Brown to promote Institute

Linda Brown, executive vice-president of the Wayne Area Chamber of Commerce and Wayne Industries, has been selected by the United States Chamber of Commerce and the Board of Regents in Washington, D.C. as the 1988 Chamber Institute Promotion Task Force Chairman for the fourth year Institute Class.

Brown recently completed her third year participating in the week-long Institute for Organization Management, conducted in Boulder, Colorado at the University of Colorado.

Responsibilities that go along with the promotion, according to Brown, are to serve as advisor to the Institute class concerning information passed down from the U.S. Chamber of Commerce and the Board of Regents regarding changes and relaying other information to the class members as needed.

She will also be promoting the Institute class.

During her participation in her third Institute class conducted in early July, Brown said studies for the entire week centered on lobbying for legislation, industrial development, economic development, public relations, internal works and to "become good leaders."

Begins with exhibit, horse judging

Fair kicks off Thursday

Wayne County 4-H'ers have less than a week to prepare their hogs, cattle, sheep and goats for the livestock judges at this year's Wayne County Fair.

The 1987 Wayne County Fair begins on Thursday, Aug. 6 and ends on Sunday, Aug. 9.

Also at the annual county fair will be many open and 4-H exhibits that feature crafts, photographs, foods and preserves and other items which will undergo the scrutiny of the many judges assigned to the county fair.

On top of all this, there are three grandstand shows (for the price of admission to the county fair) that feature top musical entertainment and the thrills of the tractor pulling, truck pulling, three and four-wheeler pulling and a demolition derby.

Admission prices to the fair are \$6 for a season pass for those 16 years and over; and \$3 for a season pass for those between the ages of 12-15. General admission for those 16 and older is \$2.50 and \$1.25 for those ages 12-15. Those under 12 gain free admittance.

Sooner Amusements will be providing rides for all ages. Discount coupons for rides at the county fair are available at all Wayne County merchant locations.

THE COUNTY fair kicks off Thursday (Winslow, Hoskins and Altona

Day) with the noon judging of all exhibits in the 4-H building and the judging of 4-H horses.

Thursday afternoon will be the judging of 4-H and open class dairy; 4-H rabbits and poultry; open class economics; and 4-H dairy goats. Early in the evening will be the judging of open class dairy goats.

One new feature of the Wayne County Fair will be the VIP Hog Calling Contest, which will get underway around 7 p.m. near the grandstand.

Then at 7:30 p.m. music will fill the fairgrounds as the Ark Valley Boys Quartet with Echo Canyon Band start to sing.

The Ark Valley Boys "move an audience from hoots of laughter and roars of cheers, to prickles of goose bumps and patriotic tears," according to the promotional material on the singing group.

"Their uptown country music and comedy combine to create a fast moving performance that holds the attention of an audience," says the release.

Friday, Aug. 7 (designated as 4-H Alumni Day) gets off to an early start with the morning judging of 4-H hogs and 4-H and open class sheep. At noon begins the judging of 4-H beef and feeder calf and cow/calf pairs. Then at 12:30 is the 4-H Horse Judging Contest. Also Friday afternoon is the judging of open class rabbits and poultry.

One popular event at past Wayne County Fairs has been the free "big"

barbecue with all the trimmings. This year's barbecue on Friday will begin at 5:30 and serving will continue until 7:30 p.m.

AT 7:15 Friday evening, 4-H exhibits will be "on parade" in front of the grandstand. Following the parade, at 8 p.m., Clyde Foley Cummins makes a return trip to the Wayne County Fair.

His show, according to the promotional material, is "a complete entertainment package featuring a variety of musical styles with particular emphasis on contemporary country sounds."

"Cummins is quickly gaining recognition as one of the most talented entertainers in country music. He and his band focus on positive, uplifting material, and every show includes both sacred and patriotic songs in addition to Top-40 and standard selections."

Carroll, Sholes and Wayne Day has been designated for Saturday, Aug. 8, which begins at 8 a.m. with a market hog show. An hour later, the judging of open class beef begins.

At 1 p.m. the horseshoe pitching contest begins — the same time that the open class feeder calf show starts. Early Saturday afternoon will be the annual sanctioned tractor pull (Nebraska Bush Pullers Association), starting at 1:30. For further information on this, contact Gerald Grone of Wayne.

