Agent reviews farm problems

The'tirst of June has arrived, yet little
corn can be seen in the fields, due to heavy
and continuous spring rains. Farmers all
around the area have felt the frustration of
postponed planting and prolonged moisture
According to Wayne County Extension.
Agent, Don C. Spize, the normal planting of
full season corn is about two and a half
weeks behind schedule. "Right how tarmers
are using a mid-season corn which grows for
100-110 days but if field work is postponed
much longer a shorter season corn, needing
less than 100 days growth, will have to be used." he sald.

"SOME DEALERS around the area are finding a shortage of the shorter season corn." Spitze said, "but others have a plen-tiful supply and will let farmers trade back

iful supply and will lef farmers trade back their long season corn."
"As for a change in crop," he remarked, "some will be changing from corn to soybeans because of its different growth pattern. Soybeans can be planted up to June 15, using a mid-season be planted up to June 15, using a mid-season be planting schedules."
"The rains also caused a loss of fertilizer in washed out areas and in places where water stood for a time and those who used a pre-emergence herbictie."

"CONCERNING EROSION." Spitze said,
"the most severe cases are to the North and
Northwest of Wayne. The biggest problems
are in lowland pasture where slit washed in,
and there are also cases of wash-out where
lowland flooding occurred." he added.
"This should emphasize to farmers."
Spitze remarked, "the value of terracing
and why a minimum of tillage should bedone."

"Right now, no emergency help will pro-bably be available for farmers," Spitze said, "the federal government will have to decide on that possibility later."

"I HAVE HEARD," he added, "that they have considered extending the deadlines for crop insurance applications, though,"



State's responsibility

managing our water resources may soon become a reality. Under the 'new federalism'' concept, states will be required to assume a much more significant roll. This shift is not unexpected, as the expressed need for ad-ditional "non-federal" involvement has been around for years. In 1973, the National Water Commission concluded in their report that "development, management, and protection of water resources should be controlled by that level of government nearest the problem and most capable to effectively representing the vital interest involved.."

Early in his term of office, President Carter asked for the establishment of a "new creative partnership" to make certain states and local govern-ments were more involved in water decisions. For years discussions have been underway on greater cost-sharing requirments for non-federal interests for water projects. For years states have been asking for more responsibility.

The whole issue may soon come into focus under President Reagan's strong desire to get the federal government off the backs of state and local government. Congressional observers feel Congress may soon enact legislation to require non-federal dollars to ald in funding water project feasibility studies and project constructions costs. Assuming additional state and local responsibility can be interpreted to read, raising state and local funds. All of this will be coupled with the new water project planning guidelines that are presently out for review. The new guidelines are principles that are presently out for review. cipally based on one objective — national economic development — aimed directly at assisting in national economic recovery. Projects that fail to meet the national economic recovery test will be eliminated from the federal budget

In the past we have readily blamed Washington for the lack of a commit ment on water development. Under the new laws and procedures now coming into focus, it is very obvious that a state commitment is a must. While this commitment has been discussed in Nebraska, a serious effort must now get underway. Our neighboring states of Wyoming and Colorado are strides ahead of us in accepting new water development responsibilities. It is obvious that any further water development commitment must begin in Nebraska, If we fail, the blame will come squarely back to us

Legislation receives further support

By Senator Edward Zorinsky Imagine you're off for a couple hours of browsing in the shops and stores of a small city. You're going to be on foot, so you park your car at a nearby garage for the after

noon.

When you return, you discover the garage has gone bankrupt and a court has impound ed your car as an asset of the garage while he bankrupty-proceeding is pending.

You'll just have to do without your vehicle, the court tells you, until all the claims against the garage have been settled. And that could be two or three years.

Sounds preposterous, doesn't it? Certain-, no court of law would issue such orders.

But that's exactly what happens tarmers today who have the misfortune store their crops in a warehouse that sub quently falls into bankruptcy.

Only in their case, it's not just a major piece of property than's locked up. It's their livelihood, their source of income for an en

With the economy slumping and warehouse bankruptcies on the rise, this absurd scenario is being repeated with increasing frequency across America

IT'S EASY TO understand the frustration of those told by a court that the grain they had stored in a bankrupt warehduse isn't their grain at all but an asset of the warehouse company, to be attached and used for settlement of all outstanding debts against the company.

