How to buy thread

Buying the correct thread is one of the secrets to successful sewing. Thread ranges from all-purpose to the various specialty threads.

Select the right type of thread for its intended purpose. An all-purpose thread is best for most of your hand sewing and machine sewing. For special projects look for topstitching thread, hand quilting thread, craft thread and extra fine thread.

If you are sewing on a serger machine, use thread designed especially for that type of machine. That type of thread has a special finish applied for fault-free, high speed sewing.

Always buy quality thread. Avoid "bargain" low-quality threads that cause tangling during hand sewing, extra lint and abrasion on the machine, and split seams in the finished garment.

Select a thread that is compatible with your fabric. A cotton-polyester thread can be used with fabrics made of natural fibers, synthetic fibers and blends. Choose the right thread color. It is best to select a thread the same color as your fabric or one shade darker. When sewing with a plaid, tweed or print, select a thread that matches as the predominant or background color.

Double your sewing options

If you have a zig-zag machine, you can create parallel stitching with a double or twin needle. The rows of stitching are sewn simultaneously, saving time and making a very professional-looking accent.

Double the versatility of your machine by using any stitch with a double needle for a different look. The new stitches will vary in suitability depending on fabric, stitch length and width. Try using graduated shades of one color or two contrasting colors for interesting variations.

To prevent the two threads from tangling while sewing, place the spools so they unwind in opposite directions. Place the left spool so thread is unwinding from behind the spool; the right thread would be unwinding from the front of the spool.

To keep from breaking needles, turn the handwheel manually to be sure the needles clear the presser foot and needle plate. Stitch length can vary depending on the look desired. Always test on a scrap of some fabric before starting on the actual project.

Try these strategies to sew

Does your time schedule not allow you enough time to do your favorite activity — sewing? Perhaps it is time to rethink your daily schedule and priorities. Try these strategies:

- Have a "sew-in." Share a babysitter with other busy sewing enthusiasts.
- Sew whenever you have some brief intervals during the day, as short as 15 minutes. To do this you must leave out your machine and projects. Waiting for a two-hour block of time may mean never sewing.
- Buy an extra long phone extension cord. Pin, cut or hand sew while talking with long-winded friends. Stitch by machine if you like (some time-conscious sewers do, without apology).

Perry 3rd, team 5th at state

Thursday afternoon Ann Perry became the first Lady Blue Devil to medal at the girls state golf meet in the school's history.

The junior did this by shooting an 18-hole total of 94. Perry was tied for third place with Kelly Dreiling of Holdrege and Stacy Baack of Cozad after regulation play. Perry claimed third place outright by winning the first sudden-death hole. Dreiling finished fourth and Baack placed fifth after the playoff.

As a team, Wayne finished fifth for the second year in a row. The locals shot a team score of 417, two shots off of fourth-place Gothenburg. Cozad was crowned state champions with a score of 384. Blair was the runner-up by shooting a 397. Omaha Duchesne finished third posting a score of 398. Following Wayne was York, 424; Columbus Lakeview, 426; Holdrege, 431; and Wahoo, 442. Minden, Chadron, Crete and Grand Island Northwest also had girls competing at the meet held at Mahoney Park in Lincoln.

Kendra Marshall of Cozad and Becky Vinton of Blair tied after 18 holes with identical rounds of 93. Marshall won the playoff, giving her the state championship.

Wayne Coach Dick Metteer said his team had fourth place as its goal. The locals came within two strokes of reaching their goal. Metteer said he knew going into the meet it would be very difficult to finish higher than fourth. The coach said Cozad,

