## At A Glance

### Calf show

The date of the Laurel Calf Show and Premium Sale will be Friday, Aug. 21, to take place at the Laurel Sale Barn. It will start at 3:30 p.m. and a public barbecue will follow the show.

Market beef 4-H Club members will be eligible to enter one animal each, provided that they have exhibited at the Cedar or Dixon County Fair and/or the Randolph Community Fair. There will be two weight classes for steers and one class for heifers.

The public barbecue will take place at 6 p.m. with the sale starting at 7:30 p.m.

### Fashion revue

4-H clothing project members had the opportunity to have their exhibits and modeling ability evaluated at the 4-H Fashion Revue and Clothing Day at the Northeast Research and Extension Center on Wednesday, Aug. 5.

Members modeled their garments before a judge where garment fit, pressing and appearance were considered. The 4-H'ers were also evaluated on their poise, self-confidence and ability to answer related questions.

Clothing construction skill was recognized through an interview session with the judge. It was then that alternative finishes were demonstrated and that the member was able to explain selected methods.

# Recreation Center praised during dedication

Wayne State College's new Recreation Center was dedicated during a Friday afternoon ceremony that took place inside the 56,000 square foot facility.

Nearly 100 people attended the dedication ceremony, which coincided with the Wayne State summer commencement program that took place on Friday morning at the WSC Willow Bowl.

Dr. Joseph Fleck, Interim president of Wayne State College, in-

troduced the special guests at the ceremony. He said the Recreation Center was not only a multi-purpose facility, but it is also multi-purpose project that will involve the students and the community.

Another speaker was Gretchen

Hirschbach of South Sioux City, current member of the Board of Trustees of Nebraska State Colleges. She said the facility is "state of the art" and would strengthen Wayne State College's appearance to teachers and students.

"This is a major achievement for the board of trustees, Rich Brington (executive officer with the board of trustees) and the administration and staff of Wayne State College," Hirschbach mentioned. "I hope you enjoy the facility. You certainly deserve it," she said in her dedication remarks.

**JOHN STRUVE**, vice president of finance at Wayne State and master of ceremonies for the dedication, introduced J. Alan Cramer of Wayne as the next speaker. Cramer is a former chairman and member of the State College Board of Trustees.

Struve said Cramer was on the board of trustees during the time that the facility's designs, ideas and concepts were formulated. Cramer was also on the board during most of the construction phase of the new facility, and had a significant role in the establishment of a fine recreational facility for Wayne State College, Struve mentioned.

Another guest introduced during the dedication was **Dr. Ed Elliott**, currently president of Central State University in Warrensburg, Missouri and former Wayne State president who also was involved in the initial planning process for the new facility.

Elliott, an avid jogger who ran many times on the outdoor track, said he was happy to know that there now is something larger than Rice Auditorium for people to jog in. "It's great to be home in Wayne," he told the audience.

He said the new facility represents opportunity and is important to higher education. The facility will involve the students, townspeople and the larger community, he said.

He expressed pleasure that the Recreation Center is now completed. "It's here. It's a reality," he mentioned.

Gary Bowen, project architect from the firm of Bahr, Vermeer and Haacker Architects, praised the work of the construction companies for a "wonderful job of craftsmanship."

"We are pleased and honored to have helped make this facility a reality," he said.

**RADEK CONSTRUCTION** Company President Clarence Hoelsing also was a guest speaker at the dedication of the Recreation Center. RaDeck was the project contractor.

"It was an enjoyable project," Hoelsing said. He emphasized the importance of teamwork that was evidenced in the construction project.

Mayor Wayne Marsh said in his dedication address that the community is "proud of the growth of Wayne State College."

"May it continue to prosper and lead the community into the future," he mentioned.

