Because three forms of identification were needed on each hog, both ears were lagged and one was notched.



Q. We recently took our car in to be repaired, and the mechanic told us it would run about 550. We did not have a written agreement. When we went to pick the car up, the bill was nearly \$300. The mechanic said he had tried to get hold of me and couldn't and that it he hadn't gone ahead and done the extra work which was required, the car would not have been ready at the time promised. He also said that if we didn't pay the full amount, he would keep the car. Do we have any recourse?

A. Your only recourse would be to sue the mechanic to recover the excess amount you had to pay over what was authorized. You would have to show the court that the mechanic had no authority to make the repairs, and/or that the repairs were not needed or the charges were excessive. Since the amount in question is less than \$300, this mafter could be pursued in small claims court.

It is customary for a mechanic to contact the customer before making additional repairs, and it is wise for the owner to stipulate that if the cost runs over a certain amount, the mechanic should obtain further approval before proceeding. The difficulty that a rises here is that an "estimate" generally does not constitute a contract. Actual costs frequently exceed estimates of this nature. Very often, when additional work is done without an exact agreement, it is said to have been done with the implied consent of the owner and if the owner is benefited, there should be reasonable compensation to the mechanic. But if the additional work is found to be unnecessary, or the unexpected charges exhorbitant, then the owner should not be required to pay the whole bill. Under Nebraska law, the mechanic has an "artisan's listen" on the vehicle and can keep it until the bill is paid. It would be up to the owner to sue to recover the vehicle. If you did not do so, the mechanic would be within his legal rights to self the car to pay his bill and any expenses of the sale.

A. Generally, a lawyer will seek to have an individual disqualified from a jury if the lawyer feels the individual would not render an unblased decision in the case. Some people are automatically disqualified under state law (judges, clerks of the supreme or district court, sheriffs, jaliers, persons who have a case pending in the court at the time the jury is impaneled, and certain convicted felons). There are also general qualifications prohibiting husband and wife from serving on the same jury panel, and persons who are incapable of serving on a jury due to physical or mental disabilities may also be excused, eithough a physician's certificate may be required. The lawyers for both sides may disqualify jurors who they feel would not render a fair decision based on the evidence. This might be based on the juror's knowledge of one of the parties, the juror's opinion about the case, or any number of other factors. The lawyers for both sides ask each potential juror a number of questions designed to determine whether or not that individual would be acceptable as a juror.

Each lawyer also has certain pre-emptive rights to disqualify jurors solely because it is the lawyer's personal opinion that the potential juror would not benefit his or her client. These are limited in number, however.

Education—our profession—has also become a farget for right-wing groups in the country who have spent large sums of money to destroy the gains made by the NEA in the areas
of political lobbying and organization.

Education — our profession — has been challenged by the professional testers — the results experts' who have translated their interpretations of raw scores into a profit-making, lucrative business at the expense of many programs and eourses that had students, not products, as their central concern.

Education — our profession — has been attacked by parents who would control the curriculum in the schools If they had their way. These parents, frustrated with the difficulty of being parents in loday's world, vent their collective spleans sometimes on the curriculum, in particular, and often on the school, in general.

Education — our profession — is sometimes undermined by boards of education, or ad ministrators who would simply acquiesce to the slings and arrows aimed at the system by seeking simple, easy to measure, pseudo solutions to the complex problems that lace education lodey.

And teaching itself — our vocation — is very often ridiculed by a public who, out of ignorance or cynicism or even anxiety, repeats, parrot-like, those phrases that we all have heard so often — 'only 180 days a year', only five hours a day, summers off.' The public repeals those phrases, mindlessly unaware of the preparation time; the paperwork time; the college course time; the inservice training time; the summer job time; the student conferring time: the advising time: the committee work time; the school-function attendance times; and the parent-conferring time — all of itspent by us beyond the school day or the school year.

But let's not wallow in self-pity. Let's not flop around in self-doubt. Let's not submit to the pressures. Let's not rereal into silence and let's not go underground or try to go unnoticed. Let's tell the critics what we know is true. Let's tell the critics that contrary to the educational experts' at a 'Time or 'Newsweek' or 'CBS Television,' the schools are doing a good job.

We don't have to doubt what we're doing. We don't have to be ashamed of the time we put in, or the salaries we negotiate for.

We can look the community, the critics, the politicians and the parents straight in the eye and say: "Your kids will never get, from any other institution in our society, the concentration, or professional care, concern and attention that they're receiving now while they're in adults after the concentration.

e teach your kids in this different, changing society as best we can with what you give and we're proud of the job we do."

The miscellaneous base flow program was imenced in 1978 in Northeast Nebraska. commenced in 1978 in Normeast Nebraska. Measurements are conducted twice each year specifically in the spring and fall when weather conditions limit the influence of vegetation, irrigation, overland runoff, and other factors which may influence the stream's base flow. Ideally the measurements are made when the stream's flow is most representative of the stream's virgin base flow (springs contribution). Measurements in Northeast Nobraska are

Measurements in Northeast Nebraska are conducted on each named stream. Presently the Department is measuring about 300 sites in Northeast Nebraska. Usually, the site is located at the mouth of the stream or if the stream is large, several sites are measured. All measurements are published in the Department's yearly Hydrographic Report under miscellaneous discharge measurements.
