## At A Glance

### Barbecue slated

### Energy monies

Governor Kay Orr announced recently that Goldenrod Hills Community Action Council in Wisner received \$193,372 to make energy saving home improvements under the Weatherization Assistance Program.

The governor estimates that energy saving home improvements will be made in 115 homes in the counties served by Goldenrod Hills Community Action Council, including Knox, Cedar, Dixon, Dakota, Thurston, Burt, Washington, Dodge, Cuming, Stanton, Wayne, Pierce, Madison and Antelope.

In making the announcement, the governor cited a Nebraska Energy Office study showing that once the home improvements are completed, homeowners generally realize a 21 percent savings in their energy use.

The Goldenrod Hills Weatherization program provides basic home repairs for elderly, low income and handicapped individuals.

### Grant awarded

U.S. Senator David Karnes announced that a \$300,000 grant will fund a program to help rural Nebraskans deal with farm-related stress.

The Rural Mental Health Demonstration Program Grant comes from the National Institute of Mental Health and will be administered by the Nebraska State Mental Health Authority.

The grant, which will focus on a demonstration project in Nebraska, will finance a program that will provide mental health services to adults through Ag Action Centers and rural doctors' offices, and to children through teachers and education materials at the schools.

Public service announcements will also be developed. Farm Crisis Hotline staff will be trained to deal with behavioral emergencies and long range planning will be done to respond to future rural mental health needs.

Counties included in the grant are Wayne, Dixon, Cedar, Burt, Thurston, Dakota, Cuming, Stanton, Colfax, Platte, Nance, Boone, Madison, Pierce, Antelope, Knox, Boyd, Rock, Brown, Cherry and Keya-Paha.

## Semitrailer overturns with cattle

A SEMITRAILER BELONGING TO S & B Enterprises of Valentine overturned Monday evening on a county road four miles north and approximately two and a half east of Wayne. The driver, Robert Epke, was headed to the Mike Meyer farm northeast of Wayne with a load of cattle when he slid off the south side of the road, causing the trailer to turn over on its side. A spokesman for the Dixon

County Sheriff's Department said muddy roads were a contributing factor in the accident which occurred shortly after 7 p.m. The semitrailer contained 56 head of cattle, three of which were killed in the accident. Another two or three cattle were crippled. Epke, the driver, was uninjured.

## School board approves budget of \$2,758,690

The Wayne-Carroll board of education Monday night approved a budget for the 1987-88 school year which shows an increase of slightly less than three percent over the current fiscal year.

The new budget, including all programs, totals \$2,758,690. The budget, excluding federal programs, is \$2,638,629.

There were no visitors from the school district at Monday night's budget hearing. Voting in favor of the budget were board members Becky Keldel, Cap Peterson, Arnold Emry and Sid Hillier.

Board member Joyce Reeg abstained from voting, and board member Nell Sandahl was absent from the meeting.

HAUN, IN HIS annual budget message to board members, said the Wayne Public School District continues to operate within its budget and is solvent in all accounts.

The district continues to carry a cash reserve of approximately 20 percent of its annual budget which allows the district to operate on a cash basis during periods when tax monies are received in minimal amounts.

Haun added that data compiled by researchers at the University of Nebraska shows the Wayne school district, when compared with 281 Nebraska K-12 districts, ranking 186 (one is high) in tax rates per pupil with a total tax rate of 1.40.

The highest rate listed is 2.82 (Crawford), and the lowest is 0.76

(Harrisburg). The district ranks 206 in actual valuation per resident pupil.

THE PROPOSED Wayne-Carroll school district budget calls for an increase, including federal programs, of \$80,103. Of that amount, \$45,000 is in the instructional budget.

The remainder of significant budget increases are in special education, where \$30,000 has been budgeted for the removal of education barriers at the middle and high schools.

Haun said special education costs must be budgeted for the year that they are incurred even though it is anticipated that the district will receive at least 85 percent reimbursement the following year.

HAUN POINTED out that the one unknown budget concern for 1987-88 is salaries.

The board of education and teachers have not reached a salary agreement for the 1987-88 school year. If a settlement is not reached then salaries will be set by the Court of Industrial Relations.

The findings and rulings of the court are binding on the school district regardless of the amount of money in the budget or the financial condition of the school district.

Haun said budget preparations must proceed, however, and tax levies must be set regardless of the guessing game which becomes a part of the budgeting process.

