#### Resolution

The Wayne County Board of Commissioners accepted writ-ten objections to the establishment of a low-level radioactive waste dump facility in Wayne

They unanimously passed a resolution to show that they objected to any sife location in Wayne County for the waste dump facility, according to Commissioner Bob Nissen of Wayne.

A five-state commission on

five state commission on Tuesday picked Nebraska to host a regional disposal facility for low-level radioactive waste for low-level radioactive waste generated in five states. Nebraska commission representative Dennis Grams voted the only no vote to the proposal. The four other states in the Central Inferstate Low-Level Radioactive Waste Compact Comminission voted in favor of having Nebraska hosting the waste site.

Waste would come from Louislana, Oklahoma, Kansas and Arkansas as well as Nebraska.



Wanted: Individual or individuals willing to give of themselves. To share smiles, laughter, and lots and lots of hugs and kisses. Nothing ask-ed for in return. No experience, job training, degree

or resume required. Men, women and children of all ages welcome

"WE DON'T ask much of our volunteers," says Lynette Car-michael, founder of the local PAL

(People Are Loved) organization.
"We simply need volunteers who are willing to give a little bit of time and a lot of love. 'We aren't out to change anyone's

behavior and we have no goals to

PAL WAS ORGANIZED by Lynette, along with friends Kay Cat-tle. Emily Haase and Jeanette Geiger, in June of this year as a way of-bringing-together residents of the community, of all ages, with han-dicapped individuals of all ages.

Meetings are generally held once a month, from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. in the fellowship hall of the First United Methodist Church in Wayne.

"It's simply a structured social evening," describes Lynette.

"We play bingo and other games. There's also a music corner, arts and crafts, books and magazines, a film

and refreshments.
"No one is obligated," stresses
Lynette. "Volunteers and PAL participants can simply come and sit if

they wish.
"Just be a PAL."

LYNETTE, THE mother of a 13-year-old daughter with Down's Syndrome, said she and her husband, along with daughter Maria, first became involved in an organization similar to PAL while living in Kansas City, where the program was con-ducted through a church

"We moved back to Wayne in October of 1986," says Lynette, "and there was nothing."

That's when Lynette contacted friends Emily Haase, Kay Cattle and Jeanette Geiger. "We talked about PAL for a long

time," smiles Lynette, "and then we did it."

EMILY, LIKE Lynette, is the method of a handicapped child. Twelve-year-old Nick was born with spina bifada and attends District 57

spina briadd aring an animal shared south of Wayne.

Kay and Jeanette are both employed by Educational Service Unit 1, which is headquartered in Wakefield and provides services, including special education, to schools

in a six-county area.
Kay is pre-kindergarten services
coordinator and Jeanette works as an
aide with the Wayne children's program, a program for multi-handicapped children located at the Region IV residential building.

ALL FOUR WOMEN are friends and all four wanted to combine their ideas and experiences into a pro-gram where residents of the com-munity, including residents with disabilities, could come together in a social setting.

The first PAL meeting took place in Wayne on June 5 of this year. "Of course we wondered if anybody would show up and how it would go over," says Lynette.

"Since that first meeting I think we've found there is a real need for this type of program in the Wayne

"It has really blossomed," says
Kay, adding that the program has
grown from approximately 20 at the
first meeting in June to over 60 at the
group's meeting in November.

We're really excited about it," and the state of volunteers who have adds Lynette.

VOLUNTEERS AT PAL meetings have included college students, girls from Wayne Middle School, a 4-H club, a church interest group, the art education class at Wayne State Col-lege and the Region IV:children's staff, along with other residents of

the community.
"We need and want volunteers of all ages," points out Lynette, adding that local clubs and organizations may wish to become involved by volunteering their time just one

month a year,
"They can' just come and sit and visit," says Lynette. "Or maybe they would like to throw a party or furnish snacks."

"IT JUST wouldn't work without

All four organizers say they are especially proud of their husbands — Larry Haase, Don Cattle, Roger Gelger and Dick Carmichael.

"They come and they participate," says Lynette. "You name it and they

Lynette encourages volunteer parents to bring their entire families,

including younger children.
"Many handicapped individuals points out Jeanette. "So It's really great when men and young children show up at our PAL meetings."

ALTHOUGH PAL is designed as a social night out for handicapped in-dividuals, Lynette says it is just as rewarding to the volunteers

"It probably takes about three meetings before the volunteer really feels comfortable;" says Jeanette. "But then they're hooked," she

"The volunteers find it as a place to go and meet someone with a disabili-ty in a non-threatening situation," points out Kay, adding that trained personnel are always present at the meetings.

# Stand up and be counted?

Exactly what is the population of Wayne, Nebraska? 5,240? 5,040?

Wayne, Nebraska? 5,240? 5,040? More or less? That is what business men, city administration officials and others are asking following a recent release of estimated 1986 population figures for

cities throughout Nebraska.
Estimates from the United States
Census Bureau Community
Awareness Products Program of Lakewood, Colorado and the Nebraska Natural Resources Com mission show that Wayne's popula-tion of 5,240 in the 1980 census has dropped nearly 4 percent to 5,040.

the college students are among those listed in the 1980 census that was taken around April of that year.

