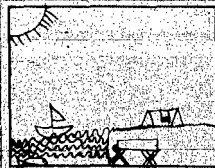

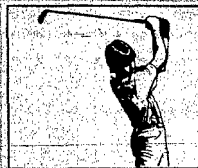

## Driver ed program reviewed

A proposal to increase per pupil summer driver education fees from \$10 to \$15, requested by Mike Mallette of Wayne to the Wayne-Carroll School Board, will be reviewed.

But no action will likely take place until the request has been passed through proper negotiation committee channels.

In a policy adoption Wednesday evening, the school board stated its position that they will consider changes in salary or working conditions of an instructor "only after the request had been channeled through the proper negotiation committee process."

The \$5 in added fees would be earmarked toward paying an increase of salary for "behind the wheel" instruction, which takes in six hours of the total 36 hour course.

School board member Neil Sandahl, in looking at a survey of summer driver education salaries paid by school districts in comparability array, wondered if an increase was necessary in view of the school district's efforts in "trying to hold down the costs."

Revealed in the survey was what instructors received in salaries on a per pupil basis. Wayne was listed first at \$66 per pupil (\$69 if the fee increase is approved), followed by Randolph, \$65; Wisner, \$55; West Point, \$50; Norfolk, \$40; and Tokamah, \$33.

However, Mallette pointed out that South Sioux, Central City and Schuyler came out higher when figuring on an hourly wage basis. All three came in at \$10 or over per hour for the six hours of required driving time.

"If I was a first year teacher stepping into the position at \$10 an hour, I would feel pretty good about it," he said.

Board President Becky Keidel was apprehensive about acting on an individual instructor's salary request. "I feel this is something that Dr. Haun should handle for us,"

driver education program is in the summer months. One reason why the program is offered during the school year is to accommodate students who reside a great distance from Wayne. Because the classes are scheduled during school hours, the students do not have to drive the extra miles during the summer months, once the school year ends.

"This is a program parents really support. It's a very worthwhile program," Mallette said.

**IN OTHER SCHOOL business,** the board:

• Learned that ESU No. 1 will cut Wayne-Carroll's school nursing salary by 20 minutes a day. The school district would have to "buy back" the 20 minutes subtracted by ESU, which could cost the district approximately \$115 a week.

• Cutting 20 minutes a day doesn't seem like much, but it is less than what we wanted to cut in the first place," said Keidel.

"In some districts, having a school nurse is the only health care they [students] get," she said.

• Joyce Reeg made the motion to pay for the extra 20 minutes daily and it was approved unanimously by the remainder of the school board.

• Gave the go ahead to build an office at the high school for Ron Carnes, new Wayne-Carroll Athletic Director.

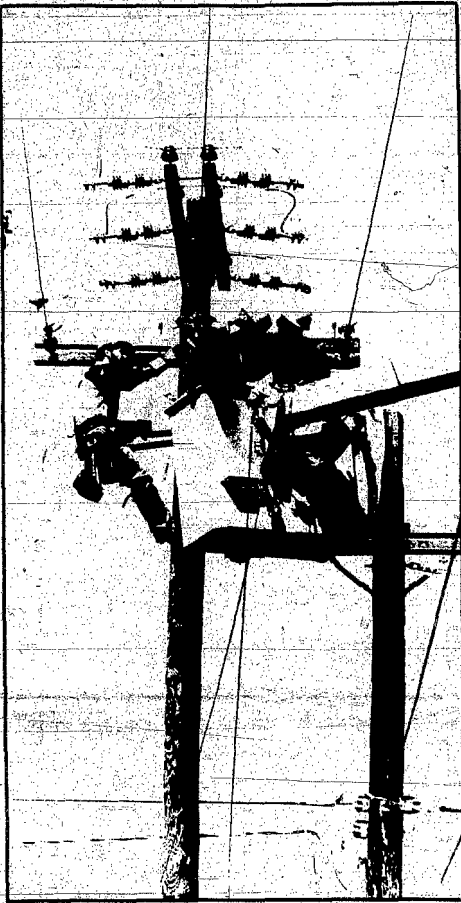
• Was informed by Superintendent Haun that a \$2,500 technical assistance grant for an energy study at Wayne-Carroll High School was approved by the state of Nebraska. Haun said technicians will be obtained to audit energy consumption within the high school. Later, the school district can turn around and apply for a federal energy to remedy problem areas that the technicians had found in their audit.

