Wickes announces store closings

Wickes Co. of San Diego, Calif., has recently announced that it will be closing or selling its J.M. McDonald Co. stores in a dozen Nebraska communities.

Wayne's J.M. McDonald Co. manager Dale Boyle, said locally four employees, including himself, will be affected by the Wickes Co. decision.

The Wickes firm has filed for relief under Chapter 11 of the federal bankruptcy code. The filing generally allows companies to reorganize their holdings while under the federal bankruptcy court's jurisdiction.

According to Sanford Sigoloff, Wickes chairman and chief executive officer, Nebraska stores to be sold or closed later, are located in Wayne, Holdrege, Beatrice, Lexington, McCook, Kearney, North Platte, Norfolk, Ainsworth and Sidney.

THE DECISION will affect 45 of Wickes 55 J.M. McDonald stores across the country. All 10 stores on the West coast will remain open.

The local McDonald's department store has operated in the community for over 50 years, first under the Golden Rule name. Later the store was purchased by the Brown-McDonald Co. with headquarters in Hastings until it was acquired by James M. McDonald in 1948 and the name changed to the J.M. McDonald Co.

In 1967, McDonald's was sold to Gamble-Skogma, Inc., of Minneapolis, Minn. which later became a Wickes subsidiary.

COMPANY OFFICIALS have targeted stores in O'Neill, Grand Island, Hastings and Fairbury for closing. They will also close the McDonald headquarters in Hastings.

Speaking for Wickes, Ann Jolson said the Hastings and Fairbury stores will start going out of business sales on June 10.

Council plans ordinance reviews

Tuesday, June 8, an ordinance that will in effect remove the existing city ordinance restricting the sale of alcoholic beverages on election day will be given its first reading, during the Wayne city council meeting.

The ordinance is the result of a request by the Wayne Chamber of Commerce to allow alcoholic beverages to be sold on election day.

The second reading of another ordinance dealing with the placement and maintenance of trees in public right of ways

will also be given.

In other action Tuesday night the council will review the city's tort (liability) insurance and discuss the procedure and policy of renting equipment from the auditorium.

The council will also discuss in general form the upcoming 1982-83 fiscal year city budget. According to city administrator Philip Kloster, although still in the tentative planning stages, he is projecting that the new budget may be considerably less than the current year's budget.

Conventions held

Frank Prather and Bob Enz were elected co chairmen of the Wayne county Democratic party during the party's county convention on June 1.

Elected vice chairman was Charlene Rasmussen. Other officers elected include Jocell Bull, secretary and Bob Jordan, treasurer.

Delegates were also selected to attend the state Democratic convention scheduled for later this year. Selected were Prather and Jordan. Alternates for the state convention from Wayne county will be Kenneth Olds and Rasmussen.

In addition to the election of officers and selection of state delegates, a short meeting was held with the state party platform distributed to those attending the evening county convention.

The Wayne County Republican convention was held June 4 with Sheryl Marra elected as the new county chairman.

Other officers elected were Gerald Schafer, vice president, and incumbents Bonnie Nelson, secretary and Charles Maas, treasurer.

Delegates selected to the state Republican convention were Maas, J. Alan Cramer and Marra.

Alternates chosen were Fred Mann,

Lloyd Straight, and Leon Meyer.

Before the election of the new officers and selection of state delegates, rulings from the chair and motions from the floor were made concerning the seating of people who came to the convention.

According to those present, several people were invited to attend the convention but were not properly registered delegates.

