Up, up and away

300 balloons proclaim Chicken Days in Wayne

The Wayne Regional Arts Council this year is using more than 300 balloons to promote its second annual Chicken Show.

This balloons will be released this Thursday evening at 8:15 in downtown Wayne to travel throughout the country with messages proclaiming July 10 at Chicken Days in Wayne.

Jane O'Leary, a spokesman for the Arts Council, said residents may purchase a balloon for \$1. The balloon will have a message inside telling the owner's name. The message also will ask for the finder's name and address, the date the balloon was found, and where and how it was found.

MRS. O'LEARY said the owner of each balloon released will be eligible for a prize of 100 chicken bucks if his or her balloon travels the furthest distance. The chicken bucks will be redeemable in participating chicken buck stores in Wayne.

The person finding the balloon that traveled the greatest distance from Wayne will win a "chicken shirt" and another special prize.

In addition, if the finder returns the balloon and completed entry form in person to The Wayne Herald office by July 10, they will receive five chicken bucks.

BALLOONS MAY be purchased in advance or on Thursday night before they are released.

Persons who would like to purchase a balloon in advance are asked to contact Arts Council Board members Jane O'Leary, Pearl Hansen, Gail Korn, Karen Mendenhall or Mike Carney.

"We think it's going to be a lot of fun," said Mrs. O'Leary, adding that last year's Chicken Show received exceptional national media coverage and will be an even bigger event this year.

Mrs. O'Leary said the Chicken Show is a "chicken celebration" of chicken jokes, chicken puns, chicken songs, chicken games, chicken arts and crafts, chicken this and chicken that.

Rain date for releasing the balloons will be the following Thursday evening, May 20.

The greatest love

Wayne mom proud of her family

For Bill and Sharon Corbit of Wayne, raising a family depends on treating each family member equally.

This is especially important to them and their four children, Tim, 17, Kecia, 13, Kalli, 8, and Heath, 7, because both Kalli and Heath are affected by Down's Syndrome, a birth defect which slows and eventually stops normal brain growth.

"The big trick is to keep an even balance," Sharon said. "You can't continue to dwell on the handicapped children in the family. They are just two of the children in the family, and the normal children are just as important. It's a mistake that some parents of handicapped children make, and the consequences can be devastating."

THE CORBITS learned of Kalli's condition about eight weeks after her birth, although Sharon feels that the doctor was aware of the condition from the beginning but wanted to wait before telling her. "I had just lost my mother to a massive coronary on Mother's Day. I'm really grateful that the doctor waited."

The initial reaction was "quite a blow to the family." "It was something that happened to someone else. I had worked with the March of Dimes in the past, had two normal healthy children and had been helping other parents. It always happens to someone else."

Sharon added, "I thought of all the things she would never do, silly things like attending prom, dating... little things that you assume they will do."

"Then I realized that God didn't give a guarantee that any child would live a beautiful life, and I shouldn't be worried about something so distant."

KALI SEEMED to pick up the unhappy vibrations from her mother, and soon Sharon noticed that Kalli had quit smiling. "If I would smile, she would smile too."

When Kalli was about 2 1/2, the family began considering the adoption of another child, a Down's Syndrome baby. "It was a family adoption, something that each member of the family had a part in," Sharon said. They were thinking about a little boy, to balance out the family.

In the beginning, they went to a private adoption agency, but were referred to the Welfare office. "Retarded children are usually placed on the Welfare roll due to the fact that it is likely they will not be placed as fast as other children, and will go into foster homes."

They then called the Region IV office in Norfolk to learn the procedure for placing their names on an adoption waiting list. "We were told it was impossible... because we had children already." When they explained to the office that they were interested in a Down's Syndrome baby, the situation changed, and they were assigned a caseworker.

"We waited two years... and had given up," said Sharon, who had gotten a part-time job which later evolved into a full-time one.

"We got the call... they had found a little girl for us."

The "they" Sharon refers to is a national adoption agency which specializes in placing special needs children across the nation.

THE FAMILY received a newsletter-type mailing which included a picture of the little girl, but in looking at the paper they happened to notice the picture of Heath, just above that of the little girl. "It was love at first sight," Heath, who is originally from Alabama, joined the Corbit family about three years ago, at the age of four.

