At A Glance

Arrests made

Acting on a tip from a citizen who observed a truck that was stopped along a side road in Stanton County, a semi-truck driver and hitchhiker were apprehended by local law enforcement officials on having possession of marijuana.

Authorities from the Wayne County Sheriff's Department and Nebraska Highway Patrol subsequently stopped a semi-trailer truck approximately two miles south of Wakefield. The truck was hauling iron.

Subsequently, a large quantity of marijuana plants were seized from the truck and the two individuals in the semi were arrested. The marijuana was stashed inside the cab's sleeper.

Randy L. Gendron of Fort Dodge, Iowa, the driver of the semi, has been apprehended and placed in the Wayne County Jail and charged with felony possession of marijuana. He is being held on a \$10,000, 10 percent bond, according to Janssen.

The hitch-hiker, Raymond N. Warren of Amarillo, Texas, was arrested for misdemeanor possession of marijuana and is being held at the Wayne County Jail on a \$100 bond.

Wayne County Sheriff LeRoy Janssen said Warren had nothing to do with the harvesting of the marijuana. However, upon search of Warren, a "misdemeanor amount of marijuana was found on the person," Janssen said.

The arraignment for both men has been set for Thursday, Aug. 20.

Cigarette caper

Wayne Police are investigating the theft of 50 cigarette cartons of Marlboro and Marlboro Lights that were removed from the premises of Bill's GW in Wayne on Aug. 8 and 9. Value of the theft was \$584.

Afterwards, on Aug. 10, two females entered Bill's GW carrying tote bags and grabbed a shopping cart. After noticing they were being watched, the two females took off, leaving another 20 or more cartons of cigarettes in the grocery cart.

The suspects were driving an older blue-colored Chevrolet, possibly a Chevelle. One woman is described as tall, thin with frizzy dishwater hair and about 20 years old. The other was classified as short, heavy with brown hair and in her mid-30's.

Bids accepted

The Wakefield City Council accepted the \$184,375 bid of Westoff Construction Company of Lincoln for a project which will approximately double the capacity of the lagoon.

The new construction will add six more cells over about 20 acres of surface. The current facility has seven cells over approximately 22 acres of land. The city just recently purchased 48 acres of land for the project.

The council expects construction to begin Monday or Tuesday of this week. Cass Construction of Burwell will begin doing the dirt work.

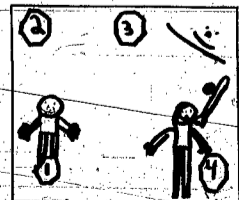
City Administrator Lowell Johnson said that the contractor plans to stake out the lines on the site.

