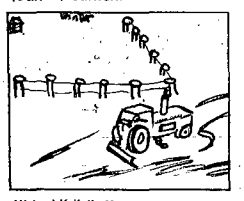

## Rezoning of property goes to third reading

A request to suspend the third reading of an ordinance which would rezone property owned by John Mohr and Fern Thorman east of Wayne failed to gain city council approval Tuesday night.

At the last city council meeting, council members voted to establish the title of Ordinance No. 87-31 to rezone the parcel of property from Light Industrial to Highway Business. The owners of the property had received an offer to sell a portion of the real estate to John Parker of Norfolk, who would be the purchaser and developer of a motel on the property to be rezoned. A Super 8 franchise would go on the property.

A motion to waive the three readings of the ordinance and pass it was turned down by the city council during the Dec. 8 regular meeting. The second reading of the ordinance took place at the Dec. 29 city council meeting.

Wayne Attorney Duane Schroeder, representing Mohr and Thorman, asked that the third reading of the ordinance, which would be scheduled for the Jan. 12 meeting of the city council, be suspended.

at the council meeting to vote on whether or not to suspend the third reading. Favoring the suspension were Darrel Heier, Sheryl Lindau, Stan Hansen, Freeman Decker and Darrel Fuetberth. Councilman Randy Pedersen abstained from the vote. Six council votes were needed to suspend the third reading.

The city council will review, for an upcoming city council meeting, a revised ordinance that would approve a Wayne Cablevision franchise extension for another 10 years. The city ordinance which granted the original franchise expires in 1990.

Dean Wandrey of Northeast Nebraska Cablevision LTD of Denver, Colorado, affiliated with the Wayne Cablevision franchise, said at the Dec. 8 council the time extension is needed to meet bank obligations and to satisfy inquiries of the sale of cablevision property in Wayne.

At the last meeting, the city council asked City Attorney Kern Swarts to redraft the franchise ordinance and present it at the Dec. 29 council meeting.

Tuesday night, Wandrey said the firm has reached an agreement with another firm for the sale of Wayne Cablevision. He introduced Todd Acker of Jones Intercable, a firm headquartered in Englewood, Colorado, which is the potential buyer of Wayne Cablevision. Acker serves the company as fund engineering manager.

Acker said Wayne Cablevision is a very well run operation and he would not see any staff changes at this time.

"We plan no staff or operation changes other than changing the name on the building," said Acker.

"I think most of the people are probably concerned about the service and the rates," said Councilman Heier.

"I can't give you any numbers. The rates will continue to go up in Jones Intercable and other cable companies as operational costs and program costs increase," Acker mentioned.

"We are dedicated to providing the best quality of variety programming and service as possible. At this point, I don't see anything being dropped," he added.

The city council will place the resolution approving the Wayne Cablevision tentative approval of franchise and the ordinance for the franchise extension on the agenda for the Jan. 12 regular meeting.

SCHROEDER said that the city council had since Dec. 8 to consider the rezoning ordinance. He said his clients have already received conditional approval of their subdivision, with the conditions of paying the park fee of \$2,400 and the signing of the subdivision agreement requiring the subdivision owners to put in the sewer and the water.

"If we sign a subdivision agreement prior to the rezoning change being granted, then we could end up having a piece of property that we can't sell because of the power of purchase agreement conditioned upon, number one, obtaining approval of a subdivision and two, given the property zoning," said Schroeder.

Six council members were present

IN OTHER ACTION, the city council:

- Received a resolution and a request for a signature of the resolution from John Carollo of Wayne, representing Nebraska for Clean Environment headquartered in Winside.
- The resolution calls for a proposal to keep the proposed low level radioactive waste facility out of Nebraska — or at least out of Wayne County and the jurisdiction of the Wayne city limits.
- The city council took no action on the request, but will study the resolution.
- Approved a permit request for extension over street right-of-way. The new canopy placed on the First National Bank building in Wayne on Main Street is not over the actual street, but currently is on the street right-of-way.

## Found shot to death Baumann labeled as Wayne State friend

Otto Baumann, former northeast Nebraska resident and a longtime booster of the University of Nebraska in athletics and education, was also known for his contributions to the Wayne State College Foundation.

