



### ask a lawyer

a public service of the nebraska state bar association

Q: I am a 59-year-old man who became totally disabled as a result of an on-the-job accident in February. Workmen's Compensation paid all of the doctor and hospital bills.

The company I worked for paid me for all of February and six months additional at half pay. Now they say they are no longer liable for any more bills, claims, etc. My question is, can I sue them for damages for future loss of income, pain and suffering or future medical bills?

A: Coverage under the Nebraska Workmen's Compensation Law is an exclusive remedy by the employee for accidents arising out of and in the course and scope of employment.

Unless you and your employment.

Unless you and your employer have elected to be excluded from the Nebraska Workmen's Compensation Law, you may not sue your employer for future loss of pay, pain and suffering or Lost wages. Since you indicate that your expenses have been covered by Workmen's Compensation, it is

clear that you did not elect to be excluded from this coverage.

The amount you are entitled to receive for the injuries you sustained is governed by this law. If you question whether you have received all of the benefits to which you are legally entitled, ask your attorney to look into the situation and advise you.

Q: How can you get a judgment against a party owing you money? Do you take them to small claims court and ask the judge to grant the judgment? Can you collect interest on the account until it is paid?

A: To obtain a money judgment, a lawsuit must be filed. It may be filed in small claims court if the amount claimed is \$1,000 or less. Eve has a small claims court, and in Omaha and Lincoln small claims matters are also handled through the municipal court system

Small claims court limits the participation to individuals only, with no

attorneys allowed to represent clients.

Money judgments which are sought for \$5,000 or less (this will increase to \$10,000-effective August 26, 1983) may be filed in municipal or county court. A lawsuit for any amount of money damages may be filed in district

The filing of a petition in the appropriate court initiates your claim against another person. A trial is held in which a judge or jury determines whether or not you are intitled to any money from the other party.

Whether you are entitled to interest depends upon the type of claim you have. Generally, if the account is certain and fixed, interest will be allowed, but if the amount is in dispute, interest will not be allowed. In any event, if a judgment is obtained, interest will be allowed from the time of the judgment until it is paid.

## Socialism in retreat worldwide

Yurl, Andropov, leader of the Soviet

Union, recently stated, "Communists are convinced that the future belongs to socialism Such is the march of history,"

Mr. Andropov is wrong. If a member of the Soviet. Politburo could work up the courage to tell Andropov what is happening in the world he would realize that around the globe socialism is in full retreat. It has fallied as an economic system. If is intellectually bankrupt. And, moreover, the people know this.

In the democratic nations of the West, election after election has demonstrated the popular support for the free enterprise system and the rejection of state controlled economies.

IN 1979, Margaret Thatcher won a land silde victory over the Labour Party which had been moving swiftly toward a socialist world view. Britlain's rejection of socialism was reconfirmed in the June 9 landslide for Thatcher and free market Tory Party. In Germany, Helmut Kohl's coalition toss ed out the increasingly left wing Social Democrat party which had ruled West Germany for more than 10 years.

many for more than 10 years.

In Norway, Denmark and Japan the par fies that supported lower taxes, less regulation and growth oriented free market policies have been elected or reelected. And in France, the people have taken to the streets in violent demonstrations when the socialist government they elected actually imposed socialism on the French people. In those nations controlled by the Communists (who do not allow elections), the people continue to vote with their feet Despite the Berlin Wall, Eastern Europeans continue to fiee westward to the capitalist nations. Whenever-Fidel Castro opens the smallest crack in the door from his Island prison, thousands risk their lives leaving everything behind to fiee.

Vietnam offers another example. Throughout that nation's history it has suffered occupation by the Chinese. The Japanese, a long and brutal war during the 1980s, and natural disasters such as typhonos and famine. And yet, it was only the imposition of socialism which caused the mass exodus of boat people'who continue To flee socialism. How bad is socialism? The

EVEN IN the Communist nations that confinue to profess belief in socialism, economic necessity is bringing free market reforms. China and the Soviet Union are allowing small plots of private farmland—which invariably outperform the larger collective farms. Their economic journals discuss incentives and yes, even profils. Hungary is leading the way in

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