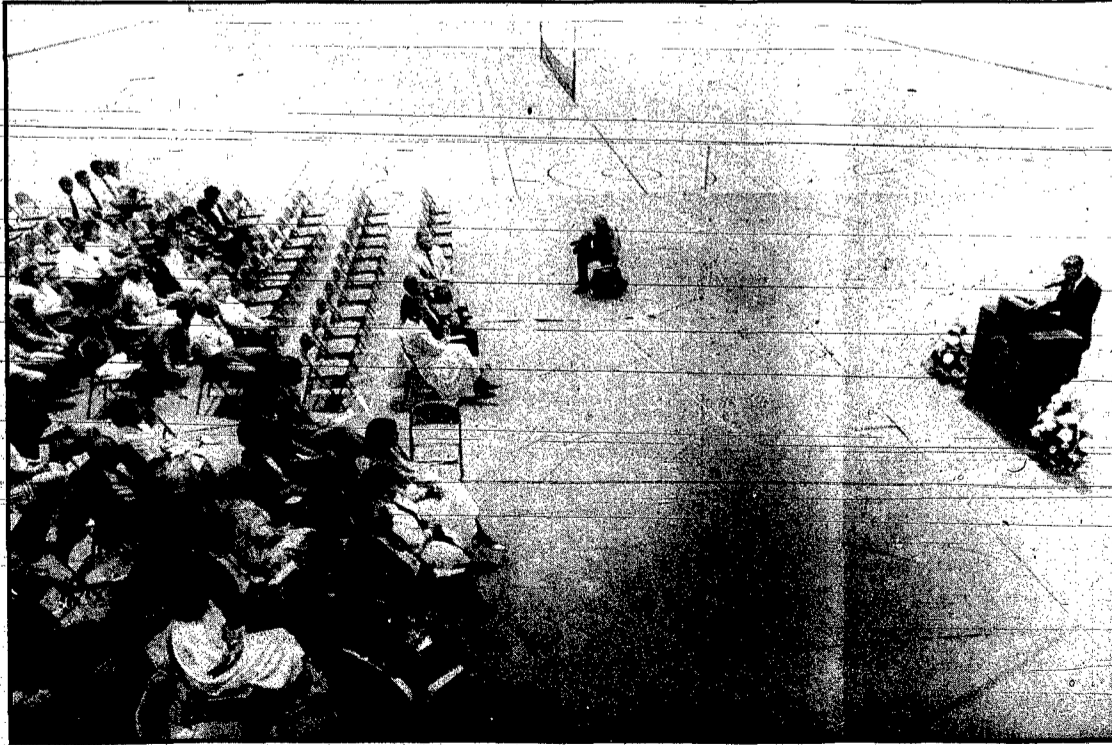
The final speaker during the dedication was **Pete Kotsiopoulos** of Kearney, currently chairman of the Board of Trustees of Nebraska State Colleges.

He pointed out the importance of students in relation to the new facility. "Their interest and total wellness will be enhanced by use of this facility. The only reason we are here is because of the students," Kotsiopoulos said.

He also thanked the bondholders who helped to bring the Recreation Center to its present state.

Plans are to open the facility to students in early September. However, Struve said it probably won't be until around Nov. 1 when the facility will be opened up for public use. College officials would like to see how the facility is being run during the student use, and to see what the "ins and outs" will be before opening the facility to the public.

State Senators **Gerald Conway** of Wayne and **Stan Schellpeper** were also in the audience. Also introduced were **Dick Carpenter**, physical plant consultant to the state college board of trustees, and **Minnie Rice** of Wayne.

## Wayne area contributes to state diet-heart study

Those 94 residents of Wayne and the surrounding area who participated last March in the Nebraska Diet-Heart study, and the local volunteers, have made an essential contribution to a potentially "landmark" epidemiological study.

**Dr. Bruce McManus**, a researcher from the University of Nebraska Medical Center, said the study which examines the blood cholesterol level, the blood fats and other major risk factors of a 1 percent random sample of Nebraska's population, is unique

in the United States. **McManus**, director of the cardiovascular registry at the University of Nebraska Medical Center, heads the Nebraska Diet-Heart study.

The end result of the study could mean more information will be available in the future about heart disease within the state of Nebraska or this region.

**THERE ARE** studies done in this measure in heavily-populated cities and the information from the studies are applied on a national level.