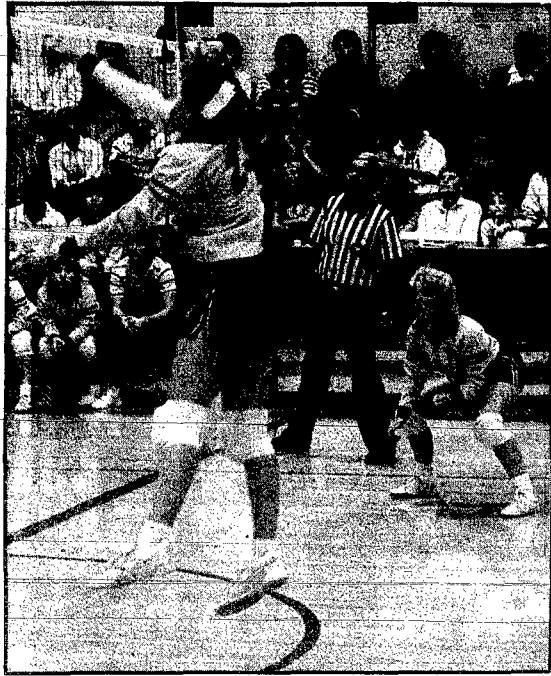

Lady Eagles on roll; boost record to 9-3

The home court advantage proved to be more than enough as the Allen Lady Eagles downed Winside Tuesday night 15-11, 15-13.

The Lewils and Clark Conference match wasn't really as close as the scores indicated. Allen, 9-3, won for the fourth straight time and the Lady Eagles have won six of their last seven matches. The loss was Winside's second straight and it was the Wildcats fifth setback in the last six matches. The loss dropped Winside to 4-7 on the year.

Allen went up early in the first set. The hosts biggest lead was at 9-2. Winside was having trouble returning the Allen serves, resulting in short rallies. Winside cut the lead to 11-6 behind the serving of Cher Olson. Allen scored the next three points and led 14-6. Christina Bloomfield brought the visitors back to within 14-11 before Lori Jensen's spike attempt went wide giving the Lady Eagles the win.

The second game started much like the first one. Allen led 4-0 and built the lead to 7-1. Winside got a sideout and Ann Meierhenry got the serve. The senior's rifle serves caused Allen problems. Meierhenry served seven points for Winside to give the Wildcats an 8-7 lead, their first lead of the evening.

Missy Marlinson put Allen back on top and before she was done serving the hosts had a 14-9 lead. The next surge came from Winside. Bloom-

field got the Wildcats to within 14-13 before losing the serve. Liz Hansen won the game for Allen when her serve wasn't returned.

Meierhenry led all scorers with 10 points. She was 11-13 at the serving stripe with eight aces. Martinson was next in line with eight points and 11-12 serving in a winning cause. Allen hit 50-57 serves while the Wildcats were 40-46.

Allen's Candace Jones was the top spiker. The junior finished the night 9-12 with six kills. Martinson was 8-10 with three aces. Tricia Hartman of Winside was also 8-10 as she recorded two ace hits. The Lady Eagles were 30-35 at the net while Winside went 31-40.

Allen Coach Gary Troth said he has seen his team look sharper. Troth said his team had trouble with their serve-receive. Winside Coach Jill Stenwall echoed Troth's concern. Stenwall said her team was 9-40 on serve-receive. Winside took the junior varsity match by scores of 15-9, 11-15, 15-3. Bloomfield was the top scorer with 15 points. Tina Hartman added nine points and Michelle Thies tallied eight points. Allen got revenge in the C squad match with a 11-5, 4-11, 11-0 win.

Both teams will be in action Tuesday night. Allen will travel to Homer looking to clinch the outright Lewis Division championship. Winside will host its last match of the season when it entertains Hartington. Both matches are scheduled to begin at 6:30 p.m.

Holy Trinity dumps juniors

The Wayne 7th and 8th grade football team finished the season with a 30-6 loss to Hartington Holy Trinity Thursday afternoon.

Wayne, 0-4, got its only score on a two yard run by running back Regg Carnes on the first play of the second quarter. At that point the locals trailed 8-6. The high powered Holy Trinity offense scored a touchdown in each quarter of the game.

Carnes led the Wayne offense with 100 yards on 18 carries... The 7th grader also added a 30 yard punt return and a 30 yard kickoff return. John Murphy was credited with 29 yards on 11 carries.

Carnes and Jason Fink paced the Wayne defense. The pair were credited with nine tackles apiece. Troy Kaup totaled seven tackles, Jim Murphy added five and Brian Gamble was in on four stops.

