory

boomers. An entire booklet was devoted to instructing farmers on such perils as barn manure.

It got so bad that when Eula Bingham became administrator she made headlines by claiming the elimination of nearly 1,000 "nonsensical" and "nit-picking" regulations.

Now comes a new study and statistical analysis of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States which shows — as suspected all along — that while OSHA tinkered, it lost sight of its main purpose of reducing serious job accidents and sickness. Instead, sharp increases have occurred.

Although the total injury and illness rates show declines since 1972, when the Bureau of Labor Statistics first gathered the data, the rate for serious injury and illness — those that cause loss of days of work — rose 15 percent from 1972 to 1977.

Days lost due to sickness and accidents rose 29.1 percent. Fatalities rose by over a 1,000 or 24.1

percent, from 1974 to 1977.

Although OSHA stopped counting worker fatalities of small employers (11 or fewer) in 1977, these deaths can be reliably estimated. For large companies, worker fatalities rose by 20.8 percent in 1977, far overshadowing earlier declines.

OSHA now is plunging into an uncharted area of federal regulation — an attempt to identify, catalogue and regulate the use of thousands of carcinogens — substances alleged to cause cancer — in the work environment. OSHA's regulatory plan, according to a reliable estimate, could require industry to spend upwards of \$88 billion.

Is OSHA capable of taking on this staggering assignment? And will the money be well spent?

Social planners have been pushing for a guaranteed income welfare plan for years. They are still at it.

After the defeat of such a plan in the Nixon period known as the Family

Assistance Plan (FAP), they embarked on a study in Seattle and Denver to learn if people on welfare would work less or more under a guaranteed income. Much to their surprise, people worked less.

This is opposite from the way it was expected to work. Under the guaranteed income plan, the government guarantee provides basic needs but a family may earn more by working. As earnings rise, welfare benefits are reduced on a sliding scale while at the same time assuring a guaranteed income. When given a choice, the study showed, husbands reduced their work effort by 11.4 percent and wives by 25 percent rather than opt for additional income. Young men getting married chose to work 55 percent less.

The Chamber of Commerce of the United States adamantly opposes a current White House welfare bill which would give the federal government the power, in effect, to set a guaranteed minimum income for welfare families. The House of Representatives is expected to act on the proposal

before the year is out.

Currently, the states determine the amount of benefits. But under the White House bill, there would be a federal mandate that all welfare families receive a minimum amount.

Such a plan would amount to an income redistribution scheme. Moreover, Congress would be pressured year after year to raise the benefit levels. By its estimates, the Administration plan would cost taxpayers \$5.7 billion more a year.

The Chamber has helped draft a counterproposal which would dismantle rather than expand federal control. The states, says the Chamber, offer the best opportunity to devise programs based on need.

Based on a survey of top state welfare officials, the Chamber has concluded that "state and local governments have been able to reduce caseloads, costs and error rates in the programs over which they have control while increasing benefit levels."

A sample of survey findings: In 1976, the state of Arizona started a program of accountability to staff productivity which has enabled the administration to hold the line on increases in staff.

Arkansas is using federal aid dollars to furnish community services rather than institutional care to welfare patients. California has pioneered in the use of computers to detect cheaters.

Florida raised aid for dependent children benefits by 100 percent from 1972 to 1978.

The Welfare Improvement Act (H.R. 4466), which the Chamber supports, would replace the federal matching of state funds with a system of block grants, or lump sums, which states could use at their discretion.

Congress has an easy choice. It can buy an old socialist hand-me-down, like guaranteed income, or it can give the 50 states the wherewithal to bring welfare aid to those in need without today's attendant "mess."

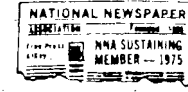

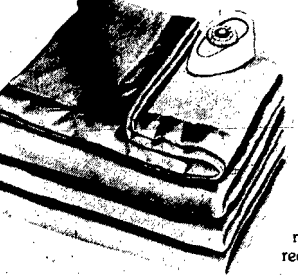
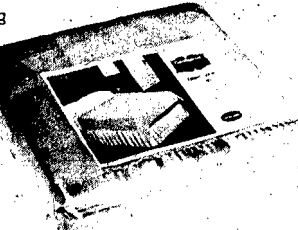

Interceptions Are Vital As Devils Get First Win

Electrically filled the air (and thankfully the lights) Friday night as the Wayne Blue Devils powered themselves to their first football victory of the season, defeating Wisner-Pilger 14-14. The game was played in Memorial Stadium on the Wayne State campus, where an earlier Wayne game was postponed due to light failure.

Wayne head coach, Stew Cline, played with the win and his squad's performance stated, "It's great to get that first win under our belt. This win was the result of a super effort by our kids. We kept telling them that if they kept putting out a good effort it would pay off, and tonight it did."

