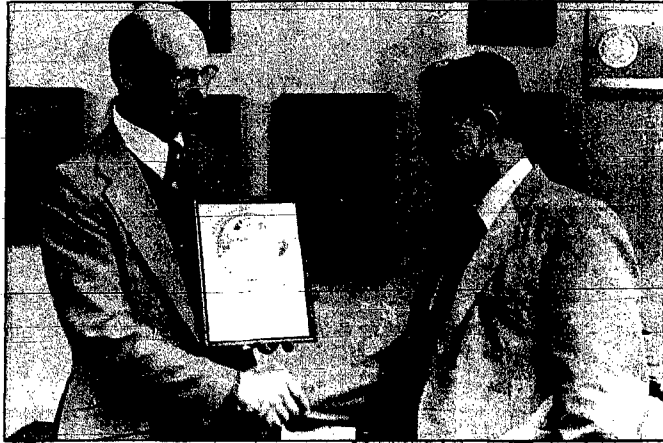

A holiday hostess

Famy's famous Christmas coffees are longtime tradition in Laurel

What would Christmas be like in Laurel without Famy Ericson? It's unimaginable. Like Santa Claus without his long, white flowing beard, like a Christmas tree without tinsel and lights, like Rudolph without a red nose, or like a turkey dinner without family and good friends.

FAMY HAS become a Christmas tradition in Laurel. Each year, as Christmas Day approaches, Famy opens up her home.

And they come — all ages — to sample Famy's famous Christmas cookies, bars, cakes, rolls and coffee. Swedish egg coffee no less. Famy wouldn't have it any other way.

FOR THE past 20 years, Famy has invited residents of Laurel to share Christmas with her. It's an open house, everyone comes, and Famy waits to greet them all at her door. She has spent weeks, even months in advance, baking all sorts of Christmas goodies to serve her good friends.

There are sugar cookies, fruit cookies, chocolate dip cookies, thumb print cookies, ginger cookies, fruit cakes, pound cakes, coffee cakes, caramel bars, butterscotch bars, chocolate bars, fudge, cheese, nuts — and more.

"I LOVE IT," says Famy, who will be 79 years old in March. "Oh yes, it's a lot of work and a lot of expense, but I love every minute of it." Famy straightens up, takes time to smooth her neat blue dress, and says, "Besides, I get to see all my old boyfriends from my days in the cafe."

FAMY'S ANNUAL Christmas coffees began in 1961. For the first 10 years they were held each year around Christmastime at Lony's Cafe, where Famy worked as a waitress for her niece, Lony Nelson.

Lony and Famy hosted the coffee together. Famy baked most of the Christmas goodies and carried tray after tray to the cafe where good friends and neighbors gathered to sample the treats.

When Famy quit her work at the cafe in 1970, shortly before entering the hospital for hip surgery, she didn't even consider quitting what had become a Christmas tradition to many of the community's residents — the annual Christmas coffee.

She just moved the location of the coffee to her home on the west side of the town's Main Street.

"BE SIDES," says Famy, "it was much easier for me to serve the coffee in my home than carry all those trays over to the cafe."

How much easier is it? Well, Famy may not tote all those trays to the cafe anymore, but she still spends days baking all the goodies — by herself.

"I bake it all," says Famy. "Lots of my friends offer to bring something, but then," she smiles, "I wouldn't be able to say 'I made it all myself.'"

THIS YEAR, Famy says she went through about 20 pounds of butter, and 20 to 30 pounds of sugar.

The pecans for the cookies and candies were sent to her by a niece in Texas, Gloria Tolles. "I have pecans in most everything," laughs Famy. And, the friends who gathered last week to share Christmas with Famy, drank about 2 pounds of coffee.

"It's all egg coffee," says Famy, "a Swedish tradition."

Although Famy is German, her late husband was Swedish and came from near Concord. "I got a lot of my ideas from the Concord people," she smiles.

FAMY BEGAN baking her Christmas cakes and cookies in October. In late October she left to spend a month in Texas, and after that a week with her son and family in Des Moines.

"I was a little short for time when I got back home," she smiles, "but I got it all done."

IN ALL, THERE were about 16 different Christmas cakes, cookies and candy for Famy's Christmas guests this year.