#### VACATION NEEDN'T SABOTAGE DIETS

Life is sometimes unfair. Just when the chocolate Easter candy disappears from your waist, and the Christmas cookies finally crumble from your hips, along comes vacation.

But, long trips, restaurant meals, and family reunions don't have to sabotage your hard-won weight loss. Follow these tips for weight-conscious vacationers.

Boredom, inactivity, and eating out are the diet saboteurs on long trips. In the car, play games, sing or count cows. If you don't get carsick, catch up on your reading. Take frequent breaks and stretch, walk, jog in place, or do calisthenics.

On the airplane, order a diet drink. Save the peanuts for the zoo. Offer your dessert to a seat partner. If there's time between planes, walk to the farthest bathroom or explore the entire concourse.

**MOST RESTAURANTS**, even fast food outlets, have salad bars or low calorie entrees. Choose those, but avoid heavy dressings and extra toppings. Order low-fat or skim milk. Eat only half the bun on the sandwiches. If french fries or desserts are irresistible, grant yourself just one meal, made up of just that treat during the trip.

Replace the missed nutrients at other meals. Whether on the road or at your destination, include the basic Four Food Groups — milk, meat, fruits/vegetables and grains — in your family diet.

At family gatherings, too little physical activity and too much good food can be disastrous.

Volunteer to chase toddlers or wait on elders. "Games like badminton, softball, or even croquet are better than just sitting."

Avoid offending family cooks by taking a little of each dish. Eat the lower calorie foods. Take a small bite of the fattening others so your compliments will be honest.

No matter what your vacation plans, include lots of walking and other calorie-burners in your activities. And set realistic expectations for yourself. Don't try to lose weight during vacation. Not gaining is quite an achievement all by itself.