Baumann, age 80, and a business associate were found shot to death at his business, O & G Water Conditioning, in San Gabriel, California. Another business associate was wounded.

Wayne State College Foundation Executive Director Shane Giese said Tuesday that Otto was a longtime friend of Wayne State College. His wife, Gladys, attended school at Wayne State.

Giese said Otto began working with the Wayne State Foundation in the early 70's, establishing scholarships for students of Beemer and West Point to attend Wayne State College.

But his ties with the college were there even before the establishment of the scholarships.

"He was very interested in supporting higher education. Both Otto and Gladys were super people," said Giese.

His contributions have led to the distribution of four \$700 WSC scholarships each year to graduating seniors from Beemer and West Point.

Otto and Gladys were both life members of the Wayne State College President's Society.

Giese said Otto was very interested in athletics, both the Cornhuskers and Wayne State teams received his support. "His contributions here were more for academics, but there were some contributions for athletics," he mentioned.

"Otto refereed at some of the high school and Wayne State games. He was fond of Wayne State College and he had good feelings about it," said Giese.

## Wayne businessman dies

Long time Wayne resident and businessman, Arnold "Arnie" Reeg, died Thursday, Dec. 24. He was 68 years old.

Services took place Saturday at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Wayne.

Arnie, a 1938 graduate from Wayne High School who also served in the United States Air Force from May, 1941 to August, 1945, owned and operated a grocery store (Arnie's Grocery Store) in Wayne until 1978.

Afterwards, Arnie and his son Bill Reeg and son-in-law Dean Bruggeman purchased Arnie's Ford-Mercury in Wayne. Arnie also owned Arnie's Golf Cart sales.

He was a member of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, the Wayne Masonic Lodge 120 and he was an active community leader.

## Adams appeals suspension

Wayne's city council has authorized the hiring of an attorney to represent City Administrator Phil Kloster and the City of Wayne at a police officer suspension case that will be heard before the Wayne Civil Service Commission sometime in January.

The authorization came following an executive session involving personnel matters during Tuesday night's regular city council meeting.

Wayne City Police Officer Keith Adams has appealed to the three-member civil service commission a

recent three-day suspension without pay which has already been carried out, according to a city official.

The hearing date has not been set, but is expected to take place in January.

"A written complaint against Officer Adams was registered by a Wayne citizen (Sandra Atkins) concerning Adams' law enforcement practices, which eventually led to the three day suspension.

The Wayne Civil Service Commission is chaired by Joe Nuss. Other members on the commission are Robert Merchant and Clete Sharer.

## Sledding area discussed by Wayne City Council

Just where can children (or adults) do some sledding around the city of Wayne?

In recent years, one location used for sledding was right on Sherman Street between 3rd Street and 2nd Street.

But now, with city officials guarding against a potential liability situation, that area may be off limits to sledding.

Councilman Stefan Hansen brought up the topic during Tuesday night's regular meeting of the Wayne City Council.

Since the city is assuming the liability of the sledding on the city street, it was not worth the chance to allow the sledding, mentioned Wayne City Administrator Phil Kloster.

Some of the other locations mentioned for sledding were near the Wayne Country Club and near Wayne-Carroll School.

Councilman Darrel Heier said the city council needs to look for something as a place for sledding. "The city is responsible to make an area available if possible," he mentioned.

He asked if a solution could be worked out to continue allowing the sledding on Sherman Street through the use of barricades or other means.

The Wayne City Council will study the issue and report on their findings at the next council meeting, scheduled for Jan. 12 of next year.

Postal service copes with cuts

Retail business (window service and other areas other than deliveries) of the Wayne post office won't close on Saturdays, at least for now, according to Wayne Postmaster Tom Jones.

Last week Congress passed legislation which will require the United States Postal Service to assume the retirement and health benefit costs normally picked up by the federal government. The legislation was passed as a means for deficit reduction, and it will require the postal service to come up with \$1.2 billion in meeting the cost.

Wayne is currently in the Omaha Division of the United States Postal Service. Dave Failor, spokesman for the office of communication in the Omaha Division of the U.S. Postal Service, said about 100 post offices (about 50 percent of the division's post offices in Nebraska) throughout the division were closed or had undergone staff reductions last

Saturday. The same is planned for Saturday, Jan. 2 in an effort to evaluate how much savings the post office will realize.

