Local farmer turns pork exporter

Sorenson was one of only nine producers in the state sending pigs to Peking. One of the requirements stated that the pigs must have been farrowed in February.

Because the Flying Tiger airplane, which will ship the pigs, holds a limited amount of weight, the Chinese wanted between 450 and 500 pigs which average approximately 100 pounds. Ten tons of specially formulated, high protein feed also was sent along on that plane. Excess weight would have meant the elimination of some pigs or feed.

OF THE 463 PIGS purchased by the Chinese, 200 are Hampshires and 263 are Durocs. A total of 350 are gilts and the other 113 are boars. Sorenson was one of about 20 Duroc breeders contacted about the deal.

Selection of the pigs was complicated. Nine tests and several other requirements had to be passed. The animals were checked for brucellosis, pseudorabies, rhinitis, pneumonia, tuberculosis and several other diseases.

Testing has been conducted since March. The pigs must be free of external parasites, such as lice and mange, and internal parasites. Dr. Walter Chace, a Laurel veterinarian, did the blood tests and a SPF coordinator helped with the other tests. After the initial tests were run and passed, each pig had to be inspected for any physical problems. Because three forms of identification were needed on each hog, both ears were tagged and one was notched.

It may be stretching things a little too far to say that Dick Sorenson may play a role in the future of China's number one meat.

However, the Wayne pig producer is one of nine Nebraskans helping China improve the health and genetics of its hogs. On Saturday, 25 of Sorenson's disease-free pigs were among 463 being shipped to the highly populated country.

This is only the third plane-load of hogs ever to be flown from the United States to China. The Chinese plan to crossbreed the American and Chinese hogs to improve on health and rate of gain. Sorenson said it is his understanding that in China many hogs are inbred.

Pork is China's number one meat but Sorenson said the quality "leaves a lot to be desired." The quality can be improved pretty easily by crossbreeding, he said.

THE CHINA-NEBRASKA hog deal originated on Governor Charlie Thone's trip to mainland China last summer to help promote agriculture. Thone learned that China was interested in buying clean, healthy hogs.

The state of Nebraska made initial contact last fall and the Nebraska Specific Pathogen Free (SPF) Association handled the agreement. In January, a delegation of seven Chinese came to Nebraska to set up details on the deal.

Three of the Chinese stayed in Nebraska the past five months and flew back with the hogs Saturday.

SORENSEN SAYS the Chinese were really fussy and rejected all pigs that didn't meet all the requirements. "I thought I was fussy," he said.

The three Chinese diplomats who have been in Nebraska since January hand-picked their hogs and eliminated anything that didn't meet their high standards. "They inspected each pig with a fine tooth comb," said Sorenson.

Perhaps one reason that the Chinese were so particular is the fact that they bought a load of hogs several years ago that weren't disease free. They ran into serious health problems that time.

The sale is a joint venture between the Chinese government and its import export organization. Much red tape is involved and several federal and state forms must be filled out according to Sorenson.

The Chinese government will send payment for the pigs and testing to the Nebraska SPF Association. China also must pay transportation cost which is about half the cost of the hogs.

FIVE OF THE nine Nebraskans selling pigs to China are Duroc farmers, Sorenson said. Those five had to come up with at least 10 different blood lines. All of their pigs are registered through the Duroc Association.

The selection process was extremely time consuming and federal standards were strict. Government regulations asked pig producers 17 points to insure only top quality pigs.

- Some of the government's questions
- Is the export security facility isolated by at least 100 feet?
- Are pens, alleys and chutes made of an impervious material and skid resistant?
- Is there a minimum of four square feet per 50 pound hog?
- Is there a squeeze chute or similar restraining device?
- Is there a crowding pen for inspection and identification?
- Is there a roof over at least three-fourths of the pens and alleys?
- Is there a separate hospital ward for the pigs?
- Do you keep a supply of disinfectant on hand?
- Are arrangements made for personnel to change clothes?
- Is there adequate draining?
- Is there artificial lighting with not less than 70 foot candle power?