Top hog

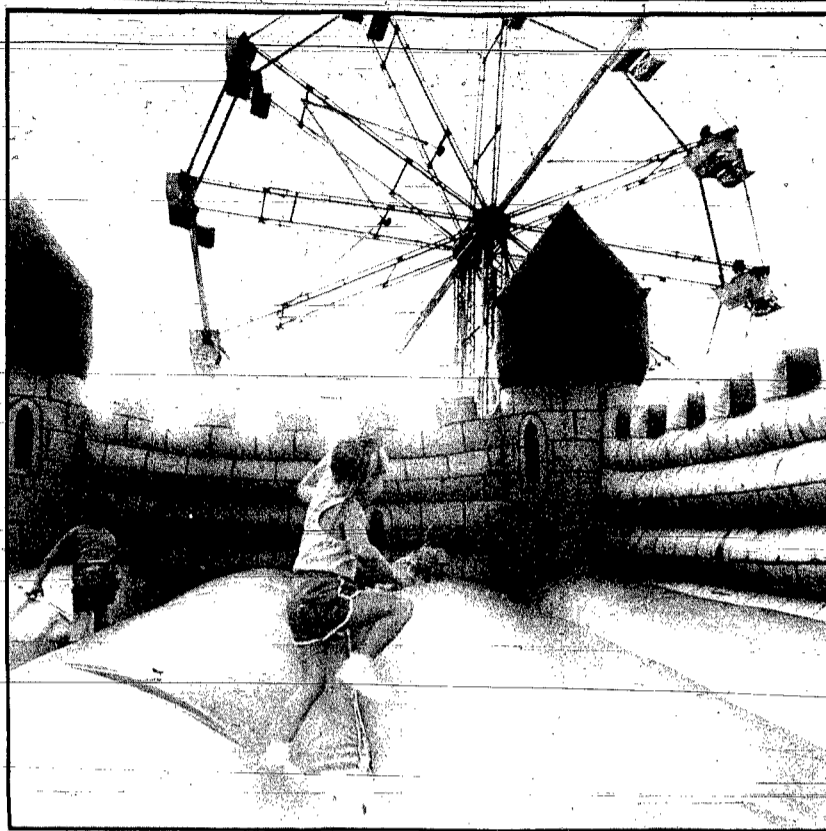

WAYNE AMERICA will be painted on new water tower

WAYNE AMERICA will be painted on the newly completed new water tower that is located in the Sunnyside Subdivision area of the city of Wayne.

The city council gave final approval, by a 5-1 vote, for the slogan wording during Tuesday night's regular meeting.

Cost to add the word "AMERICA" to the top of the tower will be approximately \$1,125, according to Wayne City Administrator Phil Kloster.

Councilman Freeman Decker voted against painting "WAYNE AMERICA" on the tower. Councilmen voting for the added painting were Carolyn Filter, Larry Johnson, Sheryl Lindau, Stan Hansen and Darrel Fuelberth. Absent from the meeting were council members Randy Pedersen and Darrel Heler.

Decker said he hasn't changed his mind since the proposal was first brought before the council in July. "I'm still opposed to it. I still think that it is unnecessary," Decker said.

He offered an alternative — to paint WAYNE and underneath the city's name, have painted HOME OF WAYNE STATE COLLEGE.

Lyle George of Wayne, who first brought the proposal to the city council, said he felt "very positive" about placing WAYNE AMERICA on the

water tower and that he has received a lot of feedback from a lot of people. "I get the feeling, when I talk to people, that a substantial amount really like the idea," George said.

THE TERM "Wayne America" is simple, he said, and "is not a recent trend."

"If [the term] has been around at least since 1972. So it's not just a flash in the pan thing," George mentioned. "Just two words," he added.

KTRC Radio of Wayne had conducted a call-in survey on the proposal and found that of the 137 calls, 80 were in favor of the slogan on the water tower, while 57 voted against it.

Councilmember Johnson said he believed that the majority of people in Wayne really didn't care what went on the water tower, and that the city council should not spend a lot of time on the issue.

Decker introduced a motion that would "just put WAYNE on the water tower." However, he withdrew his motion when a second to it never came.

Other business concerning the new water tower dealt with rumors.

RUMORS ARE that the water tower is too tall and work had to stop on the water tower because of height; that the water tower would have to be

moved to another location; that the water tower, once painted, could not be in service for at least two years.

None of these statements bear any truth, according to Kloster.

"And we are not being sued over the water tower," he added.

Cecil F. Coombs, professional engineer with the consulting engineering firm of Howard R. Green Company which has been working with the city on the water tower construction, gave a status report on the structure.

The primer is currently being applied to the water tower. It will eventually have a white pillar and the top will be blue with black lettering.

The lettering on the water tower could last up to 20 years, Kloster told the council.

THERE IS A steady light on the top of the water tower at the present time, put in operation last Friday.

"There are two red lights up there. If one burns out then the other light comes on. It's on standby mode," said Coombs.

A concrete floor has to be poured inside the pillar and crews are in the process of installing electrical service to the water tower.

Grading and some concrete work around the water tower also remains, along with seeding around the tower.

The new water tower will be in service sometime after Sept. 15.