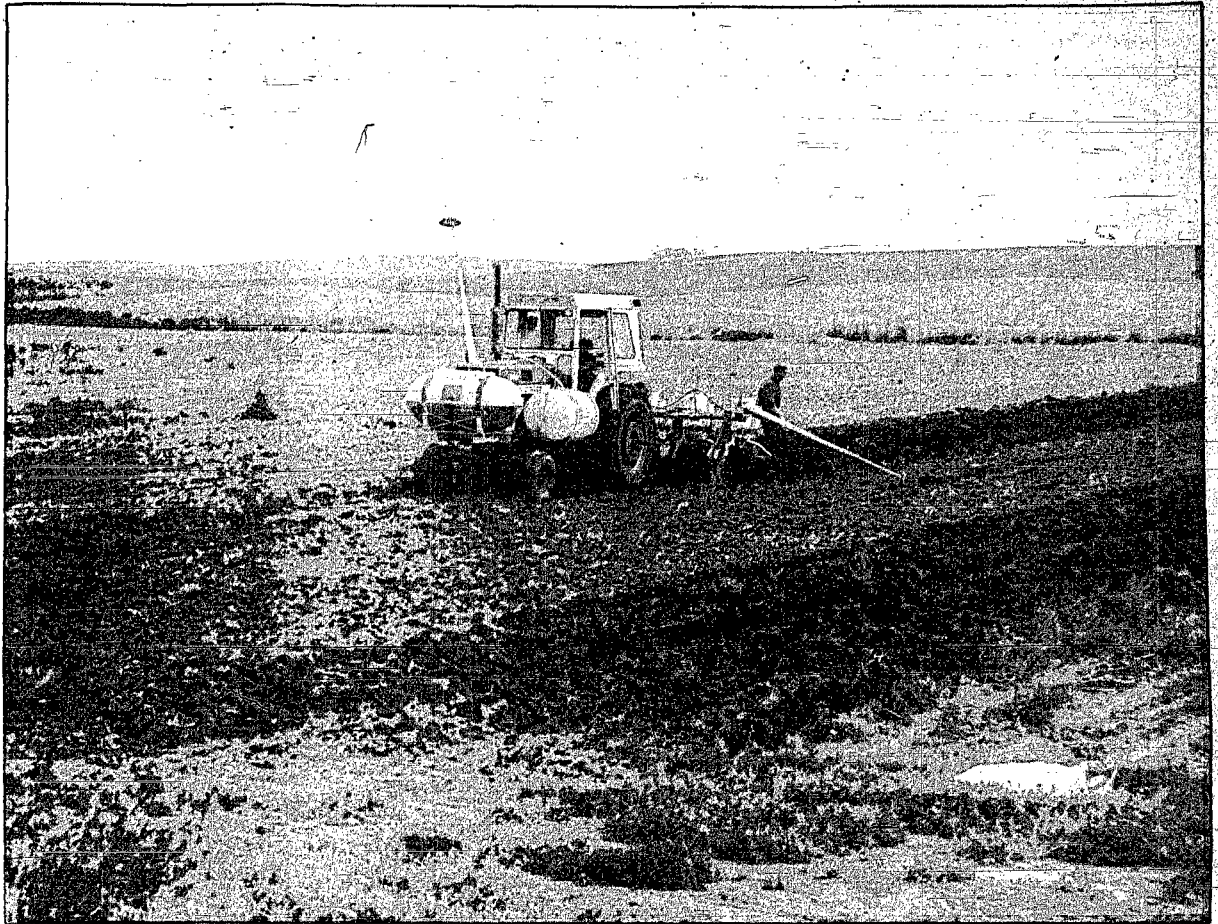
Mrs. Frederick Mann, as the current county chairman, ruled that the people could be seated as voting delegates if they resided in precincts that had no registered delegates present.

A motion followed the ruling by Kenneth Marra that only duly registered delegates could vote.

The motion, voted on by registered delegates, carried, thus overriding the chair's ruling.

During the convention it was evident that some people felt they had been denied the right to vote at the convention. Others felt that why should there be a process for having delegates if anyone showing up would be allowed to be seated and vote?

In other action during the convention Friday evening, the delegates approved several resolutions which will be reviewed in the June 10 issue of *The Wayne Herald*.

Back in the saddle

AREA FARMERS FINALLY got a break this past week and were able to get back to field work. Estimates are that farmers are about three weeks behind schedule due to the rainy weather.

Agent reviews farm problems

The first of June has arrived, yet little corn can be seen in the fields, due to heavy and continuous spring rains. Farmers all around the area have felt the frustration of postponed planting and prolonged moisture.

According to Wayne County Extension Agent, Don C. Spitze, the normal planting of full season corn is about two and a half weeks behind schedule. "Right now farmers are using a mid-season corn which grows for 100-110 days but if field work is postponed much longer a shorter season corn, needing less than 100 days growth, will have to be used," he said.

"SOME DEALERS around the area are finding a shortage of the shorter season corn," Spitze said, "but others have a plentiful supply and will let farmers trade back their long season corn."

"As for a change in crop," he remarked, "some will be changing from corn to soybeans because of its different growth pattern. Soybeans can be planted up to June 15, using a mid-season brand, and will be a good possibility for late planting schedules."