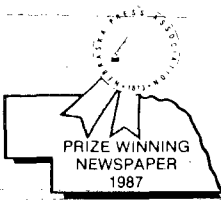

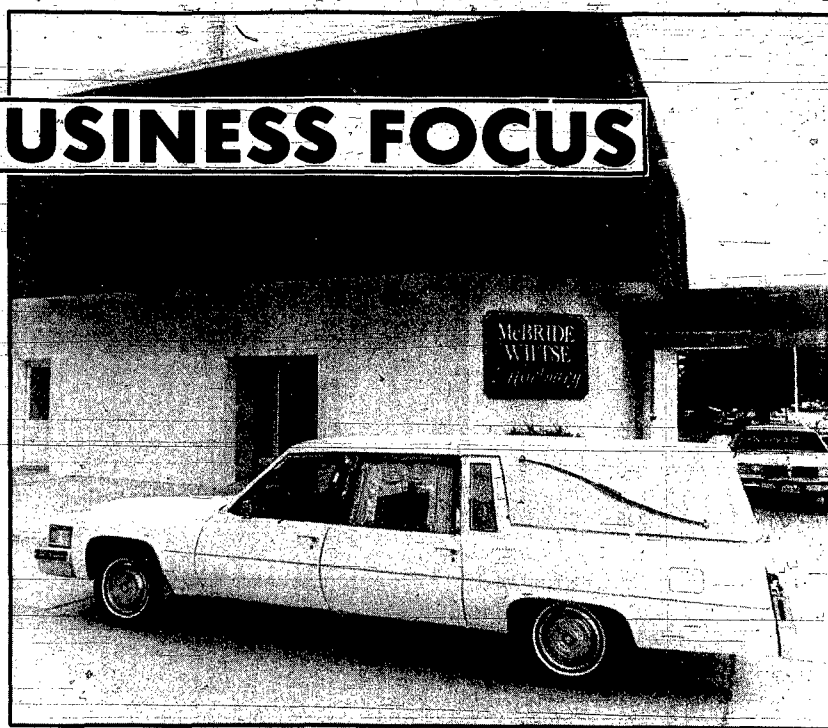

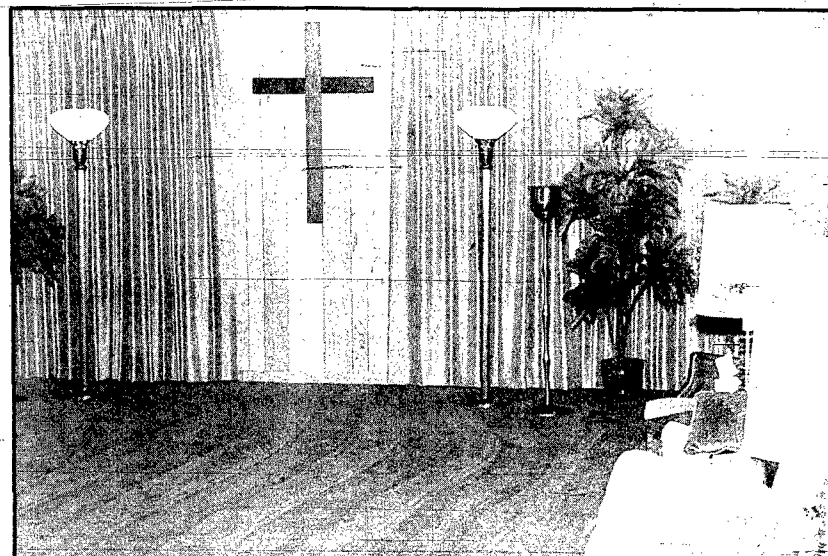

## WSC gridders open practice Aug. 12

Eighty players will report when the 1987 Wayne State Wildcats officially open the football season Aug. 12 with the start of fall camp.

The Aug. 12 starting date is earlier than usual, but fifth-year Coach Pete Chapman and his staff are anxious to begin preparations. Workouts are scheduled twice a day with meetings with position coaches will be held in the evenings. According to Chapman, the earlier starting date and rigorous schedule are two ways the coach hopes to rebound from last year's 2-9 mark.

"Going into spring practice we knew the areas we needed work on," Chapman said. "And we felt we made some real progress in those areas and that the kids responded to the challenges we gave them."

An improved offensive line and depth at quarterback should help the offense that sputtered last year while averaging only 7.7 points a game.

Ben Lehr, Mike Anderson and Jeff Wagner return to the offensive line. The addition of Harry Gardner and Steve Schiek from the junior college ranks will also help to shore up the line.

The Wildcat running game also seems to be showing signs of life. Since Chapman installed the "run and shoot" offense the Cats have been known primarily as a passing team.

"We just feel that we have the potential with an experienced line to improve our running game," Chapman said. "That and the quality of our running backs may bring us more toward the philosophy of running the ball once in a while."

Damon Ross is one of the reasons Chapman will be relying more on the running game. The redshirt-freshman was an all-state selection at Omaha Burke two years ago. Chapman calls Ross "a difference maker."

Ray Gilliland, a transfer from Wisconsin-Platteville, is the leading candidate for the fullback spot. Brent Halsch, a Class C all-stater from

Laurel, could also see some action as a freshman. Kevin Hagedorn, making the move from receiver to tailback, will add quickness and depth to the backfield.

Although the running game will be improved Chapman doesn't seem ready to abandon the "run and shoot" entirely. Three experienced quarterbacks return this fall.

"For the first time in a long time quarterback is not a major area of concern for us," he said.

Three signal callers return with experience. Scott Raue, redshirt sophomore; Mark Priegnitz, last year's JV quarterback; and five-year senior Jeff Mathers.

Those QB's will also have a talented group of receivers to throw to. Returning from last year are Daryl Mountain, Glen Mathews, Pat Wordekemper and John Pezdritz. Sophomores Chuck Burt and Mike Speller threw their hats in the ring by impressing Chapman in spring drills.

Defensively, a change of philosophy greeted Wildcat blackshirts last April. Dennis Danielson took over as defensive coordinator and has installed an upbeat, positive approach with an aggressive style of play.

Dave Uhlers, Robert Donelson and Doug Blair return to the defensive interior. Scott Wightman tops the list at outside linebacker with Greg Gerkenmeyer, Craig Anderson and Dave Gerkin also returning. Transfer Brad Fuebacher will also be heard from at that spot. Greg Cavill, Jim Sibbel and Tony Wiese shore up the inside linebacker position. UNO Terry Besta will also push for a starting spot.