Effectiveness questioned

Petition presented to curb city siren usage

The effectiveness of the city of Wayne's civil defense warning system was questioned during Tuesday's regular meeting of the Wayne City Council.

Dianne Leighty of Wayne, in speaking before the city council on the civil defense sirens, said the frequent use has "caused people to ignore the system."

She questioned the council on reasons for the repeated usage of the peak energy alert system when the public address system is used, the use of the fire siren, and whether the sirens are audible and confusing to people within the city limits of Wayne.

Leighty presented a petition to the council that carried 215 signatures. The petition proposed that Wayne's alert system be used only in emergencies which would put the residents of Wayne in danger.

SHE COLLECTED the signatures within a week and a half time frame, she said.

The petition also asked the city council to evaluate the use of the fire siren.

"People feel strongly about this. There is concern that the use of the alarm system is falling out," Leighty said.

"People have said it sounds like a prison camp, with the buzzer and whistle going off a lot," she added. "If the alert system is used effectively, it will pay for itself."

Wayne Police Chief Vern Fairchild, who is deputy civil defense director, said the city currently has six sirens posted throughout the city limits. Once a month the sirens are tested in one of several modes.

Leighty and her family reside near one of the sirens posted on the old water tower. She said her concerns about the civil defense system had started as a personal problem with the decline level of the sirens. "During the peak announcements or the fire alarm, it terrifies children if they live close to it. It is a loud noise," she said.

She polled others in her neighborhood on the concerns, and found out that many feel the effectiveness of the civil defense system is not what it should be.

The energy alert public address system's effectiveness was also questioned by Leighty. She asked if the council would consider alternatives to the public address system.

ONE PROPOSAL, she said, would be to start a door to door campaign during the start of the summer, distributing cards that would ask people to conserve energy on days when high temperatures exist. On the back of the card, the city could explain why the conserving is necessary.

"Treat the people intelligently and let them handle it," Leighty said.

She said a clergy representative told her that elderly people have turned their air conditioning off and often suffer from the heat. "These people don't understand it [peak energy alert]. They get scared when they hear the emergency siren and do exactly what they are told to do," she said.

The sirens also disturb day sleepers (those who work at night shifts), those who are sick or those others who need rest, she added.

Those who live a distance from the

sirens or are working inside a business "hear the siren, but can't hear the public address message," she remarked.

Leighty said she spoke with Bob O'Brien, Civil Defense Director for Omaha and areas nearby. She said O'Brien mentioned that if the civil defense siren system is being used on a daily basis, "you may as well take them down."

Two signals that should be used on the siren system are the Attack Warning (three to five minute waveling tone on sirens) and Attention of Alert Warning (a three to five minute steady signal from sirens, horns or other devices), Leighty said.

SHE QUESTIONED the necessity of the fire siren, since most of the firemen carry pagers which alert them of fires. One reason for the siren, she learned, was because it clears the streets ahead of the fire trucks. "If the police assistance and sirens on the trucks can't clear the streets, you'll never get me to believe that a fire whistle will help," Leighty said.

"We need to decide if we need a public address system or a civil defense system. It effectively cannot be both," she said.

Councilmember Carolyn Filter said she had questions about the peak energy alert and how much effectiveness the system had. "If you ask me if it has made a difference [in peak usage], I would have said yes," Filter said.

City Administrator Phil Kloster said that the energy peak alert system had saved the city \$100,000 in energy costs over the year. He said at least half of that savings could be attributed to use of the outdoor public address system.

"This system is a state of the art system," Kloster said. Other communities have patterned Wayne's idea of saving energy costs.

Inconvenience by some would save dollars in future energy costs for the city of Wayne, he mentioned.

"Because of the long heat spell, we probably overused it [the public address system]," he remarked. But he said the city has an obligation to save the community a significant amount of money.