About 150 residents of the community attended the coffee last Thursday morning — and they were all greeted at the door by a smiling Famy.

A special guest this year was Channel 9 weatherman Tom Peterson and his mother, Mae Peterson, who resided in Laurel several years earlier.

FAMY HAD been up since about 4:30 that morning to start making cream-buff pastries.

"They aren't something you can do ahead of time," she smiles.

Florence Johnson, a good friend, came about 6 o'clock to help Famy put finishing touches on the pastries; and by 9 o'clock, when guests started arriving, the table was filled with tray after tray of the delectable treats.

"Almost everything I bake is old-fashioned," smiles Famy. "I know what the men like, and they don't like fancy things."

FAMY SAYS she couldn't have her Christmas coffee if it wasn't for all the help she receives.

"The same girls have helped me for years," she smiles.

Florence Johnson is in charge of the coffee, Donna Ebmeyer and Clara Stewart preside at the serving table, Gladys McCullough serves up the cookies, and niece Mary Bruggeman "is everywhere," laughs Famy.

"I just turn it all over to them when the guests start arriving," says Famy.

Famy says she also gives a lot of credit to Edna Christensen, who called nearly everybody in town to remind them of the annual Christmas coffee.

Beds were piled high with coats that were pushed to the side for extra seating room as chairs and couches filled.

Famy says she was especially pleased to see many teachers from the Laurel-Concord school who took time out from their classes to sample her coffee and cookies.

"Each year I see some new faces," she smiles.

FAMY HAS lived in Laurel all her life. She was married there in 1922 to Clarence Ericson. Her husband died in a traffic accident in 1946.

Famy and Clarence were the parents of two children.

A daughter, Joan Mallatt, resides in Lincoln with her husband Patrick. Joan works as a clerk at East High School and her husband teaches.

They are the parents of one son, Jeffrey, will graduate as an electrical engineer from MIT college near Boston in January, and a daughter, Ann, who attends the University of Nebraska, Lincoln.

Famy's son, Jon, is a professor of speech at Drake University in Des Moines. His wife, Mary, is an attorney, and they are the parents of two children, 11-year-old Christine, and five-year-old Michael.

FOLLOWING THE death of her husband, Famy worked for several years in a downtown cafe, and then several years at a Creamery. She went to work at Lony's Cafe in 1958.

Mary travels a great deal. When she's home, she loves to play cards and have dinner with her friends; and is active in the Laurel Presbyterian Church.

She is starting her 30th year as Treasurer of the Laurel Cemetery Association.

HOW MANY MORE years does Famy plan to host her annual Christmas coffee?

"As long as I feel good, I'm going to do it," she smiles in the true spirit of Christmas.

AS THE GUESTS arrived, Mary's face brightened as she recognized the friends and neighbors.

Mary attended school in Carroll for one year and then, upon the suggestion of a band teacher, enrolled in Wayne Normal College. Her tuition was paid with a load of potatoes her father presented to college authorities.

MARY TAUGHT school in the Welsh community west of Carroll for seven years.

Following her marriage to Cradoc (C. H.) Morris in the

Welsh church, Mary was asked to teach Sunday school beginners who spoke only Welsh. She taught the class in English, the only language she spoke.

ALTHOUGH Mary has impaired eyesight and is hard of hearing, she is otherwise in relatively good health and enjoys the company of family and friends.

She also enjoys listening to talking books.

She attends the Congregational Church and Ladies Aid regularly with her son and wife, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Morris, with whom she makes her home in Carroll.

She also attends senior citizens dinners which are held the first Monday of each month.

MARY AND her husband, who died in 1966, were the parents of four children, including a son, Oberlin, who died in the early 1960's.