• Accepted the resignation of High School Counselor Curt Frye, who will become the Associate Dean of Students at Wayne State College. Frye had been employed at Wayne-Carroll School District for the past nine years.

• Approved a request presented by Wayne Middle School Principal Dick Mettler and High School Principal Don Zeiss to allow early entrance of interested students into the high school's academic science program (particularly into the physical science course).

**THE MOST important criteria** in the program, Zeiss said, is that the staff members who work in the program shall be chosen on the basis of their interest, ability and special training in the area; and that students should be nominated for early entrance only if they display a sincere desire to participate.

Attempts will be made to schedule the student in both eighth and ninth grade science concurrently (earth science and physical science).

## Financial responsibility proof to be required

A bill pertaining to financial responsibility, introduced by Wayne Senator Gerald Conway, has passed through the Nebraska legislature and has been signed by Governor Kerrey.

On May 7, lawmakers gave 27-16 final approval to a bill that would require car owners to show proof of financial responsibility before they could buy license plates. The proof of financial responsibility must be presented to county officials before the cars can be registered. A form would be provided by the insurance company showing the effective and expiration dates of their policy.

According to the terms of the law, uninsured motorists would be required to either get insurance or

show financial responsibility by filing a bond, certificate of deposit of money or securities, or a certificate of self insurance with the state Department of Motor Vehicles.

Car owners would be required to keep proof of financial responsibility in their cars under the bill's provision.

Motorists, if stopped by a law enforcement officer, could be asked to show the proof form. Car owners have 10 days to comply in providing the proof of financial responsibility. If unable to comply, motorists could be found guilty of Class II misdemeanor, which carries a maximum \$1,000 fine or a maximum six-month prison sentence or both.

If the bill is signed, it will go into effect Jan. 1.

## Crime Stoppers seeking information on theft

The Norfolk Area Crime Stoppers is seeking information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person(s) involved in the following crime.

**TYING DRIVERS' education** salaries to the negotiation process would be helpful, Mallette said. "It would eliminate meetings like this. But we do need help and input from the board members and members of the community."

• Approved three additional entry level steps for classified staff of the school district. The first level for teacher aide salary and secretarial salary, 1985-86 is \$4.50 an hour, with level two at \$4.60 and level three at \$4.70 per hour.

Entry level for custodians will be \$5 an hour; level two, \$5.10 and level three, \$5.20 per hour. For housekeepers and cooks, entry level is at \$4.45 an hour, followed by level two at \$4.55 and level three at \$4.65 per hour.

Haun said the classified staff will move up the first year (after evaluation). But nothing will be automatic after that.

"Nobody on the staff now will have a salary cut," Haun said.

at Wayne Elementary in the amount of \$850; to pay costs of one teacher to attend Paula Rome Summer Workshop in Rochester, Minnesota, \$1,122; pay costs for Sally McNeill and Mary Lou George to attend C. Wilson Anderson Workshop in Lincoln on Aug. 5-16. Costs of tuition for college credit are excluded.

• Approved the Educational Service Unit's special education contract, at a package price of \$28,276 (without the speech therapists).

• And accepted a Gifted Education board policy, which says the board of education recognizes, from a conceptual base, the need for gifted (academically talented) students to be a part of an educational program which will provide intellectual challenges appropriate to their special talents.

The policies state that the board of education supports a broad based K-12 staff training program which will enable classroom teachers to assist the gifted (academically talented) student in reaching his/her highest intellectual potential. The board also endorses continued development of a counseling segment designed to enhance understanding by the student of his/her special relationships to his/her educational environment.

### Budget concerns ahead

## School free of debts

All things considered, the Wayne-Carroll School District is in sound financial condition.

This is the final year of the high school bond retirement of \$60,000. No other debts are owned by the district. The roof work on the schools are nearly completed. Remodeling projects have been paid for.

One of the board members suggested during the regular meeting on Wednesday to have something similar to a "mortgage burning ceremony" to celebrate the current debt-free conditions.

But Superintendent Francis Haun cautions on becoming too optimistic. He said the preparation of the school district proposed budget is progressing, but there will be obvious restraints on spending for the 1985-86 year.

There are still unknowns as far as the source of certain receipts are concerned.

However, Haun can pinpoint that the State Department of Education has allowed Wayne-Carroll School District over \$375,000 for tuition in 1985-1986.

Before this year, Haun said high school tuition receipts were impossible to predict because of litigation and shortfall funding. A new formula recently enacted, which is based on five-year enrollment figures and not on a per pupil basis, has tuition receipt totals "close to what we are getting now [for the 1984-85 fiscal year]."

