

# Fire guts 94-year-old bank building

Several other businesses also demolished by blaze

# President says bank to open at new site

"We will be conducting business as usual," said Wayne's State National Bank and Trust Co. President David Ley Thursday following a fire which completely destroyed the 94-year-old bank building in the wee hours of the

morning:
By Thursday afternoon, Ley, a fourth generation bank president, had already announced that a temporary main bank would be set up in the former Trie Value hardware store building which the bank owns at First and Pearl 5ts.

Until then, normal business opera ions were being conducted at the bank's drive in facility at 10th and

Main St.

LEY TOLD THE Wayne, Herald late Friday, afternoon, that the temporary main bank at First and Pearl Sts. should be open for business by day (Monday).

"Equipment is streaming in now," said Ley, "and by this weekend we should have all of it in place and functioning in anticipation of Monday's opening."

opening,"
Blueprints are being prepared to reinforce the temporary bank building so that it can support the weight of vaults, and a security system is being installed.

Local bank officials are being assisted by the bank's major correspondent, First National Bank of Omaha, which sent in a team of three individuals trained in disaster prevention and organization.

"They arrived first thing Thursday and gof us going," said Ley.

BY MONDAY. LEY said he ex-pects all services to be in line at the new location, except for trust and safe deposit boxes.

He added that because of safety concerns, bank officials have not been permitted to enter the gutted in

All that remained standing following Thursday morning's blaze were dangerously unstable exterior walls consisting of heavy stone slabs.

Experts were expected to begin work this weekend on taking down the walls of the gutted building and making a final determination as to the cause of the blaze.

THE BANK president said retrieval of items from the guited bank building will have to wait until the walls are down and clearance to enter is received from the state (fire marshal, insurance company and consultants.

"They all have to be in agreement as to when the site is safe to enter and when the vaults can be obserted in minimize damage," said tery adding:

when the vaults can be opened to minimize damage, said Ley, adding that the entire bank building was remodeled in 1979 and brought up to thre code standards for maintaining records and safe deposit boxes.

Ley said clearance to begin retrieving the items could come during the early part of the week. Until the Ihems are recovered; Ley said there is 24 hour security at the safe deposit boxes, vaults and papers.

IN THE MEANTIME, Ley said the bank will be conducting, normal

IN THE MEANTIME, Ley saturine bank will be conducting normal business operations at its temporary main bank and at its drive in facility. He added that all deposit records were available through the bank's computer system and are totally safe.

DAVID, WHO became bank president in 1979, said there was only a small amount of smoke coming from the second story of the bank building when he arrived on the scene shortly after 1 a.m. Thursday after being called by police.

Flames began billowing from the roof approximately one-half hour later.

"I knew then it was serious," said Ley, "but I didn't know how serious until about an hour later."

Although Thursday morning's loss was insured, Ley said there are no estimates at this point as to the dollar amount of the damage.

# Residents waken to news of blaze

# Four towns respond to early morning alarm

("Terrible, just terrible" were the words echoed throughout Wayne Thursday morning as-residents awakened to the news of a fire during the night which destroyed his fwo-story. State National Bank and Trust Co., along with several other pusinesses.

Spectators lined the sidewalks adjacent to the site Thursday and Friday to View the charred remains of what once housed the state of the what once housed the state of the whole of the

ALSO DESTROYED or badly damaged during the early morning blaze, in buildings located to the west of the main bank building, were Century 21-State National State National Insurance Company, and Farmers Mutual which is located in the basement of the State National Insurance Co.

An apartment located directly above the bank's drīve-in'— joining the main bank building and the buildings to the west—also was destroyed by the blaze.

John Prather, sports writer for The Wayne Herald and resident of the apartment, was awakened by the smoke and escaped unharmed.

The Wayne Herald newspaper office, which adigins the bank building to the south, received smoke and water damage but was saved from the blaze by firemen who poured water onto the building while flames shot from the roof of the bank next door.

WAYNE FIRE fighters were summon

WAYNE FIRE fighters were summoned to the scene by police at approximately 1:15 a.m. Thursday.

"Things started to mushroom right away," said Fire Chief Dale Preston, adding that as things progressed it became apparent that the Wayne department was understaffed for a fire of such size.