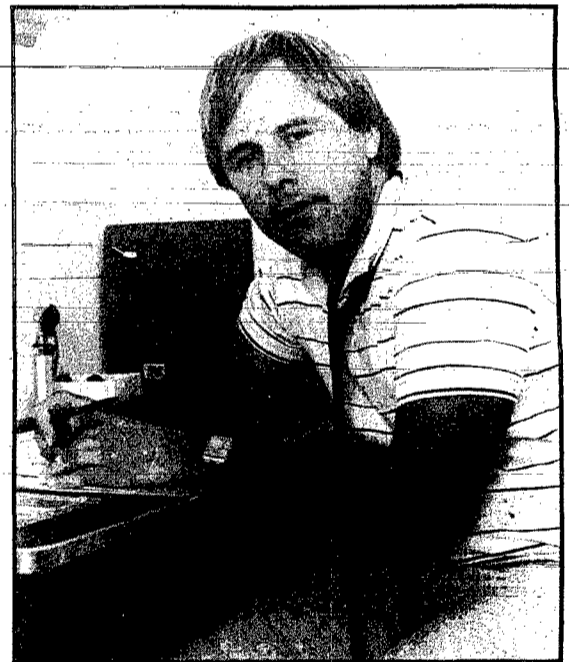

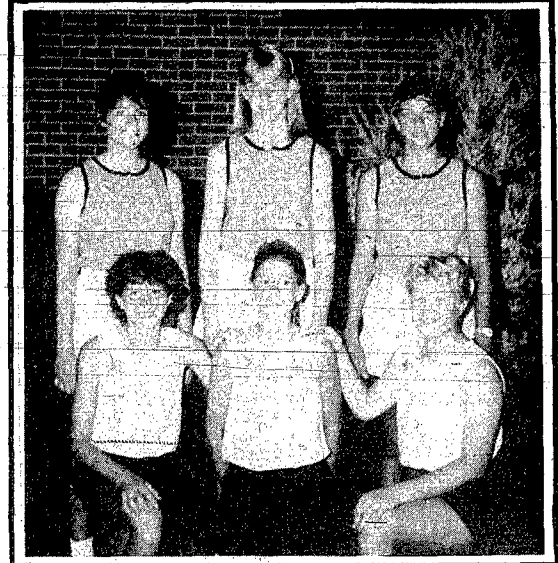

County fair countdown

As I write this week's column, I'm reminded that the county fair is less than a week away. Four-H members in Wayne County are busy putting finishing touches on their exhibits. For them, the county fair is the culmination of a year's hard work, and learning experiences. I remember my experiences as a 4-H member and the pressure of getting exhibits ready for the fair. The combination of yeast bread that won't raise, or heat stressed livestock and the dog days of August often created short tempers in the family. The following article from a newsletter sent to our office is especially appropriate this week. I hope it will help improve everyone's heat-stressed attitudes.

Be a "good finder"
"Honey catches more flies than vinegar," the old saying goes, and it's true. Sweetness is more attractive than sourness. Nowhere is it regarded a virtue to have everyone disliking us due to our rotten disposition and lack of warmth. If we would like to get along with people, be well thought of by others, and make friends, we had better get in the habit of looking for the good so we can compliment it, rather than looking for something wrong, so we can attack it. Someone who gets a kind word from us for something he or she has done has a higher sense of self-esteem as well as a higher esteem for us. He or she is likely to want to behave in a similar way again, since the previous behavior was rewarding. We feel better about ourselves, knowing that we may have "made someone's day" by a word or act of kindness. It's nice to feel nice about yourself; it's rotten to feel rotten about yourself. Since we have a choice, why would anyone choose to be a griper and complainer when it's so much more pleasant to be a good-finder? It's largely habit, and habits can be broken. We can decide to control our tongue, curb our impulses, and restrain our powers of observation. We learned how to be dependably negative — we can also learn how to be pleasantly positive. There is good to be found, if we will only look.

