Dixon County Fair Aug. 9-11

The annual Dixon County Fair will open with 4-H horse entries and close with a demolition derby. The event is scheduled Tuesday through Thursday, Aug. 9-11 at Concord.

Ark-Sar Ben 100-year awards will be given out at 8 p.m. on Sunday, Aug. 7 in pre-fair activities. Recipients of the award include Earl Eckert of Dixon, Edward Kirchner of Concord, Irma Woodward of Concord, Jesse Dixon of Emerson, Raymond Finnegan of Newcastle, Norman D. Hangman of Hartington and Norman A. Hangman of Newcastle. A Vesper service also will be held at that time.

Some of the fair's include a micro-mini tractor pull, a barbecue, a horse playday, musical entertainment, a tractor pull, a variety show, an antique vehicle parade, a livestock parade and a demolition derby.

ON TUESDAY, 4-H horse entries should be made between 8 and 9 a.m. All other 4-H and open class livestock can be entered between 8 a.m. and 12 noon. 4-H entries other than livestock can be made from 8 to 10 a.m. and entries in most open class divisions will be held from 8 to 11 a.m. The 4-H horse show is scheduled at 9 a.m.

At 3 p.m., a micro-mini tractor pull is planned. The annual barbecue will follow at 5 p.m. An open class horse playday is scheduled to begin at 7 p.m.

The evening's entertainment will include The Gems of Wakefield and The Erwin Sisters of Concord, performing at 7 p.m. A free

square dance will follow at 8:30. Various judging will take place on Tuesday.

JUDGING OF 4-H beef showmanship, 4-H beef and open class beef will start Wednesday's activities at 8 a.m.

At 2 p.m., a tractor pull is planned in front of the grand stand. A horse and dairy parade and presentation of trophies is scheduled at 4 p.m. Wednesday. The Marsha Kaye variety show will be held at 8 p.m.

Closing day will provide plenty of activities for anyone attending the fair. Swine judging will begin at 8 a.m. Thursday with sheep judging following that morning. The afternoon's activities will begin with fashion, music and home economics judging.

At 3:30, youngsters will match their skills in a kiddie pedal tractor pull. An antique vehicle parade will follow at 5 p.m. and the annual livestock parade will be held at 6 p.m. All exhibits will be released at 7 p.m.

CARS WILL roar and crash as the demolition derby brings another year's activities to a close at 8 p.m. The John Bauman Carnival will be set up on the fairgrounds all three days.

Single admission for the Dixon County fair is \$2 for adults. A season ticket may be purchased for \$5. Children under the age of 10 will be admitted free of charge. All grandstand activities are free.

Winside school plans budget

The Winside Public School will hold its annual budget hearing in conjunction with its regular meeting on Aug. 11. The hearing will be at 8 p.m. with the regular meeting immediately following. Both meetings will be held in the Elementary School Library.

The Board of Education discussed the proposed budget at a work session on July 26. The operating budget for 1983-84 will be \$951,923 — an increase of \$83,493 (9.6 percent). The cash reserve will remain at \$212,000. Since the income for 1982-83 from non-tax sources was larger than anticipated, the tax request for 1983-84 will decrease in the amount of \$38,984.20 (7.09 percent).

Actual dollar tax request amounts for the Winside School since 1978-79 show a net decrease for those years of 5.02 percent. The tax requests for the years indicated are as follows: 1978-79, \$538,099.17; 1979-80, \$544,558.05; 1980-81, \$525,409.07; 1981-82, \$457,445.16; 1982-83, \$550,058.28; 1983-84, \$511,074.60.

The breakdown of the 1983-84 budget is as follows: instructional services and instructional support services, \$592,351; school administration and business support services, \$157,021; operation and maintenance of plant, \$117,854; transportation, \$56,697; transfers to other funds, \$28,000.

School's proposed budget includes 4 percent raise

Wayne-Carroll public school teachers and other employees will receive a four percent salary increase under District 17's proposed 1983-84 budget.

Under the proposal, all classes of employees will be given four percent raises for the 83-84 school year.

The budget proposal calls for a state and local tax base increase, excluding retirement fund costs, of \$125,656 or .0602 percent. That figure is \$9,488 less than allowed by the seven percent state lid on tax revenue increases.

DESPITE THE tax base increase, figures released by Wayne Superintendent Francis Haun show that the request for local property taxes is actually reduced \$33,058 or .0254 percent from the 1982-83 request of \$1,311,090.

The reduction in local property taxes is due to an increase of \$43,599 in state aid and the anticipated full payment of non resident high school tuition.

The total proposed budget increase, including title programs, block grants, lunch, federal, state and pre-school costs is \$147,044 or .0673 percent. Haun said the proposed total budget of expenditures, excluding these categorical programs, is \$122,055 or .0590 percent.

