Several Hearings Planned On Road, Street Projects

EACH governmental body has been financially pinched to varying degrees by the state-imposed seven percent lid bill. However, officials in each community have said they will be able to at least maintain existing byways.

Proposals of each are as follows:

City of Wayne

Public Works Director Vern Schulz says Wayne has three projects slated for this year, but other proposals are strictly approximations of time and cost. Public hearing will be held at 8 p.m. Tuesday at the City Hall.

THE FIRST-priority for next year is an asphalt overlay of 10½ blocks in the southeast part of Wayne. Estimated project

cost is \$24,000.

The second priority is paving and curb and gutter in Marywood Subdivision at an approximate cost of \$76,000. Marywood is the newest subdivision here and will be located east of Tara Ridge.

The other major project scheduled during 1980 is the city's share of reconstructing Nebraska 15 north. The city will be required to pay the cost of replacing a bridge inside the city limits at a cost of \$14,606.23.

The state will pick up the remainder of the cost involved in renovating the highway north to the Concord turnoff.

New Trial Motion Denied

Ross Gets Five Years

After denying a defense motion for a new trial, District Judge Merritt C. Warren Wednesday afternoon sentenced Michael Ross. 24, to five years in the state penitentiary for the shooting death of Karen Sunderman.

ROSS, NOW OF Sergeant Bluff, Iowa, will ROSS, NOW OF Sergeant Bluff, lowa, will begin serving his sentence in about 30 days unless his attorney, S. J. (Sy) Albracht, Omaha, files an appeal. The former Wayne Police Department officer was found guilty of manslaughter Dec. 12 after a Wayne County jury deliberated more than eight bours.

hours.

Ross shot and killed Sunderman, then 18, Aug. 9 in his apartment at the Elm Motel here. The prosecution contended throughout the trial that the shooting was intentional and filed first degree murder charges after the incident. The defense maintained the mishan was an accident

mishap was an accident.

DEFENSE attorney Albracht fitted the motion for a new trial Dec. 20 based on seven reasons. He cited two of these in arguing for the new trial prior to Ross' sentencing Wednesday.

He relterated to Judge Warren that the court had erred in providing the proper instructions to the jury concerning the definition of "reckless." The term was used by Judge Warren at the conclusion of the trial to describe various verdicts to the jury. In denying Albracht's motion, Judge Warren said "we are bound by the new criminal code, not prior criminal case law." Albracht.

WITH ROSS standing before him, hands WITH ROSS standing before him, hands clasped in front, Judge Warren reviewed a thorough pre-sentence investigation made by Merlin Wright, district probation officer. According to the report, Ross had been employed briefly by Prince Hydraulic in S. Sloux City after the trial's conclusion. He had been unemployed since.

The report also brought to light Ross' involvement with a variety of drugs while in the service. Under questioning by Warren, Ross said he had not taken any drugs the day of the shooting of the day before. He added he did not feel he had any problem with alcohol, either.

JUDGE WARREN also grilled Ross on

JUDGE WARREN also grilled Ross on several points of festimony. Why, asked the judge, had (he) Ross made virtually the same statement to two taw enforcement officials, but on the witness stand had given a different story. "I was confused at the time." Ross replied. The judge also questioned Ross about the gun case, its size and how it was closed. Ross admitted to Judge Warren that it would be evident, in removing the gun from the case, whether or not it was cocked. However, Ross said he did not remember if, it was or not.

"ARE YOU ASKING me to believe that If

the judge asked. "Yes," Ross replied.
Ross said he occassionally took the gun
case with him target shooting, but this time
decided not to. "Sometimes" it's easier to

IN FINAL defense of Ross, Albracht said that he (Ross) was "blatantly honest" in what he was saying. "He can't lie, he won't lie, He admitted his drug incidents," Albracht said.
"Sure he should have checked (to see if the gun was loaded or cocked). That is what makes this an accident, Had he given it proper consideration? He doesn't know. That's what makes this an accident," Albracht argued.

THE DEFENSE attorney also reminded Judge Warren of Ross' clean record except for three traffic violations. A "most ex-haustive investigation" showed few blemishes, he said. "He has suffered menblemishes, he said. "He has suffered mental and physical anguish (over the indent)—probably more than any defendant ive every had," Albracht said. "This man has paid a terrible price for what he did," "Albracht added in requesting probation for Ross."

Prosecuting afformey Budd Bornhoft said the state was opposed to probation and that

Even with the July 1 tax increase, Nebraska's gasoline tax revenues have slipped slightly. For the January-October period in 1978, the tax raised \$72.2 million, compared with \$71.8 million for the corresponding period this year.

Peterson said a smaller fuel allocation for the state had an effect on travel but he believes the much steeper price of gasoline was a more important contributing factor.