At 1:38 a.m., Preston said he requested mutual aid from the Wakefield Fire Department. At 1:55 a.m., a call was put in for mutual aid from the Winside Fire Department, and at 2:09 a.m., the South Sioux City. Fire Department was contacted for assistance.

"To the best of my knowledge," said Prestion." a call.

PRESTON ESTIMATES there were 50 firemen on the scene from the four fowns with eight pieces of pumping and fire fighting equipment, including two aerial ladders.

"At one particular firms we were hooked.

"At one particular time we were hooked Up to six hydrants on three different mains. 
"For about two hours we were pumping approximately 3,000 gallons of water a minute, with a big portion of that going to adjoining buildings."

Preston, added that a total of A,150 feet of hose was laid out to battle the blaze.

By 5 a.m., Preston said the intensity of the fire was starling to lessen. "We knew we had saved The Wayne Herald and we felt we had stopped the spread of the fire." "By 5 a.m. we knew we were gaining ground on the fire—the fire wasn't gaining ground on us."

THE FIRST SIGNS of trouble came 1:01 a.m. Thursday when the bank's burg alarm sounded at the Wayne Police Depar

alarm sounded at the Wayne Police Department.

"A number of things can trigger the alarm," said Police Chief Vern Fairchild, adding that two officers responded to the alarm within a minute after it sounded.

The officers checked the outside of the building and found everything secure. Within four minutes after the alarm, Fair-

police station asking that the dispatcher contact bank officers.

At approximately 1:07 a.m., as an officer was returning to his car in back of the bank building. Fairchild said he heard a light popping sound and could see a whisp of smoke. The officer, according to E-airchild, immediately radioed back to the dispatcher to contact the light plant and shut off electricity to the building.

"By 1:13 a.m. we knew we had smoke and a call was put in to the fire department to stand by," said Fairchild, adding that the Jirst Irremen began arriving on the scene by 1:16 a.m.

PRATHER, WHO was asleep in the apartment located above the bank's drive-in, said
he remembers waking up at approximately
12:90.a.m.
"I smelled something but thought I was
dreaming and went back to sleep."
When Prather awakened again at about
1:30 a.m., the apartment was "extremely
smoky and smelled like a hot iron."
Prather said he went to the spare
bedroom, located in the south-end of the
apartment, and furned on the lights.
"The lights made a strange roles and

flickered on and off. I grabbed a coat, a pair of jeans, and left."

Prather, who found police investigating in the bank's drive through area, said he returned to his apartment with an officer and found the area even smoker than when he left just a few minutes earlier.
"I went back up to retrieve some cosh I remembered I had, and that was the last time I was in the apartment," said Prather; who lost all his personal belongings in the blaze.


About 30 minutes after leaving his apartment, Prather said he watched as flames began appearing through the roof of the bank, just east of the drive through.

PRESTON, WHO has been a member of the Wayne Fire Department since 1972 and fire chief since 1984, said he feels extremely fortunate that no lives were lost in the blaze.

We were very fortunate that when the floor broke loose and fell through we didn't have anyone inside the building."
Preston added that two or three firemen did receive some smoke inhalation while in the process of changing air bottles.

The fire chief added that he is extremely






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

BY DAWN THURSDAY, police he's had been strung around the BY DAWN THURSDAY, police lines had been strung around the bank's perimeters for bank security as well as spectator protection, and street barricades were put in place as traffic in the downtown area was re-routed to reduce heavy vibration. The devastation became apparent as smoke continued to billow from the building's gutted remains.

All that remained standing although dangerously unstable were the heavy stone slab walls surrounding the main bank building. "The bank itself is completed gutted," sald Preston, "but that doesn't mean that everything inside was a total loss."

total loss.

"We can't say that it was a total loss because until we get inside the area we don't know what is salvageable. We're assuming that the fireproof vaults and safe deposit boxes are intact."

WAYNE FIREMEN remained at the scene of the blaze until Friday evening when control was relinquished to the state fire marshal?s office which is continuing its investigation. Bank officials have hired off-duty police officers to provide 24-hour security at the site. Police Chief Fairchild said security will continue and barricades will remain up at the site until the walls of the guited structure have been taken down and the debris is cleared.