According to Sharon, Kalli and Heath are more than just brother and sister—"they are friends." When Down's Syndrome children are small, they are able to play with children of their own age, but as they get older, they can't do the same things, and their social activity ceases. Kalli and Heath provide companionship for each other.

The Down's Syndrome that Kalli and Heath are affected by is called "Trisomy 21," in which there is an extra chromosome in the 21st pair of chromosomes in their bodies. It is not an inherited type, rather it is one "that just happens," Sharon said. Some people had suggested placing Kalli in a home when she was born, but it was something that the family never considered doing.

situation as being unique. Husband Bill farms and raises livestock on the family farm three miles east of Wayne, while Sharon works at the Educational Service Unit in Wakefield.

Tim is active in the football and basketball programs at Wayne High, lifts weights and helps his father farm. Kecia is a member of the junior high band and stage band, swing choir, track and basketball teams and plays softball.

Kalli and Heath both attend classes in the Trainable Mentally Retarded (TMR) room at the Wayne Middle school. They each have their favorite television shows, "and can usually tell you the show title just from hearing the music," Sharon said.

All are members of the First United Methodist Church in Wayne, where Tim is a member of the "Methodist Mistrels," a singing group which his mother helps sponsor, and Kecia is a member of the Bell Choir.

"We (Bill and I) are so proud of Tim and Kecia; they are such a help and we couldn't have done it without them. There is no embarrassment," Sharon said. "Kalli and Heath are just a sister and brother to them."

"THE GREATEST LOVE that our family could show Kalli and Heath is not to baby them, to make them independent. They are happier. A lot of parents, out of guilt, try to

Hotly contested races highlight Tuesday's primary

The residents of Wayne County will be asked for their opinions in the primary election tomorrow (Tuesday). Voting polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. and local, state and national candidates will be on the ballots.

One of the key races in Wayne is the race for mayor. Incumbent Wayne Marsh will face challengers Keith Mosley and Gary Vopalensky. Voters will be asked to vote for one candidate and the top two vote getters will advance to November's general election.

TEN CANDIDATES are seeking seats on the School District 17-Board of Education (Wayne-Carroll). Voters can make a maximum of three choices with the top six vote getters qualifying for November's general election.

Running for the Board of Education are Robert Boeckenhauer, Arnold Emmy, Darrell Moore, Milton Owens, Cap Peterson, Joyce Reep, Alice Rohde, Carole Schmidt, Carol Singer and Warren Tiedke.

Other non-political elections include director of Nebraska Public Power District, representative of the University of Nebraska Third District, county superintendent, Noxious Weed Board, Board of Governors for Northeast Nebraska Community College Area First District and a proposed amendment to the Constitution.

Orville Bahr is the only individual running for the Board of Governors position in the

NPPD race, Wayne Boyd, Bernard Burton, Gary Halsedel and William Reents are running. Running for the Regent position are J.D. Schmeiyer, Don Dwarak, Margaret Robinson and Judy Larsen.

Mike Karel and Herman Opfer are running for the Noxious Weed Board and voters can vote for two. No one is listed as candidate for county superintendent.

THE PROPOSED amendment would provide that members of the Legislature receive a salary of not more than one-third of the governor's salary. A vote for the proposal will repeal the present provision fixing the salary of members of the Legislature at not to exceed \$400 per month, and substitute therefor for a provision that their salary shall be fixed by statute but in an amount not more than one-third the salary of the governor at the time such amount is set.

A vote against the proposal will retain the present provision fixing the salary of members in the Legislature at not to exceed \$400 per month.

The villages of Hoskins, Winside, Carroll and Sholes will hold village elections. Winning candidates will take over the offices rather than advance to November's general election.

In Hoskins, John Scheurich, Kenneth Elkins and James Miller are running. Voters may choose three individuals.

In Winside, Jay Morse, Marvin Cherry, Owen Harigmann, Robert Thies and Bill Anderson will seek seats on the village

board. Voters may cast votes for three candidates.

In Carroll, Gary Bratton and Ed Simpson are running with voters casting votes for two individuals. In Sholes, residents may vote for two among John Hansen, Don Bauer and Dwayne Schutt.

IN POLITICAL RACES, county, state and national seats are up for election.