KLOSTER SAID he has heard complaints at various times about the fire whistle. Dale Preston, Wayne Fire Chief, said he feels the sirens, serving the need as an early warning to the downtown area, is effective.

Preston admits he doesn't like to see people scattering when the fire whistles blow, however it decreases the odds of meeting traffic in the streets. "We would have a disadvantage if the sirens didn't blow," Preston said.

He said some individuals in the fire department, by nature of their job, cannot carry the fire department pagers, which "adds to the importance of the siren."

"They can respond even if they do not have their pagers with them," he said.

COUNCILMAN Larry Johnson said he too was concerned that the elderly, during peak energy alerts, are very concerned and honest to the point of jeopardizing their safety.

If people see this happening, then they should go to the elderly individual, comfort them and put the

Winside board approves 87-88 budget

Winside School District's Board of Education approved on Monday night a \$1,010,658 budget for the 1987-88 school year.

Of the 11 main categories listed in the approved budget, totals went down in three areas and went up in eight items in comparison to the 1986-87 school budget, according to Superintendent Don Leighton.

The total budget went up \$32,529

(3.33 percent), increasing the operating tax requirement request by \$12,501, which included the 1 percent collection fee.

However, when all totaled, there will be a actual total tax requirement decrease of \$5,895 because the bond tax request for the school district dropped nearly \$18,300. Leighton said this offsets the school district's increase in the operating tax request.

THE TOTAL TAX requirement will equal \$604,286. For the school

budget of 1986-87, the total tax requirement was \$610,181.

Increases were recorded in the expenditure areas of instructional services; support services for instructional staff; support services for general administration; support services for school administration; support services for business; support services for operation of the plant; support services for pupil transportation; and federal programs.

Decreases were noted in support services for pupils; support services for

maintenance of plant; and transfers to other funds.

The necessary cash reserve was established in the 1987-88 budget at \$165,000.

A larger balance is projected to go into the 1987-88 budget because of better tax draws and more non-tax revenue received than previously anticipated, according to Leighton.

Jane Witt of Winside questioned the board of education, saying the

Corns and calluses may look different but are composed of the same material — layers of dead skin cells that often result from wearing shoes that do not fit correctly. The key to self-care of these hard skin accumulations is to remove just enough dead skin to provide relief from pain or discomfort. (Diabetics should avoid self-removal of corns and calluses because of the dangers of infection and toe, foot, or leg loss.)

One approach to slow elimination of corns and calluses is by soaking in warm water and using a pumice stone. A moisturizing lotion applied after stone use may be helpful.

Another approach is through application of a medicine which contains salicylic acid, the only over-the-counter corn and callus removal medicine considered safe and effective by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration. Diabetics are not advised to use the product without the knowledge of their physician. Salicylic acid is available in liquid form (in flexible colloid) and may be applied with a small glass rod. It is also available in small plasters (pads) that can be affixed directly to the corn or callus. Directions should be followed precisely. Although softening and relief of pain may occur within a day or two, several days may be required for complete corn or callus removal.

Special Olympics, special memories

"Let me win, but if I cannot win, let me be brave in the attempt." — Special Olympics Oath

For 20-year old Mike Larson those were words to live by when he recently competed in the 7th International Summer Special Olympics in South Bend, Indiana July 31-Aug. 8.

Mike, the son of Randy and Diane Larson of Wakefield, not only participated but he brought home a silver medal and two fourth-place ribbons. Mike teamed up with Stephen Mann of Lincoln, Darrell Bohner of Grand Island and Mike Royer of Hooper to finish second in the 4x100-meter relay. Mike placed fourth in the 200-meter dash and the standing long jump. Larson said he was pleased with his efforts as he fledged with his silver medal.

"I thought I did good," he said. "I didn't think I'd win but I'm glad I did."

Besides the medal, ribbons and numerous articles of clothing the athletes received Mike also exchanged pins with athletes from all over the world.