America need not go that route, but the risk is real if we continue abusing our economy as we have. Actually, abuse is probably too mild a description for policies that have led to: A quadrupling of the

Ing idleness, consumption and medicority, and that combines with inhialidate provide windfall revenues to the governments by automatically pushing more and more Americans into steeper tax brackets. ... and, of course, a double-digit rate of inflation that is destroying the value of our currency and lowering our standard of living. Ironically, these policies are always promoted under the guise of "helping" people-of-modest means and of extending their "rights." But look what's happened to our rights in terms of individual freedom. In 1980, the average American will have to work the equivalent of nearify five months just to pay his taxes. The average person's share of the national debt and other obligations already run up by the federal government. has now-reached \$46,000.

There is one hopeful sign emerging from this mess: The growing consensus that fogbound thinking in Washington, D.C., is, in fact, the principal source of our economic problems. Unfortunately, many politicians know what they are doing is wrong, but they cannot help themselves. They suffer from Potomac Fever, from an addiction to the power that comes from being able to solicit votes by spending other peoples money.

That is why the great economic challenge of the 1980's — our ability to restore real economic growth and make headway against the growing problems of inflation, recession, taxafion, regulation and energy "Why didn't you care?"

OUT OF OLD Nebraska

The New Year in Omaha, 1869

Omaha on New Year's Day, 1869, had a population of little more than 8,000 people. Yet social lite among the city elite was well developed. Young Omaha resident Joseph Barker included in an 1869 letter to family members in England a description of the formal calling customarity done on New Year's Day by well-to-do Omahans. The following-are excerpts from "Omaha in 1868-1869: Selections From the Letters of Joseph Barker," edited by Charles W. Martin and published by the Nebraska State Historical Society in its quarterly magazine "Nebraska History" (Winter, 1978): "On new-year's day I went out calling with Frank Murphy, Al Patrick, Dr. (Victor H.). Caufman, Mr. Saunders and Dr. (C.H.) Pinney. It had snowed some inches the night previous so we had a nice sleigh and drove round and called on nearly all our friends and acqueintances. We started about half past flew when we quit. About a third of the houses were closed or receiving with other ladles; at such, they had a basket fled to the bell in which to leave your cards. It was a mild day and towards evening it snowed, which made it damp and unpleasant. "All the town was out calling, and there were a many very handsome and some very expensive tables. One lady's table, Mrs. Jack Morrow's, cover over \$500. He had made a fortune on the Craill Road and has just bought Ruben Wood's house for \$16,000 and furnished if at an expense of \$6,000 and, is determined to make a sensation. We all went to see it. The lady and two lady friends were spelendily dressed. A darkey in black clothes and white choker at the door-to take our costs and another at the table. The table was a long one covered, with handsome silver, glass and china with large and splendid feed cakes, pyramids of truit and confectionery, ice cream, boned turkey, chicken salads, ham, Buffalo tongues, Jellies and everything.
"On a pjendid walnut side board with a righ fack carved with hanging fruit and game with a carved deer's head in center, were changed in the content of the content o

"On a splendid/walnut side board with a high back carved with hanging fruit and game with a carved deer's head in center, was champaign, eggnog, claret, sherry, brandy and whiskey and clagars. Hot cottee and hot oysters were brought in on silver plated salvers. She is a fine tooking woman and did the honours very well. As gurs was a nearly temperance party, we did not touch much, only a drop of champaign at the sibe board and not much at the table. "Mrs. (J.P.) Peck received for the first time wifth three other laddes all handsomely dressed in her beautiful new house. She had

a very handsome dining room with a fine carved walnut side board cost 4 or \$500. Her table was like many others, turkey salads, oysters, coffee and-cakes, and fruits dried and fresh but nothing stronger than beautiful sweet cider.

"We next called on Gov. (Alvin) Saunders. His is a splendid house on the top of Farnam Street. The hall opens into a large conservatory with a lot of fine plants and some few flowers. From that Into.a. large parlour then with folding doors into another large drawing room, all the rooms have fine plate glass French windows, mirrors from the top of the room to the floor, heavy gilt cornices, fine carpets, pictures and furfrom the top of the room to the floor, heavy gilt cornices, fine carpets, pictures and furniture. The Gov. and. Mrs. Saunders received us, showed us through the house. They had a fine fable and this also was a temperance house as are most in town. There was no servant seen here, they waited on us themselves. "We then called at several nice houses, people you never saw, who all received in the usual stereotyped way and table of cake, fruits—meats—nysters, turkeys, etc. with

people you never saw, who all received in the usual stereotyped way and table of cake, fruits, meats, oysters, turkeys, etc., with, here and there egg nogg or apple toddy, coffee and cloer.

"The Hurfords and others had all handsome receptions, but we had to hurry from one to the other. We were dressed in our best evening dress and had to take off our overcoats and put them on until we were fired. I, we, hardly did more than just bite at any house, at lots of houses took nothing. The sight of so much seemed to sallsty us."

After the day-long round of calls, Joseph and the rest of his party "went to the Snyders and had a good supper of hot oysters. They had a number there and we spent a pleasant hour or two, when we all went to a party to Mrs. (Roger T.) Beats, Ella Hugos. We stayed and had music and all title dancing." He confesses, "I left about twelve quite thred." having spent a busy but pleasant day greeting the new year of 1869.






