

ALTHOUGH there is no official weather station in Wayne, readings at various points around town about 3:15 p.m. ranged from 101 degrees downlown to 106 on a residential thermometer. Two bank time and temperature signs told us the temperature was either 102 or 105. Stoux City was the hottest spot in Iowa at 106 degrees, while Norfolk set a record at 106 also Wayne was in there someplace. But all in all, there were few problems here regarding the heat.

Salaries Plague the County

We've all heard the expression "caught between a rock and a hard place," and Wayne County officials are finding that to be an accurate description of their problem. The officials held a special meeting Tuesday afternoon with County Altorney Budd Bornhoft regarding the legal liabilities in volved in taking a pay raise less than the cost of living increase.

ACCORDING to information supplied by the state, the cost of living rose approximately 12.5 percent this past year. But if county officials accept raises accordingly, then their budgets will exceed the 7 percent lid limit which is imposed by the state. They say they're darned if they do and darned if they don't. The meeting was held to clarify the legal tlability of the board of commissioners if the officials are decided to take less than what the

THE OFFICIALS have agreed among themselves to accept 8.5 percent increases. keeping in line with what Gov. Charles Thone has recommended for state employees: But that creates a slight problem, says Bornhoft. He says the officials have an "intense and immense practical problem" on their

hands. "The fact is that you are committed to this thing (a resolution approved by the commissioners two years ago) — while in office, you can't raise or lower your salary." The resolution states, in effect, that officials are to receive raises each year in accordance with the cost of living increase, But as officials have noted, to do this will send their budgets over the legal limit.

THE SIMPLE solution, the officials rought, was to accept raises of 8.5 percent (fechnically a cut fin pay based on the state's cost of living figures) so their budgets would remain under the 7 percent lid limitations. Bornhoft says the commissioners cannot

THE OFFICIALS offered to sign af-fidavits saying they are satisfied with the 8.5 percent pay filkes and that they would not sue the commissioners. "I'll draw up a resolution and the board can approve II, but I don't think it would be

BORNHOFT SAID the cost of living figure Is ambiguous and is not any particular set increase. He suggested the commissioners determine that the cost of living is 8.5 percent, or 3 percent, or 4 percent, or whatever.

Although most of the officials left the meeting confused and unsure of legal responsibilities, Bornhoft said he felt the commissioners would be within their legal rights by determining the cost of living for the officials and themselves.

AS ONE official noted, budgets for the coming fiscal year are due Aug. 15 and salary figures are needed soon in order to complete the budgets in time. The commissioners did not take any specific action Tuesday, but officials are expected to use the 8.5 percent as a guideline.

Windfall Profit Tax Will Average 19 Percent Here

The windfall profit tax on Nebraska oil production will averge 19 percent of the price of a barrel for producers and 23 percent for royally holders during 1980.

These estimates are presented in the July issue of "Business in

These estimates are presented in the July issue of "Business in Nebraska" by James R. Schmidt and Larry A Graus of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln Bureau of Business Research.

The lax legislation was signed by President Carter on April-2, and is designed to collect a total of \$227.3 billion before a gradual phaseout period begins.

and is designed to collect a total of \$273 billion before a gradual phaseout period begins.

The tax rates contained in the legislation are not applied to the entire price of a barrel but only to that fraction of the price considered to be a windfall profit. Rates range from 30 percent to 70 percent depending upon the type of oil and type of producer. Oil is classified into Three categories and producers are classified into three categories and producers are classified into two categories, independent and nonindependent, with a tax rate applying to each of the six combinations.

Schmidt and Graus noted that he effective tax rates per barrel (taxes as a percentage of the price of a barrel) are generally lower than the rates stated in the legislated rate for newly discovered oil (one of the three oil categories) is 30 percent of the windfall profit for each barrel. However, the effective tax rates will be higher for the other two categories of Nebraska oil but, on average, will not exceed 27 percent in 1980.

Reaction Swift to Abortion Decision

As expected, the reaction to the long-awaited U.S. Supreme Court decision that upheld a congressional prohibition against federal financing of welfare abortions was swift and came from spokespersons on both sides of the controverstal issue.

Nebraska was no exception:
Shirley Lang of Lincoln, president of Lincoln Right to Life, said the decision was welcome as an indication of the right of tax-payers to choose not to fund abortions. She said the decision preserved the separation of powers "fundamental to our system of constitutional government."