EACH NEBRASKA pig producer involved in the sale was required to take his hogs to Lincoln Saturday. The pigs were then grouped at the Nebraska State Fairgrounds.

Superintendent reviews local works projects

With May 23-29 declared as public works week by a Governor Charles Thone for Nebraska and by Mayor Wayne Marsh for Wayne, Vern Schulz, Wayne's superintendent of public works said he is really proud of the work his crews do.

"When I go to conferences or meetings attended by people from other cities, Wayne at times is really the envy of other communities," Schulz said. "With fewer public works employees than other cities our size, we can do more jobs, quicker than many cities seem to be able to accomplish."

Schulz said part of the reason for this is the type of people who are hired.

"WHAT I TRY to do is choose people who are good in one area, say a mechanic. We then train people to back that person up in case of sickness or vacation. At the same time, that person is being trained to act as back up in other areas," Schulz explained.

What in effect happens then is that each member of the crew can handle most of the public works jobs, is familiar with all and in some cases is responsible for one special area as well.

"This system seems to work very well for us," Schulz said. "Of course we have to make sure we hire people who enjoy a varied work schedule and not just working with one project."

THE BUDGET FOR the public works department is divided between several separate funds, each dealing with a specific area.

The current year's budget for streets is set at \$174,631. Thus far \$101,702 has been expended for an unexpended balance of \$72,928.

The park fund was budgeted for \$94,024 this year and \$46,126 has been expended. The fund for recreation has a budget of \$37,448 and \$21,216 has been spent thus far this year.

Other funds, their budget and current expenditure totals include: pool — \$22,597 current budget, \$6,139 expended; public buildings, which includes city buildings and the transfer station — \$80,510, \$3,382 expended; building and planning which includes costs of the building inspector — \$11,908 current budget, \$3,909 expended.

SCHULZ ESTIMATED the city has about 27 miles of streets to maintain, 20 acres of parks, 19 miles of sewer lines, 25 miles of water mains and 2,000 meters to read each month.

"We also serve as the repair station for about 50 city vehicles including our heavy equipment and trucks, fire department equipment and most other gasoline engine equipment," Schulz said.

Current projects within the public works department include a new ball park for Wayne.

FINISHING TOUCHES remain to be added to the project which received \$144,500 in funding which included 50 percent from the federal government, 25 percent from the state government and 25 percent from the city.

Another current project is the waste water-treatment plant which is waiting for additional funding to begin the construction phase. Total funding for the project has been estimated at about \$196,000 according to Schulz.

MAJOR IMPROVEMENTS completed within the past few years according to Schulz include:

- A major watermain update around the city for increased fire protection. The project is one of the initial steps in a 20 year water improvement program.
- Construction of a sanitary sewer intercept to handle increased population areas of Wayne.
- New storm sewer installed running North from Logan Creek about 5 blocks thus eliminating an open drainage ditch.
- Installation of a new well for the city bringing the total to six.

Schulz, who recently has been selected executive director to the Board of the American public works association's Nebraska chapter and is a 17 year employee of the public works department, said besides his people he takes great pride in their ability to clear the city of snow quickly during the winter months.

"DURING THE AVERAGE snow conditions we can have the city cleared within three hours. We don't have to hire additional people or rent additional equipment either," he said.

All in all, Schulz is pleased with the progress of his department. "Next year I just hope we can do more during public works week in the way of exhibits for people to see and be available to answer questions people might have about our operations," he said.

In part, the proclamation signed by Mayor Marsh for national public works week in Wayne calls upon all citizens and organizations to become familiar with the problems involved in providing public works for the city and to recognize the contributions that public works officials make for the communities health, safety and comfort.

Wayne's siren signals explained

Reactions to the tornado siren blown early Thursday evening point out that the warning signals of the local system may be confusing to some Wayne residents. According to Wayne's police department, a steady three minute blast means that a tornado has been sighted in the area and to take cover immediately.