In all 4,500 athletes, representing 72 countries and all 50 states, converged on the University of Notre Dame campus for the summer games. The city of South Bend had some 20,000 people volunteer to assist in the games, of which they used 18,000. Residents of the city also opened up their homes for the families of the participants.

"We were all amazed at the size and scope of the Olympics," Mike's father said. "We knew it would be big but we never imagined...it's just hard to describe."

The opening ceremony, which was televised on ABC's Wide World of Sports, lasted late into the evening of July 31. Numerous stars of the sports and entertainment worlds performed at the ceremony. Such stars as Arnold Schwarzenegger, Barbara Mandrell, Susan Saint James, Jane Fonda, O.J. Simpson, John Ritter, Clint Eastwood, Whitney Houston, Mary Lou Retton, Bart Connor, Rocky Bleier, Frank Gifford, John Denver, Don Johnson and even President Reagan spoke during the ceremony.

Although all the participants, which ranged in age from 10 to 80, were out to do their best, the order of finish wasn't the top priority. The

games were an outlet for these special athletes from around the world to gather and just have fun.

Diane Larson said family support was also a big part of the activities. Randy, Diane, the two other Larson children and Mike's grandparents made the trip to cheer on their brother, son and grandson in this once in a lifetime opportunity. Diane told one story that lends to the family support theme.

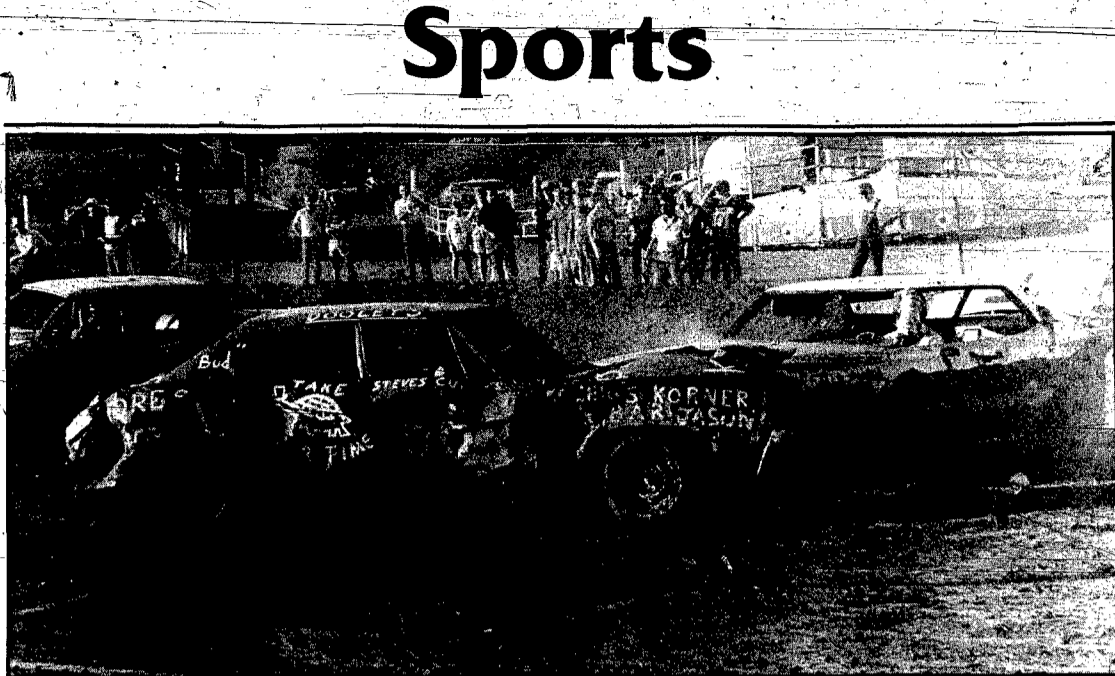

Midgets crowned champions

The Wakefield Midgets claimed their first state championship ever Sunday by downing Dannebrog-Cairo-Boelus-Centura 6-1 in the championship of the Class C Midget State Tournament held in Rushville.

