



Fact-finder report rejected by WEA

A fact finder's recommendation concerning 1987-88 contract negotia-tions between the Wayne Education Association and the Wayne Carroll Board of Education was released to the school district last Tuesday.

However, the fact-finding-recom-mendation, considered as non-binding, was rejected by the Wayne Education Association (WEA) during a meeting-which took place last Wednesday (Nov. 25). The Court of Industrial Relations will now begin a hearing to decide on a contract settlement. That hearing has been schedul-ed for Friday, Dec. 4 at Lincoln.

Negotiations between the WEA and the Wayne-Carroll Board of Educa-tion was declared at an impasse in early October. The board of educa-tion had offered the WEA a contract ron nad oriered the WEA a contract establishing \$14,300 as a base salary, an increase of nearly 4.3 percent over the previous year's base salary. Duane Blomenkamp, representing the WEA, said the last offer made by

the WEA was a-two year proposal— requesting a base salary of \$14,500 for the 1987-88 year, followed by a \$15,300 base salary for the 1988-89 school year.
In addition, the WEA had also re-

quested that the board of education agree to pay full health insurance for

Both the WEA and the board of education were represented by their legal council during the fact-finding. A third party was appointed by the Court of Industrial Relations.

THE FACT-FINDING recommen dation, according to Superintendent Francis Haun, proposed that the base salary be raised to \$14,500 and that full insurance be paid by the board of education.

Blomenkamp said that at least 90 percent of the WEA members voted to reject the fact finders recommendation. One reason why it was turn down, he said, was because the WEA down, he said, was because hie wEA would like to have a legal opinion as to what schools they should be com-pared with in current, and future, contract negotiations. He said WEA entered negotiations

with an idea to obtain a contract that was comparable to schools of similar academic excellence, community size and where there was a college in

After the Court of Industrial Relations hearing, it could be up to two or three months before a decision is rendered on the WEA's contract for 1987-88.



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

Pioneer of sorts

Wavne-Carroll school district has become a pioneer of sorts because of its recent venture in regard to teacher contract negotiations for the 1987-88 year. But it's nothing that we would consider as something to welcome with open arms

Since September, the way which contract negotiations between school boards and teachers' bargaining units, once they have gone beyond impasse, has changed.

Previously, after impasse, the negotiations would carry into the fact-finding stage. Had this been last year, the Wayne Education Association and the Wayne-Carroll Board of Education could each have their own selected council at the fact-finding hearing — and a third party to the hearing would be selected upon mutual consent of the negotiators.

As we interpret it now, the Wayne Education Association and the board of education can still have their council present at the fact-finding, but the third party is now appointed by the Court of Industrial Relations.

Whether or not this present fact-finding procedure had any significant bearing as to why the contract hasn't been settled still isn't clear.

We do know that the fact-finding recommendation has been released, and the majority of Wayne Education Association members have rejected it. The recommendation suggests a base salary of \$14,500 for 1987-88. WEA had requested a two-year contract calling for \$14,500 in 1987-88 and \$15,300 in 1988-89. The board of education had offered a base salary of

But, according to representatives of the WEA, the salary isn't as much a factor here as another issue which has lately become a key bargaining element. Legitimate comparability what other school systems the school system should be compared with — seems to be what the teachers are seeking.

When analyzing comparisons, studying population, academic excellence and other factors, we believe there are some areas which should not be overlooked.

What also should be taken into consideration in the comrisons is how much pride a community places in its education programs being offered. And, most importantly, what age the economic conditions surrounding the community when a comparability study is being made.

It will be of genuine interest to see how the Court of Indistrial Relations handles this pioneer case and "rules" on comparability, and how it will set the tone for future contract negotiations among school districts.

Senator Schmitt and Committee: I am Mrs. Allen Schmant, a dairy farmers wife, rural resident of Northand Notare Inc. theast Nebraska, Winside. According

theast Nebraska, Winside, According to the Dames and Moore Study, Northeast Nebraska has approximately 180 sq. miles of "preferred" sites for low level radio-active wastes.

I know there are many things contaminating our environment and pledge to work to try and clean or keep Nebraska's environment clean. As you know, I have constantly asserted against a Central 5 State Low Level Radio-Active Waste facility in Nebraska. There are many peofe with expertise on radio-active ty in Nebraska. There are many people with expertise on radio-active subjects, who are guiding me, included are: geologists, soil technicians, concerned scientists of America, environmentalists, Insurance people, the Department of Environmental Control, the public, etc.