At the county level, Republicans Todd Bornhoff and John Addison will vie for county attorney. Robert Enz is uncontested on the Democratic ticket. County sheriff candidates are Republican LeRoy Janssen and Democrat William Watson.

Uncontested Republicans are Orretta Morris for county clerk, JoAnn Ostrander for clerk of the District Court, Leon Meyer for county treasurer, Clyde Flowers for county surveyor, Doris Elip for county assessor and Martin Betermann for county commissioner First District.

No Democrats are running for any of those positions.

In the county commissioner Third District race, Floyd Burt is running against Jerry Popshish.

Senator Edward Zorinsky is uncontested in the Democratic race for U.S. senator. In the Republican race, Jim Keck and Ken Cameron are running.

Incumbent Doug Bereuter is uncontested in the Republican party race for represent-

tative in Congress, First District. On the Democratic side, Martin Pals, Lawrence Sather and Curt Donaldson will compete.

The governor's race is hotly contested with Gov. Charles Thone being challenged by Stan DeBoer and Barton Chandler in the Republican race. The Democrats have George Burrows running against Bob Kerrey.

Democrats for lieutenant governor are Don McGintley and Edward Conrad. Incumbent Roland Luedtke is challenged by Howard Lamb and Ken Smith in the Republican Party.

REPUBLICAN SECRETARY of State Allen Beermann is uncontested in his bid for re-election and no Democrats are running.

Four Republicans, Kay Orr, Shirley Marsh, Kurt Rasmussen and Wayne Swanson, are seeking the state treasurer position. The lone Democrat on the ballot is Orval Keyes. For auditor of public accounts, Darl Neumann is running in the Democratic party, and Republicans are Ray Johnson and Chuck Patterson.

Republican Paul Douglas is the only individual running for attorney general on either party ticket. For public service commissioner of the Third District, James Elby Packman is uncontested as a Democrat. Republican candidates are Duane Gay, Gayle Gowing and Royal Lyon.

POLLING PLACES for Wayne County voters: First Ward at Villa Wayne, Second Ward at National Guard Armory, Third Ward at Methodist Fellowship Hall, Fourth Ward at city auditorium, Brenna at School District No. 37, Strahan at School District No. 51, Hunter at School District No. 47, Hoskins Precinct and Village at Hoskins Fire Hall, Garfield at School District No. 37, Sherman Precinct and Sholes at School District No. 76, Hancock at Winside Auditorium, Chapin at Winside Legion Hall,

Sunriseview sub-division is not within the corporate limits of the city. Residents are in the Hunter precinct and will vote at School District 47, five miles east and one mile south of Wayne. Berry and Terrace Hills on Wayne State campus are in the Third Ward.

Voting questions answered

Although voting is not a complicated process, several questions arise each election year concerning the proper procedure of voting.

In the primary election, registered Republicans can vote on every ballot except Democratic ballots. Likewise, registered Democrats can vote for every ballot except Republican ballots. Registered Independents can vote only on non-political ballots.

Voters can take all ballots available to them and vote only for specific races. For example, a voter can choose to vote

only in the mayoral race and leave all other ballots blank.

Instructions which say "vote for three" do not require a voter to vote for three individuals. That voter may cast a vote for one, two or three individuals or leave the ballot blank. However, if a voter is instructed to "vote for one" that individual can vote only for one candidate or the ballot will be thrown out.

The write-in process allows a voter to write in the name of any individual not listed on the ballot. Lines are left on the ballots for this purpose.

Households included in survey

A sample of households in this area will be visited by the Bureau of the Census interviewers during the work week of May 17-22, 1982, to conduct the Bureau's monthly survey of employment and unemployment, William F. Adams, director of the Bureau's regional office in Denver, announced.

Households in this area are part of a sample of 71,000 across the country scientifically selected to represent a cross section of all U.S. households.

The monthly survey is conducted for the U.S. Department of Labor and provides a continuous record of activity in the labor force. The March survey indicated that of the 109.3 million men and women in the civilian labor force, 99.5 million were employed. The Nation's unemployment rate rose from 8.8 to 9.0 percent, equaling the rate of May 1975.

Information supplied by individuals participating in the survey is kept strictly confidential by law and the results are used only to compile statistical totals.

