Several Hearings Planned On Road, Street Projects

City Councils of area communities, and the Wayne County Commissioners, will be holding public hearings this month and next on proposed one- and six-year road and street programs.

EACH governmental body has been financially pinched to varying degrees by the state-imposed seven percent lid bill. However, officials in each community have said they will be able to at least maintain existing byways.

Proposals of each are as follows:

City of Wayne

Public Works Director Vern Schulz says Wayne has three projects slated for this year, but other proposals are strictly approximations of time and cost. Public hearing will be held at 8 p.m. Tuesday at the City Hall.

THE FIRST priority for next year is an asphalt overlay of 10 1/2 blocks in the southeast part of Wayne. Estimated project cost is \$24,000.

The second priority is paving and curb and gutter in Marywood Subdivision at an approximate cost of \$74,000. Marywood is the newest subdivision here and will be located east of Tara Ridge.

The other major project scheduled during 1980 is the city's share of reconstructing Nebraska 15 north. The city will be required to pay the cost of replacing a bridge inside the city limits at a cost of \$14,606.23.

The state will pick up the remainder of the cost involved in renovating the highway north to the Concord turnoff.

PROJECTS tentatively planned for 1981 include the following:

Enlarge the storm sewer from the transfer station north to E. Third Street and from Nebraska Street to Logan Street. Cost estimate: \$35,000.

Paving and curb and gutter for 540 feet of Fairgrounds Avenue from S. Nebraska Street to S. Windom Street. Cost estimate: \$28,000.

PROJECTS tentatively planned for 1982 include the following:

Paving and curb and gutter for 750 feet of S. Windom Street from Fairgrounds Avenue to the transfer station. Cost estimate: \$39,000.

Paving and curb and gutter for 620 feet of W. Third Street from Oak Drive to the County Fairgrounds. Cost estimate: \$32,500.

Paving and curb and gutter for 350 feet of Walnut Street from 12th Street to 14th Street. Cost estimate: \$29,000.

Paving and curb and gutter for 150 feet of E. 13th Street from Walnut Street to Schriener Drive. Cost estimate: \$7,500.

PROJECTS tentatively planned for 1983 include the following:

Widening of Logan Street from Fourth to Seventh Streets. Cost estimate: \$55,000.

Widening of Pearl Street from Fifth to Seventh Streets. Cost estimate: \$35,000.

Intersection improvements on Pearl Street. Cost estimate: \$7,500.

PROJECTS tentatively scheduled for 1984 include the following:

Storm sewer work along U.S. 35 east. This will involve closing some 1,800 feet of open ditch from the National Guard Armory east to the Nebraska Department of Roads yard. Project cost: \$175,000.

PROJECTS tentatively scheduled for 1985 include the following:

Reconstruction of Seventh Street. Cost estimate: \$300,000.

Wayne County

The County Commissioners have a long list of projects on tap for the next half a decade. Some of these involve funding from federal and other sources.

Public hearing on these proposals will be held at 2 p.m. Tuesday at the Courthouse.

PROJECTS tentatively planned for 1979-80 include the following:

Rebuild a bridge six miles north and three miles west of Wayne. County funds: \$22,500; federal funds: \$67,500; total cost: \$90,000.

Remove a bridge and install two culverts one mile west and 4 1/2 miles north of Carroll. County funds: \$3,300; federal funds: \$7,700; total cost: \$11,000.

Replace bridge two miles west and one mile north of Sholes. County funds: \$7,800; federal funds: \$4,200; total cost: \$12,000.

Rebuild bridge on north edge of Hoskins. County funds: \$12,500; Hoskins funds: \$12,500; federal funds: \$75,000.

Grade one mile of a north-south road some 2 1/2 miles east of Hoskins. Cost estimate: \$8,000.

Grade one mile of an east-west road some two miles south and seven miles east of Winside. Cost estimate: \$8,000.

Remove a bridge and replace with earthen fill six miles west and a half-mile south of Carroll. County cost: \$5,000; Natural Resources District cost: \$5,000.

Grade two miles of an east-west road six miles north and two miles west of Wayne. Cost estimate: \$14,000.