Wakefield still undefeated with pair of wins

A two-set win over Coleridge Thursday night gave the Wakefield Lady Trojans the outright championship in the Clark Division of the Lewis and Clark Conference.

Wakefield improved to 11-0 with the 15-7, 15-4 win over the Chargers. The 11-0 mark is the best start ever at Wakefield. Last year the Lady Trojans won 13 in a row but the streak came after losing a match. The loss dropped Coleridge to 2-8.

Wakefield hit 41-45 serves for 91 percent. Karen Hallstrom led the way for Coach Paul Eaton. The junior scored 18 points while serving 19-21 over the net. Senior serve specialist Mollie Greve was 8-8 with five points.

Eaton said it was nice to see Greve get back on track. He said she has struggled the last couple of matches and it is important to have her serving well if the Lady Trojans hope to hit 95 percent from the serving stripe.

Kodi Nelson was the top spiker in the match. The senior was 15-19 with seven kill hits. Julie Greve was 12-13 and Lana Ekberg was 5-6 with three aces. As a team, Wakefield finished 37-45.

Tricia Schwarten was 31-33 in the setting department. Sharon Wenstrand filled in for Michelle Otte, who was sick, in the back row. Wenstrand had a good night passing as did Kelly Fredrickson, according to Eaton.

The Wakefield JV and C squads also won. The junior varsity won 15-10, 18-16 while the C team took a 11-0, 7-11, 11-5 match. Susan Nurenberger was 26-27 serving in the two matches.

Eaton said he would like to see his team pushed to three sets so the girls can tune-up for post-season play. Wakefield has beaten its last four opponents in two sets. Wausa, Wynot and Lyons-Decatur Northeast are the only teams to push the Lady Trojans to three sets.

Eaton said the conference isn't quite as strong as it has been in the past but he thought there was more equality than in the past.

Eaton said his girls don't feel the pressure of keeping the winning

streak alive. He said he's still looking for a complete game from the Lady Trojans. The Wakefield coach said he hopes his team peaks at the right time — conference and district tournaments.

Tuesday night the Lady Trojans made quick work of Walthill downing the Lady Bluejays 15-7, 15-4. Hallstrom was again the leading scorer with 11 points on 16-17 serves. Nelson was 15-18 in spiking with four aces and eight tips.

Wakefield also won the JV match 15-8, 11-15, 15-10. The C squad lost by scores of 1-11, 6-11.

Tuesday night the Lady Trojans will host Bancroft-Rosalie in a parents' night match.

Pamida offers top merchandise, competitive prices

Pamida began as a company in 1963 when D. J. Witherspoon and Lee Wegener, both of Omaha, became partners and opened the first store in Knoxville, Iowa. They called the store Gibsons at that time, later changing the name to Pamida Gibsons when selling their stock on the open market. This happened in 1969 with the stock going on the American Stock Exchange in 1970 and the New York Stock Exchange in 1972.

On Nov. 16, 1972, Pamida Gibsons opened the Wayne store. It was open in its present location on Highway 35 on the east edge of town. Clyde Munbeck was the first store manager and had that position until November, 1973 when Gary Persinger took over the duties. Persinger was promoted to district manager in October, 1974, leaving the store manager duties for Dennis Townsend.

Townsend remained the store manager until September, 1976 when Ken Soden took over. While Soden was manager, many changes occurred with Pamida Gibsons. The name was changed in 1980 to just Pamida. In 1981 both Witherspoon and Wegener decided to sell their interest in the company to the employees, thus forming an Employee Stock Ownership Plan. In 1982, with Soden still manager, the store in Wayne was totally remodeled, enabling customers to more easily find the merchandise plus to show them a

larger selection of mens, ladies, boys, girls and infants clothing.

Soden left the company in September, 1982 and was replaced by current manager Dave Loose.