Public TV auction raises 1/4 million

The nine night public television Auction '82 which began Friday (April 23) ended at 1 a.m. Sunday morning (May 2) with a total of \$251,851 in bids and cash donations, topping last year's total of \$213,663.

The Auction, now in its tenth year, is conducted by volunteers and members of Nebraskans for Public Television, Inc. (NPTV) and is broadcast on the Nebraska ETV Network. Auction proceeds are used in support of public television in Nebraska.

NPTV is a non-profit citizen support organization with more than 27,500 members whose major fund raising project involved Auction '82 and three Festival membership pledge drives.

Auction bids were received from Iowa, South Dakota, Colorado, Wyoming and Kansas as well as Nebraska according to Auction week co-chairmen Sharon Keith and Gay Lacey of Lincoln. Of 92 major items offered for bid, a fill planter donated by Felscher Manufacturing of Columbus, Nebraska, attracted the highest auction bid of \$4,900, according to the co-chairmen.

The Wayne Kiwanis Club collected donations for the auction and Alan Cramer of Wayne was an auctioneer.

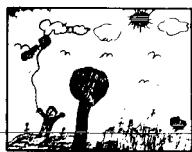

Lamb challenges Luedtke

Claiming that a "harmonious relationship does not exist" between Governor Charles and Lt. Governor Roland Luedtke, state senator Howard Lamb of Anselmo, and a candidate for the Republican nomination for Lt. governor, campaigned in Wayne last week.

Lamb, is a rancher and farmer. As Lt. governor he says he would "be active in identifying and searching for solutions to Nebraska's economic problems". He is a graduate of the University of Nebraska with a degree in agricultural engineering; and served in World War II as a navy ensign.

He was elected to the Nebraska legislature in 1976 and again in 1980, and serves as chairman of the legislature's executive board, and is a member of the education and public works committee.

Both Lamb children, sons Phillip and David are University of Nebraska graduates.

If elected Lt. governor, Lamb says he will "concentrate my efforts on improving the economic health of the state."