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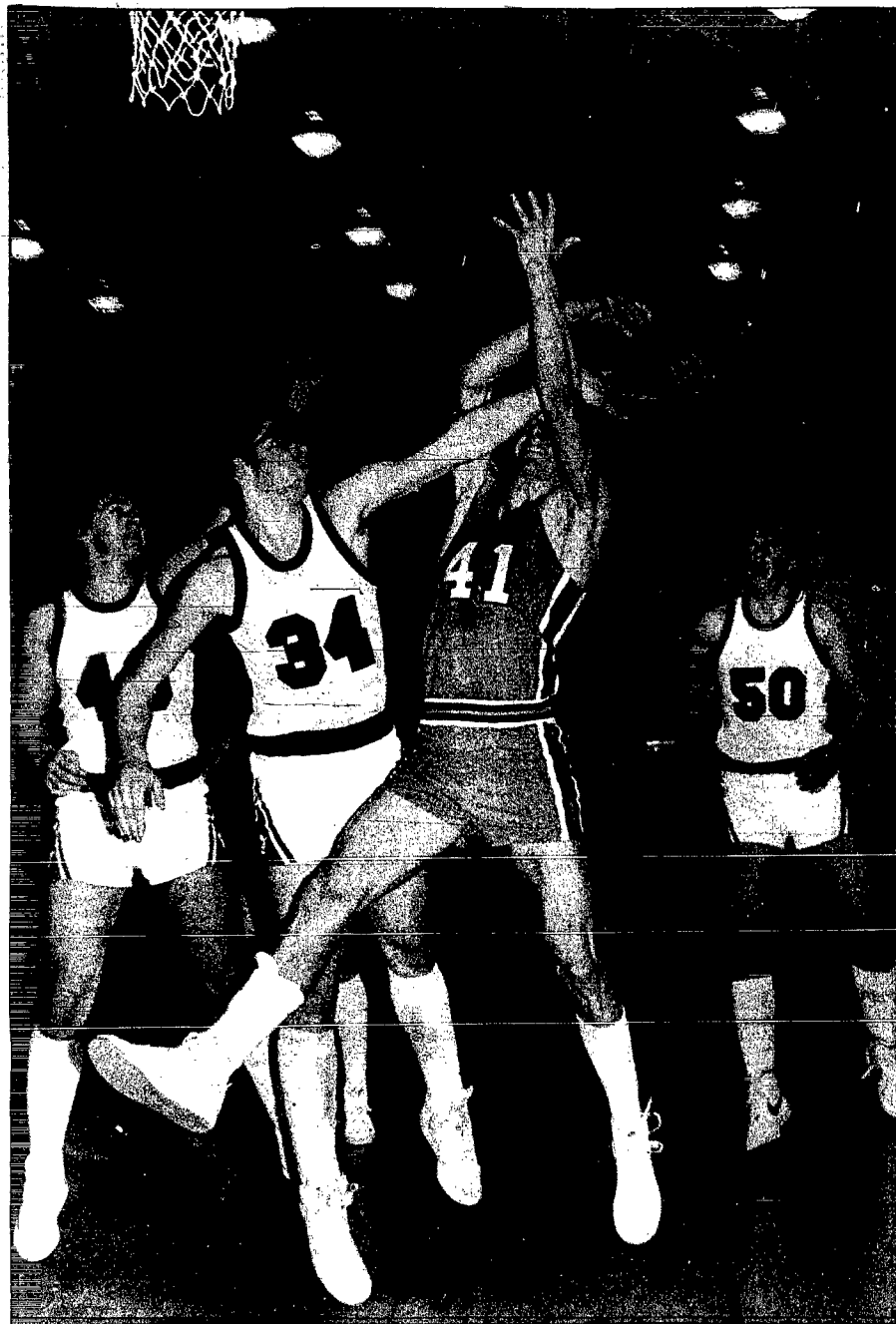

Wayne finally wins a close one for its first taste of victory

After losing one game by a single point and another in overtime, the Wayne Blue Devils finally won a close one.

The Devils downed Laurel 44-38 Tuesday night in the Wayne Carroll High School gym. Wayne hit some key free throws in the stretch and Laurel missed a couple as the hosts held off a late rally by the Bears.

Dave Marquardt's steal and free throw tied the game at 36-36 with 2:25 remaining in the low scoring contest. Laurel's Kelly Robson fouled out and Todd Schwartz gave Wayne its lead back by hitting the front end of a one and one.

SCHWARTZ MISSED the second free throw but Steve Overin grabbed the rebound and Schwartz was again fouled. Again, he hit the front end of the one-and-one for a 38-36 lead with 1:51 remaining.