WORK ON TEARING down the walls was expected to begin Saturday, according to Deputy State Fire Marshal Curly McDonald of Wayne. "We're still on a holding pattern as far as our investigation." said McDonald, adding that no one will be permitted to enter the gutted bank building until the walls are taken down and the area is determined safe.

of the blaze would probably begin Sunday, with other fire marshal's arriving today (Monday).

"Hopefully," said McDonald, "we should have some information by Tuesday as to the cause of the fire."

As of Saturday, McDonald said he would not venture a guess as to what started the blaze.

Among the businsses completely, destroyed by fire Thursday was the dental office of Dr. George Goblirsch, located on the second floor of the main bank building.
Goblirsch, has practiced dentistry at the same location in Wayne since 1947, following his release from the Navy where he served as a dental officer.

Since 1947, the orice area not been remodeled and enlarged. Although his accounts receivable were, stored in a fire proof file. Goblirsch told The Wayne Herald Friday that officials have not yet been able to get near the scene of the blaze to determine if anything was salvaneable.

"Right now my plans are indefinite," said Goblirsch, adding that patients with emergency dental problems are temporarily being directed to other dentists.

In the meantime, Malcom said he and his wife are in the process of setting up a new office in the former

Dief Center building at 104 West 1st St.

"We're in the process now of getting new furniture and equipment, and we'll be back in business next week," said Malcom.

Because they won't know for days whether or not any records survived the blaze, Malcom said anyone with copies of their tax returns, and depreciation schedules should bring them to the new office when they make an appointment.
"We're in business and will recomple anything we can. And if we can't, we'll do it through the IRS."

Malcom added that his business is still operating under the same telephone number.

"The building appears to be a total loss, as well as the majority of its contents," said State National Insurance Co. Vice President Tom McClain.

Despite the loss, McClain said all policy holders are fully covered and new files will be re-established.
"Just because we were burned out, your insurance didn't burn with it," said McClain, adding that some of the files were salvaged.

McClain added that the State National Insurance Co. is temporarily re-located in the Jensen-Peters building at 305 Main St.
"We're once again prepared to

"We're once again prepared to serve our customers insurance needs," said McClain.

# Big bucks in politics

One of the foremost academic observers in the United
States has put it bluntly: "We can no longer conduct rational
defense and economic policy because of the influence of
political contributions."
A former member of Congress has talked about the
"pyschological mortgage" that members of the Senate and
House have as a result of campaign contributions.
Both are correct.

Both are correct.

The truth is that spending in political campaigns is far beyond the point of health. We are increasingly putting the decision-making process up for sale.

My campaign for the U.S. Senate costs \$5.3 million. My opponent and I had little choice under today's system. In North Carolina — with half the population of Illinois — the two Senate candidates spent twice as much as we did in Illinois. It is not that members of the Senate and House are directly for sale, but the present system means that the big contributions have greater access to policymakers, and all members know when they vote certain ways it will help; their campaign treasuries, and if they vote the opposite, it will hurt. The public loses in the process.

What can be done?

We use to have the same contribution system for the

What can be cone?

We use to have the same contribution system for the presidential elections that we currently have for the Senate and House. Presidential candidates had to spend huge amounts of time raising money. They still do until the convention nominates a candidate, but now once that convention vention holimates a candidate, out now once that convention has taken place there is public funding — paid with funding from a small box that you voluntarily check off on your income tax form.

Both candidates have the same amount of money to spend.

Senator Mathias, a Republican from Maryland, and I have introduced a bill calling for the same procedure for Senate elections that we use in the presidential races, starting in

It would substantially reduce the amount spent in cam-

Both candidates would have the same amount to spend. And like the presidential campaigns, after the primary there could be no personal or political action committee con-

tributions.

The public would be the big winner for public policy would be less influenced by who spends the big bucks.

Senator Mathias chairs the Rules Committee that has jurisdiction. That increases the possibility that something can be passed. But odds are against it.

Obviously, some of the special interests that are so dominant on the Washington scene would suffer; they oppose it. Many members of the House and Senate oppose it because there is a tendency to believe, "Whatever system got me elected must be good." elected must be good. The biggest national scandal today is the way public policy

is distorted by campaign contributions.
We ought to change it.

