Ponca's aggressiveness at the beginning of Monday night's game against the Lady Bears of Laurel-Concord proved to be the winning edge as the Indians won by a 42-38 score.

Laurel Head Coach Pam Thies said that early in the game, the Lady Bears were outthrust by Ponca. "They [the Indians] were diving and flying after the basketball," Thies said.

"Later on, our girls did a better job of hustling," she added.

Ponca led 11-8 at the end of the first quarter and also had the half-time lead (23-17). Laurel came out fired up for the third period and outscored the Indians by a 10-4 margin.

Going into the final quarter, the score was knotted at 27-27. "We were never really out of the game. We were within one point, 39-38, with about a minute to go," said Thies.

However, Jennie Johnson scored nine of her 11 total points in the fourth quarter (three field goals and three free throws) to help Ponca hold off the Laurel charge.

Dawn Addison led all Lady Bear scorers with 12 points. Addison hit two field goals and was 8 of 11 on the free throw line.

"Late in the game we had Addison going inside, so we got Ponca to foul more," said Thies.

Sherri McCorkindale tossed in 10 points. "Sherri had a super game, playing really well. She was 5 of 7 in field goal attempts," mentioned Thies.

Laurel hit on 11 of 38 field goal at-

tempts for 30 percent. Ponca was 16 of 55 from the outside, hitting at a 29 percent clip.

Both teams experienced their problems on the free throw line. Laurel was 16 of 31 from the charity strip and Ponca was 10 of 21.

The Lady Bears were outbounded by Ponca, 38-31. Leading the way for Laurel was Becky Christensen with 14 boards, followed by McCorkindale with five.

Another factor in the game was turnovers. Laurel led in this category, 27-17.

Neither team hit on any 3-point shots for the evening.

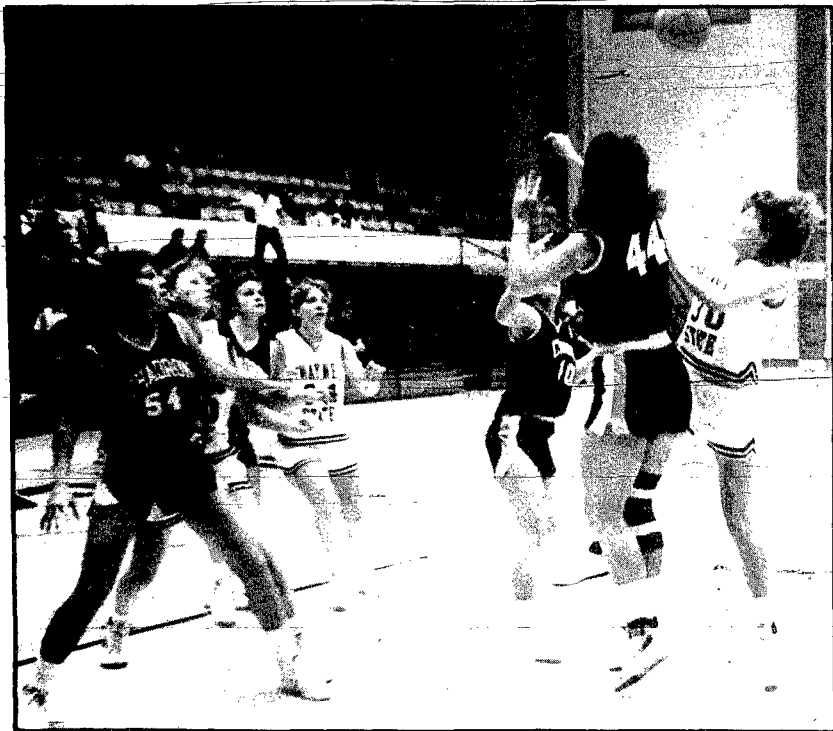
Leading scorer for Ponca was Kristi Wellenstein with 12 points. She fouled out of the game with about 2½ minutes remaining in the fourth quarter.

## Wayne State drops game at Huron

Wayne State dropped a 82-70 contest Monday night to Huron College of Huron, South Dakota.

Huron College was led by Herm Braxton, who tossed in 14 of 22 from the field and was 11 of 15 from the free throw line to tally 44 points.

The Wildcats trailed Huron College, 38-27 at half-time. With about 7½ minutes left in the game, Wayne State came back to cut Huron College's lead to one point at 62-61.

Huron College went to the free throw line 28 times and connected on 22 tosses. Wayne State canned 11 of 28 shots from the free throw line.

The Wildcats were led in scoring by Byron Haas who was 10 of 17 in field goals and 2 of 2 from the free throw line for 22 points. Next high was Scott Hurley who scored 19 points and hit on 4 of 8 three-pointers. Others in double figures were Russ Rosenquist with 16 points (one 3 pointer) and Mike McNamara with 11 points. McNamara was 3 for 3 in field goal shooting.

Rosenquist, Hurley, McNamara and Haas contributed to all but two points of Wayne State's final score.

Leading the Wildcats in rebounding was Haas with nine, followed by Hurley and McNamara each with five boards.

Huron College outbounded Wayne State, 38-31.

McNamara led the Wildcats in assists with five. He had four steals against Huron College.

Wayne State committed 17 turnovers on the evening, compared to Huron College's 21 turnovers.