Dave Marquardt, who had hit five of six free throws in the fourth quarter, missed the front end of a one-and-one and the Bears committed another foul. This time, Shaun Niemann connected on a pair of free throws giving the hosts a 40-36 lead.

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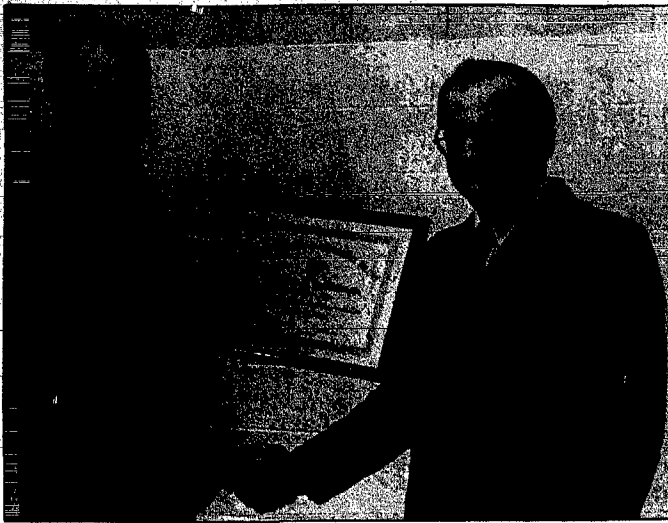

Police Issue November report

Over 50% of city arrests involve speeding

More than half the arrests and more than half the warnings handed by the Wayne Police Department in November involved motorists who were speeding.

According to police, 44 out of 83 total warnings issued in November were for speeding violations. And, 30 out of 58 arrests during the month were for speeding violations.

SPEEDING ARRESTS generated \$368 in fines for the month, with 10 cases remaining to be heard by the end of November.

Police issued 20 warnings for church-parking violations. Police action in those two categories totaled more than 75 percent of the warnings issued in November.

The third most frequent category involved four warnings for parking with motor vehicle's left side to curb.

Other warnings included parking too far from the curb (over 12 inches away), improper turns, traffic signal violations, blocking sidewalk, obstructing traffic, driving left of center, reckless driving, running stop sign and speed in excess of road conditions.

SEVEN ARRESTS were made during the month for invalid registration. The arrests generated \$65 in fines with two cases remaining on the court docket by the end of the month.

Four arrests were made for traffic signal violations for \$30 in fines and two cases remaining to be heard.

Police also handled three cases of invalid registration stickers, three cases of failure to dispose of parking tickets and three cases of minors in possession of alcoholic beverages.

In addition, police handled one case of a motorist refusing to take a breath test. The motorist was fined \$250.

The total of 58 arrests for the month, compared to 32 in November of last year, generated \$726 in fines.

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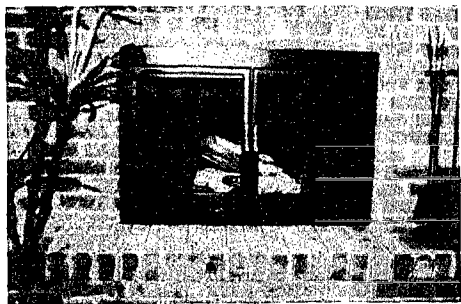

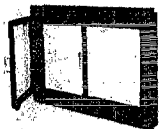

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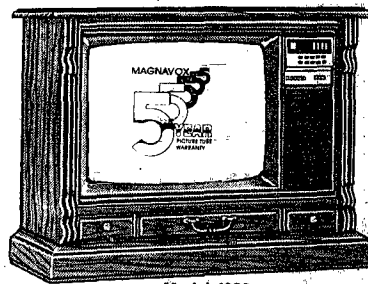

pointed village street commissioner.

Owen Hartmann, owner of Hartmann Crane Service, was appointed village light commissioner. Ralph "Jay" Morse was appointed sewer, water and refuse commissioner.

In addition to her chairman-pro-tem duties, Warnemunde was appointed village auditorium and parks commissioner.

THE DISCUSSION about an appointed board member serving as an elected chairman was initiated by Warnemunde.

She expressed a concern that the village get its new government "off on the right foot." The concern stems from a long-standing Nebraska League of Municipalities opinion that indicates only duly elected members of the board qualify for the chairmanship.

