School's proposed budget includes 4 percent raise

Wayne-Carroll public school teachers and other employees will receive a four percent salary increase under District 17's proposed 1983-84 budget.

Under the proposal, all classes of employees will be given four percent raises for the 83 98 school year.

The budget proposal calls for a state and local lax base increase, excluding retire ment fund costs, of \$125,656 or .0602 percent. That figure is \$7,488 tess thap allowed by the seven percent state lid on tax revenue in creases.

DESPITE THE lax base increase, figures released by Wayne Superintendent Francis Haun show that the request for local proper y laxes is actually reduced \$33,058 or .0254 percent from the 1982 83 request of \$33,000 percent

percent from the 1982 83 request of \$1,311,090

The reduction in local property taxes is due to an increase of \$43,599 in state aid and the anticipated full payment of non resident high school futilion.

The total proposed budget increase, in cluding tittle programs, block grants, lunch, federal, state and pre-school costs is \$147,044 or .0673 percent, Haun said The proposed total budget of expenditures, executing these categorical programs, is \$122,055 or .0590 percent.

This addition to salary increases, two other

major increases were caused by medical in-surance costs which escalated by 20 per-cent, and changes in the school employee refirement law which resulted in a budget increase of \$24,331 for the upcoming school

THE CREAM business at Roberts Feed & Seed is now down to three customers this summer. The business tests the cream and pays customers on the amount of butterfat in it.

Customers now receive 81 cents for each butterfat pound. In 1951, 55 cents was paid per butterfat pound. The price has been as low as 50 cents at one point since the Griesches purchased the business in 1976. That year, there were still 21 or 22 regular cream customers.



It continues. "The Chicken Show will altract about 2,000 people who will play chicken games, sing chicken songs and behave like chickens, Why? "Just a lot of stillness," a show planner told the Journal. There's no valid social im pications."

ask a lawyer

Q: I worked for a doctor for 16 years and then found out that he was required to pay me minimum wage and had not been doing so. The Wage and Hour people would go back only one year on my past-due wages. Is there any way I can collect for the other 15 years? I no longer work for him.

A: It is difficult to answer your question without further facts. Generally, the Department of Labor, Wage and Hour Division, has the authority to collect shortages on required minimum wage payments for a period of two years prior to the time a formal complaint is filed by a Department of Labor attorney in federal court.

Such a complaint would not be filed unless an investigation of the employer showed a violation of the regulation and it was determined that no informal settlement with the employer would be possible.

If it can be shown that the employer intentionally violated the Wage and

If it can be shown that the employer intentionally violated the Wage and Hour regulations, the Department of Labor may go back three years to recover shortages. There is no recourse for shortages in the minimum wage prior to the two or three year periods described above. With respect to your particular situation, you may want to contact the Wage and Hour investigator who conducted the investigation in your case, or the District Director of the Wage and Hour Division, Department of Labor in Omaha, Nebraska.

Like most state and federal agencies, the Wage—and Hour Division routinely responds to inquiries from the public regarding rights which ex-

routinely responds to inquiries from the public regarding rights which exist under the laws they administer or with respect to investigations they have conducted. An agent of the Wage and Hour Divisor should be able to obtain the specific information about the investigation of your case which you need to answer your inquiry.

If, after consulting with the Wage and Hour Division, you are still in

doubt as to what has happened, you may want to confact an attorney with experience in the field of labor relations to discuss your situation more fully. In general, if the Wage and Hour Division has entered into a settlement,

that settlement will preclude a lawsuit by you. However, the final answer to that question would depend upon the precise terms of such settlement as might have been reached with your former employer.





State sets bag limits

he Nebraska Game and Perks Commissioners set season dates, and possession timits on rail, snipe, woodcock, grouse, and urning dove at their meeting in Lincoln July 21.

Ifter hearing reports on the status of the five Nebraska species, minissioners voied to follow Wildlife Division staft recommendate down the line for the up-coming early funting season.

Iologists told: the Commissioners information obtained from antity completed "coo-counts" indicates Nebraska dove numbers re declined about 9.5 percent from last year's population imates. Biologists termed that amount of decline "not significate out that Nebrasko's population is still higher than average in the Central Management Unit.

me average in the Central Management Unit.

"Coo counts" are made by Commission personnel who travel preselected routes and stop at intervals to listen for and count the
numbers of doves heard. Nebraska's 1983 average of 36.9 doves perroute remains higher than the Central Management's Unit's average
of 25.9 doves per route. Nebraska, Kansas, and the Dakotas are the
peak dove production areas of the Central Management Unit.
The 1983 Nebraska mourning dove season will be Septémber 1
through October 15, the daily bag limit will be 12 and the possession
limit will be 24 doves. Shooting hours will be 30 minutes before
surrise to sunset.

Grouse hunters can look forward to a season 16 days longer than last year's and the opportunity to combine grouse hunts with deer and duck hunts. Biologists fold the Commissioners breeding ground surveys show the 1983 spring grouse population up approximately 14 percent over lost spring. The biologists don't anticipate much change in total harvest over last year, which was up four percent from 1981 on a statewide basis.

The 1983 grouse season will be September 17-through November the daily bag limit will be three birds, the possesion limit will ine grouse. Shooting hours will be 30 minutes before sunrise

sunset.

The 1983 Nebraska rail hunting season will be Selember 1 through November 9. The daily bag limit will be 10 birds, the possession limit will be 20 rail. The snipe season will be September 1 through December 15. The daily bag limit will be 8, the possession limit will be 16 snipe. The woodcock season will be September 15 through November 18. The daily bag limit will be 5, the possession limit 10 woodcock. Shooting hours for these three species will be 30 minutes before surgice to sunset.

Deer permits available

A total of 3,259 firearm deer permits for the 1983 hunting season will go on sale on a first-come, first-served basis August 1, the Game and Parks Commission announced Thursday.

Beginning August 1 resident hunters who have not already purchased a 1983 firearm deer permit, as well as all non-resident hunters, may apply for permits remaining in the eight management units. Those units and the number of permits still available are Calamus East Unit, 379 permits; Calamus West Unit, 346 permits; Keya Paha Unit, 27 permits; Loup West Unit, 214 permits (Ridge Unit, 439 permits; Plains Unit, 286 permits; Sandhills Unit, 1,038 permits; and Upper Platte Unit, 126 permits.

If there are still permits remaining September 1, hunters already holding a 1983 firearm deer permit may purchase a second permit in units wiere permits are still available.

Permit applications must be accompanied by a check in the cor-

holding a 1933 tirearm oper permit may pursuant units where permits are still available.

Permit applications must be accompanied by a check in the correct amount of the permit. Resident deer hunting permits are \$20. on resident permits are \$100. The hunter must also purchase \$47.50 Nebraska Habital Stamp in order to hunt or trap any game species in state. Permit applications should be mailed to Nebraska Game'and Parks Commission headquarters. Box 30370, Lincoln, NE 68503. Applications received prior to August 1 will be returned.

Turkey population up