Monday night's game, was Wayne State's last basketball game for 1987. The loss brings their record to 3-6. Their next contest is slated for Jan. 5 at Sioux Falls College.

The first Wayne State home game of 1988 will be Jan. 9 against Midland College. Of the next 17 games Wayne State is scheduled to play, nine are on the road and 10 will be home games.

Since Nov. 24, the Wildcats up to Jan. 9 will have played eight consecutive road games. In Wayne State's last home game on Nov. 24, the Wildcats defeated Dana College.

## Lady Wildcats get big lead fend off Chadron comeback

Wayne State's Lady Cats looked as though they would run away from Chadron State during the opening minutes of Saturday's afternoon contest at Rice Auditorium.

The Lady Cats had jumped to a 21-4 lead with 11:35 remaining in the first half. But it took the pressure-packed free throws of Wayne State's Michelle Blomberg in the final seconds to fend off a furious Chadron comeback and allow the Lady Cats to win by a 56-53 score.

Blomberg, fouled intentionally, went to the free throw line with the score at 51-50 with less than 40 seconds remaining in the game. She hit one of two shots to make it 52-50.

Chadron fouled Blomberg two more times, putting her at the line both times with the one and one. She converted all four free throws to give Wayne State the lead for good.

During the closing seconds, the Lady Eagles' Mary Perrien canned a 3-pointer to cut the deficit to one point. However, her last-second 3-point shot attempt only drew iron.

Wayne State was coasting to a sizeable lead in the first 10 minutes of Saturday's contest, led by three 3-point field goals made by Blomberg. Smith also had a couple of buckets in the opening stretch.

But in the remaining 10 minutes of the first half, Wayne State could score only seven points and Chadron State came back with 15. The half-time score stood at 28-19.

At halftime, the Lady Cats were shooting only 11 of 37 for 30 percent from the field. Chadron was shooting equally as bad, hitting on only 29 percent of their field goal attempts in the first half.

The Lady Cats extended their lead to as much as 13 points with 12 minutes remaining in the game before the Lady Eagles began their comeback.

Wayne State was outscored the second half by a 34-28 margin.

Perrien, who led Chadron in scoring with 18 points, and Cindy Westling, who scored most of her eight points in the final 10 minutes of the game, led the Chadron State charge in the final minutes.

Wayne State was led by Blomberg with 19 points. She was also the Lady Cats assist leader with seven.

Dawn Bernt-Tucker scored in double figures with 10 points, followed by Linda Schnitzler with nine points.

Pulling down the most rebounds for Wayne State were Bernt-Tucker with 10 and Kae Burke with nine. WSC outbounded the Chadron State Eagles.

For the game, Wayne State hit on 32 percent of their field goal attempts, while the Lady Eagles shot 34 percent from the outside. The Lady Cats were 12 of 16 from the line while Chadron was 7 of 12.

ON MONDAY night, the Lady Wildcats were defeated by the Briar Cliff Lady Chargers by a 92-76 score.

The loss puts Wayne State's record at 5-3 while Briar Cliff improves to 8-2.

The difference in the game could be seen in the foul statistics and Briar Cliff's 88 percent free throw shooting

percentage. Wayne State fouled 28 times to Briar Cliff's 18. The Lady Chargers scored 28 times out of 32 attempts on the free throw line. Wayne State was 10 of 16 from the line.

Lady Wildcat Michelle Blomberg led Wayne State in scoring with 17 points. She hit on four 3-point field goals.

Also in double figures were Linda Schnitzler, Dawn Bernt-Tucker and Kris Smith, each with 16 points.

The Lady Cats were outbounded by Briar Cliff by a 50-42 margin. WSC was led by Bernt-Tucker with 13. Blomberg was also the Lady Wildcat assist leader against Briar Cliff with 11. She also had three steals.

Leading the scoring for Briar Cliff was Cheryl Dreckman with 33 points. Also in double figures were Beth Sibenaller with 22 points and Sue Vlach with 18 points.

It was a two-point difference, 42-40, at half-time, with the Lady Chargers in the lead.

This weekend, the Lady Cats will be competing in the Peru State Invitational basketball tournament.

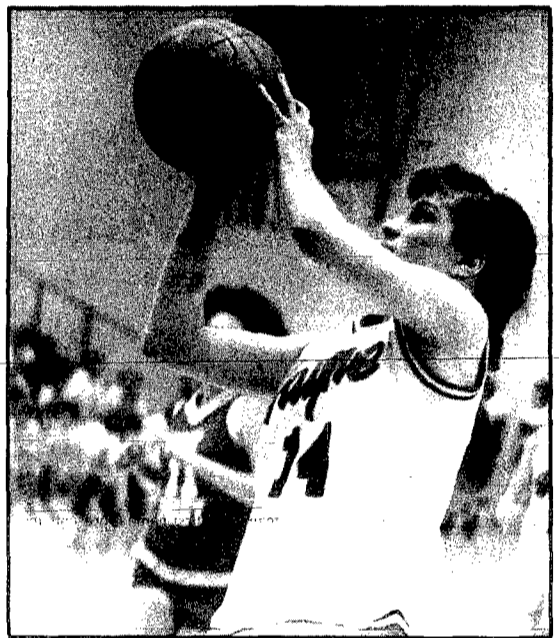