Wakefield's four previous state championships have been at the Junior Legion level. Wakefield was crowned the Class B Junior Legion champs in 1973 and it was the Class C champions in 1978, 1979 and 1984. Wakefield teams have a combined record of 11-0 in Class C state tournament action.

Practice starts at Allen

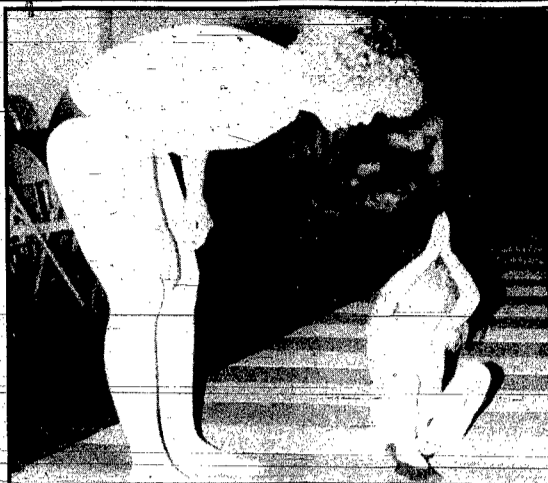

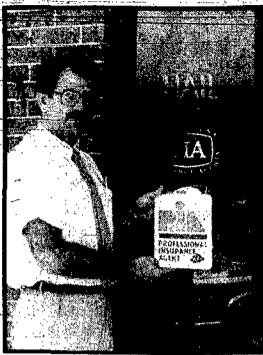

LEIGHTON replied that the operating tax levy requirement and the bond levy requirement are "both for school purposes" and both figure into the school district's total tax levy.

"Whether the school district taxes increase or decrease will eventually be determined by property valuation. All we can control is how much we ask for," Leighton said.

Also, the Winside Board of Education adopted a board policy on dress code in the schools.

Beginning Sept. 1, 1987, the following dress code will be in effect:

- Shorts will be allowed to be worn during school hours only at the approval of the administration.

- Athletic uniforms (including sweatsuits) will only be allowed to be worn during school hours upon the approval of the administration.

- And no shirts or blouses showing bare midriff will be allowed to be worn during school hours.

The board also decided not to purchase a new vehicle (station wagon or suburban type used vehicle) while the current van being used for transportation is still in good running condition.

They also decided to pay \$4 an hour, \$15 minimum as an activity bus driver salary.

Todd Popsil, currently attending Wayne State College has been offered the position as the assistant football coach at Winside High School. Natalie Fontenelle, also attending Wayne State College, has been offered the position of assistant volleyball coach.

air conditioning back on.

Councilman Freeman Decker made a motion that the city officials evaluate the use of the alert signals and "hopefully come up with a solution" to what he thought was not an insurmountable problem.

"My only complaint is that the fire whistle blows too long," Decker said. Johnson however, interpreted Decker's motion to limit the announcements and usage of the civil defense system.

"Separate times need separate measures," Johnson mentioned. He said the city staff and city hall use discretion when sounding the alert and that practice should proceed as in the past. Johnson said he would favor a study be made of the system, but not to limit the usage at the present time.

It was decided by the city council to

have the administration, the police chief and fire chief work on something. Mayor Wayne Marsh said he would like to do something that would be more satisfactory to the petition signers and residents of the Wayne community.

IN OTHER ACTION the city council approved an ordinance that would basically place stop signs on the 10th Street and the new Providence Road extension; and the intersection of the new Providence Road extension and Highway 35.

No parking will be allowed on the extended Providence Road, to keep in conformity with the present Providence Road.

No action was taken on discussion to place stop signs on the corner of Providence Road and 14th Street, Claycomb Road and 14th Street, and Linden Street and 14th Street.