"The rains also caused a loss of fertilizer in washed-out areas and in places where water stood for a time and those who used a pre-emergence herbicide will have to

cultivate or add a post-emergence to their crop. The rains will definitely reduce the effectiveness of the pre-emergence," he added.

"CONCERNING EROSION," Spitze said, "the most severe cases are to the North and Northwest of Wayne. The biggest problems are in lowland pasture where silt washed in, and there are also cases of wash-out where lowland flooding occurred," he added.

"This should emphasize to farmers," Spitze remarked, "the value of terracing and why a minimum of tillage should be done."

Whether or not farmers suffer a big loss, the agent explained, will depend on what kind of growing season we get. If we have a warm summer, and a dry fall, farmers should be alright, but if we get an early frost, farmers will be in trouble.

"Right now, no emergency help will probably be available for farmers," Spitze said, "the federal government will have to decide on that possibility later."

"I HAVE HEARD," he added, "that they have considered extending the deadlines for crop insurance applications, though."

New owners; business locate in Wayne



A NEW BUSINESS, the Diet Center, opened its door on June 2 in Wayne's Professional building. The Center's counselor, Alice Froeschle, said there is no contract people must sign and they are not under any obligation once they join the program, saying that the main thing is that people must really desire to lose weight in order for the program to be effective.

Alice Froeschle, the center's counselor, began the five-phase diet program herself at a center in Norfolk.

In just a little over three months she lost about 35 pounds, she said. When she later read an advertisement for a job opening with the center, she decided to start her own center in the Wayne area.

THE DIET CENTER, located in the former Security Land Title Company office, was painted and redecorated by Mrs. Froeschle.

There are five different phases to the diet program. "You start on a conditioning program," she said, "and then begin the actual reduction diet."

During both of these phases, dieters must report daily for weigh-in. "After you have met your desired goal," Mrs. Froeschle explained, "you begin a stabilization and maintenance diet." During this period, check-in occurs only once or twice a week.

"DIETERS ALSO attend nutritional balance classes to learn about their body and its nutritional needs," she said. Mrs. Froeschle said she has received many inquiries about the center and many people have begun the program.

Legislation receives further support

By Senator Edward Zorinsky Imagine you're off for a couple hours of browsing in the shops and stores of a small city.

When you return, you discover the garage has gone bankrupt and a court has impounded your car as an asset of the garage while the bankruptcy proceeding is pending.

You'll just have to do without your vehicle, the court tells you, until all the claims against the garage have been settled.

Sounds preposterous, doesn't it? Certainly, no court of law would issue such orders.

But that's exactly what happens to farmers today who have the misfortune to store their crops in a warehouse that subsequently falls into bankruptcy.

Only in their case, it's not just a major piece of property that's locked up. It's their livelihood, their source of income for an entire year.

With the economy slumping and warehouse bankruptcies on the rise, this absurd scenario is being repeated with increasing frequency across America.

IT'S EASY TO understand the frustration of those told by a court that the grain they had stored in a bankrupt warehouse isn't their grain at all...

And it's just as easy to understand why one farmer, Wayne Cryts of Pawnee, Mo., finally rebelled.

With help from several friends and in violation of a court order, he removed a quantity of soybeans from the warehouse equal to what he had put in.

He acted more in protest and to highlight his plight than anything else. And, when he refused to reveal the names of his accomplices, he was jailed for contempt.

Wayne Cryts was a victim of a system that may be legal but certainly is not fair. At this writing, he remains in custody in Russellville, Ark.

Farmers everywhere know that they could

well be the next victims of this obviously flawed system.

In Washington, Wayne Cryts' plight has prompted introduction of legislation that would prevent future farmers from suffering his fate.

THE BILL IS BASED on the premise that the government is in a much better position to wait out long bankruptcy proceedings than any individual farmer.

Known as S. 2486, it would authorize the Agriculture Department to purchase from farmers on request grain stored in bankrupt warehouses.

The government would then simply take the farmer's place as a part to the bankruptcy proceeding and, ultimately, it would receive payment under the settlement agreement.

In the meantime, the farmer would have sufficient cash to finance his next year's crop - regardless of the status of the bankruptcy proceeding.

THE BILL ALSO would help prevent future warehouse bankruptcies in two ways.