Lawrence, Batt of Omaha, an attorney who represented Dr. G. William Orr and an Omaha abortion clinic in U.S. District Court challenges of Nebraska's abortion laws, said he was concerned in that the 54 ruling said government has a legitimate interest in protecting potential life.

According to the U.S. Supreme Court, the congressional ban, most commonly referred to as the Hyde Amendment, isn't violative of a woman's constitutional rights.

In its ruling, the court also said states do not have to pay for abortions if federal reim-

bursement funds are not available.

The Hyde Amendment specifies federal funds may be used for abortions for the poor only to save the life of the mother or to terminate pregnancies resulting from rape or incest, that are properly reported to authorities.

Nebraska's regulations for using Medicaid funds for abortions was patterned after the Hyde Amendment, but Federal Judge Robert Denney of Omaha some months ago enjoined the state from enforcement of the restrictions.

Douglas noted Nebraska's regulations were based on a legal position that has now been affirmed by the Supreme Court.

Mrs. Lang said the recent ruling has resulted in a redoublding of efforts by all right to life organizations to protect human life from the moment of conception "without regard to age, health or condition of dependency."

The executive director of the Nebraska Civil Liberties Union, Dick Kurtenbach of Lincoln, said his organization was "very disappointed" by the court's action. He said the high court previously held that abortion

Budget balance is large
The state of Nebraska ended the fiscal

Budget balance is large
The state of Nebraska ended the fiscal
year June 30 with apparently the largest
general fund balance in history.
The amount — \$116.3 million — was
almost twice as much as a year earlier and
was well ahead of the largest previous year
end balance of \$63.8 million in 1974.
At least one member of the state board of
equalization, which sets the state's sales
and income tax rates, did not believe the
balance excessive. Treasurer Frank Marsh
said he expect's some clitzens will say they
are being taxed too heavily. But he added
they would not take that stance it they had to
worry about meeting the state's daily bills,
or it they remembered 1976 when the state
ended the fiscal year with a skimpy balance
of \$1.8 million.
Marsh maintained the large balance

During the first 11 months of the year, tax receipts were ahead of projections about \$6 million. Also factoring in the general fund balance was the fact the Revenue Department was off target about \$12 million in estimating the state's liability for income tax refunds.

How Do You Value A Human Life?

One of the oldest — and I believe the most
untair — charges against business people is
that they are always more preoccupled with
making money than with protecting the
welfare of their employees.
One such typical criticism is that
businesses are willing to cut back on safety
expenditures in the workplace, even though
this may result in serious Illness or endanger human lives. Thus, we're told,
businesses should be made to accept
untimited government regulation to ensure
that the responsibility of profecting workers
is met.
This whole argument is horribly

that the responsibility of profecting workers is met.

This whole argument is horribly simplistic in at least three respects. First, it totally ignores that of the some I million businesses in America today the overwhelming majority are small businesses in which personal relationships between managers and their employees are close, and the lines of authority are often nearly in visible. I know that in Hollywood business people are practically always stereotyped as cold, callous and unfeeling. But in the real world, the typical business leader is the neighbor next door who happens to share America's Judeo-Christian principles. That is not the kind of person who sits around trying to figure out how to make an extra buck by taking risks at his employee's expense. Second, the argument also ignores that when business people do think in purely economic terms about the bottom line, they find one of their highest priorities is to protect their employees. After all, it is industry,

not government, which must pay the most for worker's compensation, both directly, in terms of coverage, and indirectly, in terms of coverage, and indirectly, in terms of less work-hours and declining productivity. Thus, business has the greatest incentive to keep its people well.

Third, more and more businesses are coming to realize that they might save two lives with the same resources the government mandates they spend to save one. Consider the example of Deere and Company which manufactures farm and other heavy equipment and employs \$1,000 people in 11 manufacturing sites.