Grade three miles of an east-west road four miles south of Wayne. Cost estimate: \$25,000.

PROJECTS tentatively scheduled for 1980-81 include the following:

Grading, culverts, gravel surface of one mile of an east-west road 2 1/2 miles north of Hoskins. Cost estimate: \$7,000.

Grading and gravel surfacing of one mile of a north-south road four miles south and two miles east of Wakefield. Cost estimate: \$7,000.

Grading of two miles of an east-west road six miles south of Wakefield. Cost estimate: \$14,000.

Grading of three miles of an east-west road some two miles west of Carroll. Cost estimate: \$21,000.

Rebuild a bridge three miles north and 3 1/2 miles east of Carroll. Cost estimate: \$15,000.

Rebuild a bridge five miles west and 2 1/2 miles south of Carroll. Cost estimate: \$15,000.

Rebuild a bridge six miles north and 2 1/2 miles west of Wayne. Structure may not be needed pending drainage study. Cost estimate: \$10,000.

Remove and replace a bridge, grade approaches and gravel surfacing two miles north and 2 1/2 miles east of Wayne. County cost: \$16,000; state cost: \$32,300; federal cost: \$285,400; Dixon County cost: \$16,150; total cost: \$323,000.

PROJECTS tentatively planned for 1981-82 include the following:

Grading four miles of an east-west road, nine miles south of Wayne. Cost estimate: \$28,000.

Rebuild bridge 2 1/2 miles west and three miles north of Hoskins. Cost estimate: \$20,000.

Grade three miles of an east-west road and one mile south some nine miles south of Wayne. Cost estimate: \$28,000.

Grade two miles of a north-south road located six miles north and four miles west of Wayne. Cost estimate: \$14,000.

Grade two miles of an east-west road near Carroll. Cost estimate: \$14,000.

Rebuild a bridge three miles north and 2 1/2 miles east of Carroll. Cost estimate: \$12,000.

Rebuild a bridge three miles north and one mile west of Wayne. Cost estimate: \$40,000.

Rebuild a bridge three miles north and 1 1/2 miles east of Carroll. Cost estimate: \$12,000.

Allen Names Kumm Acting Superintendent

Allen Consolidated Schools Athletic Director Glenn Kumm has been appointed acting superintendent after Supt. Robert Heckathorn suffered a severe heart attack Friday, Dec. 28, at his home.

Kumm was chosen at a special Allen board of education meeting Monday afternoon, Dec. 31, at the school.

THE DECISION was particularly of interest since high school principal Dale Kennedy received word recently there may be just cause not to renew his contract for the

Superintendent Heckathorn is recovering at St. Joseph's Hospital in Sioux City. The attack was considered quite serious and Heckathorn was in intensive care.

He was at home when he became ill and was taken to an area hospital before being transferred to Sioux City.

Heckathorn has one year remaining on a three-year contract.

coming year. That action was taken at a special Allen board meeting Dec. 15.

A hearing requested by Kennedy before the board has been postponed indefinitely at the request of both attorneys involved. It had been set for Wednesday.

KENNEDY apparently was unaware of Superintendent Heckathorn's heart attack and the board's action to appoint Kumm as a temporary replacement. According to board members Monday afternoon, the principal was in Chadron and had not left a phone number where he could be reached.

The board's attorney, Bob Ott of Norfolk, was contacted by phone during the board meeting and recommended the board appoint an acting superintendent. He said there are no state statutes setting guidelines for such an appointment and the board could appoint whomever it desired.

"IT'S GOING TO be a bad situation for anyone who comes in under the circumstances," one board member said. The appointment "in no way" will become a permanent spot, Kumm said.

In addition to Kumm's appointment, the board contacted Lionel Froseth, Ponca superintendent, concerning his availability for guidance.

The board also gave Kumm the responsibility of restructuring class loads to make up for classes he has been teaching. These are general math, federal programs, remedial reading, bookkeeping and commercial math.

HECKATHORN'S wife, Barbara, also is an instructor at Allen and her position will be filled temporarily. Heckathorn himself was teaching a 12th-grade English class.

