Uncover Bones

"Hey mom, look what I found," might be the expression used when three local junior archeologists return home after a long day on the job.

Chad and Troy Frey, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Carlos Frey of Wayne and Steve Marra, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Marra of Wayne have spent weeks of their summer vacation digging up bones under a bridge on Logan Creek, one mile east and one-half mile south of Wayne. Steve and Chad are age nine and Troy is 6 1/2.

The three-sons ventured to the creek last summer and stumbled across their first finding, a couple of leg bones and a large skull. The two families believe the bones belong to either a bull or an ox.

This summer, the boys returned to the site with hoes and shovels hoping to unearth some more bones. A typical afternoon excursion includes taking along instruments for digging, a rug of water and bicycles for transportation.

So far this summer, the boys' luck has continued. They have found several other bones and another skull, which they unearthed in three parts. They said they plan to spend the rest of the summer looking for more bones.

The dedicated archeologists took some of their findings to "show and tell" last school year but found that excessive handling causes the remains to wear. The three boys stated that their parents encourage their hobby and are enthusiastic about it. They are learning and having a lot of fun doing it, they added.



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County Reaches \$11,150 in Bonds

During February 1980, Nebraska citizens purchased \$3,662,000 worth of Series EEE and H HH United States Savings Bonds, bringing sales for the first two months of the year to \$8,030,042. John F. O'Neill, volunteer state chairman for Nebraska, has announced these 1980 sales represent 15.5 percent of the assigned 1980 dollar goal of \$51,900,000.

Citizens of Wayne County purchase Savings Bonds totaling \$11,150 during February 1980 for \$13,786 during the period January-February 1980, said Bev Eiler, volunteer county chairman. For 85 percent of their assigned goal of \$167,000.

Nationally, Americans purchased \$2,548 million worth of United States Savings Bonds during January-February 1980. Series EEE sales alone were \$2,403 million. Cash value of holdings of Savings Bonds by some 23 million families or households were \$77.7 billion, accounting for over 15 percent of the privately-held portion of the public debt.

Proposed Budget for School Set At \$1.9 Million for Next Year

Wayne Carroll School District board of education whipped through some items but struggled through others in a hot, sticky and lengthy meeting Monday night at the high school.

spiced with considerable discussion on the board's recent decision to eliminate baseball and with an unanticipated action to cut the golf program as well.

The board was presented copies of the proposed budget for fiscal year 1980-81, as compiled by Supt. Francis Haun. The budget is an estimate, the superintendent noted, since teacher salary negotiations will not be completed for several weeks.

the year before (1978-79). Of the total \$1.9 million proposal, the total property tax requirements are estimated at \$1,152,908.13. Estimated non-tax revenue will include \$379,308 from state funds, \$127,901 from federal funds and \$294,424 from local sources.

Total tax requirements for the 1979-80 fiscal year were \$1,137,175.67 and includes requirements for the general fund, sinking fund and the bond fund, as does the figure for the coming fiscal year.

The official budget hearing will be at 8:30 p.m. Monday, Aug. 11, at the high school. The board will review the budget line by line at that meeting. No action was taken involving the budget.

In other action, Superintendent Haun had some bad news for the board regarding a contract with Educational Service Unit No. 1 for nursing services.

HAUN SAID an unforeseen communications problem with the ESU administration has resulted in unexpected costs to the Wayne Carroll district. Haun said he had a verbal agreement with ESU that the unit would provide nursing services to the school district.

However, according to Haun, the unit apparently reneged on its part of the agreement and will pay only half the cost of employ-

ing a nurse. There still will be a savings to the Wayne district of about \$6,000 (compared to \$11,000 under the initial agreement), but about \$4,000 will have to be budgeted for Wayne's share of the agreement, Haun explained.

THE BOARD officially approved the appointment of Jerry Stovar, vice president of administration at Northeast Nebraska Technical Community College in Norfolk, as the board's fact finder in teacher negotiations.

He will be paid \$20 per hour plus mileage and other expenses during fact finding negotiations with a Nebraska Education Association representative and an independent fact finder.

The resignation of head football coach and English teacher Stewart Cline was accepted. Superintendent Haun said he anticipates difficulty in finding a replacement with the proper teaching and coaching credentials.

THE BOARD gave its nod to updating of a special education policy, heard a report on Title I funding and heard a report on progress in repairing the roof on the Carroll Elementary School. The repair should be completed by fall.

All actions were unanimous and all board members except Dorothy Ley were present.