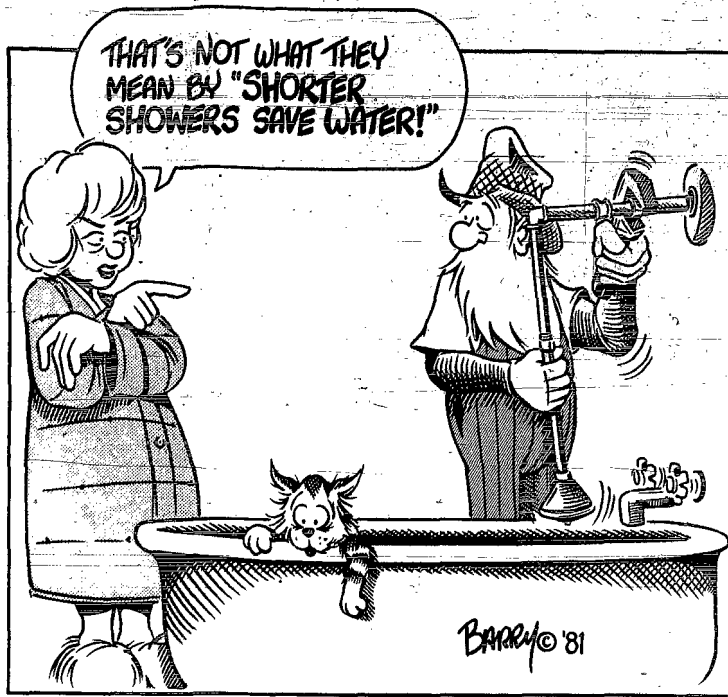

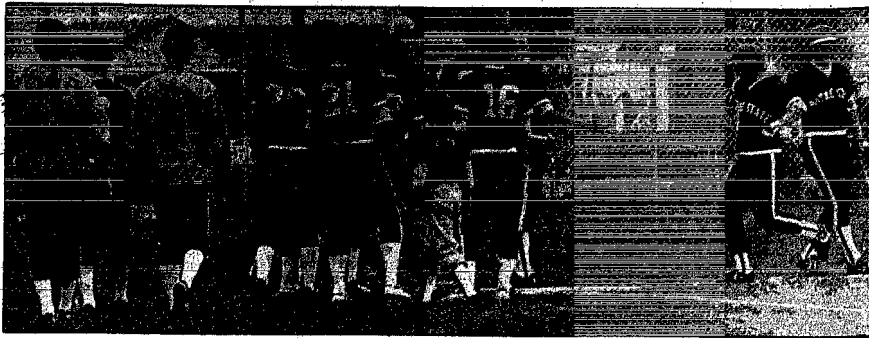

WAYNE STATE was nearly as close to defeat in the first game. The teams exchanged runs in the early innings and

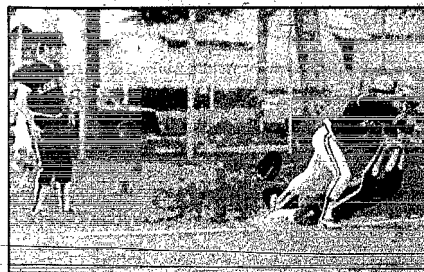
Chadron led 6-4 after four innings.

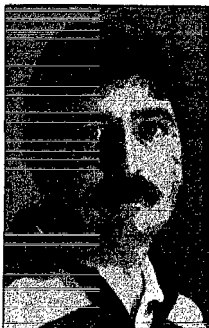
has been carefully selected to fit with our priorities. We are eager to get underway with plans for 1982-83."

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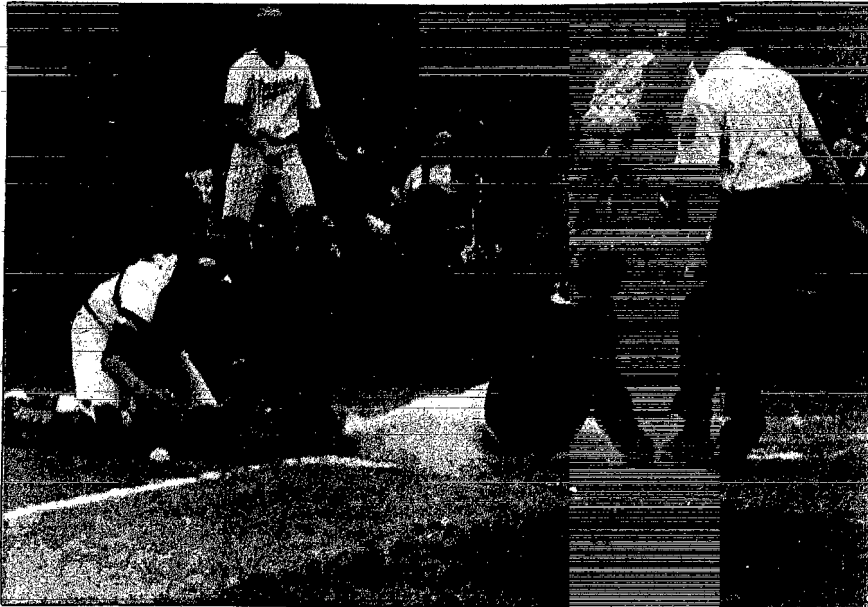

State tourney is goal

Trojans wrap up the title in NE Baseball League

With district action opening tomorrow (Tuesday), the Wakefield Trojans have good reason to cautiously sense a possible berth in the state baseball tournament.

The Trojans picked up a pair of victories 11-0 and 8-4 over Wayne Friday afternoon to clinch the Northeast Nebraska League championship. With a 9-2 record and top seed in districts, Wakefield has a good shot at a state qualification.

TO WIN DISTRICTS the tournament hosts will have to defeat the winner of a game between Laurel and Bancroft and then defeat the winner between Wayne and Omaha South. The district champion automatically qualifies for state.

However, the Trojans' hopes would remain alive even with a loss in districts. The six district champions and two wildcard teams all qualify for state. With nine or ten wins and only three

losses, Wakefield should have one of the best records in the state. It took a solid performance for the Trojans to sweep the Blue Devils Friday at the Wayne State College field. The league champions cracked 11 base hits and put together two explosive innings to win by the 10 run rule.