# Congress needs to "wake-up" to realities

After years of futile failing at bloated federal budgets. Congress has commissioned a wake-up call of its own: the Gramm-Rudman amendment. Unable to wake up to itscal reality, the legislators have ordered the Congressional Budget Office, the Office of Management and Budget and the Executive Branch to bang on the door until Congress gets off its collective duff and cuts spending.

Actually, Gramp Pudgets

ding.
Actually, Gramm-Rudman goes even further: It empowers the President-to do the cutting unless Congress makes a series of annual, salamistyle slices in the deficit leading to a balanced budget in 1991.

GRAMM-RUDMAN'S deticlences are legion. It's crude, because it avoids Congress' duty to set spending priorities. Its automatic spending-cut mechanism shields half the budget, including Social Security— the biggest ticket item of all. It leaves a lot of questions unanswered. (Would congressional salaries be subject to automatic reduction?) Heck, if might not even be constitutional?

automatic reduction?) Heck, if might not even be constitutional.

But what plan recently has not contained flaws, not left questionable programs intact, not been based on laughable economic assumptions, or not contained political poison?

In fact, the best proposal, theoretically, was Jimmy Carter's

happened to thal — and its architect?

GRAMM-RUDMAN has two advantages over any budget plan in recent memory: 1) if has passed Congress, and 2) it might just work — because it is so awful no one can afford to let it take effect.

First of all, the White House will have something, 10, hold over those Cabinet members who up to now have preferred the tashionable Washington empire-building game to the bloody budget wars: Pick up the ax, or the defense buildup goes into reverse gear. The screams of the squeamish are already echoling in the capital's media as OMB Director James Miller chops next year's budget to meet Gramm-Rudman guidelines. But we may finally see an administration budget that matches it rhetoric.



GRAMM-RUDMAN has already set in motion some serious soulset in motion some serious soul-searching within the confines of the Capital Beltway. As it takes its course, Congress will know much more about itself and its fiscal and political priorities. And so will the rest of us.



Q. In July of 1983 I fell while employed at a grocery store, injuring my noulder. In September 1983 I had minor surgery followed by a year of therapy, by doctor gave me 25% disability in December 1984, so I have been receiving ompensation this year. My arm still inst'r tight and never will be. What will appen to me — will the company just quit making payments?

A. Under the Nebraska Workmen's Compensation law, an employee receiving an injury arising out of and in the course of their employment has a right to three types of benefits: wage loss payments, medical, hospital payments and vocational rehabilitation. If the employee and the employee cannot agree on the benefits to be paid, either party may petition the Workmen's Compensation Court for resolve the dispute.

The employee is entitled to payment for all reasonable medical expenses arising from the injury. Wage loss benefits are based on the employee's average weekly wage, the extent of the disability and whether the injury is to a "scheduled member" (for example, an arm, leg or foot), or to the body as a whole.

whole.

Vocational rehabilitation is available if the employee is unable to return to work in any occupation for which he or she has been trained or had prior experience.

You have given a few details, so from your question we must assume that your disability rating was to your arm, not your body as a whole. Since you state that your arm five ever will be right, "we will assume the disability is permanent. A permanent rating means you have reached maximum healing medically. If these facts are incorrect, then the answer will be different. Prior to receiving a permanent disability rating, your company or its insurance carrier would have paid you "temporary total-disability benefits" while you were off work and receiving medical attention, and perhaps "temporary partial benefits" if you went back to work part-time. These benefits are based on 2/3 of your average weekly wage up to a maximum of \$200 (the 1983 maximum).

The loss of the use of your arm is considered a "permanent partial disability to a scheduled member" (your arm). The total loss of your arm or its use would mean wage loss benefits of 2/3 of your average weekly pay, up to a maximum of \$200 (the maximum in 1983), for a period of 225 weeks from the time a permanent rating could be given by the doctor. Since your loss is 25%, then payments will be due for 25% of 225 weeks, of 5.25 weeks.

Once all payments have been made, your employer may discontinue benefits and close your case. If you disagree with their decision, you might first discuss if with your employer or with the insurance company or whoever has been handling your claim. If the dispute is not resolved, you may want to seek the workmen's Compensation Court.