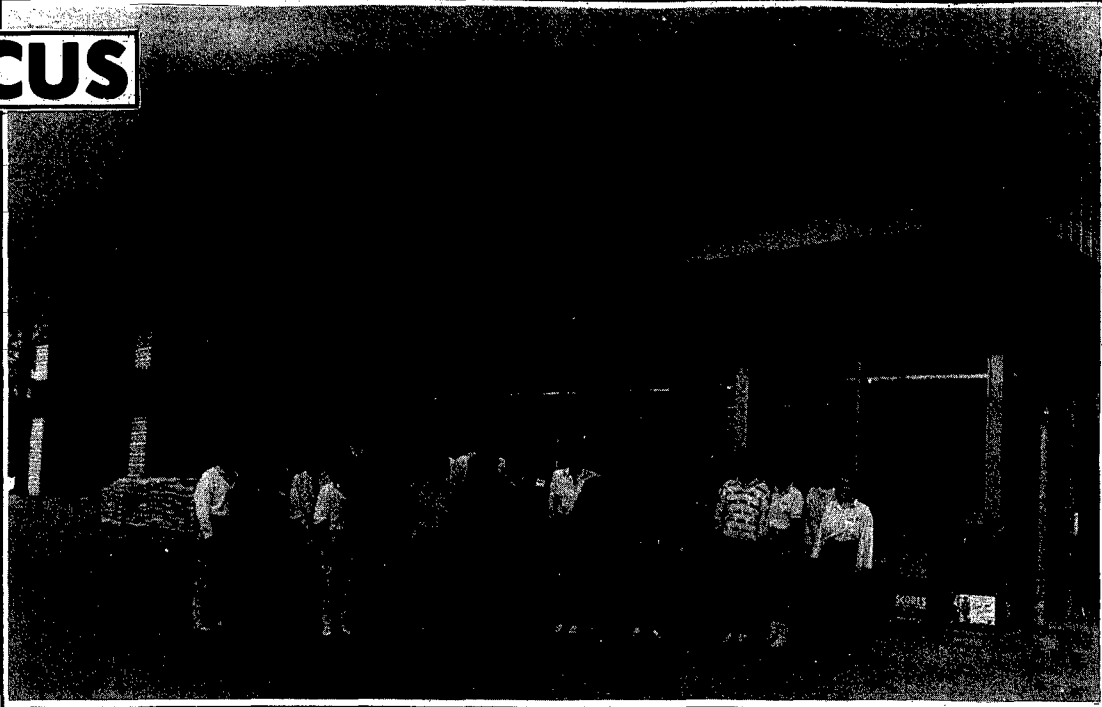
Over the years, Pamida's policy has been to offer basic merchandise at a competitive price while providing a good clean shopping atmosphere and good customer service.

Weekly advertised specials are run with prices reduced from the already low prices. Pamida wants to stress that occasionally an item advertised may be out of stock or that it may have sold out early. In this case, Pamida offers a unique alternative.

Customers can take a raincheck on the item or be offered a comparable item at an equal savings.

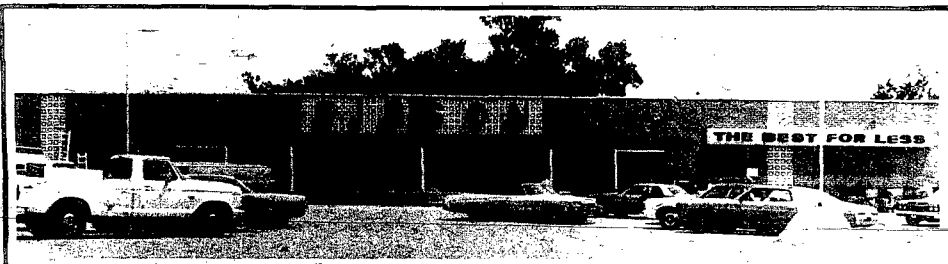
"If you feel the comparable item is not comparable, or if we have no replacement item and you do not want a raincheck, you may choose any other regular priced item in our store and we will give you 25 percent off that item. We call this P.A.R. [Pamida's Alternate Raincheck]. We feel this gives the customers a choice they may not find at other stores in the area," mentioned Loose.