Between 1972 and 1974, this company followed the rules of the Occupational Safety and Health Administration to the letter. Every single nitipicking one. Result? Worker injuries rose by an alarming 42 percent. So the company changed its strategy and decided to shift its priorities away from OSHA and toward what it knew would work in its plants to reduce accidents and injuries. In so doing, it was implicitely accepting sole responsibility for protecting its workers by moving systematically to identify and eliminate hazards where they were. By this year, Deer's safety performance had dramaticalty improved. All injuries were down by 74 percent, serious injuries by 76 percent and days off by 89 percent. Is Deere merely an isolated example? Consider that during the 25-year period preceding OSHA's creation in 1971 — when industry was handling safety and health concerns on its own — serious injury and fataitity steadily declined. Since OSHA's inception in 1971, however, and since the huge 380 percent increase in its budget, and over



ence assure you of a quality job, done on time, at a price you'll like. \$25 billion in regulatory expenses to in dusfry and consumers, the serious accident trend has reversed direction and begun climbing again. Consistently pressured by OSHA's red tape, and by other government regulation, higher inflation and taxation, businesses have had to reduce their in vestments in new and safer plants and equipment. The trouble with so many regulators in Washington is that they have never been exposed to the responsibilities of the real world where people are constantly struggling to meet a payroll with limited resources, and where the idea of forcing industries to spend more than \$100 million a year to comply with regulations that might, just might.

and where the idea of forcing industries to spend more than \$100 million a year to comply with regulations that might, just might, save one-half of a hypothetical life is rightfully considered absurd.

The Supreme Court, thankfully, agrees, in a major victory for the business community against OSHA, a case in which the U.S. Chamber was heavily involved, the Court has just ruled that OSHA cannot impose new health standards on industry regulating workers' exposure to benzene without proving that current standards are unsafe. The decision is very significant and represents a big step in the right direction. Another is that when it comes to deciding difficult issues today regarding workers' health and safety, a growing proportion of the rank and file frust a team of management and workers, rather than outside individuals or government agencies. I can understand why.







When the disease is allowed to develop until there are a lot of dead leaves, it is then very dif-ficult to bring it into check if the large number of spores being pro-duced in the dead leaves.

Credit Strategies Offered

Editor's Note: This is the ninth in a series of several articles developed by the Cooperative Extension Service in Lincoln, The articles provide some practical advice for making the best of a bad situation. The articles will deal with farm management

Beef producers in Nebraska are in the same tight credit, cost-price squeeze that the rest of the agricultural sector faces. Several strategies may be helpful in weathering these unfavorable economic conditions.

Cow-Calf and Range Livestock Producers. Established cow-calf producers, particularly those in the range area, have a relatively large proportion of total costs which are fixed, and therefore are not great ly affected by high short term interest rates. This puts these producers in a favorable position in comparison to crop producers and livestock feeders. Some cow-calf and range livestock producers are affected however, and may wish to consider the following strategies to reduce cash expenses and improve cash flow.

1 Cull poor producing breeding stock early and heavily. It may cost more than \$300 to carry a cow through a year. This is money wasted if the cow is not productive. In addition, income from culled breeding stock is taxed at the lower capital gains rate rather than as ordinary income if owned for two years.

2. Cash flow may be improved by postponing the purchase of replacement breeding stock this year. It may be helpful to select replacements from within the existing herd rather than by purchased stocker cattle appears to be risky this year with high interest rates and an uncertain cattle market. It extra forage is available, consider the possibility of renting it or engaging in "custom grazing" cather than purchasing stockers.

a high proportion of the cattle feeder's costs are cash costs. Traditionally, feeders have used borrowed, capital to finance livestock and feed purchases. Feeders profits have been badly hurt recently by high interest rates and falling fat cattle prices. Some strategies cattle feeders may consider are:

1. Thoroughly review and evaluate your credit needs and sources Be sure to consider alternative sources of financing also. For example, feeder cattle selfers may be willing to finance your purchases on favorable terms. These sellers are also potential custom feeding customers.

2. Cacefully consider custom feeding. This may improve cash flow as feed costs are generally paid periodically by the cattle owner. Custom feeding also eliminates the credit needed for livestock purchases and reduces the risk of unfavorable cattle price moves.

3. Practice careful feed inventory management. You may wish to consider hedging feed purchases or contracting for future feed delivery rather than buying large quantities of feed now.

4. High short term interest rates present problems for feeders, but opportunities for profit may still exist. Budget out expected costs and returns before buying cattle. It may be possible to "lock in" profit with a hedge or a forward contract Interest expenses will usually be a larger part of total feeding cost for animals fed for a slow rate of gain.