THE SCHOOL district has continued to receive reductions in

general fund state aid. State aid has decreased for the Wayne school district \$124,000 during the period from 1984-85.

In order to maintain the level of education programs expected of an AA accredited school, Haun said these funds have over the years been replaced from the local property tax.

In addition to the continued loss of state aid, Haun said the district will have a loss of \$22,750 in high school tuition for tax purposes.

He added, however, that the loss should be offset by an increase in assessed valuation (2 1/2 to 3 million dollars) as a result of petitioners transferring their land into the Wayne district for 1987-88.

WHILE THE FINAL tax levy for the school district cannot be determined until property valuations have been set, the superintendent predicts that a tax levy increase of less than three percent can be expected.

Haun said that among other reasons, this is possible because of the lowering of the district necessary cash reserve from \$750,000 to \$709,000.

It is anticipated that major roof repairs involving roof insulation at the high school will be partially funded from a federal energy grant.

IN OTHER BUSINESS Monday night, board of education members heard a report from Haun regarding staffing for the upcoming school year.

Haun said all positions have been filled with the exception of a head

## Wayne-Carroll classes slated to begin Aug. 31

Students in the Wayne-Carroll School District can begin sharpening their pencils in preparation for the first day of the 1987-88 school year. Regular classes for students in the Wayne-Carroll district will begin at 8:30 a.m. on Monday, Aug. 31.

Students who are new to the Wayne school district and have not yet registered are asked to do so as soon as possible. School offices are open daily from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

SUPERINTENDENT Frances Haun said busses will run regular routes on the opening day of school.

Students riding the bus will be mailed a bus route prior to the opening day of school and will be able to anticipate the approximate time of the bus arriving at their home.

Haun added that busses will leave the Wayne schools at approximately 3:45 p.m. on the first day of school.

THERE WILL BE two sections of kindergarten in Wayne, with the morning session running from 8:30 to 11 a.m., and the afternoon session running from 12:30 to 3 p.m.

All other classes begin at 8:30 a.m., with the first and second grades dismissing at 3:15 p.m., and third and fourth grades at 3:20 p.m.

Middle school will dismiss from 3:30 to 3:45 p.m., and high school at 3:45 p.m.

Carroll school classes begin at 8:20 a.m. and dismiss at 3 p.m. Kindergarten classes will be in the afternoon.

ON THE FIRST day of school, seventh and eighth grade students are asked to pick up their class schedules in the gymnasium at 8:20 a.m. Fifth and sixth grade students will find their home room assignments posted outside their classroom.

Ninth grade students are asked to report to the lecture hall for orientation on Monday, Aug. 31 at 8:30 a.m.

Tenth, 11th and 12th grade students are requested to report to the high school commons to pick up their class schedule cards at 8:10 a.m., and report to regular classes at 8:30 a.m. Lunch tickets may be purchased beginning at 8:10 a.m.

Teachers will report at 8:15 a.m. on Aug. 26, 27 and 28 for workshop activities.

SUPERINTENDENT HAUN said there will be no change in the cost of school lunches for the coming year.

School lunch prices are \$1.20 for high school and middle school students weekly; \$1.10 for elementary school students daily; \$5.25 for elementary school students weekly; \$1.45 for adults daily; and \$7.25 for adults weekly.

# 'Guys and Dolls' — a musical fable

"Guys and Dolls," a musical fable of Broadway, will be presented by Wayne Community Theatre on Friday, Aug. 28 and Saturday, Aug. 29 at 8 p.m., and on Sunday, Aug. 30 at 2 p.m.

The play, which is designed for the entire family, is under the direction of Ted Blenderman and will be staged in Ramsey Theatre on the Wayne State College campus.

Cost is \$5 for adults, and \$4 for senior citizens (65 and older) and children ages 12 and under.

"GUYS AND DOLLS," which was

modestly subtitled "A Musical Fable of Broadway," was an exciting musical jamboree of Times Square.

It was perfect fusion of the varied and highly individual talents of Frank Loesser, Jo Swerling, Abe Burrows, George S. Kaufman, Michael Kidd and Damon Runyon. Runyon, born in one Manhattan, became the indubitable voice of another. From Manhattan, Kan., Runyon, the itinerant reporter, had developed into the poet of the illiterate.

