

ASK A LAWYER

A Before a divorce is granted in Nebraska, the judge must be convinced that all reasonable efforts have been made toward reconciliation.

This rule is generally construed to mean that one or both of the parties must consult with a third party who has some special expertise in dealing with marital problems. However, this does not necessarily mean that you and your husband will be forced to go to a marriage counsalor. If you and he have genulnely tried to resolve your differences. If you have previously discussed your situation with a minister or counselor, and if neither one of you believes that counseling could help keep your marriage together, you may not be required to go through any further proceedings.

On the other hand, if you have made no attempt to reconcille your differences you may need to go through Conciliation Court or to a social service agency or private counselor to explore the possibility of reconciliation.

## Lesher answers Broder on business investment

One of the most entertaining figures on
the American scene today is author and
liberal gadfly Gore Vidal. The problem is
that now Mr. Vidal is seeking the
Democratic nomination for Senator from
California and asks that we take him and his
ideas seriously.
In a recent Interview on National Public
Radio's "Ali Things Considered," Mr. Vidal
revealed vividly the level of his knowledge
about our tax system and its effect on
business. "People do not like the fact," he
said, "that the corporations, since Reagan
is in. now pay no tax at all. No tax at all. No
tax at all. The top 400 in Fortune magazine
pay no tax at all. This is astionishing."

NOT ONLY ASTONISHING, Gore, but completely false. Yet, I have the impression that Mr. Vidal is not along in his belief that the corporale income tax was all but done away with last year when Congress passed President Reagan's Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981.

As Mark Twain might have said were he alive and heading a major American coporation today, the reports of the death of the corporate income fax have been greatly exaggerated. Yes, corporate tax receipts are expected to dip from \$41 billion in fiscal 1981 to \$47 billion this year, but this is due as much to the recession as the Reagan tax cut package. By next year, however, they are projected to climbr pajolity to \$85 billion. to \$84 billion in 1984 and \$88 billion in 1985.

Moreover, while every other revenue source for the government will remain steady or decline as a share of total fax receifts, the corporate share will rise from 7.5 percent this year to 11.6 percent in 1984. And whereas individual income tax rates will be indexed for inflation beginning in 1985, no such provision has been made for corporate tax rates. All told, the estimated \$431.4 billion in tax relief provided by the President's economic \_recovery program between fiscal years 1982 and 1985 will be divided as follows: Individual taxpayers will get \$354.3 billion and corporations \$77.1 billion.

YET, THERE is a broader issue to be ad-

circulated by Mr. Vidal and Ilke-minded critics. In the final analysis all corporate income taxes are paid by Individuals—either consumers, employees, shareholders or pensioners. The corporation acts only as a kind of surrogate tax collector for the government. When the corporate income tax is increased, that hike can be passed on to consumers in the form of higher prices. Workers might pay in the form of lower wage and benefit increases, fewer hours and even layoffs. Shareholders could suffer from lower dividend payments and stock prices. Retrees can lose in all three ways, facing higher prices, in the stores, smaller pension fund contributions by the companies and lower return on stocks, whether they own them directly or through their pension fund. The point is that there is no

they own them directly or through their pension fund. The point is that there is no "secret" stush fund from which corporations campay income taxes.

The corporate income tax not only survives—It thrives. But if you're consumer, employee, shareholder and retiree—and I have yet to meet an American who doesn't lit at least one of fhose descriptions—then this news is certainly nothing to cheer about.

David Broder, the nationally syndicated columnist, usually leads the pack, rather than follows it, which is why I was surprised to see him sing-the-familiar "Where are the new factories?" refrain to the business community in a recent column.

Mr. Broder suggested that I am begging the question by claiming that the President's economic program has not been given sufficient time to work. The falain fact is that we have not yet had supply side economics under the current administration.



THOSE WISHING to par-licipate should register with the Extension Office by Saturday, May 15.