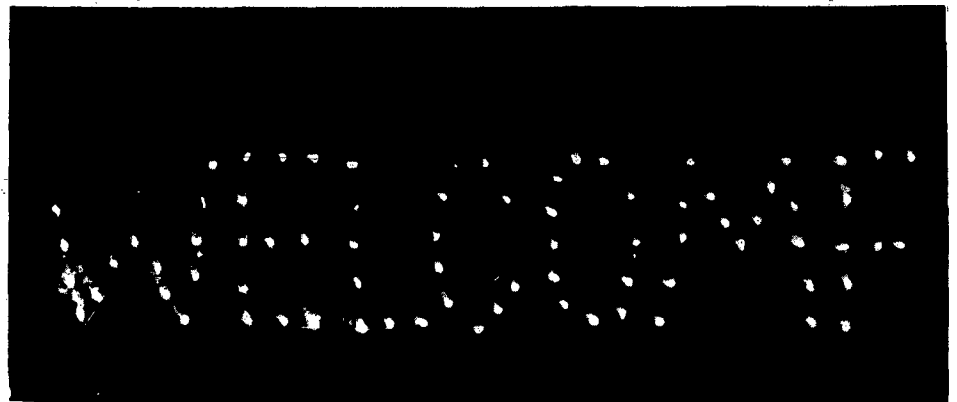
Joseph W. Fleck, Wayne, a major in the Air Force Reserve, has completed the two week defense strategy course while on active duty for training at the National Defense University.

In civilian life, Major Fleck is an associate professor of education and head of the Division of Education and Psychology at Wayne State College.

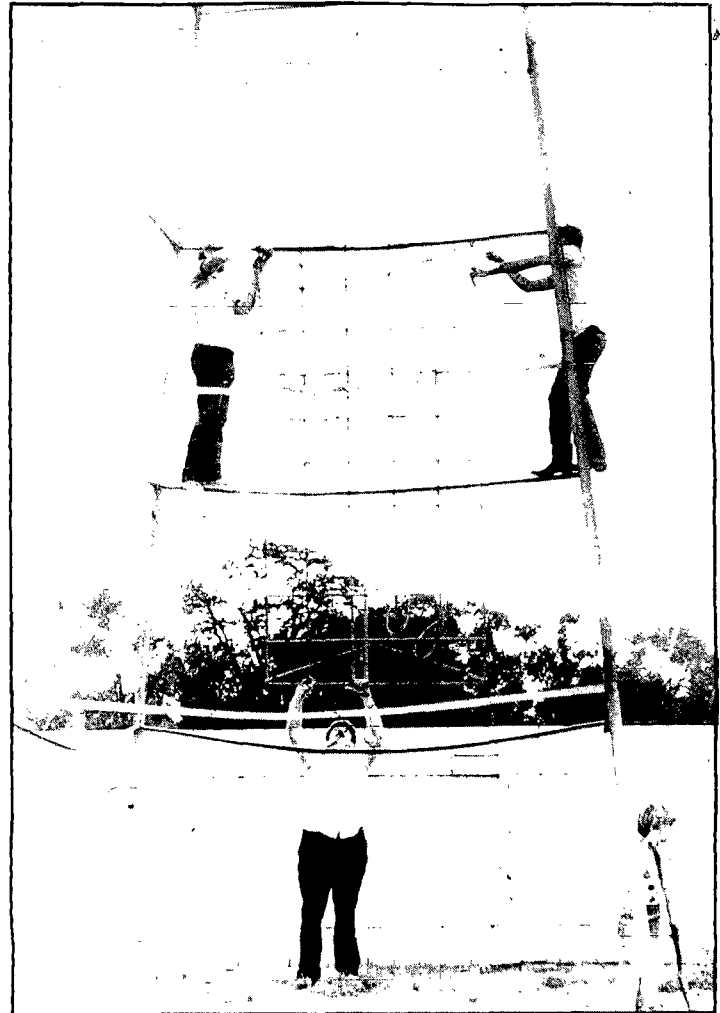
William Cathoon of Wayne has left for active duty in the United States Army Reserves.

Nettleton was taken to Providence Medical Center for treatment of minor burns on his hands.

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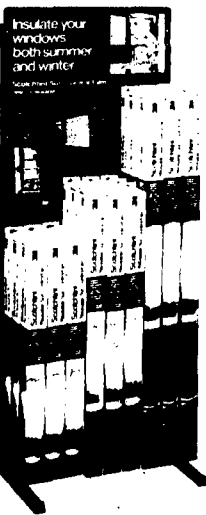
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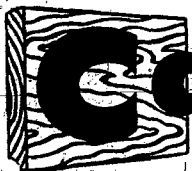