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# Nebraska court upholds legality of safety belt law

In a decision that could have broad impact, a Nebraska state district court has affirmed the constitu-tionality of that state's safety belt use

taw.

The presiding judge denied a legal challenge to the law which sought to

challenge to the law which sought to overturn it as an infringement on the personal freedom of motorists.

In declaring the safety belt use law constitutional; Judge Donald E. Endacott of the District Court of Lan caster County rendered a comprehensive decision encompassing a range of constitutional questions.

Endacott concluded that Nebraska's safety belt law (1). Is a valid and reasonable exercise of the police power of the state of Nebraska's (2). Jobes not deprive (motorists) of any fundamental right, liberty, or freedom; (3). gives adequate inclice of conduct pro-

hibited and, therefore, does not violate plaintiff's rights to due process of law; (4)...plaintiff's right to equal protection of the laws has not been violated; (5)...does not delegate legislative authority to the federal government; and (6) does not violate any (motorists'). rights under either the Nebraska Constitution or the United States Constitution."

SUPPORTERS OF Nebraska's safety belt use law hailed the decision as an important precedent.
"As the first district-level ruling on the constitutionality of the safety belt

the constitutionality of the safety belt use law, this is a very significant decision, said John Sullivani director. of Nebraska Traffic Safety, Now a non-profit coalillon which supported passage of the safety belt use law and is, now promoting compliance with the law, "Judge Endacott's opinion is

strong and deals unequivocally with a whole range of challenges. "We knew we had a very good law and we expected to prevail in this ac-tion," added Sullivan. "now we can get on with the business of saving lives on Nebraska roads."

OPPONENTS HAVE consistently charged that safety belt use laws infringe upon the Individual liberty of motorists. a position which Judge Endacott refuted in his decision.

The decision reads in part, as follows: "The requirement that plaintiff wear a safety belt may be incovenient for him, but it does not deprive him of any constitutionally protected. Ilberties, rights or freedoms. "Plaintiff's desire to lack as he chooses in this regard is clearly outweighed by the State's legitimate."

Sullivan noted that the Nebraska ruling should make it easier for safe ty belt use laws to pass in other states. Many of the questions raised in the litigation as to legality of such laws have been voiced by opponents of belt use legislation. IN ADDITION to Nebraska, 16 other states and the District of Columbia have approved safety belt use laws. Similar legislation is pending in most other states.



Overlock sewing machines
You probably are seeing lots of ads and promotions for overlock sewing machines this season. What are they? What do they do? Do you need one?
Overlock sewing machines are special purpose machines that frim, stitch, and overcast a seam in one operation. Sometimes they are called sergers or overedge machines.

Overlocks perform a limited number of functions, but do them well and quickly. They are not meant to replace conventional sewing machines, but are to be used with them.

ALL OVERLOCK machines finish edges of fabric and can frim away part of the seam allowance in the process. Some can be adjusted to make a close satin stitch on the raw edge of the fabric. Some also roll the edge of the fabric realing a narrow rolled hem.

Most overlock stitiches form a seam at the same time they finish the edge of the fabric. Seams made by overlock machines are generally flat and pucker-free. This is helpful when sewing on silky fabrics and others that tend to pucker.

The seams are moderately strong, but should be reinforced by conventional

The seams are movement survey and should be removed by the machine stitching in areas of stress.

If you do a lot of sewing, have a sewing business, want to increase your speed, or like your clothes and household textiles to have the same stitching as

ready mades, you may wa<u>nt to</u> look at some of the overlock machines on the market. There are four types of overlock machines.

TWO-THREAD overlock machines primarily finish edges. They aren't esigned to stifich a narrow seam.

Three-thread overlocks are used to sew and finish seams or to finish seams at have been sewn or conventional machines. They can handle a variety of abric weight and have slight stretch to accommodate knits. Some can be concreted to two-threads.







# Briefings about 1985 Farm Bill will be conducted

Officially known as the Food aguirty-Act of 1985, the farm bill eauthorizes virtually all federal arm programs — from the major onmodify price support programs orresearch, credit, food stamps and

One of the most massive pieces of egistation ever considered, the bill was signed into law by President Leagan on Dec. 23.

ZORINSKY SAID his Nebraska and Washington offices have been deluged with calls from farmers and ranchers asking questions about the