In addition to salary increases, two other

major increases were caused by medical insurance costs which escalated by 20 percent, and changes in the school employee retirement law which resulted in a budget increase of \$24,331 for the upcoming school year.

HAUN SAID that since the preparation of budget documents, it now appears there will be a significant shortfall of high school tuition money at the county level for 1983-84.

This shortfall, however, will not be assessed back to resident taxpayers, he said. The monies should ultimately be collectible, he pointed out.

According to Haun, the school district will have funds from the 1982-83 budget to pay all current billings and to transfer monies into unemployment, legal and depreciation accounts. Those accounts were not funded last year because of uncertainty of property tax income.

Haun said it appears the property tax income should normalize for 1983-84 after a loss of \$296,000 in tax dollars for 1981-82 and 1982-83 budget years due to an error in the assessed valuation of the school district for 1982.

The building/sinking fund is proposed to remain at \$40,000. The bond fund, which has three more years to complete, will remain at the same level of approximately \$61,000.

THE PROPOSED BUDGET calls for elementary teachers' salaries totaling \$518,000—a drop of \$6,000 from last year. The reason for the lower figure is that one teacher resigned and her position was not filled.

At the secondary level, teacher salaries will be \$412,000 under the proposal. That figure is an increase of \$17,000 from last year.

The amount of money budgeted for special education programs is \$57,000, an increase of nearly \$6,000 from last year.

Approximately \$14,000 will be spent for elementary and secondary textbooks, \$32,000 on teaching supplies, \$9,000 on furniture and equipment and \$8,000 on computers.

LOCAL AND district taxes are the highest source of revenue for the school district. Proposed receipts from those taxes for the 1983-84 school year will total \$1,278,032.

Non-resident high school tuition is estimated at \$315,000 and state aid should total \$329,800. Total receipts including title programs, a block grant, federal and state lunch monies and pre-school is proposed at \$2,274,770. Excluding those areas, the total is \$2,134,132.

A piece of history

Wayne's last creamery is outgrown

The last creamery in Wayne—and one of the last in northeast Nebraska—has stopped churning.

For many years, dairy farmers brought cream to the creamery which is now located at Roberts Feed & Seed. Those days are gone.

Mark and Carol Griesch have sold Roberts Feed & Seed to Brooks and Jennifer Widner of Wayne. The couple, which takes possession today (Monday) will continue all phases of operation at the business except for the creamery.

CAROL GRIESCH says the cream business has put itself out of business. Technology has led to its downfall.

"It's a piece of history becoming obsolete. Bulk milk is the easiest way to go," Carol said. "Everyone sells bulk milk, there are no separators now."

The cream business was booming back in the 1950s and creameries required four employees. One man would carry in cream and eggs, another would wash cans, one would test the cream and another would write out checks. On Saturday nights, farmers would bring their cream into town.

Roberts creamery has been operating at its present location since 1951 when Evert Roberts got his cream station license. At that time the business handled as many as 200 five-gallon cans of cream a night. Carol estimated there were 10 or 12 cream stations in Wayne in the 50s.

THE CREAM business at Roberts Feed & Seed is now down to three customers this summer. The business tests the cream and pays customers on the amount of butterfat in it.

Customers now receive 81 cents for each butterfat pound. In 1951, 55 cents was paid per butterfat pound. The price has been as low as 50 cents at one point since the Griesches purchased the business in 1976. That year, there were still 21 or 22 regular cream customers.

After the cream is tested and purchased by Roberts Feed & Seed, it is then sold to the West Point Dairy, which picks it up and churns it.

The first cream station in Wayne was started in 1931 by H. B. Graham, who built the building and opened an ice cream plant. He made ice cream there until Bill Schmitz took over for a short time.

ROBERTS FEED & Seed is much more than just a creamery. The business sells Garst seeds, Sexauer seeds, NABP seeds, Hubbard Feed, farm chemicals and operates an egg buying station.

The Griesches have sold the business because Mark became district manager for the Garst Seed Company on July 1.