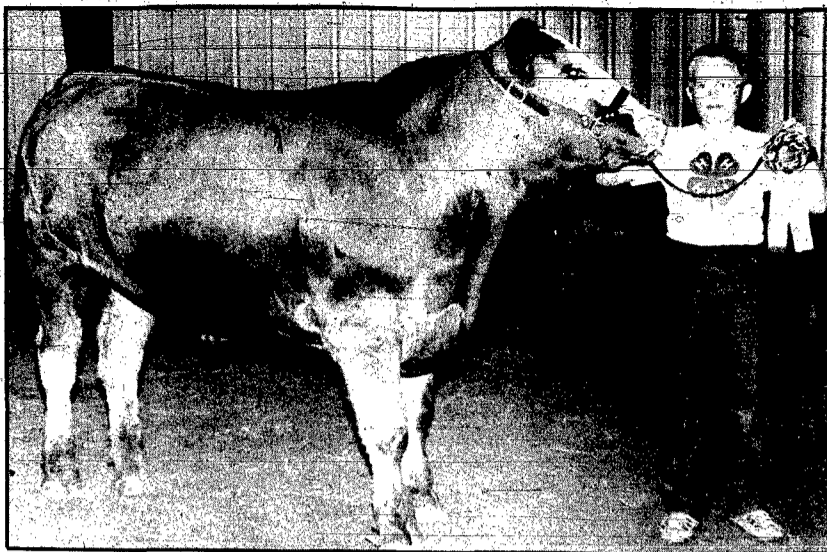

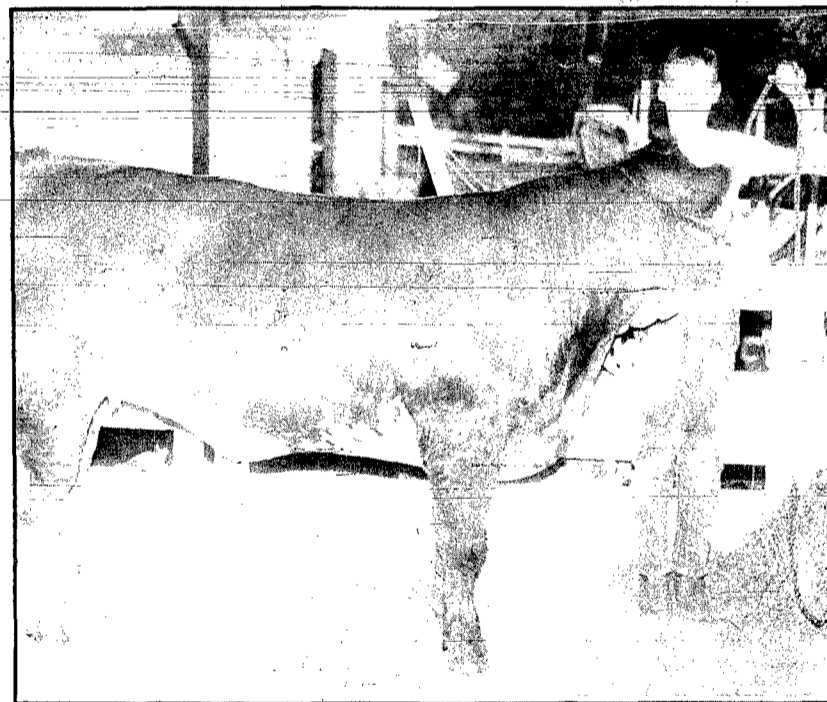

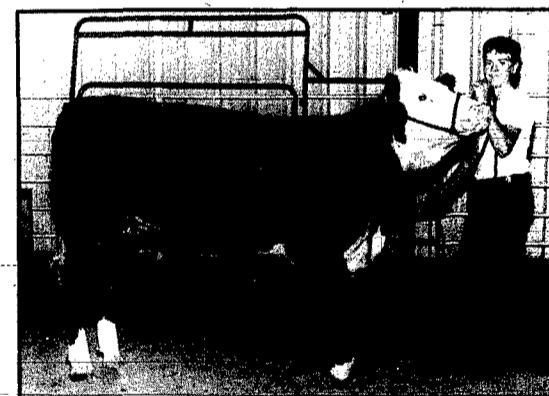