After leading 19-7 at intermission, Wayne needed a good effort to stop a determined Wisner team in the second half. Wisner moved the ball well in that half and late in the third quarter the Gators were in scoring position inside Wayne's five yard line. The Blue Devil

defense firmed up however, and halted the threat, holding Wisner for no gain on fourth and one.

Coach Cline stated, "The first half of the game was definitely ours, but the second half belonged to Wisner, so I'm glad we scored when we did."

Wayne's Rick Johnson scored the game's first points, going over from six yards out. Hugh Jager kicked the PAT and Wayne led 7-0 with nine seconds left in the first period. The score capped a 12-play, 69-yard drive.

Jeff Zeiss was a main factor in that drive, catching two passes for 39 yards. Zeiss ended the night with four interceptions for 50 yards.

Wisner took advantage of a Wayne miscue in the second quarter and tied the game on Kerry Meyer's seven yard touchdown scamper. The Gators recovered a Wayne fumble on the Blue Devils' 40-yard line to set up the scoring drive.

Four minutes later, Wayne regained the lead on Johnson's

second touchdown run of the game, this one from 11 yards out. The PAT attempt failed, and the Devils led 13-7. Johnson carried the ball 28 times for 87 yards during the game to lead Wayne rushers.

Again it was a pass play that kept Wayne's drive going. On third and five from their own 49, quarterback Jeff Dion teamed up with end Scott Wessel for a 32-yard pass play, moving the ball inside Wisner's 20.

Blue Devil Steve Sorensen ended first half scoring intercepting a Wisner pass and returning it 47 yards for a touchdown. That was a big score for Wayne, giving them the winning points.

Wisner narrowed the margin to five points with 10:08 remaining in the game on a six yard scoring pass from Springer to Koch. The PAT was perfect, and the score read Wayne 19, Wisner 14.

Wayne earned its victory in the last quarter, stopping two Wisner drives inside Devil ter

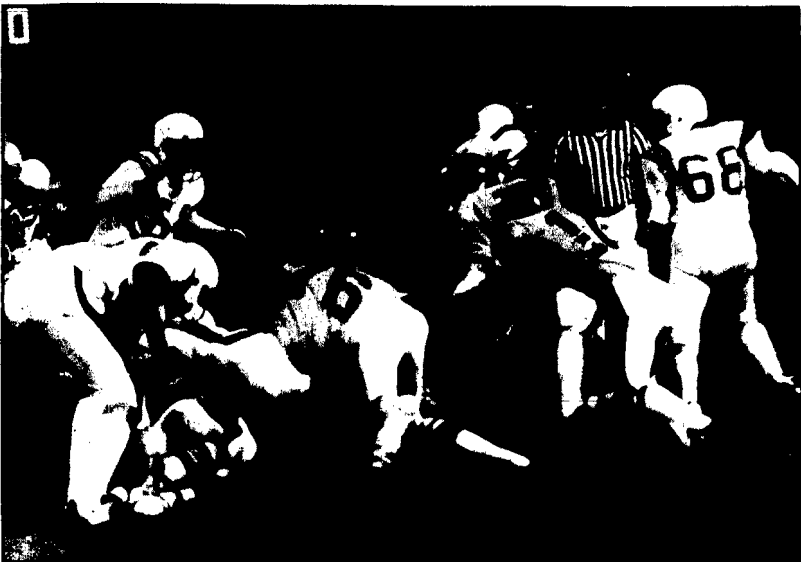
ritory. Paul Sutherland came up with a big interception to halt one drive, and Wayne's defense held again on a fourth and 10 attempt from the 45 yard line.

State Seeks to Reduce Local Traffic Mishaps

Because approximately 40 per cent of Nebraska's traffic accidents and fatalities occur within city and county jurisdictions, the Department of Roads has added a Local Systems Traffic Engineer to its staff to help local subdivisions reduce the toll.

His services are available statewide and are an expansion of the traffic safety services already available to the cities and counties through the Department.

Robert L. (Bob) Meyer of Lincoln has been appointed to the position. He will work out of the department's Traffic Engineering Division. Local officials are encouraged to contact him for help with their traffic problems by calling 402-473-4594, or by writing to the Traffic Engineering Division, Nebraska Department of Roads, Box 94759, Lincoln, Ne. 68509.

The Local Systems Traffic Engineer will work primarily with cities and counties that do not have the resources to develop and implement traffic management techniques on their own, but his services are available to all political subdivisions.

He will help them identify potentially hazardous locations within their jurisdictions and recommend corrective measures. His responsibilities include inventorying of existing traffic control and signal devices, traffic flow and volume studies, construction and work zone study studies; and the study and evaluation of pavement markings.

Other aspects of his work include on-the-job training of city and county personnel in traffic management and study, analysis and evaluation of parking, pedestrian and traffic conflicts. Special emphasis will be put on the development of safer school crossings and improved lighting as well as recommending solutions to special traffic safety problems within the communities.

In addition, the Local Systems Traffic Engineer will assist the cities and counties in applying for state and/or federal funds to correct traffic safety problems.