**DESPITE THE depressed economy,** fixed costs will rise for the school district. Health insurance premiums are anticipated to rise by 14 percent and school text and supplies will increase 5 percent.

No progress has been made on 1985-86 salaries of instructors within the school district, which also enters into the budget. "Both sides are waiting to see what the state legislature will be doing this year," Haun said.

Plans for a new bus have been deleted from the budget. "We'll get by another year or two on our buses. We would like to buy a suburban," he mentioned. No federal monies for vocational educational programs, used in office education and trades and industry, will be available.

"The continued review and updating of school district goals by the board of education has provided for the most urgent school building repair, maintenance and selective remodeling," Haun wrote in a memo to the school board.

"As the budgeting process continues, we will be asking the board for assistance in prioritizing long and short-term goals for the school district," he said.

Haun said requests for computers, printers and related software continue to increase.

The 1984-1985 budget request for computers was in the \$9,000 range. For the upcoming fiscal year, the requests for computers and accompanying material have been coming in at over \$20,000. "I think it is a worthwhile expenditure," Haun said.

He said there may be money left over in this fiscal year's budget to handle some of the computer and software increase.

The computers, he said, could be used with the school district's new reading and math texts (K-8) to correct tests and to measure specific skill deficits of students. The date also enables teachers to individualize re-teaching.

The proposed budget will be presented to the board of education in June.

A source from Boyle Offices said Tuesday that interviews for the position of care centre administrator are currently being conducted and it is hoped that the opening will be filled within the next two weeks.

Three area residents have completed their GED requirements and will receive their high school diplomas, according to adult education instructor Jeannette Carlson. Completing GED tests were Brian Price of Wayne, Shirley Clausen of Pender, and Harvey Miller of Laurel. There are five GED battery of tests, including writing skills, social studies, science, reading skills and mathematics. Tests are scheduled each month and are given by Curtis Frye, Wayne High guidance counselor. Adult education classes, sponsored by Northeast Technical Community College, have been held at Wayne-Carroll High School every Tuesday evening during the 1984-85 school year. Classes will resume in September.

### Youth workers still sought

The Greater Nebraska Job Training Program is still accepting applications from young people, ages 16-21, who are seeking summer employment through the Summer Youth Employment and Training Program (SYETP). Mollie Anderson, Greater Nebraska Job Training Program Director, indicated that additional employment openings, are available due to supplemental federal funding for the summer program. "We (the SYETP) received an additional \$600,000 which translates into 35 more work slots," Anderson stated. The Greater Nebraska Job Training Program provides economically disadvantaged youth with minimum wage summer employment from May 27 through September 13. The young people will be placed at public and private non-profit community service agencies that have been designated as worksite sponsors. # Drivers Ed

Over the past months, news has flowed from the Unicameral about the importance of saving lives by requiring Nebraska motorists to wear seat belts.

And most recently, a bill (introduced and co-sponsored by Gerald Conway of Wayne) calling for car owners to show proof of financial responsibility before they buy license plates, has passed through the legislature and was signed by Governor Kerrey. It will go into effect on Jan. 1, 1986.

The nature of this law is to reduce the number of uninsured motorists, relieving the anguish experienced by so many people who know what it is like to have had an accident involving an uninsured.

These bills are related to saving motor vehicle accident victims both their lives and money.

So that is why we find it confusing that Wayne-Carroll High School's Driver Education program is in jeopardy. If the legislature sides with Governor Kerrey's proposal, the high school could lose \$7,840 of state reimbursement for the driver education courses.

If the state of Nebraska is so intent on boosting the safety factor of motorists on state highways, why cut at the very root of creating safe drivers?

That root begins with the basic fundamentals taught to the impressionable 14-year-olds through driver education programs across the state.

Not all students take driver education classes. It is not a required course. But 85 percent of the students at Wayne-Carroll High School take the class. Over 60 Wayne area youngsters are registered for the driver education program which will be in operation this summer.

The course instructs the student on defensive driving and elaborates throughout the course on the driving of vehicles after consuming drugs or alcoholic beverages.

And students who have participated in drivers education classes will get, from some insurance companies; reduction in insurance premium costs.

What could happen if the reimbursement percentage for a major share of the program's expense is eliminated?

Students over the age of 14 could be charged tuition to take the driver education class during the summer months, when the greatest number of youngsters participate in the program.

What is lost through reimbursements from the state for the driver education program could be absorbed through the general fund tax levy — making every property taxpayer in the school district pay for the support of the program.