His herpes were safe blowers, hard-boiled sports, beer barons, crapshooters, horse players, gangsters and slangsters of Manhattan-on-the-subway.

Runyon's understanding of New

Yorkers was gladly seized by the authors and the result was a glittering, facetious, fabulous transformation of the other world — the universe of another world.

TRIED OUT IN Philadelphia, where the audiences wanted to keep it forever, "Guys and Dolls" swept the sophisticated New York audience when it opened at the Forty-Sixth Street Theatre on Nov. 24, 1950.

It had a run of 1,200 performances, and was revived five years later with undiminished energy. The critics were — and remain — uncritical. Three years after its premiere in New York, "Guys and Dolls" opened in London.

In November 1955, Hollywood turned it into a motion picture with Marlon Brando as Sky Masterson, Frank Sinatra as Nathan Detroit, and Jean Simmons as Sarah Brown. Vivian Blaine was the only star from the original Broadway cast.

WAYNE'S COUNTERPARTS are Chuck Higbee as Sky Masterson, J. Dave Rusk as Nathan Detroit, Melissa Wilbur as Sarah Brown, and Gwen Jensen as Miss Adelaide.

Other members of the Wayne Community Theatre cast include Gil Haase as Big Jule, Clyde Flowers as Lt. Brannigan, Elijah Powell as Brand Bottle Bates, Mike Scott as Nicely-Nicely, Stuart Rethwisch as Harry the Horse, Darren Wacker as

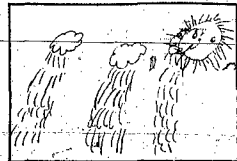
Rusty Charlie, Byron Bonsall as Benny Southstreet, and Katherine Butler as General Cartwright.

The bride's attendants wore royal blue summer satin frocks in floor length. They carried alstroemeria lilies and carnations.

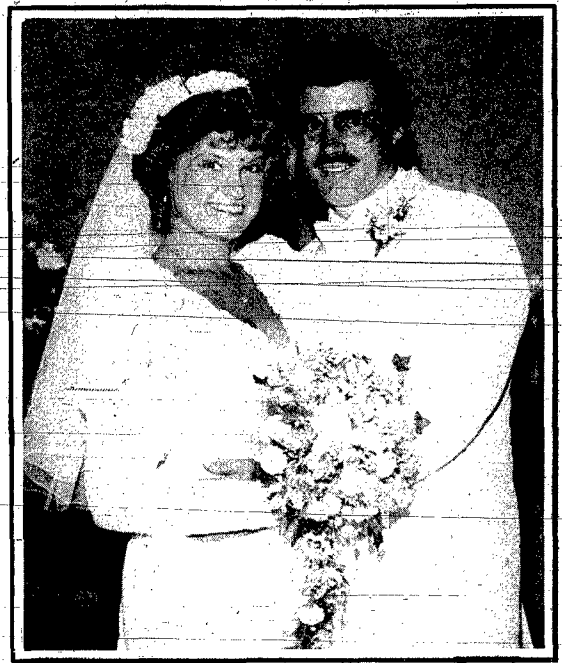
The bridegroom was attired in a white tuxedo, and his attendants wore gray tailcoats.

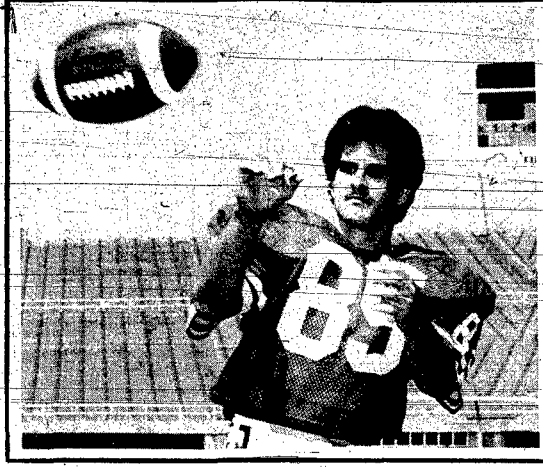

During the fair, the flag stood in the Republican Party booth as a part of the local party members' salute to the bicentennial of the U. S. Constitution.

## Foreigners to report transfers

Foreigners who acquire or transfer any interest other than a security interest in Wayne County's agricultural land are reminded to report the transaction to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service within 90 days.

