

Someone who gets a kind word from us for something he or she has done has a higher sense of self-esteem as well as a higher esteem for us. He or she is like-ly to want to behave in a similar way again, since the previous behavior was rewarding. We feel bether about ourselves, knowing that we may have "made someone's day" by a word or act of kindness. It's nice to feel nice about yourself; it's rotten to feel rotten about yourself. Since we have a choice, why would anyone choose to be a griper and com-plainer when it's so much more pleasant to be a good-finder? It's largely habit, and habits can be broken. We can decide to control our tongue, curb our impulses, and restrain our powers of observation. We learned how to be dependably negative — we can also learn how to be pleasantly positive. There is good to be found, if we will only look.