Or the student could learn the basics of driving without the assistance of the school district, with the lessons provided by parent or guardian.

Driver education is important. Many parents believe in the program as evidenced by the high percentage of participation. So it is likely that the program will be continued.

But the apparent logic by the Governor, neglecting state financial support of driver education while approving other good measures relating to aiding victims of motor vehicle accidents, is not a solution when seeking to make cuts on the proposed state budget.

Our legislators should be informed of this.

We receive numerous news releases from the Democratic Policy Committee, chaired by Robert C. Byrd.

Just after the tax deadline of April 15, a release came entitled "SAVING YOUR DEFENSE TAXES. On April 15 You Bought the Pentagon's..." It begins with a quote from President Ronald Reagan: "We cannot continue any longer our wasteful ways at the expense of the workers of this land..." That statement was made in February of 1981.

It goes on to say: "Shortly after taking office, President Reagan charged that the United States could continue its wasteful ways at the expense of the workers of this land..."

During the next four years,

however, Americans were treated to a seemingly unending series of revelations about the Pentagon's paying outrageous prices for tools, spare parts and other equipment. In many instances, these horror stories have involved purchases of simple, off-the-shelf items which can be purchased in hardware stores with pocket change, or a few dollars at most.

MANY OF these revelations were exposed by the Pentagon's Independent Inspector General's office which was created in May of 1980, over the opposition of the Administration, by Senate Democratic-sponsored legislation "to promote economy, efficiency and effectiveness" in the

Defense Department and "to prevent and detect fraud and abuse" in its programs and operations.

- As a result it has been learned that with your tax dollars the Pentagon has paid:
  - \*\$44 for a lightbulb.
  - \*\$640 for a toilet seat cover.
  - \*\$436 for a coffee hamster.
  - \*\$7,422 for a ledge maker.
  - \*\$180 for a flashlight.
  - \*\$148 for a rubber washer.
  - \*\$427 for a tape measure.
  - \*\$1,118 for a 22-cent plastic stool cap.
  - \*\$242 for a push switch.
  - \*And \$272 for a \$3.75 soldering iron.

ON APRIL 15, Americans paid their income tax.

If you paid the government \$500 in

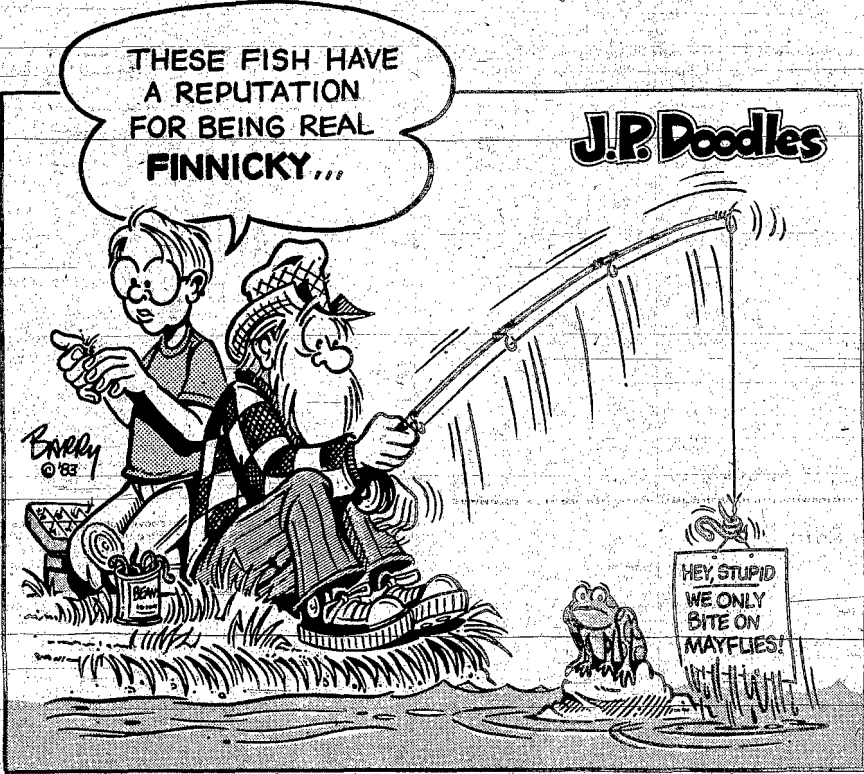
taxes, you just bought the Pentagon a hammer and two lightbulbs.