Wakefield scored four runs in the third inning and seven in the fifth. Pitcher Mark Starzl struck out nine batters while firing a three hit shutout over the five inning contest.

IN THE THIRD inning Troy Greve singled to lead off. Mark Kubik was safe on a leader's choice and Jeff Coble singled. Then Brian Soderberg blasted a triple to bring home two runs. Starzl and Mike Clay clubbed back to back singles and a Troy error led to another run.

The triple of Brian's opened the flood gates. We were reserved at the plate but that triple gave us a cushion, said Wakefield coach Joe Coble. We were able to take a few pitches and do more running.

In the fifth inning the Trojans pushed their lead over the 10 run mark. Clay singled, Kent Roberts walked and Keith Roberts singled. Bases on balls drawn by Troy Greve and Mark Kubik kept the drive going and Coble socked another hit.

Starzl singled in Wakefield's 10th run and Clay added insurance with a double down the left field line for his second hit in the inning.

LEADING BATTERS for the winners were Clay (3-4), Starzl (2-4) and Coble (2-4). Wayne's only three hits were collected by Steve Overin, Todd Pfeiffer and Todd Schwartz. Overin's hit was a triple.

Wayne's first baseman Tim Heier was ejected from the game for throwing a bat. Pfeiffer suffered the loss on the mound. Wayne is scheduled to play Omaha South at 2 p.m. Thursday and Bancroft and Laurel meet at 4 p.m. Tuesday. The winner of the late game will play Wakefield at 4 p.m. Thursday.

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

State Treasurer makes campaign stop in Wayne

State Treasurer Kay Orr said last week in Wayne she is a fiscal conservative.

"And I practice what I preach," said Mrs. Orr, who was in Wayne on Monday and Tuesday as part of her campaign swing through northeast Nebraska.

Mrs. Orr, a Republican, faces three opponents in her re-election bid for the office of State Treasurer.

MRS. ORR was a guest along with Governor Charles Thone at the Kiwanis Club's annual Scholastic Achievement Banquet on Monday night.

On Tuesday morning she visited several county and government offices, and met with residents during a stroll through downtown Wayne.

"The question is not whether I can do the job or not," said Mrs. Orr. "I am doing it."

MRS. ORR was appointed State Treasurer in June of 1981 by Governor Thone.

Prior to her appointment, she ran the governor's campaign in 1978.

Mrs. Orr said her accomplishments during the time she has served as State Treasurer include saving a half million dollars by getting the six major banks to reduce the amount of money left in non-interest bearing accounts as com-

— "The money freed from these non-interest accounts has then been invested until needed to be paid out to meet State claims," said Mrs. Orr.

AS STATE Treasurer, she also has returned about \$335,000 to the State General Fund from warrants written by the State that had not been cashed after two years or more.

She also has "arranged" for Omaha liquor, wine and beer wholesalers to deposit their fee and tax payments directly to the State Treasurer accounts in Omaha, reducing security premiums for the wholesalers and the State Labor Control Commission.

Mrs. Orr said the extra interest earned by getting this money a couple of days earlier will earn close to \$30,000 yearly for the State.

MRS. ORR also has directed more than 40 depository banks to send in money daily if it exceeds the amount needed to compensate them for handling State business.

Previously the banks were required to send in such money only once a week. This change, she said, will save the State \$40,000 a year.

Mrs. Orr said during the last

seven months of 1981, her costs for administering the State unclaimed property law were 16 percent less than the same months the year before.

She also has reduced the travel budget for the current year of the State Treasurer's Office by 40 percent compared to the previous year.

A WIFE AND mother of two grown children, Mrs. Orr is a member of the Lincoln Junior Women's Club, first vice president of the Lincoln Hospital Auxiliary and member of the hospital's Planning Committee.

She also is a member of the City of Lincoln's Goals and Policy Committee, secretary of the Citizen's Advisory Committee, and a member of the Governance Task Force.

IF MRS. ORR is elected State Treasurer it will be the first time a woman has been elected to a constitutional office.

Constitutional offices are those of Governor, Lieutenant Governor, State Treasurer, State Auditor, Secretary of State, and Attorney General.

There are two parts to my office as State Treasurer," said Mrs. Orr.

In addition to running the office, it's important to communicate to the people of this state what I have done in office."