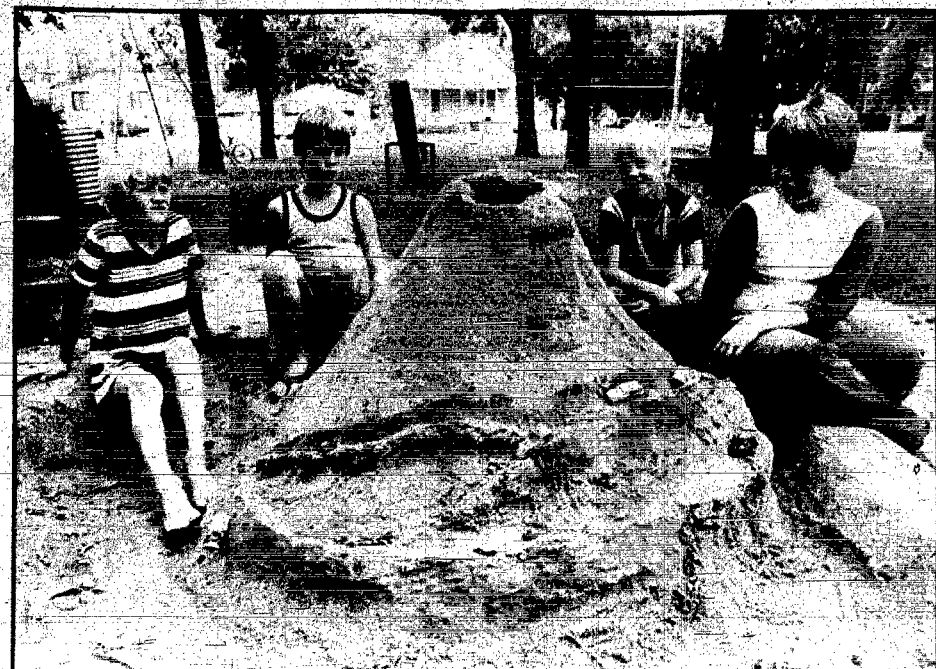

Another Wayne Chicken Show is in the history books and most residents are all chickened out for the summer. Yet, clippings from other newspapers and correspondence from across the country keep infiltrating this office.

I'm sure there are many, many newspaper articles we'll never see in Wayne, America. But some of the mail we've received is sort of interesting. I'll share some of that in this column and then close the books on another chicken show until next summer.

Many newspapers picked up an Associated Press newswire article which originated at The Wayne Herald's office. The AP also had a photo of Wayne's own Deryl Lawrence practicing his putting stroke. The voice of Wayne's Nick Zimmer, a KTCH radio disc jockey, was heard on many radio stations through a story he did for AP.

Our summer intern, Michelle Kubik, brought in a clipping from the Colorado Springs Sun which was sent from her uncle and aunt, Hu and Crete Rodman. The Colorado paper ran both the Associated Press story and photo of Lawrence.

One of the most creative articles (also one of the longest) I've seen was sent to us from R. Howe of Northridge,

Cal. It appeared in the Northridge Daily News and was written by staff writer Robert Ballenger.

The story appears with a two-column illustration of a man dressed in a chicken outfit and a sign that says, "Welcome to Wayne, Nebraska: Chicken Population..."



The article starts like this: "On Saturday, as many as 5,000 otherwise normal folks played chicken in the streets of Wayne, Neb. Fowl play has been going on there for three years now. It is all part of Wayne's annual Chicken Show, an offbeat cackle in an area known for its corn and soybean

production."

Later in the article, the author tells his readers where Wayne is located. "Wayne, in northeastern Nebraska about 100 miles from Omaha, is definitely off the beaten path."

Ballenger wrote about many of the festival's activities including the fun run. "Saturday morning's festivities were not exactly chicken droppings either. The day started off with an 8-mile 'fun run' from—where else—an egg processing plant in nearby Wakefield to downtown Wayne."

The Northridge paper isn't the only one in California to run a story about Chicken Days.

Paul Kirkwood, who is visiting his uncle Norman Haglund of rural Wakefield, brought in a copy of the San Jose Mercury this week.

The article starts, "Chicken lovers clucked, plucked and pecked their way to the amusement of about 300 onlookers at the third annual Chicken Show in Wayne, Neb."

The seven-paragraph story continues. "More than a dozen people participated in contests to cluck like chickens and call chickens. The chicken call ranged from truly fowl sounds to one youngster's plea, 'Come on chicken, I need \$\$.'"

Also in my file of chicken stuff is a letter from Early Real Estate of Bethel, Maine, whose motto is "something to crow about."

The letter says, "Dear Sir: We thought you might like to know that you made the Portland Press Herald today, and we also want you to know that we totally disagree with what appears to be the editor's last line comment. We think you are great."

The letter also asks if anyone out here can tell them where they can get an adult-size chicken suit for their upcoming open house in August.

Enclosed with the letter is the article which appeared in the Portland (Maine) Press Herald. It says, "Wayne, Neb. has a chicken show. In a story about the show, The Wall Street Journal headline was straightforward enough: 'On July 9, People in Wayne, Neb. With Dress Like Chickens and Sing.'"

It continues, "The Chicken Show will attract about 2,000 people who will play chicken games, sing chicken songs and behave like chickens. Why? Just a lot of silliness," a show planner told the Journal. "There's no valid social implications."