Veteran Mark Wolf will lead the young Wildcat secondary. Cordell Gregory and Glen Sutton return for their sophomore seasons after seeing playing time as freshmen.

The Cats open the season Sept. 5 at Al Caniglia Field to play UNO. WSC will open at home Sept. 19 against Southwest State of Minnesota.

## Pitt State top choice in CSIC

Pittsburg State was the overwhelming choice to win the CSIC, according to 15 print and electronic media representatives of each city in the CSIC.

The results were announced at the CSIC Football Media Luncheon at Arrowhead Stadium in Kansas City on Friday.

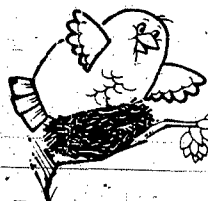

## Sports Med Line

Heel pain, with the first step in the morning is the bane of many runners and other athletes as one reader wrote into ask about. It can affect others as well, especially those who must stand or walk a lot. The heel pain usually begins slowly, perhaps as a stiffness and can progress to the point of hurting not only with the first morning step, but also each time one stands after sitting for any length of time. This pain, located in the heel, usually just to the front of the heel pad can be a result of several things. In the under 14 year old athlete it may be "Sever's Disease," an epiphysitis of the growth plate in the calcaneus. In this case the heel may hurt during activity and is usually worse after activity. Rest as well as arch supports in the athlete's shoes help. Practicing as much as possible on softer surfaces will also reduce the stress. This condition is usually outgrown with age, with few long term negative effects.

Heel pain in the adult is usually referred to as a heel spur or as plantar fasciitis. It is an irritation of the attachment of the spring ligament. The ligament helps support the foot and is stretched each time the foot bears weight. If an x-ray is taken and a little boney growth shows this is known as a heel spur. While it looks on the x-ray just like you would imagine, it actually is a "shelf" of bone and is not sharp. This boney growth is a reaction to the stress that has been applied to the ligament and is your body's attempt to rectify the situation. Many people between the ages of 35-65 have this boney change but have experienced no pain. This means the irritation at the area, not the boney growth, is the cause of the pain.

Plantar fasciitis or heel spurs can be treated in the same manner. If the pain has just begun to occur, frequently a short course of 1-2 weeks of anti-inflammatory medication will resolve the pain. When this is coupled with a reduction in activity, and by wearing shoes with arch supports, as opposed to going barefoot, or wearing sandals, further pain relief occurs. If this initial treatment does not work, and after you have cut your activity to at least half, then you can consider several options. Frequently, an adhesive taping in the lower dye strap technique helps relieve the stress on the spring ligament. This form of rest in conjunction with a steroidal injection often resolves the pain.

However, participants in the recent Nebraska-Diet-Heart study come from various communities in a large defined geographic region. The information from this study is unique, McManus said, because it will "provide us more information that can directly apply to the people in Nebraska."

He said the study provides the researchers an opportunity to look at differences in heart diseases. The American Heart Association releases statistics concerning deaths relating to heart disease on a county-to-county basis.

PERHAPS BY careful analysis, insight may be available in the future as to why there is a variation in death rate from county to county in Nebraska.

He said analysis in regard to the recent study is in the "earlier stages" with preliminary information possibly to be made available by fall.

Participants should have received personal results of their blood tests which provides a "complete list of

the substances in the participant's blood" and an explanation of what the substances are.

Those who did not receive these results should write to Janet Wilson, Department of Pathology, UNMC, 42nd and Dewey Avenue, Omaha, NE 68105.

The study, in the long run, will provide researchers with answers to more scientific questions in relation to heart disease.

It will also provide the American Heart Association information to help guide the organization's education effort in this region in relation to heart disease, according to McManus.

The testing in Wayne took place March 19 and 20.

Without the help, support and interest of the hospital and the surrounding community, this undertaking would have been literally impossible," McManus said.

During testing at 39 sites statewide, the research team and volunteers collected blood samples from each of the more than 12,000 participants, as well as lifestyle information.