For example, the break even selling price for a yearling steer purchased at 700 pounds fed to gain 2.85 pounds per day for 130 days increases by \$19 cwt for each percentage point change in the interest rate. Corn Borer Caution Urged GOOD YEAR

European corn borers are beginning to show up in corn flelds across Nebraska again this year and it's important that farmers begin checking for them now. Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources extension enomologists recommend that farmers check flelds twice a week for egg masses, signs of feeding or young larvae.

In the Nebraska Cooperative Plant Pest Report for June 19, surveyers found borer egg masses in virtually all of 160 corn flelds surveyed in Lincoln and Perkins counties. Infestations ranged up to 44 percent and averaged 15 percent of plants with egg masses on them. At the University of Nebraska South Central Station near Clay Center, 10 percent of plants surveyed.

After hatching, young larvae move down into the plant whorl and feed on the rolled up leaves. When chewed leaves unfurl and grow, they have a characteristic shot holed appearance, often with straight rows across leaves "Unwrap some leaves to deter mine if borers are still allive." Roselle said

Whether or not controls are economical depends on the type of field, he said. "Economic in festation levels are about 35 per cent in irrigated corn. 50 percent in dryland corn. 25 percent in popcorn and 15 percent in seed fields." These percentages in dicate that economic yield reduction will likely occur due to first brood borers, he said

Use your field data to defermine levels of infestation, he continued. If you scout 50 plants and five of them have egg masses, larvae, or signs of feeding, then the infestation levels is 10 per cent.

Research by John Witkowski, station near Concord, shows the most effective control materials tested are Furadan and Dyfonate granules, applied at the rate of one pound active ingredient per acre for either product. These can be ground or aerially applied. Other products registered for borer control are granular for mulations of Thimet, toxaphene, EPN and diazinon. These control borer larvae but have not been as effective as Furadan or Dyfonate Sprays also have not been as effective as granular materials. Roselle said. There is less penetration into whorts and shorter residual effects as sprays adhere to leaves more and grow away from the area in which borers work."

Deregulation of the airline industry has turned out to be a "bitter pill" for many congressmen and consumers to swallow. Instead of trimming costs as billed, deregulation has seen the cost of air cargo rise by 40 percent and a cutback in insurance and liability.

Survey Shows Vietnam Vets Glad They Served

While most Vietnam Era voterans now agree with a majority of the public that America should have stayed out of Vietnam, these same veterans are glad they served their country and would serve again it asked to. These were the findings in a survey conducted for the Veterans Administration by Louis Harris and Associates, and released by Max Cletand, administrator of Veterans Affairs. The study was ordered by Presi-

continue to confront the Vietnam Era voteran. The survey reflects strong patriotic feelings on the part of voterans, despite disillusionment with the war and a great deal of bitterness about their treatment after the war. Ninety-one per cent of the veterans serving in Vietnam agreed with the statement: "Looking back, I am glad I served my country." Two thirds of Vietnam veterans say that they would serve again if asked The survey also confirmed an ad vance sample finding that although only one in five Americans still supports America's involvement in the Vietnam war, a great majority of the public has a high regard for the veterans who fought that war. "If appears that the public is finally separating the war from the warrior." Cleland said "Despite the untriendly reception Viotnam vetgrans received when returning home, which is verified in the survey, this group of veterans is beginning to find some understanding and sympathy among the American people."

There also is evidence that most veterans of the Vietnam Era are adjusting well to civilian life, although there remains much to be done in healing the physical and psychological scars.

Louis Harris and Associates in terviewed 7,000 people nation wide between November, 1979 and March, 1980. They fell into four groups the general public Vietnam Era veterans, educators and employers. The VA said that the surveys are the most thorough and comprehensive ever undertaken of attitudes towards Vietnam Era veterans. Other survey findings included

Census Bureau Plans Survey

Local representatives of the Bureau of the Census will conduct a survey of employment in this area during the work week of July 14-19, 1980, Leo C. Schilling, director of the bureau's Regional Office in Denver, announced.

The survey is conducted for the U.S. Department of Labor in a scientifically designed sample of approximately 84,000 households throughout the United States. Employment and unemployment statistics based on results of this survey are used to provide a continuing measure of the economic health of the Nation.

For example, in May the survey indicated that of the 105.1 million men and wamen in the civilian labor force, 97 million were employed. The nation's unemployment-rate was 7.8 percent, up from 7 percent in April and 6.2 percent in March.