As a result of the discussion, board members agreed to recheck with the League on current policy and directed the clerk/treasurer to research the matter.

It was board consensus to allow Cherry's election to the chairmanship stand pending an opinion from the League.

HARTMANN, WHO openly supported the Cherry chairmanship, also agreed that the matter needed to be rechecked by the village.

"There's no use starting out on the wrong foot," Hartmann told the other board members shortly after Warnemunde expressed her concern that the board follow the law.

The League's opinion in the matter appears to be an interpretation of laws pertaining to village government.

Wyllie said the League's stand on policies can and do change. She said she would be contacting the League to see if it had aban-

doned or made exceptions to the opinion.

Brockmoller, who served as chairman from February to June, was an appointed member of the board. During the previous board's June reorganizational meeting, Bruce Wyllie, an elected member, was selected as chairman.

WYLLIE SERVED as chairman until he and three other board members, Floyd Burt, Dick Schmidt and Ray Jacobsen, resigned en masse on Nov. 2.

The resignations came during Cherry's first meeting as an appointed member of the board. Cherry replaced Brockmoller, who had resigned earlier.

There was no official challenge to Brockmoller's chairmanship on the basis of that League opinion.

Robert Ensz of Olds, Swarts and Ensz, Wayne, who served as legal counsel to the village, said that if the League opinion existed it certainly did not have the force of law.

ENSZ SAID "my horseback opinion" is that Cherry, as a member of the board, is entitled to serve in any capacity open to other board members.

At one point during the meeting, Hartmann expressed concern about the state interfering with the autonomy of local government.

Ensz said he was not aware of a state statute that would contain that kind of restriction on a bonafide member of a local board.

He acknowledged that even if the matter was addressed in a state statute, the restriction was certainly subject to legal challenge.

During the board meeting, the clerk was authorized to pay a number of village bills and process the payroll for employees.

BEFORE THE Monday night meeting, the Wayne County Clerk's Office had certified the results of the village's special election on Dec. 8, according to Gretta Morris, county clerk.

A canvassing board comprised of two disinterested county residents recouped the special election ballots, including absentee ballots at the Wayne County Courthouse.

According to Morris, official election results show Hartmann received 126 votes and Morse received 85 votes for the two short-term seats on the village board.

The short terms expire in June. Official results show Warnemunde, who is president of the Winside Women's Federated Club, received 102 votes and Wiff received 88 votes for the two long-term seats on the board.

The long terms expire in June of 1984.

WITH OVER A 40 percent voter turnout, the election results show 175 ballots cast out of 282 registered voters, according to Morris.

Losing candidates in the short-term races were Wayne Denkleu, Wayne County veterans service officer, with 70 votes, and Ronald Hansen, a part-time Wayne State College student and Salmon Well employee, with 47 votes.

Losing candidates in the long-term races were Leon Koch, owner/operator of Lee & Rosie's Bar, with 75 votes, and Veryl Jackson, a Winside school bus driver, with 72 votes.

Several write-in candidates appear on the ballots, but none received more than two votes.

IN OTHER ACTION Monday night, the board heard a review of the school's insurance by agent Dean Pierson.

The board voted to combine four property policies into one policy with liability coverage, resulting in a savings of \$3,044 to the district.

The new policy will include increased liability coverage from \$1 million to \$2 million.

THE BOARD also reviewed results of ninth grade achievement tests taken last September.

Test scores show that students in the Wayne School system tested considerably higher than the national average.

Using 50 as a national average base, test scores of Wayne students averaged 69 in reading, 77 in mathematics, 65 in language arts, 71 in reference materials, 67 in social studies, and 71 in science.

BOARD MEMBERS also were given results of a state department evaluation of the school's lunch program last November.

The report stated that menus prepared for Wayne students show "good variety, reflect students' preferences and meet meal pattern requirements."

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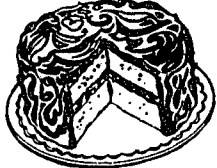

Motor vehicle inspection issue on the road again

Almost everybody seems willing to concede that statistics can be used to serve any purpose...