If you paid \$1,000, you bought the Pentagon a toilet seat cover and a tape measure — you almost paid enough to enable it to purchase a 22-cent plastic stool cap.

And if you paid a whopping \$11,128 in Federal income tax, congratulations. You have just bought a lightbulb, a toilet seat cover, a hammer, a coffee maker, a flashlight, a rubber washer, a tape measure, a 22-cent plastic cap, a push switch and a soldering iron.

Political parties like to pick on each other now and then. And we normally don't like to publish these articles.

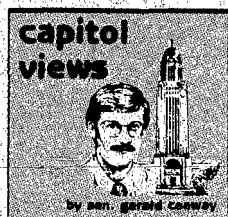

# Cuts likely in state budget

As the Unicameral begins its last three weeks of this legislative session, the attention will be on the matching of revenues with the proposed appropriations. During this period, there will also be a flurry of activity to bring various bills to the final stage before the clock runs out. If a bill has not been passed by May 31, it will not be acted upon until next January.

During this past week, I have made the decision to join with several other senators in an attempt to hold the sales and income taxes at the current rates. This can be accomplished if the tax base is expanded, and a rational, selfless plan for cutting state level operations is put into place. With state revenues being reported below earlier projections, we will



have to reduce the budget by about \$30 million to accomplish this goal. The Appropriations Committee is recommending a combination of cuts and a one percent sales tax increase

to support state operations, but many of us, including Governor Kerrey, feel that the job must be done solely through budget cuts. This, however, will not be an easy task since most everyone has their own list of what is important and what we can afford to cut.

Spending measures must be viewed in light of the current need as well as the return on investment. We must also structure the budget to include adequate reserves to insure the stability of operations. It will be much more appropriate to make the cuts now than to instruct the state agencies to make across the board cuts half way into the fiscal year.

In other action this week, the Governor signed LB 404 into law, one

of the bills I introduced and worked very hard for. It requires all motorists to prove they are financially responsible before they can register their vehicle and then maintain this proof of financial responsibility to legally operate on Nebraska roads. The law will go into effect on Jan. 1, 1986.

LB 404 will reduce the number of uninsured motorists and relieve some of the anguish experienced by so many people who know what it is like to have had an accident involving an uninsured. The passage of this bill has been sought for many years, but never achieved. I'm proud to have brought about its resolution and would like to thank all of you who provided positive support for this legislation.

## First state golf championship

# Steady team play earns Blue Devils Class B golf crown

The Wayne-Carroll varsity golf team proved that a balanced team effort can reap its share of rewards in the end.

The Blue Devil golfers turned in scores which ranged just four strokes on their way to winning their first ever Nebraska State Class B golf title Thursday, May 16 at the Alliance Golf and Country Club in Alliance.

Two-time defending state champion Superior closed out the tourney in a tie for third place with Schuyler, while Crete took runner-up honors in the 12-team event.

**SENIOR ROD DAHL** ended the 18-hole tournament as Wayne's leading player with a rounds of 36-42 for a total of 78. The score was enough to earn him a spot among the individual medalists with a tenth-place finish. Brad Olson of Elkhorn Mt. Michael was the top medalist with a two over par 74.

Tom Perry was close on Dahl's heels with scores of 40-39 for a round of 79, while senior Brad Moore shot

an 81 on the day with scores of 41-40. Sophomores David Ellis and Kevin Greiss each carded scores of 82 with identical rounds of 44-38. (Note: In high school golf competition, the four low scores are used in computing the total team score.)

Weather conditions were perfect, according to Maciejewski. "It was ideal, there was no wind...a perfect day to golf." He added that the team shot a practice round on Wednesday with wind, conditions, but "we heard the weather forecasts and knew that it should be pretty good on Thursday."

All of the guys on the team shot consistently low scores," said Wayne golf Coach Harold "Mac" Maciejewski. "They didn't do anything fancy...just shot well and that is the kind of team effort it takes to have a good season and win a state championship."

Maciejewski added that while it is unusual for a team which wins not to have more than one individual medalist, the team scored low as a

group and that proved to be the key in the "championship." That type of shooting is what is needed, rather than one player shooting extremely low and another high...they don't have to "carry" each other and it becomes a group effort rather than an individual one.

MACIEJEWSKI was quick to praise the efforts of his entire team. "There was good leadership by the upperclassmen out there on the course," Maciejewski said, and he added that it was also one of the best major tournament performances by the two sophomore members on the squad this season as well.