First, it would limit the government's ability to buy grain to that stored in federally licensed warehouses, or warehouses licensed under a comparable state system.

And statistics show that far fewer licensed warehouses experience bankruptcies than unlicensed.

Second, S. 2486 would hold the Agriculture Department financially accountable for federally licensed warehouses, thereby providing the impetus for USDA to improve its warehouse examination standards.

A year ago, the U.S. General Accounting Office said at least 300 grain warehouses around the country were in enough financial trouble so that bankruptcy could result.

Some of those warehouses have since failed and others are on the verge of declaring bankruptcy today.

Obviously, there is no time to lose. Quick passage of S. 2486 will insure that the kind of "justice" Wayne Cryts experienced is a thing of the past.

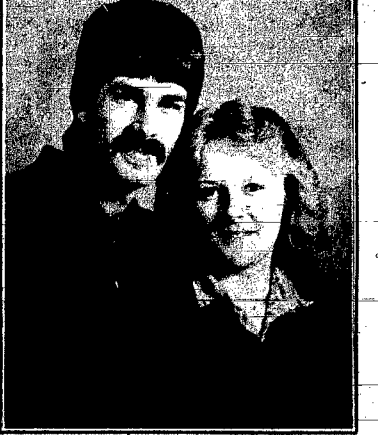

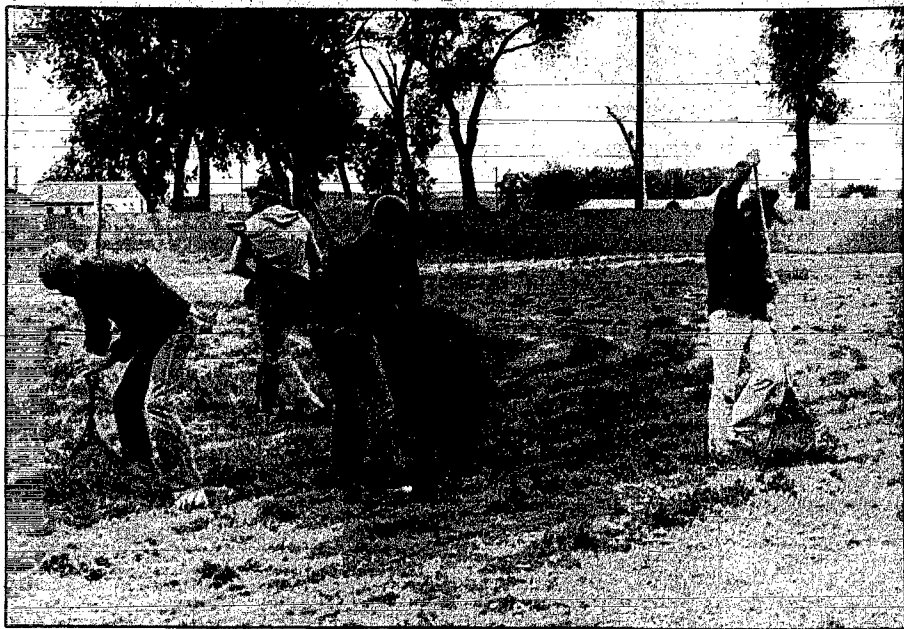

Two record holders finish Wildcat baseball careers

In spite of a successful season that saw the Wayne State College baseball team earn spots in the conference and NAIA Area III championships, a look at the books shows no new baseball records were established by the 82 Wildcats.

In spite of that fact, Coach Ron Jones will have a couple of record holders to replace in next year's lineup. A pair of Wayne seniors, first baseman Bill Schwartz and catcher Mike Meyer, are record holders who finished their careers with the 20-21 Wildcats this spring.

Schwartz leaves with records for most hits in a season (81), most home runs in a season (18), and most RBIs in a season (67), all established in 1981. Schwartz led the Cats in several categories, including at-bats (137), home runs (4), RBIs (35), and put-outs (239), as well as the co-leader in doubles with 9. Schwartz batted .277 this season.

Meyer established the season record for doubles with an impressive total of 15. Meyer was the number two batter for the Cats this year with a .355 average.

JUNIOR OUTFIELDER Tom Todd tied his own school season record (set in 1980) for stolen bases with 14 in 15 attempts. Five triples by Todd was tops for the Cats. Todd batted .281 this season.