A representative of the census bureau, when contacted by The Wayne Herald, said Tuesday that any student which resided in the area for six months during the year would be included in the 1980 census fally.
"For our purposes, the student lives there and contributes to the economy community," said the representative

However, City Administrator Phil Kloster believes that the college enrollment adds to the 1980 census population figure of 5,240 for the city

most part, is not included in that total, he said.

He claims that the 1980 census was taken after the college students completed the spring semester.

WSC DEAN of Student Services, Max Lundstrom, said Tuesday he feels certain that students who resid ed in the campus dormitories were included in the 1980 total census. The number residing in the college dormitories at the beginning of the fall semester usually averages over 1,000 students, he mentioned

Kloster believes that the census
done in 1980 was compiled after the school year. And he emphatically disagrees with the 1986 estimate that

disagrees with the 1986 estimate that says Wayne's population has dipped from 5,240 to 5,040.
"No way are numbers down in Wayne, Nebraska." said Kloster in an interview on Tuesday.
One way to estimate Wayne's population, he said, is to review how many residential meters are hooked up to homes within the city.
He said the city has on record that

He said the city has on record that there are 1,767 residential water meters hooked up to homes within the city limit. Take that amount and multiply It by three (members per household) and that would come out to over 5,300 people.

"And it might be interesting to note that we had only 1,675 residential water meters hooked up in 1980," mentioned Kloster. Building activity in Wayne would

not indicate that there was a decrease in population. "Look at how much annexation there was in the last flive years and the multiple hous-ing constructed," said Kloster.

HE CITED THE recent develop-HE CITED THE recent develop-ment of the Sunnyview, Marywood, Terra Ridge, Coan and Carhart sub-divisions as reasons for questioning the estimated population decline figured for Wayne. "We also have a tremendous amount of homes in Wayne that are rented or have boarders in the houses," he added. Families associated with new in-dustry in Wayne have also settled in-

to the community.

A decline in population, as mentioned in the estimate, would have a negative impact on the well-being of a community and he was concerned about where the estimate numbers for 1986 were coming from.
"Had the revenue sharing been in

# effect, there would have been no doubt that we would have had to take an internal census. That [population figure) would have influenced the revenue sharing money that we got from the federal government," said

Federal revenue sharing has been eliminated, and Kloster said it would be of no benefit now to take a census of the city. "There's no reason now to do it at this point. It could just as well walt until the 1990 census," he said. THE COMPARISON of the 1980

census and the estimated census figures for 1986 show that Winside, rigures for 1986 show that Winside, Concord and Dixon gained in popula-tion while Wayne, Hoskins, Allen, Wakefield and Laurel all lost a percentage of population. The figures of population increases

or decreased, as was given to The Wayne Herald Tuesday from the Nebraska Natural Resources Com-mission, are as follows: •Wayne — 1980, 5,240; 1986 estimate,

•Winside - 1980, 439; 1986 estimate, •Hoskins -- 1980, 306; 1986 estimate,

Allen — 1980, 390; 1986 estimate, 320. •Wakefield -1980, 1,125; 1986 estimate, 1,000. •Concord — 1980, 145; 1986 estimate,

160. •Dixon — 1980, 127; 1986 estimate;

•Laurel - 1980, 1.031: 1986 estimate.

According to the estimates, Papillian grew the largest of all cities in Nebraska since the 1980 census, growing from 6.399 to over 11,000 peo-ple. The census bureau derives its estimates from reported births, deaths and migration figures that are supplied from the Internal Reveue Service files.

Other cities of 5,000 or more showing increases were Omaha, Lincoln, Grand Island, Bellevue, Kearney, Norfolk, Columbus, Scottsbluff, Lavista, Alliance, South Sloux City, McCook, York, Plattsmouth, Blair, Sidney, Raiston and Holridge.

Declines were noted in Fremont, North Platte, Beatrice, Nebraska City, Lexington, Chadron, Seward, Ogallala and Wayne.



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## Diabetes Care

Diabetes is a metabolic condition which results in elevated levels of glucose, or sugar, in the bloodstream. There are four areas of care about which diabetics should be concerned:

Diet: Without question diet is the most important fac-tor in the control of diabetes. The correct diabetic diet contains the correct proportions of fat, protein, and carbohydrate, as well as the correct amount of

Medications: Oral medicines are sometimes given to diabetics to cause the insulin in the body to work more effectively. Insulin-hormone is often necessary for those who are producing little, if any, insulin inside the body.

Glucose Measurement: The measurement of blood glucose is an effective way of determining how effective medications are in controlling blood sugar. It also provides valuable information about diet. Portable esting devices allow for glucose measurements in the home, at work, and when traveling.

Foot Care: Since diabetics often have circulation problems, foot sores are not uncommon. Foot care by an appropriate health professional will help prevent infections and the possible loss of a foot or leg.
