City's Electric Rate Hiked

n electric rate hike and new water eres were given approval at the final lar City Council meeting in December, there was considerable discussion ording the city's "general obligation iciation in subdivisions.

WITH HARDLY a wimper, the Council approved a 12 percent hike in retail electric rates effective with the February billing. The hike to Wayne residents is the result of hike in rates paid by the city to its supplier of power, Nebraska Public Power District.

hike in rates paid by the city to its supprised power. Nebraska Public Power District. The Council also approved an ordinance allowing the replacement of old water meters with new remote meters. The old ones will be replaced periodically at the city's expense. The new meters are much more efficient and will help reduce the amount of revenue lost each month through the inadequate meters.

DISCUSSION OF the city's involvement in developing subdivisions and its general obligation participation continued at this meeting from previous meetings.

There were no written or oral objections at a board of equalization hearing involving assessments for Hillside Drive into Sunnyview Subdivision

noted that there was no general obligation participation in this project, but that the council had opted for taxpayer involvement in Marywood Subdivision.

City Attorney Kem Swarts explained that in Marywood, the Council elected not to assess intersections. "To date," he pointed out, "the city of Wayne has never assessed intersections."

SWARTS SAID there are no intersections involved in Hillside Drive since it is a straight street. State statute is clear in that intersections are to be general obligation, the attorney said. "It goes back to the historical problems of assessing intersections."

Intersections."

He also explained that the legal framework, through ordinance, now provides the Council with the option of assessing intersections to the developer.

The assessment schedule was approved,

The remainder of the discussion on general obligation participation came when developer John Vakoc spoke to the Council as a special agenda Hem.

SAYING "IT hardly seems relevant any

more." the developer asked the Council to "justify the seeming inconsistency" of its policy regarding general obligation of intersections.
"In my opinion, there was clear infent by the city administration that general obligation participation was a thing of the past," he said. "That intent seems to be supported in several ways."

NUMBER ONE, he said, was through statements made by the former city administrator (Darrell Brewington). Secondly, he continued, was through a subdivision agreement the city had with Pat. Gross (developer of Marywood Subdivision) whereby the city has the right to assess the entire cost of any improvement of any streets in the improvement district. Thirdly, he added, the assessment schedule presented by the engineers in which they proposed no general obligation participation.

VAKOC ALSO disagreed with the city: attorney's contention that no intersection was involved with Hillside Drive. Vakoc pointed out that the street does, in fact,

MR. NORDSTRAND, a former WSC faculty member who served with the U S embassies in Denmark and Norway, died Sunday at St. Joseph Hospital in Sloux City, lowa, after a short illness

Iowa, after a short liness Born Nov. 15, 1909, in San Francisco to Nils and Kristofa Nordstrand, he was well known for his contributions to both Wayne

tional worlds. On Sept. 30, 1933, he married Lillian Aalia at Sloux Falls, S.D. During his career at WSC. Mr. Nordstrand served as assistant dean of instruction, director of federal aid to higher education programs, director of international programs, assistant dean of faculties, dean of the school of humanities and fine arts, chairman of the department of humanities, dean of the school of arts and sciences and professor of English.

HE RECEIVED the Blue Key Award for outstanding service in international education and the National Achievement Award, for excellence in teacher education and international education given by the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education in 1971.

In 1974, he was honored in a special way. The WSC Nordstrand Visual Arts Gallery was named for him. In 1975, he received yet another award at WSC, the Blue Key Award for leadership and service.

BEFORE COMING to Wayne State in BEFORE COMING to Wayne State in 1986, his career continued in Scandinavia as Cultural Affairs Attache' at the U.S. Embassy in Norway, at the same time chairing the Fulbright Program of the U.S. Educational Foundation. In 1956, he moved to the U.S. Embassy in Denmark as Public Affairs Officer, Director of U.S. Information Service and chairman of the U.S. Educational Foundation.

In Denmark, he worked closely with U.S.
Ambassador Val Peterson, former Wayne

In recognition of his foreign services, Mr. Nordstrand was decorated a Knight of the Order of St. Olav by the Late King Haakon VII of Norway and received the Meritorlous Award from the U.S. Information Agency."

HE ALSO WAS decorated a Knight of the Order of Danneborg by the late King Frederich IX of Denmark.

Mr. Nordstrand studied at Cogswell Polytechnical College in San Francisco and Menio Park Junior College in California. He received a bachelor's degree from St. Olaf. College in Northfield. Allian: and attended graduate school at the University of Chicago and the University of Oslo in Norway.

During his academic career, he hield positions as director of athletics at Garretson Public High School in South Dakota, and was dean of men at Concordia College in Moorhead, Minn., and St. Olaf College. After a term as lecturer at the University of Oslo, he became dean of academic administration and later dean of the faculty at St. Olaf College.

HE WAS preceded in death by his parents.

SHE WAS, naturally, delighted. But the work continues. The shell of the house is complete, but the electric lights have to be installed, more wood furniture carved and the wallpaper hung.