The Portland column ends with the author's comment, "How about mental ones?"

ask a lawyer

Q: I worked for a doctor for 16 years and then found out that he was required to pay me minimum wage and had not been doing so. The Wage and Hour people would go back only one year on my past-due wages. Is there any way I can collect for the other 15 years? I no longer work for him.

A: It is difficult to answer your question without further facts. Generally, the Department of Labor, Wage and Hour Division, has the authority to collect shortages on required minimum wage payments for a period of two years prior to the time a formal complaint is filed by a Department of Labor attorney in federal court.

Such a complaint would not be filed unless an investigation of the employer showed a violation of the regulation and it was determined that no informal settlement with the employer would be possible.

If it can be shown that the employer intentionally violated the Wage and Hour regulations, the Department of Labor may go back three years to recover shortages. There is no recourse for shortages in the minimum wage prior to the two or three year periods described above.

With respect to your particular situation, you may want to contact the Wage and Hour investigator who conducted the investigation in your case, or the District Director of the Wage and Hour Division, Department of Labor in Omaha, Nebraska.

Like most state and federal agencies, the Wage and Hour Division routinely responds to inquiries from the public regarding rights which exist under the laws they administer or with respect to investigations they have conducted. An agent of the Wage and Hour Division should be able to obtain the specific information about the investigation of your case which you need to answer your inquiry.

If, after consulting with the Wage and Hour Division, you are still in doubt as to what has happened, you may want to contact an attorney with experience in the field of labor relations to discuss your situation more fully.

In general, if the Wage and Hour Division has entered into a settlement, that settlement will preclude a lawsuit by you. However, the final answer to that question would depend upon the precise terms of such settlement as might have been reached with your former employer.

What she is teaching the dog is not to come to her. Would you return to someone who beat you?

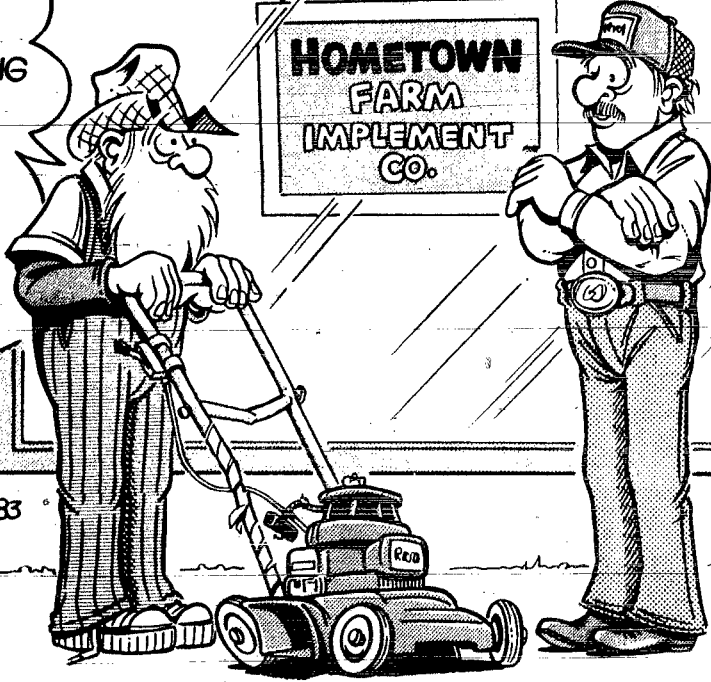

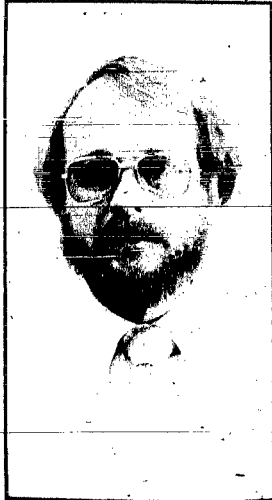

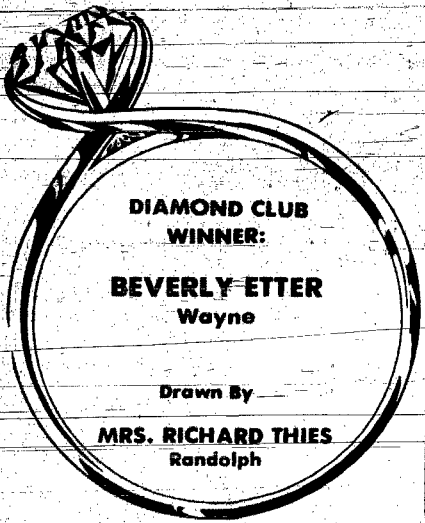
"Considering the economy, I think they were fair in determining the increase."—Chuck Ahlvers, Wayne