One recurring issue that always prompts the paper pushers to bring forth their "facts and figures" is motor vehicle inspections. The 1982 Legislature, which convenes January, is expected to tackle the issue. Already, motor vehicle inspections have been discussed (with and without statistics) at an interim legislative hearing.

SAFETY-MINDED officials believe the inspections keep hazardous vehicles off the road, thereby eliminating one element that could lead to accidents. And if we're to believe their statistics, accidents will decrease if there are regular safety inspections.

Then there are the middle-of-the-road folks who probably believe both sets of statistics and say they're not illogical. Sure, they might say, inspections could cut down on the number of accidents by taking off a fast turn. And yes, they'll add, it's very possible that the condition of the car has nothing to do with most fatal accidents, many of which are caused by speeding, drinking, careless driving and the like.

WITH THE 1982 legislative session just around the corner, it's time again to play the statistics game. Certain recurring issues are prime targets for the statistician.

During a recent hearing of the Legislature's Public Works Committee, the State Motor Vehicles Department produced statistics in support of an inspection program. The department's facts and figures would indicate inspections cut down on the number of traffic accidents.

On the other side are people like Sen. Merle Von Minden of Allen with statistics that they say lives are not saved by inspections. Opponents of the inspection program, of course, are in favor of saving lives and curbing accidents. But they don't think the inspection program is the answer.

SO WHAT'S the answer? A statistician can't tell you. Nor can the person who is driving a car in tip top shape and just had an accident, or the person who has never had a mishap with his mobilized junkyard.

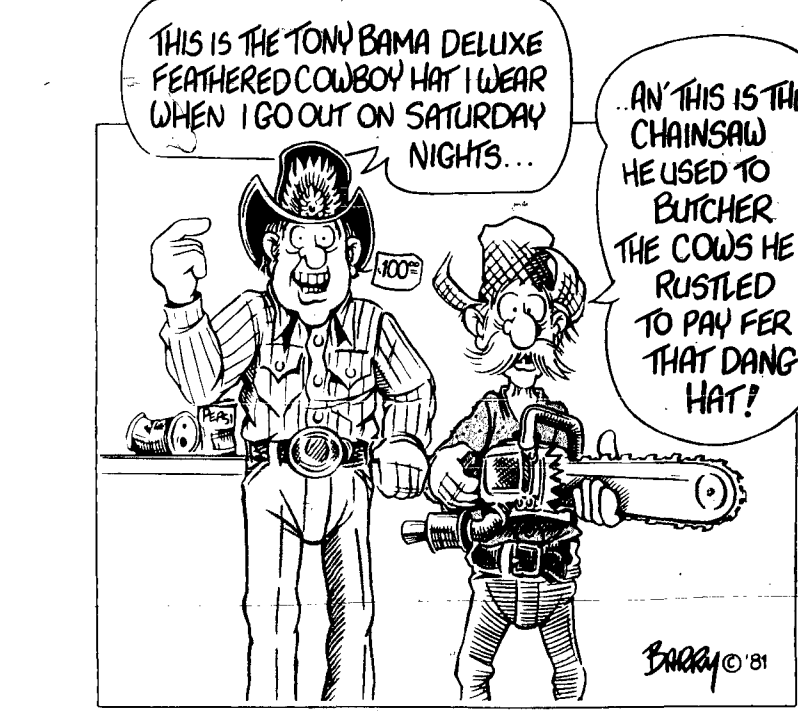
The committee is pressed right now by some tight financial projections. The Legislature during this fall's special session cut a large chunk out of the state budget, and the committee is trying to find ways to save even more.

With Thone and Warner behind a repeal proposal, and with the backing of the rest of the Appropriations Committee, the general exemption could very well find itself getting the ax in the 1982-83 budget.

Marketing instability forces fat cattle shift

Despite the fact that cattle on feed numbers in Nebraska are showing gains while those in the other 23 major cattle feeding states have been down substantially in recent months, there are many well equipped feedlot facilities in the state that are standing empty.

IT IS DANGEROUS of course to generalize, but relatively safe to say that the great numbers of cattle being fed to slaughter weights in Nebraska are today going to market in greater percentages from the large feedlots that range from 5,000 to 50,000 head capacities.

Jenkins elected to group

Doug Jenkins of Carroll has been elected to membership in the American Angus Association, reports Dick Spader, executive vice-president of the national organization with headquarters in St. Joseph, Mo.