New Trial Motion Denied

Ross Gets Five Years

After denying a defense motion for a new trial, District Judge Merritt C. Warren Wednesday afternoon sentenced Michael Ross, 24, to five years in the state penitentiary for the shooting death of Karen Sunderman.

ROSS, NOW OF Sergeant Bluff, Iowa, will begin serving his sentence in about 30 days unless his attorney, S. J. (Sy) Albracht, Omaha, files an appeal. The former Wayne Police Department officer was found guilty of manslaughter Dec. 12 after a Wayne County jury deliberated more than eight hours.

Ross shot and killed Sunderman, then 18, Aug. 9 in his apartment at the Elm Motel here. The prosecution contended throughout the trial that the shooting was intentional and filed first degree murder charges after the incident. The defense maintained the mishap was an accident.

DEFENSE attorney Albracht filed the motion for a new trial Dec. 20 based on seven reasons. He cited two of these in arguing for the new trial prior to Ross' sentencing Wednesday.

He reiterated to Judge Warren that the court had erred in providing the proper instructions to the jury concerning the definition of "reckless." The term was used by Judge Warren at the conclusion of the trial to describe various verdicts to the jury.

In denying Albracht's motion, Judge Warren said "we are bound by the new criminal code, not prior criminal case law." Albracht

had argued that the court's instructions "veered from state statutes."

WITH ROSS standing before him, hands clasped in front, Judge Warren reviewed a thorough pre-sentence investigation made by Merlin Wright, district probation officer.

According to the report, Ross had been employed briefly by Prince Hydraulic in S. Sioux City after the trial's conclusion. He had been unemployed since.

The report also brought to light Ross' involvement with a variety of drugs while in the service. Under questioning by Warren, Ross said he had not taken any drugs the day of the shooting of the day before. He added he did not feel he had any problem with alcohol, either.

JUDGE WARREN also grilled Ross on several points of testimony.

Why, asked the judge, had (he) Ross made virtually the same statement to two law enforcement officials, but on the witness stand had given a different story? "I was confused at the time," Ross replied.

The judge also questioned Ross about the gun case, its size and how it was closed. Ross admitted to Judge Warren that it would be evident, in removing the gun from the case, whether or not it was cocked. However, Ross said he did not remember if it was or not.

"ARE YOU ASKING me to believe that if it took a three-pound pressure to pull the trigger that the gun went off accidentally?"

the judge asked. "Yes," Ross replied.

Ross said he occasionally took the gun case with him target shooting, but this time decided not to. "Sometimes it's easier to take the gun itself," Ross said. He also admitted he was not joking around with the gun at the time he took the gun from the case but was "dead serious."

IN FINAL defense of Ross, Albracht said that he (Ross) was "blatantly honest" in what he was saying. "He can't lie, he won't lie. He admitted his drug incidents," Albracht said.

"Sure he should have checked (to see if the gun was loaded or cocked). That is what makes this an accident. Had he given it proper consideration? He doesn't know. That's what makes this an accident," Albracht argued.

THE DEFENSE attorney also reminded Judge Warren of Ross' clean record except for three traffic violations. A "most exhaustive investigation" showed few blemishes, he said. "He has suffered mental and physical anguish (over the incident)—probably more than any defendant I've ever had," Albracht said.

"This man has paid a terrible price for what he did," Albracht added in requesting probation for Ross.

Prosecuting attorney Budd Bornhoff said the state was opposed to probation and that

Fire Department To Play KCAU

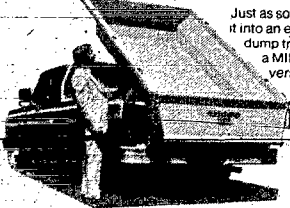

Trojans Use Late Spur To Gain Win Over Wausa

The 65-51 Wakefield victory over Wausa Friday night may not have been a work of art but the Trojans jelled throughout the contest and showed that they can play well when the pressure is on.

Both teams entered the game with 2-1 records losing only to Hartington. The game was close until the fourth quarter when the Trojans came alive before their home crowd and outscored Wausa 23-10.

Led by Doug Netz and Kevin Thieroff with 17 and 16 points respectively, the Vikings didn't let Wakefield pull away in the first three periods. The Trojans led 28-25 at the half and 42-41 after three quarters.