"Do not go outside to see what's happening," advised police chief Vern Fairchild, "and don't telephone the police station to find out where the tornado is located." Fairchild explained that the system also uses two other signals. In case of attack, the signal is a ten-second blast, on and off for a three minute period. The fire siren is a wailing signal for three steady minutes.

"Don't wait for an all-clear signal," Fairchild said, referring to the attack or tornado signals, "because there is no such thing."

Corn price supports are available until May 31

Erwin D. Morris, Chairman of the Wayne County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee (ASCS), said price support loans will be available until May 31 on 1981 corn, sorghum and soybeans.

County loan rates are: corn \$2.37, sorghum \$3.90/cwt., soybeans \$4.92.

In an effort to seek options which would yield them the best returns, local farmers placed about 1.8 million bushels of 1981 corn under price-support loan and 1.2 million bushels in the grain reserve. Morris said both programs are designed to help strengthen farm prices.

THE NINE MONTH price support loan provides immediate cash for farmers and allows them time to assess the market or to hold grain for feeding later on. Variable interest rates are charged and farmers may repay the money before the loan matures. The reserve program provides three-year loans and storage payments to farmers. Morris said 1981 feed grain crops are eligible for immediate entry in the farmer-owned grain reserve. The annual storage payment of 2 1/2 cents a bushel that is paid in advance, the waiver of interest charges after the first year, and cash from the loan provide capital while farmers wait on the market.

County loan rates for 1982 small grains are: wheat \$3.55, oats \$1.29, barley \$2.01, rye \$2.09.

THE ASCS OFFICIAL said each rate is based on a national average rate and varies from county to county to reflect prices received by farmers, production and consumption trends, and transportation costs.

Farmers interested in placing 1981 corn, sorghum and soybeans under loan may contact the local ASCS office.

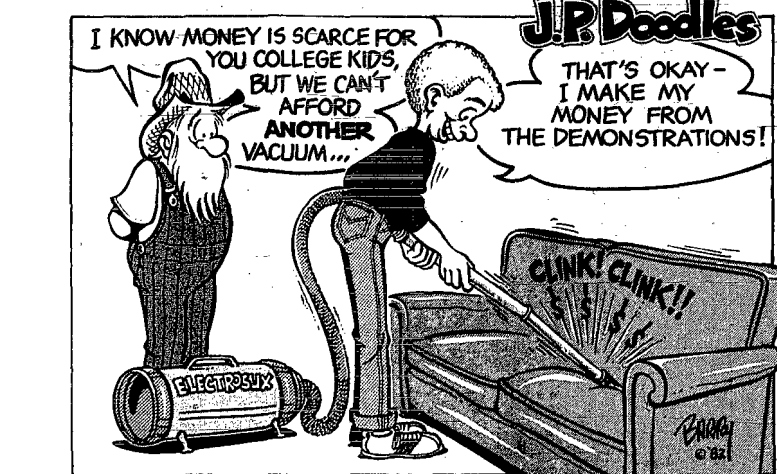
It's not easy to be a teacher today. It's not only a physically demanding job, but there's a psychological toll that is taken as well.

Q. We recently took our car in to be repaired, and the mechanic told us it would run about \$50. We did not have a written agreement. When we went to pick the car up, the bill was nearly \$300.

A. Your only recourse would be to sue the mechanic to recover the excess amount you had to pay over what was authorized.

Q. What reasons can a lawyer use to exclude someone from serving on a jury? Is there a difference if it's a civil case or criminal case?

A. Generally, a lawyer will seek to have an individual disqualified from a jury if the lawyer feels the individual would not render an unbiased decision in the case.