The American Angus Association, with some 38,000 active life and junior members, is the largest beef cattle registry association in the world. Its computerized records include detailed information on nearly 10 million registered Angus.

The Association records ancestral information and keeps records of production on individual animals for its members. These permanent records help members select and mate the best animals in their herds to produce high quality, efficient-breeding cattle which are then recorded with the American Angus Association. Most of these registered Angus are used by the U.S. farmers and ranchers who raise high quality beef for U.S. consumption.

Mader is beef specialist

Terry L. Mader began work as beef specialist at the University of Nebraska Northeast Station on Dec. 1.

Mader will fill the position formerly held by Vernon Krause. According to Cal Ward, District Director, Mader is on a combination research and extension specialist appointment. Mader carries professional rank in the Animal Science Department of the University's Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources, but is assigned to the Northeast Station and to the Northeast Extension District.

Mader will continue research work in beef cattle nutrition and management at the Northeast Station. He will also work with the County Extension Agents on informal educational programs for cattle producers, beef cattle producer organizations, and other individuals and groups interested in beef cattle production.

Mader is married and has one son. The family is living in Wayne.

Livestock judging set

Eight vocational agriculture district livestock judging contests for high school students will be held in Nebraska, beginning Dec. 17 and continuing into early January.

Winners in the district contests qualify for competition in the state vocational agriculture judging contest to be held in April. It is anticipated that 900 individuals will be competing on 230 teams from different vocational agriculture departments in the district contest series.

The contests are co-sponsored by the departments of animal science and agricultural education in the University of Nebraska Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources. Contestants, competing at the junior and senior levels, will be required to visually appraise livestock, use production records available on animals and defend judging decisions by developing and delivering oral reasons. Participants must estimate the quality grade of a beef steer and market swine.

Eight district contests will be conducted at four sites. The schedule: Dec. 17 - UNL, East Campus judging pavilion, Lincoln; 19 - Fanner Park Grand Island; Jan. 4 - Howard Pitzer Ranch, Ericson; 6 - Keith County Fairgrounds, Ogallala.

Wisner has champion boar

McGuire Hampshires, Wisner, NB exhibited the reserve champion boar of the recent National Southeastern Hampshire Meat Hog Conference that was held in Statesboro, GA.

The McGuire boar, sired by Acujack, competed against sixty eight other boars for the reserve champion honors. The boar later sold at auction for \$3,500 to Zimmerman Hampshires, Versailles, Illinois.

Treasury to set CCC rates

Beginning Jan. 1, the interest rate on Commodity Credit Corporation loans will be set at the rate charged CCC by the U.S. Treasury Credit Corporation loans will be set at the rate charged CCC by the U.S. Treasury during the month that the loan is issued, according to Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block.

Loans disbursed since April 1, 1981, and which have interest rates subject to change, will have their interest rates adjusted Jan. 1. These loans, which currently have a 14.5 percent interest rate, will be adjusted to the interest rate charged CCC by the Treasury in January. Previously, CCC interest rates were set semi-annually on April 1 and Oct. 1.

The interest rate paid by CCC has declined from a peak of 16.75 percent in October to 13.625 percent this month. Farmers should benefit from this downward trend in interest rates, Block said.

Milk support price stays

The federal milk support price will remain at \$13.10 per hundred pounds for milk with a milkfat content of 3.67 percent—the national average—until the end of the year, as a result of legislation signed by President Reagan.

The same legislation also continues the support price of \$12.80 per hundred pounds for milk with a milkfat content of 3.5 percent.

This legislative action (Public Law 97-77) continues in force a similar law, signed Oct. 20, that rolled back the milk support price from \$13.49 to \$13.10. The \$13.49 figure was required under permanent legislation.

Forest shares given

More than \$220 million will be paid to 40 states and Puerto Rico as their shares of national forest receipts in fiscal year 1981, Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block said today.

An interim payment of \$171 million, based on estimated revenues, was paid Oct. 1, Block said. Checks with the final payment of \$59 million are being mailed today.

The State of Oregon will receive the largest payment in 1981—\$95.1 million. California will receive \$41 million and Washington, \$29.4 million. Nebraska will receive \$56,357.56.