The Trojans controlled the tempo of the game by applying a press on defense. After falling behind 35-32 early in the third quarter, Wakefield canned two quick baskets to regain the lead which they never relinquished. Rick Guy scored a layup for a 36-35 advantage.

Scott Hallstrom, Wakefield's leading scorer, suffered an unusually cold hitting streak early in the game but found the

range with three consecutive field goals late in the third quarter. Two last second free throws pulled Wausa within one point at 42-41 with one quarter remaining.

Hallstrom fouled out only 35 seconds into the fourth period but the rest of the team took over to put the game away. Jeff Hallstrom and Tom Preston, who finished with 14 and 11 points respectively, combined with the Trojans bench to break open the close game.

The Wakefield press paid off during the last six minutes as Wausa tried to make up the deficit. The Trojans stole the ball 17 times in the game, with most coming during this period. Brent Kahl sparked the hosts, playing fine defense and scoring two of his four field goals within 15 seconds for a 52-43 Trojan lead.

"The bench did a heck of a job for us. We had some players in foul trouble but the bench did its job," said Wakefield coach Ernie Kovar. "The game got kind of ragged in the third quarter but our bench took control. Wausa likes to get the ball down court in a hurry so we pressed to slow them up. The press started to take its toll as the game progressed."

One of the key defensive standouts was Barry Jones who scored seven points and led the team with 10 rebounds, six steals and six assists. Preston added five assists. Rick Guy scored eight points. Wakefield shot 45 percent from the floor compared to 37 percent for Wausa.

Perennial power Wymore Southern won the tournament with 157½ points followed by West Point with 106½, Logan

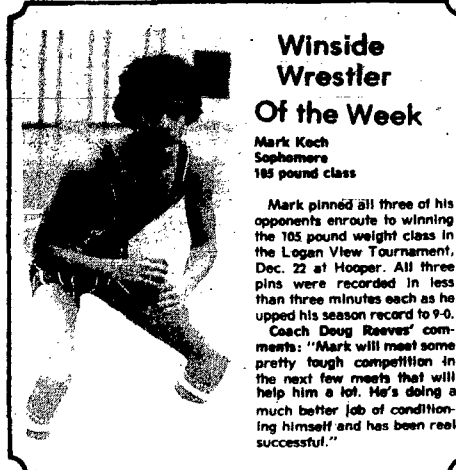
View with 92½ and Winside with 88½.

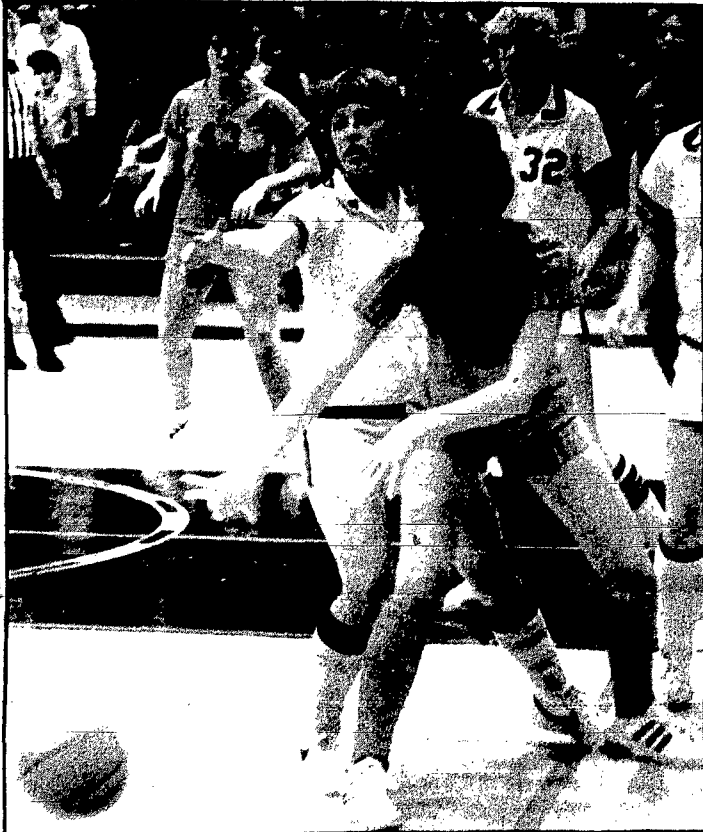
Five Ponca players scored in double figures. Brad Koeppel was