And it's just as easy to understand why one farmer, Wayne Cryts of Puxico, Mo., finally rebelled. Cryts' crop had been locked up in a bankrupt Ristine, Mo. warehouse for almost two years.

With help from several friends and in violation of a court order, he removed a quantity of soybeans from the warehouse equal to what he had put in.

He acted more inprotest and to highlight his plight than anything else. And, when he refused to reveal the names of his ac-complices, he was jailed for contempt.

Wayne Cryts was a victim of a system that may be legal but certainly is not fair. At this writing, he remains in custody in Russellville, Ark. But his symbolic protest has made him a folk hero throughout agriculfural mild-America.

Famers everywhere know that they could

well be the next victims of this obviously flawed system. In Washington, Wayne Cryts' plight has prompted introduction of legislation that would prevent future farmers from suffer-ing his fate.

THE BILL IS BASED on the premise the premise the premise the posterior premise the p to wait out long bankruptcy proceedings than any individual farmer.

Known as S. 2486, it would authorize the Agriculture Department to purchase from farmers on request grain stored in bankrupt warehouses. The purchase price would be the prevailing market rate.

In the meantime, the farmer would have sufficient cash to finance his next year's crop regardless of the status of the bankruptcy proceeding.

THE BILL ALSO would help prevent uture warehouse bankruptcles in two ways.

First, it would limit the government sability to buy grain to that stored in federally licensed warehouses, or warehouses licensed under a comparable state system. Thus, a powerful incentive would be created for tarmers to use licensed warehouses and for unlicensed warehouses to become licensed.

And statistics show that far fewer licens-d warehouses experience bankruptcies

than unlicensed.

Second, S. 2486 would hold the Agriculture
Department financially accountable for
federally licensed warehouses, thereby providing his impetus for USDA to improve its
warehouse examination standards to
decrease the possibility of bankruptcy.

A year ago, the U.S. General Accounting Office said at least 300 grain warehouses around the country were in enough financial trouble so that bankruptcy could result.

Some of those warehouses have since failed and others are on the verge of declaring bankruptcy today.

Obviously, there is no time to lose. Quick assage of S. 2486 will insure that the kind of ustice" Wayne Cryts experienced is a ng of the past

Q. What is the difference between an abstract, a title opinion and title insurance. Which is

best to have?

A An "abstract of title" is simply a written record of all of the transactions which have taken place with regard to a certain parcel of real estate. The possessioning an abstract is no indication of ownership of the land to which it relates. Anyone may acquire an abstract for

any piece of land

An abstract of title is prepared by an abstracter. In addition to the history of the title to the An abstract aftitle is prepared by an abstracter. In addition to the history of the title to the process, such as mortgages, mechanic's liens, easements and restrictions which may affect the title to the real estate. If you are buying read estate, you should obtain an abstract of title and have it updated to the date of purchase so that you are aware of any problems which may affect your ownership of the real estate.

A "title opinion" as written by an altorney after reviewing the abstract of title. It is the at corney's opinion as to the marketability of the real estate and it is generally requested by the buyer prior to closing the sale so that he is certain of receiving good title to the property in guestion.



For a one time fee, the filtle insurance company will provide a policy insuring the buyer that he is obtaining good filtle from the seller. A filtle insurance policy does have a variety of exclusions and limitations which you should be aware of. For example, most filtle insurance policies do not provide coverage for mechanic's liens, boundary discrepancies and other potential problems. It is ad visable to have your attorney review the title insurance policy so that you clearly understand what is covered and what is not in short, an abstract properly prepared by a bonded abstracter and reviewed by an at torney can be every bit a valuable to you as a filte insurance policy. However, whether you are dealing with an abstract or with filtle insurance, you should obtain the opinion of an at torney to make ceratin that any title problems are explained to you and, if necessary, cor rected before you close the sale.

Q. If you buy property and receive a warranty deed, and later a defect is discovered, who makes the defect right? Is a court proceeding necessary?

A. A warranty deed generally guarantees that the seller is providing the buyer with good to the to the property. Free from encumbrances other than those stated in the deed. If you have a warranty deed and thereafter find that your title is defective, you may insist that the seller correct the defect, unless the defect is excluded from the warranties of title contained in the deed. If may be necessary for you to go to court to force the seller to cure the defect, depending on how substantial the defect is.

However, the buyer can generally avoid such problems and potential Hilgation by having an attorney review the abstract or the little insurance policy prior to closing the sale.
