Home Extension Specialist Predicts Sharp Rise in 1981 Food Prices

Food prices are expected to rise 10 to 15 percent in 1981, predicts Paul Westcott, an economist at the U.S. Department of Agriculture, at the 1981 Agricultural Outlook Conference held recently in Washington, D. C.

The sharpest increases will be in meats and sugar, reports Kathy Prochaska Cue, University of Nebraska extension family economics specialist.

Prochaska Cue, who attended the conference, says Westcott predicted overall meat prices will increase 17.9 percent. Pork is expected to increase 27.6 percent, with beef and veal increasing 13.5 percent.

Westcott said producer losses in the first half of 1980, resulting from rising corn prices and low hog prices, will lead to declines in pork production in 1981 — perhaps 8 to 10 percent.

With only slight increases in beef and broiler production, 1981 per capita meat and poultry supplies will be 2 to 4 percent below last year's level, leading to a retail price for these foods increasing 15 to 20 percent.

Eggs also are expected to take a jump in prices. Consumers already are seeing high egg prices, partly due to seasonal holiday cooking and also to substitution for meats and poultry. Prices in 1981 will go up about 17 percent over last year's relatively low prices.

Westcott said prices for sugar and sweets are likely to show another substantial rise in 1981 — 21.5 percent — with the size of the increase depending on global sugar production.

Prochaska Cue says it makes good sense to stock up now on meat, particularly pork and beef. And, she says, if freezer space is available, you might want to stock more poultry too.

However Prochaska Cue questions whether now is a good time to purchase a freezer.

"It will depend on the interest rate you can get for the credit, and how determined you are to keep that freezer full in the future so it runs efficiently," she says.

The family economics specialist warns against hoarding sugar and sweets. "This would create an artificial shortage of sugar, similar to the situation that existed not too many years ago. Just buy what you need," she says.

According to Westcott, the main causes of the expected higher food prices are the farm value of food, which measures the return of payment received by farmers for agricultural commodities used in food; a farm-to-retail price spread, measuring the impact of marketing costs on food prices; and the costs of foods not produced on domestic farms, which includes fish and imported foods.

The farm to retail price spread is expected to increase 9 to 11 percent, with a 10 to 17 percent rise expected in fish and imported food prices.

Janet Wilson, extension consumer education specialist, says consumers will have to continue to sharpen their shopping skills. "They will have to substitute and use the switch-and-save concept.

People will be less brand-conscious and more flexible at the store," she notes, adding that the consumer is becoming more aware of the high marketing costs in foods.

Wilson says the energy factor is very important when considering higher food costs. In 1980, the "hidden" cost in packaging increased 12 percent, transportation went up 8 percent. (It's expected to increase in 1981 to 14 percent) and direct energy use was up 6 percent. (which is expected to go up to 30 percent).

"Consumers will have to make conscious decisions about the choice of specially packaged foods, or processed convenience foods," the specialist notes. "While these foods may save time and human energy, that added plastic and paper means more weight which seriously affects transportation and disposal costs."

Wilson says it is important to remember that food is still a bargain in the U.S. compared to other nations.

"We are so aware of the cost of food because we buy it so frequently. But in the past, food costs have not risen as rapidly as housing, transportation or health costs," she notes.

Allen Wins Ratings Battle