I have studied this subject for almost a year, studied at Northeast Technical College, Norfolk, attended governor's task force meetings, in

governor's task force meetings, in Lincoln. Also attended meetings in Lincoln. Also attended meetings in Chadron. Hartington, Norfolk. Columbus, Omaha and many others. I took part in two meetings where two developers. Westinghouse and U.S. Ecology, presented their plans.

Prompted by PURPA (U.S. Public Utility Regulatory Policies Act) which was enacted in 1978 by the U.S. Coopers and directs utilities to con-

Congress and directs utilities to connect up with small-scale independent power producers (also known as qualifying facilities) and to pay a fair market price for the electricity, several hundred U.S. companies have entered the independent power business since 1980, bringing a spirit of—entrepreneurship to—electricity that was last seen in the early part of the century.

The steadfast refusal of those who have led America down the Nuclear path, who refuse to admit the atom path, who refuse to admit the atom posse unique and unprecedented safety problems have got our state and others into "where does the deadly debris go?" Are we going to continue the Nuclear path and tevy this against our children and their children forever? I for one and many more Nebraska citizens want to see Nebraska Public Power District dedicate themselves to trying and using the new technologies which have no harmful wastes

no harmful wastes.

Forty years, I have waited to hear
producers of Nuclear waste say
"They are safe for mankind and environment", but to this day and my
knowledge there is nothing available
to nuetralize the harmful radioactive materials. When this era's
history is written, management of history is written, management of Nuclear wastes might rank as the 20th Centuries largest scientific and political blunder. Many other Nebraskans and I are fired of

Neoraskans and I are Irred of waiting!
Entomb (by vault) our Nuclear generators, before Dec. 31, 1992, as they are reaching retirement age, so we will not have to deal with generators garbage. The federal mandate reads: By Jan. 1, 1990, non-compact states must file annifications. compact states must file applications to operate disposal facilities or cer tify to NRC that they will provide for low level waste storage and disposal

within their own borders after Dec. 31, 1992. States not meeting that deadline could be denied access by the three states with disposal sites. To me this means when the Federal

Government is ready to accept these wastes (high and low level) from a Nuclear generator, Nebraska will be able to dismantel and move debris to the aiready existing sites, but NO. MORE generating of Nuclear energy wastes after 1992 or we the state will be responsible for it in our own

Many Nebraskan's and I do not support the Five State Central Com-pact and U.S. Ecology Developer for a centralized 5 state low level radio-active facility. Their facility cannot attain a zero release of the harmful radio active components. U.S. Ecology proposes to operate it ap-proximately 30 to 40 years, but radioproximately 30 to 40 years, but radio-active wastes placed in it will be harmful to mankind and animals for centuries. Nebraska's geological features, soil and climatic conditions will break down their barriers of safety. Probably, the high level wastes are waiting "in their wings". Nebraskans sure do not need our state to "host" trucks to the facility, driving up and down our public. driving up and down our public highways and roads carrying deadly highways and roads carrying deadly radio-active debris for many years to come. I realize there is a fine to withdraw from the Compact but it is small compared to the liabilities a host community will inherit when U.S. Ecology leaves after 30 or maybe 40 years, not even mentioning the threat of contamination and law suits.

Nebraska has 3 aquifers beneath us, used by multi-millions of people for drinking. Geologists are warning us, a serious threat exists if harmful for drinking. Geologists are warning us, a serious threat exists if harmful radio-active components reach an aquifer. Oklahoma City has wells contaminated with radio-active components. I lowas has confaminated wells also. Let's keep Nebraska FREE from this threat. The constant hauling of Nuclear garbage around, reates a constant threat for accidents. Contaminating our environment is becoming inevitable and a very possible cruel reality. According to scientists and chemists there are more harmful radio-active components in our environment than ever before. Nebraska's productive agriculture soil and production of milk, vegetables, and meat for mankind could become a "bare-industry" with him production, if a Nuclear generator or waste facility should have a serious accident. should have a serious accident

should have a serious accident. License (after entombment by vault) a fee to be established, the Nuclear generators. License, a fee to be established, all public and private producers of low-level radio-active wastes. Their wastes should be stored and monitored at the same facility that produces it. It should not be moved until the short-lived radio isotopes have decayed and become isotopes have decayed and become safe. Nebraska Department of

safe. Nebraska Department of En-Health, Nebraska Department of En-vironmental Control and local authorities rules should be the regulations and guidelines. These are my beliefs and many others according to the knowledge and information gathered on the sub-ject. We will meet with our legislators during the 1988 session on our beliefs.