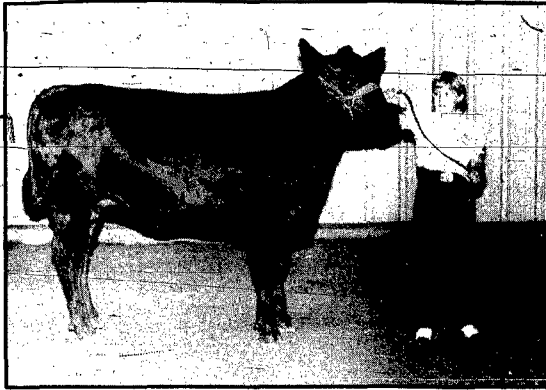

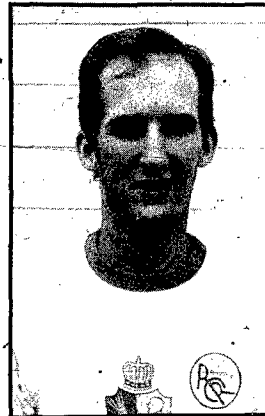

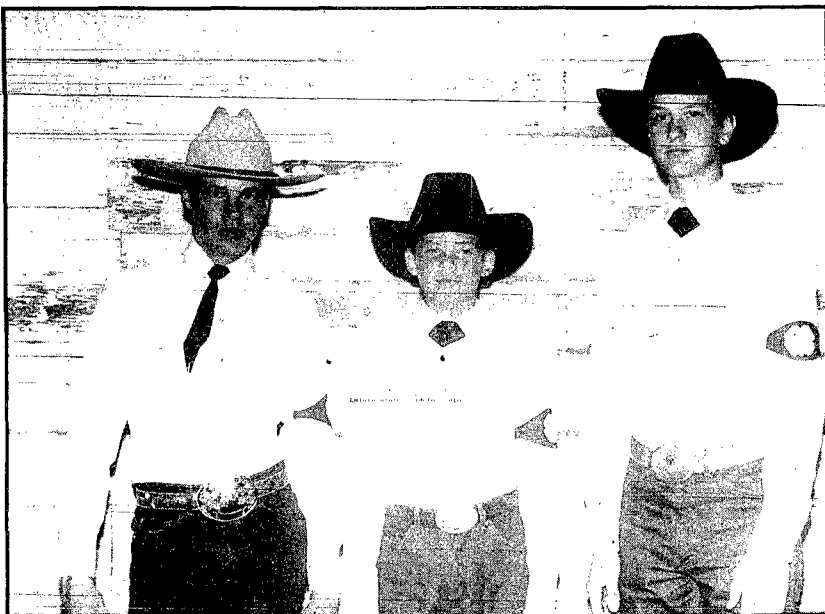

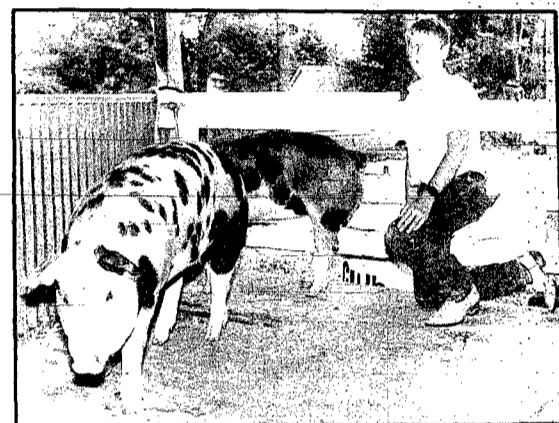