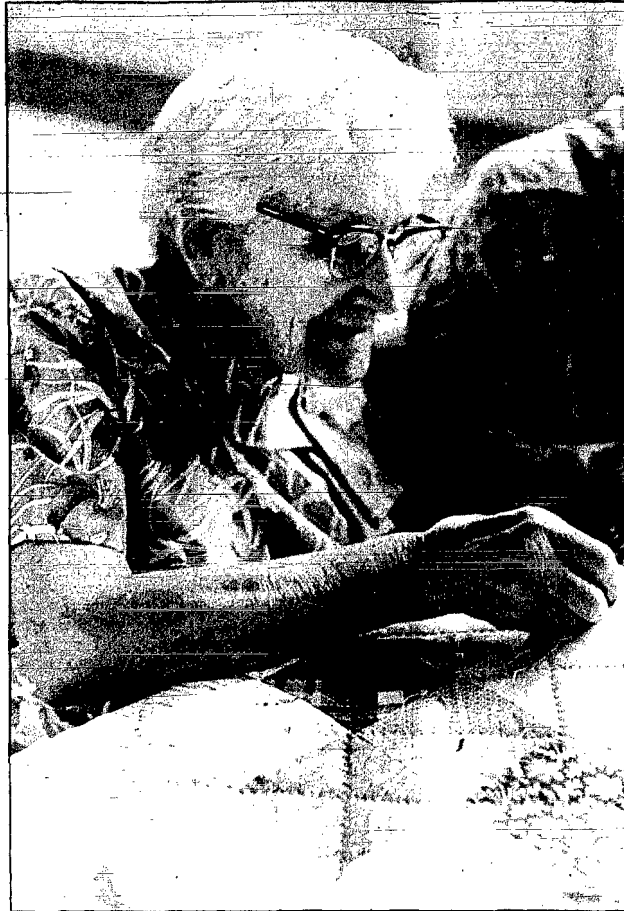

"Congratulations," he said as he turned to the graduates. "I wish you the very best in the future."

Coach Ron Jones' squad ends the 1982 season with a 20-21 mark. The Cats lose six seniors to graduation, but only four were regulars and WSC prospects for next season are strong.

The Cats never really got into the Area III tourney. Part of the problem may have been that two WSC regulars, pitcher Grady Hansen (Junior, Omaha) and designated hitter Gregg Cruickshank (sophomore, Columbus) did not make the trip. Cruickshank due to illness and Hansen due to prior commitments.

A surprisingly strong Mayville State club downed the Cats 7-2 in first round action. The comets, 22-8 and champions of NAIA Dist. 12, took advantage of a horrible fourth inning for the Cats to post the win. Mayville scored five runs in the fourth to blow open a 1-0 game. Largely thanks to numerous Wayne State mistakes like three errors, a wild pitch, a passed ball, and a balk. Four of the five Comet runs crossed the plate with two outs.

THE CATS STRUGGLED offensively. Top senior catcher Mike Meyer (Wayne) had a pair of singles, while outfielder Craig Leiding (Junior, Omaha) had a 2 RBI single. Comet pitcher Jeff Hill accounted for five hits over the other innings to up his record to a 3-1-1.

Wildcat moundman Randy Frink (sophomore, Henderson IA.) took the loss to drop his record to 1-4. He was relieved by freshman Joe Olsen (Laurel) in the eighth, who surrendered only one hit.

The elimination game looked like a rematch for the Central States Intercollegiate Conference championship, and the outcome was the same, too, as Emporia State drilled the Cats 14-4. Wayne State was never really in the contest as the fine Hornet squad pounded seven extra base hits and watched WSC commit six errors.

Emporia rocked three Wildcat pitchers for a total of 14 hits. Sophomore standout Dan Hilgenkamp (Arlington) took the loss as he finished 2-4. He was relieved by Rick Guy (sophomore, Wakefield) in the fifth, who gave way to sophomore, Jeff Clark (Sioux City IA.) in the eighth.

The strong Hornets scored in every inning except the eighth as they stayed alive in the tourney and improved to 41-25. Pitcher Mike Montgomery went the distance to pick up his eighth win in 12 decisions.

Wildcat junior Randy Heying (Granville IA.) accounted for half the WSC hits with three RBIs and three hits, including a solo home run in the second. Sophomore Rich Murcek (Omaha) blasted a towering solo home run in the bottom of the ninth.