Sophomore pitcher Rick Guy of Wakefield also tied a school record, that of most pitching losses in a season. Unfortunately, the fireballing pitcher drew many of Wayne State's toughest assignments, with three of his losses coming against major colleges — two against the University of Nebraska and one against Kansas State. Guy made nine appearances and was co-leader in strikeouts with 29. His six losses (against one win) ties a record

set by Mark Westerguard in 1979. Junior outfielder Craig Ludwig finished the season as the top Wildcat batter, hitting .360. Ludwig led the team in runs (28), hits (40), and strikeouts (29), and was co-leader in doubles (9) and hit-by-pitches (2).

Senior outfielder and co-captain Ken Murcek was one of the Cats' top performers, hitting .308 on the year. Murcek came within one walk of tying the school base-on-balls record of 38, co-held by Randy Miller (1976) and current WSC assistant Coach Don Hasenkamp (1977).

Gregg Cruickshank had a fine season, spending much of the year as the Wildcat designated hitter. Cruickshank, who missed the Cats NAIA area playoff games due to illness, hit .337 on the year.

Sophomore Jeff Clark made significant contributions to the Cats as a backup at both catcher and pitcher. Clark batted .333 and played error-free baseball as a catcher, and was 1-0 and sported a 1.86 earned run average in six appearances on the mound.

JUNIOR GRADY HANSEN topped the WSC pitching staff in innings pitched (51 2/3) and had a 4.53 earned-run average while sporting a 5-3 record. Hansen, who threw 23 strikeouts, was co-

leader with four complete games. Steady performer Dan Hilgenkamp led the pitchers in appearances (12) and was co-leader in strikeouts with 29. He had a fine 3.73 earned run average and posted a 2-4 record while throwing four complete games, tied with Hansen in that category.

Another regular on the mound was a sophomore Randy Frink, who competed in nine games and had a 1-4 record and 6.02 ERA. Junior Rocky Thompson came on strong to post a .311 record and

2.89 earned run average.

The Cats top reliever was freshman Joe Olsen of Laurel, who pitched in nine games but for a total of only 12 innings. Olsen had a 2-0 record with two saves, and posted a 3.00 ERA. Also aiding the pitching staff was the lone senior, Kevin Williamson, who was 2-0 and junior Vic Sharpe of Wayne, who was 2-1.

With such a strong group of underclassmen on hand, the outlook for the 1983 edition of the Wildcat baseball team is extremely promising.

Turkey hunting success down

A respectable 35 percent of spring shotgun turkey hunters bagged their bird during the 1982 season, according to Game and Parks Commission figures.

The 1982 success total was down from 1981's 41 percent and this year's wet, cool spring may have played a hand in the reduced success. Commission Big Game Specialist Karl Menzel of Bassett says the lower success was probably due to flocks breaking up later than normal this year.

"We had snow in early April," he said, "this caused turkeys to stay together in their winter feeding areas longer than usual. Because they stayed together longer, distribution was poorer than in other years and gobblers did not respond well to calling."

Nebraska archers found the 1982 spring archery turkey season pretty tough going, with only 63 of 800 licensed bowmen taking turkeys for an eight percent success rate.

During the same season in 1981, 84 of 755 archers bagged birds, for a success rate of 11 percent.

Wayne golfers finish one-two

Two Wayne boys swept top honors in the Norfolk Optimists Golf Tournament held Thursday at Norfolk Country Club.

Cole Froeschle won the tourney with a 38 37-75 total and Tom Perry was second with a 37 40-77. Froeschle will be a junior at Wayne-Carroll High School and Perry will be a freshman there.

Froeschle qualified to play in the state tournament at Omaha Benson Country Club on June 22. The winner of that tourney will advance to San Diego. Approximately 20 golfers participated in Thursday's meet at Norfolk.

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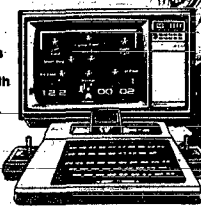

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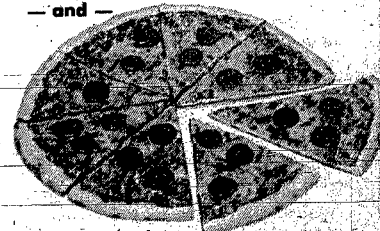
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
