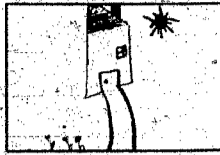

## Safety seats required

Drivers who don't have their children buckled up will be subject to a fine under a new Nebraska state law which went into effect Friday.

The law requires that a child restraint system be used when transporting any child under the age of four. A seat safety belt can be used for children over the age of one. Anyone found guilty of violating the law will be fined \$25. Area hospitals and concerned citizen groups are renting equipment to meet the requirements of this law.

"Obeying the new Nebraska law on child restraints in automobiles is one of the best things people can do to help insure safety for children," Dr. Daine Peetz, president of the Nebraska Medical Association, said.

"I urge every driver to learn about the law and to respect its purpose," Dr. Peetz said. "In my years of practice, I have seen how people of all ages are maimed and killed in auto accidents. Without question, seat belts and other restraints are worth their weight in gold in preventing harm to the people in accidents."

## Three Wayne stores burglarized

Three Wayne businesses were burglarized sometime early Tuesday morning.

According to Wayne Police Department reports, the Pizza Hut, Griess Rexall and Sav-Mor Pharmacy were all hit by burglars.

A BURGLAR or burglars made off with approximately \$1,000 from the Pizza Hut on East Highway 35. A heavy bar apparently was used to break the dead bolt and pry open the south door of the Pizza Hut between 2:30 and 8:30 a.m. Tuesday.

A Pac-Man machine was broken into and an estimated \$400 to \$500 in quarters was taken. An estimated \$300 in cash, which was

being stored in the machine, also was removed.

The cash register was forced open and approximately \$200 was taken. Officers Robert McLean and Ronald Penlerick tested for finger prints Tuesday morning.

GRIESS REXALL was hit by vandals for the second time in about two months. Suspects removed the light bulb above the back door and forced open the door at the same location as the previous burglary there, according to the police report.

A narcotics cabinet door was pried off but

no narcotics were kept there. An estimated \$150 was taken from a drawer of the prescription room and an unsuccessful attempt was made to force open the cash register drawer.

Approximately 350 two-milligram tablets of valium and another 700 five-milligram tablets of valium were taken.

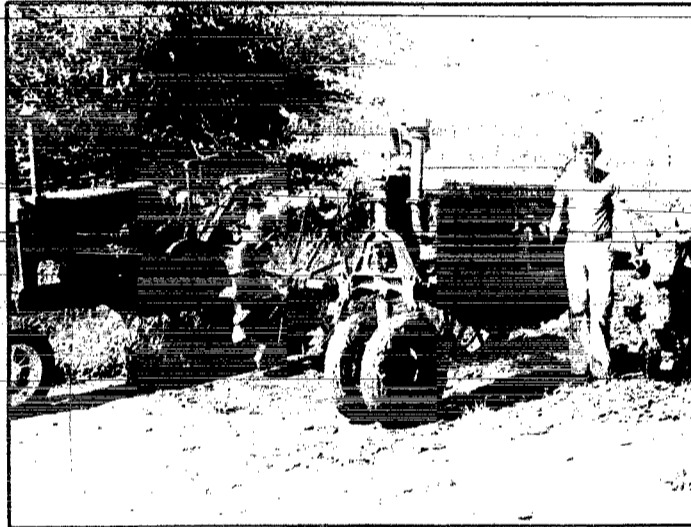
The burglary occurred sometime early Tuesday morning or late Monday night according to the report.

SAV-MOR PHARMACY also was struck by vandals early Tuesday morning according to the police report.

The burglar or burglars forced open a door and entered the building. A cash register was forced open and an undetermined amount of cash was taken. A metal file cabinet, containing a small amount of cash, was removed from the store.

Both drug stores were tested for finger prints.

Another theft was reported just after midnight that same morning. Two floor mats, which were cleaned and left outside at Casey's General Store for a short while, were stolen. Estimated value of the mats is \$35 each.

## Tinkering with tractors

Jody Jones likes to tinker with tractors. Especially old ones.

This week, the Allen High School senior will be taking an antique tractor to the Nebraska State Fair for the second consecutive year.

This year, his 1936 John Deere A tractor has qualified for competition

at the fair. Last year, it was a 1929 Farmall Regular. Bus Good gave the Farmall to Jody when he was just six years old.

Jody, who lives on a farm south and east of Allen, works on antique tractors in his spare time. He currently is working on a 1935 Farmall that he bought at a sale two years ago.

He also has plans for several tractors owned by his grandfather, Vern Jones. He is now working on one in senior shop class.

The John Deere that Jody will take to state was purchased by his great grandfather, Frank McGuire, in 1936. Frank is now 94 years old.

He used it until 1957 and it has sat in the trees on his land since then. Last September, Jody brought it home.

Jody said he picked up most of his mechanic skills from his grandpa, Vern, who works on engines. He also learned from his father, Bob, and from high school mechanics classes.

Both rebuilt tractors are in good condition and run well. The only thing wrong with the Farmall was a stuck piston when Jody started working on it.

He cleaned it out, had it rebuilt and put it back together. A good cleaning and a paint job finished the project. The tractor earned him a purple ribbon at state.

The John Deere also had a stuck piston. When the piston was pressed, the engine block broke so Jody had to get a used block and install it. To complete the project, he cleaned and painted the tractor.

Jody said he will take the tractor to the state fair on his grandpa's trailer.