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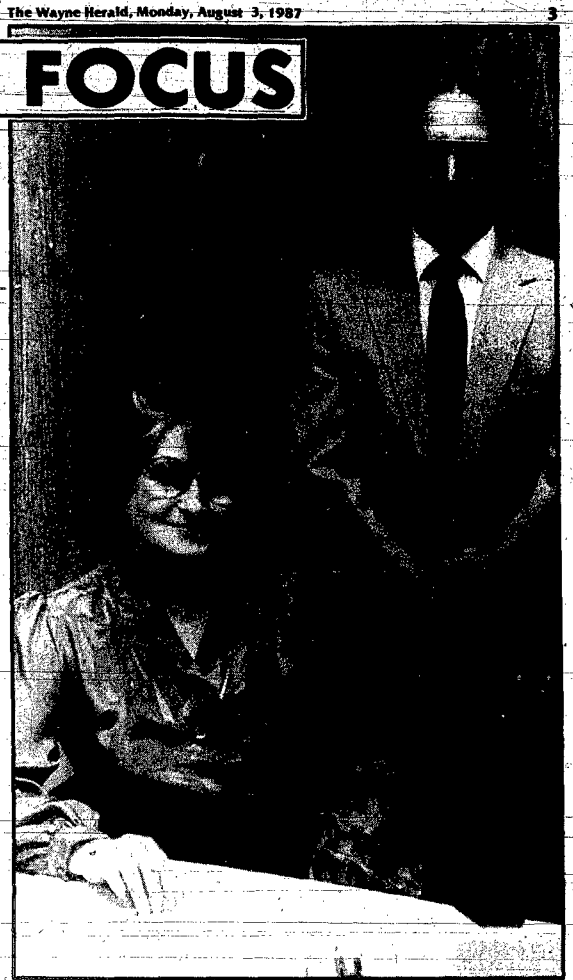
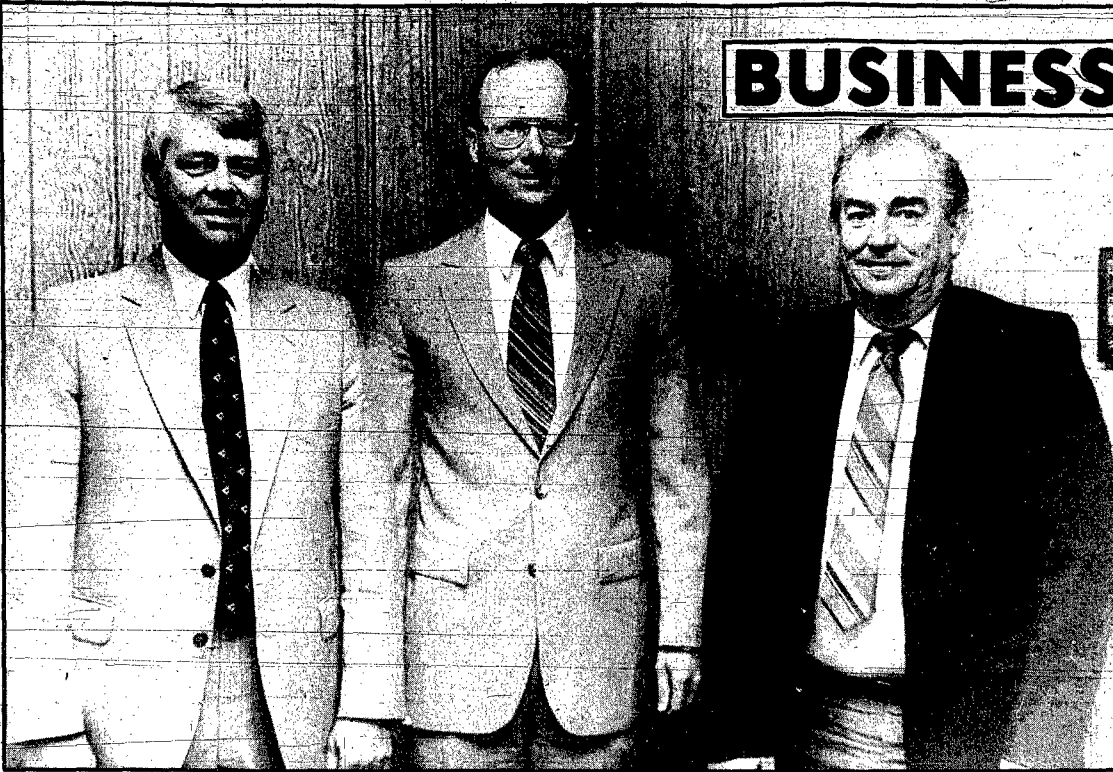

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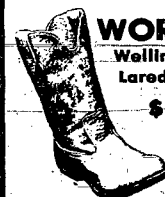
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Hamer's hot bat powers Midgets

becomes more difficult. The participants are tested on what they have learned." Brown mentioned.

SOME OF the courses are required and some are electives "geared to areas of particular interest of the Chamber," she said. "We were not learning what Chicago participants are learning."

For instance, one course she took was "Industrial Development for Smaller Chamber of Commerces."

"That was very informative and helpful," Brown said. Other universities that host institutes are Notre Dame, University of Georgia, Southern Methodist University, San Jose University and the University of Delaware. Brown

said the Institute at Colorado is the largest of all the regional areas, primarily because it is centrally located.

"It's one of the best institutes, too," she said. Other institutes, she said, "are too widespread in their classes."

Brown said becoming involved in the Institute, as a Chamber executive, is important. "It allows us to continue to grow. If we do not learn more, and are not aware of what's going on in the United States and in the promotion of the Chamber, we become stagnant," she said.

"One can never learn enough, or have enough information to help the community and the area," she added. "We have to continue to promote the community and keep on top of things."