He added that he was especially pleased with the performance of the two sophomores, Ellis and Greiss. With a lack of actual tournament experience from their freshman year, Maciejewski said that the two came out, put in a lot of hard work and "performed like upperclassmen."

He continued, stating that the team's attitude has been a key to

their success throughout the season, one of the best in the history of the golf program at Wayne-Carroll. "Their attitudes, along with the way they perform out on the course has to be one of the reasons they did as well as they did this year. They set out wanting to do the job and play the game, and those kind of things add up to making a good team."

"They encourage each other and through the season molded together to reach the point they are at."

"We had great family support throughout the entire season, and especially all the way out in Alliance at state," he said. That support had a lot to do with the outcome of the season, Maciejewski said. "They were there with us all season long and that encourages the players to keep trying to do their best."

THE STATE GOLF crown was a reflection of the successful season for the Blue Devils, one which included wins in all of their duals and

triangular meets, and championships in all but one of their five invitational appearances.

It was the third consecutive trip to the state tourney for Wayne. The squad won their district title last year and ended in fifth place at state, and was district runner-up in 1983, before going onto state. Wayne's B-1 golf district was well represented at state, with all three of the qualifying teams placing among the top five teams. Schuyler in a tie for third place and Elkhorn Mt. Michael in fifth.

FOR MACIEJEWSKI, who plans to retire at the end of this year after 32 years in the Wayne-Carroll school system, seeing his team win the state championship was the crowning touch on a long and successful coaching and teaching career.

"Winning this kind of thing gets you really excited about coaching, seeing the players do well...it's something they all can be proud of," he said. "It's also a great

feeling for me to be part of that group."

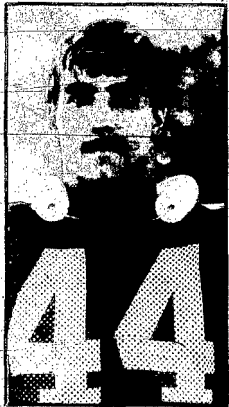
## Pehrson, Stelling lead area competitors at state track

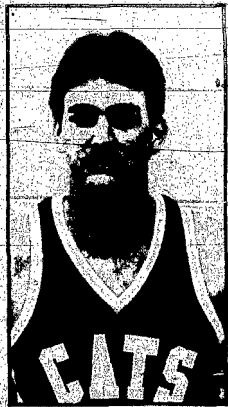

HAVE A SAFE, SOBER MEMORIAL DAY WEEKEND ON THE WATER. Memorial Day, May 27, and National Safe Boating Week, June 2-8, are good times for boaters to assess their safety practices for the upcoming boating season, says Andy Nielsen, Nebraska's Boating Law Administrator. The theme for the 1985 Safe Boating Week is "Think Before You Drink — Smart Skippers Stay Sober". While it is similar to last year's theme, it is obviously good advice anytime.

"Most everyone is aware what alcohol consumption does to the human body, but most people believe it applies more to the other guy than to themselves," Nielsen says. "A high speed boat is no place to take chances, so be careful and limit your alcohol consumption while boating."

"TAKE A FEW minutes to check all of your required boating equipment. Check to see if it's still on board and if it's in serviceable condition. Personal flotation devices (PFD's) that were used last summer or fall and put away wet may be rotted and need to be replaced."

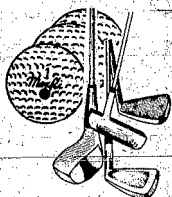
"When replacing your PFD's, be sure your new equipment has been approved by the United States Coast Guard. Remember there must be one PFD of proper size for each person on board, plus one "type-four, throwable", either a ring buoy or a seal cushion which also must be U.S. Coast Guard approved."

"If we have appreciable rains be on the lookout for floating debris in all waters, especially if you boat the Missouri River or if you will be pulling skiers," he said.

"Watch for sudden weather changes and allow plenty of time to get off the water. On larger reservoirs, the water may become rough very rapidly," Nielsen said.

Nielsen recommends boaters refresh their boating skills by enrolling in the free "Nebraska Better Boating" home study course. If interested, write Nebraska Better Boating, Box 30370, Lincoln, Neb., 68503.

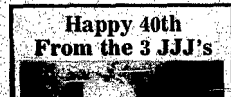

### AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR EXPENDITURES AND PAYMENT OF EXPENDITURES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY the Mayor and the Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska: . . . . . Section 1. 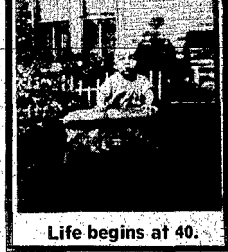