\$10,000 Ak-Sar-Ben grant divided among groups

For the past 18 years, University of Nebraska College of Agriculture students have been able to test their classroom knowledge in regional and national competition, thanks in part to the Knights of Ak-Sar-Ben.

Ak-Sar-Ben has helped support the travel of collegiate judging teams at NU since 1953, said Ted Hartung, dean of the College of Agriculture. Since that time Ak-Sar-Ben has contributed a total of \$137,000.

Elvin Frolik, dean of the College of Agriculture at the time Ak-Sar-Ben first started the program, was instrumental in getting the program started, with an annual grant of \$1,500. As the number of students enrolled increased and as inflation continued, the amount awarded was increased, Hartung said. The grant for 1981-82 is \$10,000.

The Ak-Sar-Ben grant is given to the NU Foundation, and then is assigned to the College of Agriculture. The money is divided among the Departments of

Animal Science, Agronomy, and Forestry, Fisheries and Wildlife. The Department of Animal Science will spend most of its \$7,100 share this year on the meats and livestock judging teams, Dr. Dwight Loveday, NU extension meats specialist and meats judging coach, said 160 students have been involved in the senior meat judging teams since 1953. The International Colingate Meats Judging Contest is their main contest each year.

R. B. Warren, NU professor of animal science and livestock judging team coach, said 348 students have been involved in junior and senior livestock judging teams since 1953. The Department of Agronomy is dividing its \$2,500 share this year among the weeds, soils and range plant identification teams. The weeds judging team, coached by NU professors of agronomy Alex Martin and Orvin Burnside, placed second at the North Central Weed Science Con-

test this summer, in its first year of competition.

The soils judging team has been active since 1962. According to Dave Lewis, NU professor of agronomy and team coach, 124 students have been involved in soils judging over the years.

The current school year is the second for the range plant identification team. NU placed 12th last year at the International Society for Range Management contest in which team members

must be able to identify 200 range plants.

The Department of Forestry, Fisheries and Wildlife will use its \$400 share of the money to help support travel of Wildlife Club members to a yearly quiz bowl, held in conjunction with seven or eight other states.

Without Ak-Sar-Ben funding, many of the teams would not have been able to travel or compete in any of the various contests, Hartung said.

Pesticide applicators required to renew their certification before expiration date

Pesticide applicators whose federal certification expires in 1982 must renew their certification before the expiration date in order to continue use of restricted pesticides.

The renewal requirement applies to the blue federally issued card, not the green state-issued card, according to Emery Nelson, University of Nebraska extension specialist-pesticide training. About 1,750 Nebraskans certified in the categories of agricultural, right-of-way and demarcation and research are affected.

The easiest way to renew is to attend one of the 14 Crop Protection Clinics to be held at various locations in the state during January, Nelson said. The clinics are approved by the Environmental Protection Agency for recertification requirements. They are conducted by the Nebraska Cooperative Extension Service.

To be recertified at the clinics, participants need to arrive by 8:30 a.m. to obtain materials from an EPA representative, Nelson said. Training information for the right of way category will be completed by 2 p.m. while ag plant and demonstration and research information will be completed by 4 p.m.

Applicators who do not want to attend the training provided at the clinics may instead take an EPA approved examination for their category, Nelson said. The exams will be available at the clinic sites at 10 a.m. the day of the training. Applicators selected for this alternative must earn a score of 70 on the exam to renew their certification, Nelson emphasized.

Each of the area clinics will highlight control of plant diseases, insects and weeds prevalent in that area, Nelson said. However, several topics will be common to all of the meetings, including symptoms of pesticide poisoning, implications of the 1981 Hazardous Waste Law, safe use of pesticides, calibration, and new pests and pesticides.

Nelson emphasized that the recertification training is only for current holders of pesticide certification. Initial training for individuals wanting to acquire certification for the first time will be held in March, he said.

ASC county and community committees are in charge of local administration of such national farm programs as Feed Grain and Wheat Programs, ACP Programs and Commodity and Storage Structure Loan Programs. Last year, he pointed out, more than 1,200 farmers, about 80 percent of all farmers in the county, took part in one or more of the programs administered by the ASC committees.