The Agricultural Foreign Investment Disclosure Act requires all foreign owners of U.S. agricultural land to report either holding, acquisitions, dispositions leases of 10 years or more, and land-use changes to ASCS.

"This law is still in effect and those

who fail to report, or who are late in reporting face possible fines," said Dean Owens, Chairman of the Wayne County ASC Committee. The Foreign Disclosure Reports contain the date the land was acquired or transferred, the value of the purchase price yet to be paid, and the estimated value of the land.

Foreign investors reported owning 12.4 million acres of U.S. agricultural land as of December 31, 1986. In Nebraska, foreign-owned agricultural land totaled 70,137 acres for 1986. The Wayne County ASCS is unaware of any acres in Wayne County that are owned by foreign investors.

Owens said the report must be filed when a single foreign individual, organization, or government holds a direct or indirect interest of 10 percent or more; when a group of foreign individuals, organizations, or governments, acting in concert, hold an aggregate interest of 10 percent or more; when a group of foreign individuals, organizations and governments each with less than 10 percent and not acting in concert hold an aggregate of 50 percent interest or more in agricultural land.

"Agricultural land is any tract of more than 10 acres now in agricultural, forestry, or timber production. This includes land in agricultural use when purchased, as well as land later converted to agricultural use," Mr. Owens said.

Foreigners who own or have an interest in 10 acres or less do not need to report unless annual proceeds from the sale of agricultural products grown on these acres exceed \$1000.

Board members also heard a report from Cap Peterson regarding the establishment of a non-profit foundation for the district. The foundation would provide financial support for school activities that could not be provided by tax dollars. 
Center Committee, the midwest regional representative for the Society for College and University Planning, and a member of the boards of directors for both the Maverick Club and Lady Mavs at the University.

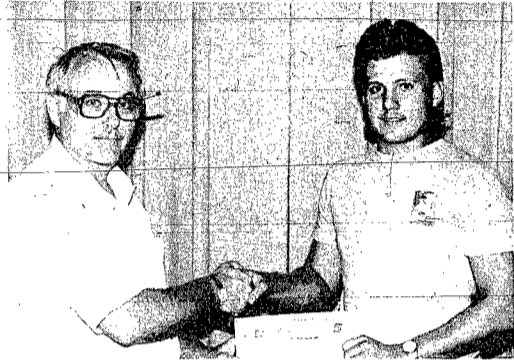
### Daub announces candidacy

—All lunch must be eaten in the lunchroom area. No food may be taken out of the lunchroom. (Includes lunch brought from home.)  
—No outside food or drinks brought into school during the hours of 11:30-1:30.  
—Lunch hour: 11:55-12:51.  
—Lunch ticket prices: Daily - \$1.20, weekly - \$5.75.  
Parents and students should be aware of the latest policies regarding school lunch programs and competition with that program from outside sources. The Competitive Foods Policy reads as follows:  
"Foods sold in competition with National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs are subject to all federal regulations. Such foods shall not be sold on school premises during the period beginning one-half hour prior to the serving period for breakfast and/or lunch and lasting until one-half hour after the serving of breakfast and/or lunch. State and Federal reimbursements may be withheld from schools found in violation of this policy."  
This policy does prohibit foods such as pizza, hamburgers, etc. from being brought to school during meal service times. (11:30 to 1:30 at Wayne High School.)  
In effect, this policy prohibits any foods or drinks brought to school from outside sources during the hours of 11:30 to 1:30 each school day or use of drink machines at school during these hours.  
Students or parents may bring a sack lunch from home.

## Medicines and Sunlight

An intense sunburn following very little exposure to the sun may be due to the effects of taking certain medicines. "Photoallergy" and "phototoxicity" are the words used to describe unusual responses to even brief exposures to sunlight. Areas of the body typically affected include the head, arms and neck.

Phototoxicity reactions can occur in many persons who are exposed to sunlight while taking large enough doses of certain medicines. Photoallergic reactions, on the other hand, occur in a much smaller number of persons. Medicines associated with these reactions include the tetracycline antibiotics, thiazide diuretics, chlorpromazine, and griseofulvin (a popular antifungal).

People should be aware that sunburn or changes in the skin following sun exposure may be due to medicines they are taking. One's physician should be consulted if phototoxicity or photoallergy is suspected. Clothing and sunscreens provide some protection against reactions but are not universally effective in preventing all problems. A change in medicines is sometimes necessary.