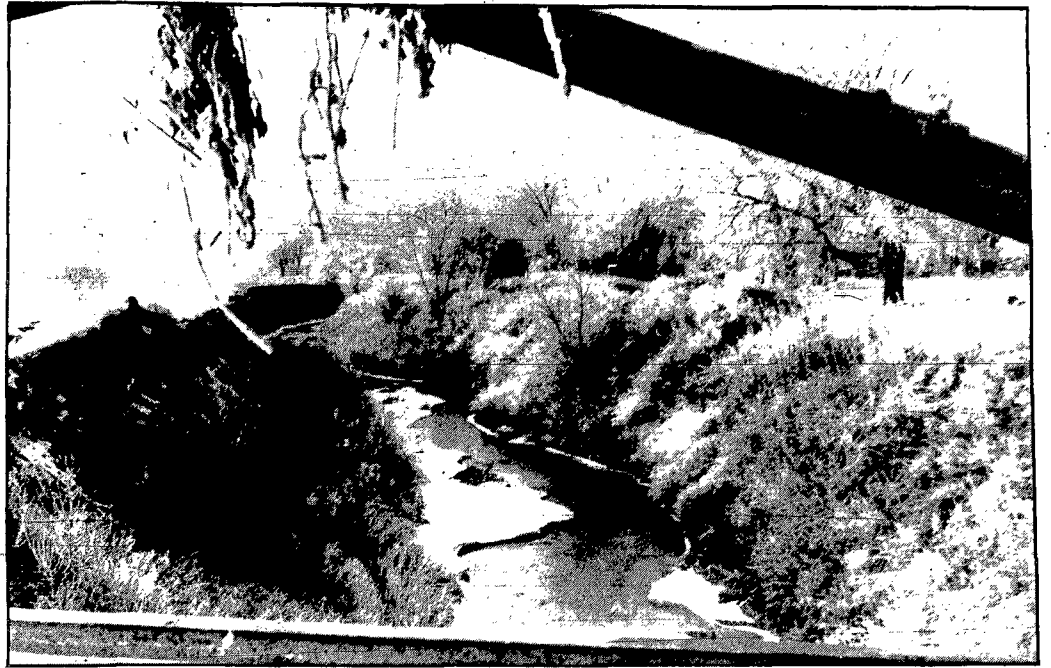

because of the jury's verdict, any reference to the incident being an accident is far removed.

"IT WAS AN act of manslaughter, a particularly serious type of manslaughter," Borhoff said. "I don't think it deserves the maximum (sentence), but I don't think it deserves the minimum."

Borhoff recommended that Ross receive not less than five years, and Judge Warren concurred by sentencing Ross to just that.

"Having to live with that (the shooting) on your conscience will be a burden the rest of your life," the judge told Ross. "For the protection of the public and because a lesser sentence would promote disrespect for the law and diminish the seriousness of the crime..." Ross was sentenced to the five years.

HIS BOND of \$50,000 was continued and implementation of the sentence was stayed for 30 days to allow the defense attorney time to appeal the sentence.

If an appeal to either the sentence or the verdict is not made within that time, Ross is required to surrender himself to custody of the County Sheriff and then will be taken to Lincoln to begin serving his sentence.

Other court action

In other court action Wednesday, Judge Warren sentenced Daniel King, 24, Norfolk, to two consecutive six-month terms in Wayne County Jail.

KING WAS sentenced on two counts of receiving stolen property. He originally had been charged with two counts of burglary following incidents at Charlie's Bar in Winslow and Danny's Place in Hoskins, but plea bargaining between attorneys reduced the charges.

Judge Warren also sustained a demurrer motion by Mid West Bridge & Construction Co., and Universal Surety Co., Norfolk, who are being sued by the city of Wayne.

THE DEMURRER is a form of objection. The city now has 20 days to file an amendment to the case or the case will be dismissed.