WCPPD Hikes Retail Rates by 10%

Wayne County Public Power District's board of directors approved a retail rate increase for electric usage in 1981 at their December regular monthly meeting.

THE HIGHER rates will be used to figure electric bills beginning Feb. 1 for electric energy.used after Jan. 1.

The rate revision will increase electric bills for the district's 2.270 rural customers by approximately 10 percent. The increase will raise the cost to the farm-residential customer to \$63.65 from the present \$57.89 for the average 1250 kWh's consumed by them per month.

wholesale power costs to the local power district by its power supplier. The Wayne County Public Power District has no power generation of its own. Therefore, all electric energy distributed in their Wayne and Pierce County service areas is purchased from Nebraska Public Power District of Columbus. The estimated 12 percent increase in the wholesale power rate is the result of major breakdowns during 1980 at NPPD's Cooper Núclear plant and at the coal-fired Gerald Gentleman I plant at Sutherland.

some 1.5 Percent of the local retail rate increase will be used by the Wayne County Public Power District to offset rising costs in its operating and maintenance budgets for 1981. Constant upgrading of lines and substations is necessary as demands for electric energy continues to grow 4.7 percent each year for the district's

A Glance Back At the Second Half of 1980

(This is the final roundup of stories that occupied the front pages of The Wayne Herald during the second half of 1980. The first half was reviewed last week.)

The second half of 1980 was punctuated by record and near record high temperatures in July and August, and the continuing dry spell that plagued the upper Midwest for two years. August brought some relief from the dryness, but temperatures still remained in the 90's, providing humid and uncomfortable conditions.

The economy was a dismal point to be considered, with the net laxable retail sales falling off
gradually after a fremendous start.

The City Council began budget sessions to frim some \$180,000 from the overall budget to prevent a deficit. The cuts were needed after the one-cent city sales tax was deteated in May.

The Wayne-Carroll School District board set a budget of \$1.9 million, up slightly from the previous year.

Sharp Rise in 1981 Food Prices

Food prices are expected to rise 10 to 15 percent in 1981, predicts 15 percent in 1981, predicts 16 percent in 1981, a economist at the U.S. Depart-ment of 'Agriculture, at the 1981 Agricultural Outlook Conference held recently in Washington, D. C.

The sharpest increases will be in meats and sugar, reports Kathy Prochaska Cue, University of Nebraska extension family economics specialist. Prochaska Cue, who attended the conference, says Westcott predicted overall meat prices will increase 17.9 percent, Pork is expected to increase 27.2 percent, with beef and veal increasing 13.5 percent. Westcott said producer losses

Prochaska Cue says it makes good sense to stock up now on meat, particularly pork and beef. And, she says, it freezer space is available, you might want to stock more poultry too. However Prochaska Cue questions whether now is a good time to purchase a freezer. "It will depend on the interest rate you can get for the credit, and how determined you are to keep that freezer full in the future so it runs efficiently," she says. The family economics specialist warns against hoarding sugar and sweets. "This would create an artificial shor-


tage of sugar, similar to fife situation that existed not too many years ago. Just buy what you need," she says.

According to Westcott, the main causes of the expected higher tood prices are the farm value of food, which measures the return of payment received by farmers for agricultural commodities used in food; a farm to-retail price spread measuring

The farm to retail price spread is expected to increase 9 to 11 percent, with a 10 to 17 percent rise expected in fish and imported food prices.



At its regular monthly meeting Monday, after taking care of its other business, the commission delived into some philosophical type issues — the disposal of hazardous wastes, the condition of sidewalks in Wayne and illegal business signs.

The group deserves credit for its foresight. illegal dumping of chemical wastes is reported almost daily across the country, and Wayne does not have an ordinance preventing such disposal

country, and Wayne does not have an ordinance preventing such disposalhere, nor does the county.

It is not known if there are any chemical deposits being dumped in the county, or even if any exist. To the best of our knowledge, the types of manufacturing in the county do not lend themselves to hazardous chemicals. But an ordinance regulating or even preventing their disposal here should be given serious thought.

Sidewalks and illegal business signs are instances of a different color. There are ordinances regulating each, and commission members are putting the wheels in motion to have the ordinances enforced. Many, many sidewalks in residential and downtown areas are in dangerous condition, posing hazards to an increasing number of persons walking. Some slabs are raised, some are cracked and some are badly broken.

broken. Many sidewalks are blocked because cars are illegally parked; others are virtually buried in unmowed grass, weeds, or are covered with dirt, rocks, etc., making them impassible.

The commission also is giving some serious thought to enforcing an ordinance which regulates signs advertising in home businesses. According to the city code, signs advertising in-home businesses cannot be more than two square feet in area and must be attached to the building.

There oughta be a law, and there is. The laws were approved by former Councils and should be followed or repealed.

But until such action is taken, the commission is doing right to request that the Council and others see to that the existing laws are enforced. Dan Field, Editor.