It will be judged on how well it runs, a parts list, a story about the tractor, its appearance and what work was done to renovate it.

The 17 year old said he examines the motor first when fixing up an old tractor. Once the motor is repaired, there isn't much to do but clean and paint, he said.

The two tractors Jody has restored originally had steel wheels on the front but someone cut them off and put on rubber tires. They would be worth a lot more money now if that hadn't been done, Jody said.

Jody spent the better part of a year working on each of the tractors. The Farmall took a little more than a year but Jody said he worked at it slowly in his spare time.

He got the John Deere a week after last year's State Fair and worked on it until the Dixon County Fair.

"My grandma said it looks just like it did the day her dad drove it home," Jody said of the John Deere.

The engines of both tractors are four cylinder and were made to run on kerosene. Jody now runs them on gasoline but said they probably would still run on kerosene.

Unlike today's tractors which average between 100 and 150 horse power, the old tractors had probably 25 horse power, Jody said.

The Allen senior said he expects the tractors to last many years and added that he hopes to keep adding to his collection.

"I really like doing it. When a tractor sits for 30-some years and you get it running again, it makes you feel good," he said. "There isn't any plastic on these tractors. They're about all cast iron."

## Lincoln man purchases Hometown

Hometown IGA has a new owner but he says no major changes are planned.

Ron Burt, 47, took over as owner of the Wayne grocery store early this week. He and his family, wife Kristi, 21 year-old son Rex, two year-old daughter Mandy and one year-old son Matt, have moved to Wayne from Lincoln.

Burt, who is originally from Bassett, worked 10 years as a meat manager for a Safeway store in Lincoln and eight years for Jack and Jill.

The new IGA owner said he missed the small town atmosphere while working in Lincoln. "It's a different world. The biggest thing in a small town is that you know your customers by name," Burt said. "I missed the casual type relationships you couldn't get in Lincoln. And we want to raise our children in a smaller place."

Burt said Hometown's previous owner, Vic Patik, sold the business because he felt he was being spread too thin with a store in Wayne and another in David City. He wanted to spend more time with his family.

The new owner said he is planning only some small changes.

Burt's first couple days in Wayne have made him feel welcome, he said. "I already get the welcome feeling. That's what I was looking for. Two dozen people have welcomed me to town. The welcome has been warm and friendly. It's everything I was looking for."

THE CITY COUNCIL officially accepted Dick Korn's resignation as fire chief, Tuesday night. Korn stepped down from the position several weeks ago and Dutch Siltzman was elected new chief.

The Council's action was basically a formally with the appointment of Siltzman as

Kloster also said on behalf of the city council that he wanted to thank Dick Korn for his years of service as fire chief.

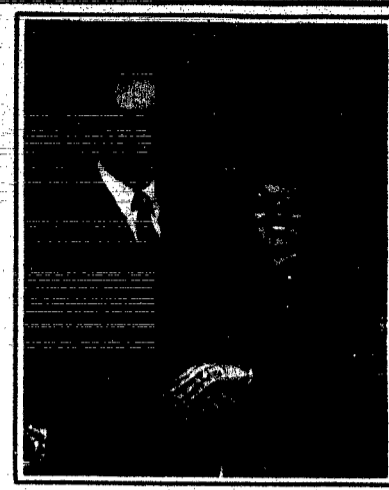



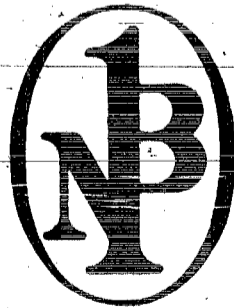

### Hunting seasons open today

First light today (Thursday) saw thousands of Nebraska hunters in the field eager to take advantage of opening day of mourning dove, cottontail rabbit, rail and snipe seasons.

Mourning dove "coo-counts" made in May indicated a slight decrease in Nebraska's 1983 dove breeding population, but that population was still significantly higher than the average for the entire Central Management Unit made up of 14 states — Montana, Wyoming, Utah, New Mexico, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri and Arkansas. Weather is the biggest factor in dove hunting — a few nights of cool temperatures can hasten southern migration.

The dove season will be Sept. 1 through Oct. 15. Hunters may take 12 doves per day and have a total of 24 in possession.

Cottontail rabbit hunters are expected to enjoy a season comparable to last year's, as good cottontail populations have been reported in most areas of the state. Though the cottontail is an excellent game animal that provides first-rate hunting opportunities, most Nebraska hunters take them incidental to other species. Biologists say the cottontail is one of the most underutilized game species available in the state.

The 1983 cottontail season begins today (Thursday) and will continue through Feb. 29, 1984. Hunters may take seven bunnies per day and have a total of 21 in possession.

Nebraska's Virginia and Sora Rail season opens Sept. 1 and continues through Nov. 9. Hunters may take 10 rail daily and have 20 in possession.

The 1983 Common Snipe season is Sept. 1 through Dec. 15. The daily bag limit is 8, the possession limit is 16.

Legal shooting hours for all game species are 30 minutes before sunrise to sunset.

To hunt these species outdoorsmen must have a 1983 Nebraska hunting license, which sells for only \$8.50, and a 1983 Nebraska Habitat Stamp which sells for \$7.50. Both are available from any Game and Parks Commission office in Lincoln, Omaha, Norfolk, Bassett, North Platte, Alliance or the Ak-Sar-Ben Aquarium, Schramm Park SRA near Gretna, or from any of 1100 permit vendors across the state.