"There still will be delivery services," said Failor.

FAILOR SAID the post office must assume the retirement and health benefit costs without raising postage rates, without using capital reserves and without borrowing capital. "We have to cut back on construction and slash operation expenses," mentioned Failor.

In May of 1987, long before the recent passage of deficit reduction legislation, the postal service requested rate increases that averaged 16 percent. That request, which would raise the price of a postage stamp for first class letters from 22 cents to 25 cents, will be reviewed in the spring. "The average household would pay \$10 a year more in postage," said Failor. "These rates may or may not be approved."

THE POSTAL SERVICE cannot

raise the price from 25 cents to 27 cents or more in light of the recent legislation, he mentioned.

Wayne Post Office hours on New Year's Eve (Dec. 31) will be as follows — the window will close at 2:30 p.m.; lobby will close at 4 p.m.; and 2 p.m. is the deadline for collection boxes.

Wayne Postmaster Jones was given the option on whether or not to reduce staff or close the retail unit of the Wayne post office on Saturday. "We didn't elect to close our retail unit of our offices," said Jones.

"There is no way that we can cut staff, with the amount of mail that come in to distribute. At the present, we're not leaving any delayed mail. It's all current," said Jones.

Laying off people could affect the current mailings and the service which the local post office provides. "Some capital improvements planned for the Wayne post office, such as roof repair or air conditioning, will probably go by the wayside," Jones said.

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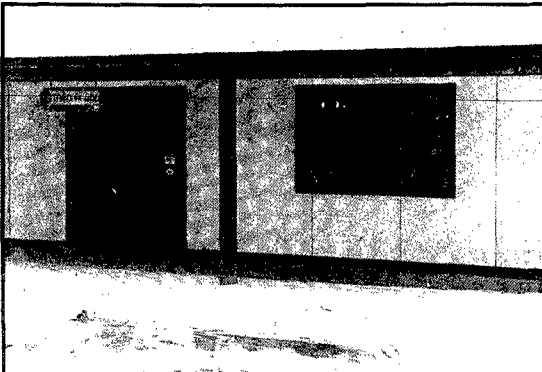

On Saturdays, customers can purchase one menu item at regular price and get a second menu item of equal value for one-half price. Sunday's special includes an all-you-can-eat Mexican plate for \$3.50.

And for those watching their weight, Taco Del Sol offers a diet plate seven days a week for \$1.49. The diet plate includes a taco with extra tomato instead of sauce, a lettuce salad with tomato, and half an apple crisp without cheese or sugar.

Connie said Taco Del Sol is constantly striving to provide quality service to its customers and is the only Mexican restaurant in the state to offer a delivery service. "Tacos to Go-Go" began last August, with delivery to businesses only from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. each Monday through Friday, and to the general public from 5 to 10 p.m. seven days a week. Customers can also take advantage of a carry-out service.

Taco Del Sol also is the only Mexican food restaurant in the area which opens at 8 a.m. every day of the week to serve coffee and rolls. There also is hot chocolate and candy. "We go through a ton of candy," smiles Connie.

The newest service provided by Taco Del Sol, beginning this week, is one-drop delivery to Wakefield each Tuesday. Mexican food lovers in the Wakefield area can call in their orders of tacos, taco salads and crispos to Benne's Package Liquor each Tuesday before 5 p.m. The orders will be delivered to Benne's at 6 p.m. Connie said she hopes to expand the one-drop delivery service to other communities surrounding Wayne.

Beginning after the first of the year, Taco Del Sol also will be setting up a taco table for customers at The 4th Jug in Wayne each Wednesday from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. in conjunction with the pool leagues. Connie said tacos will be made to order.

Taco Del Sol is open seven days a week, from 8 a.m. to 11 p.m., with a staff of one full-time and 12 part-time employees.

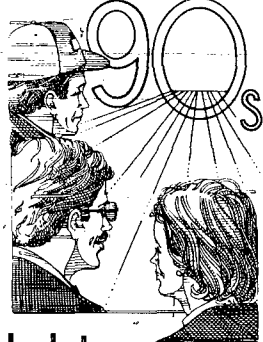

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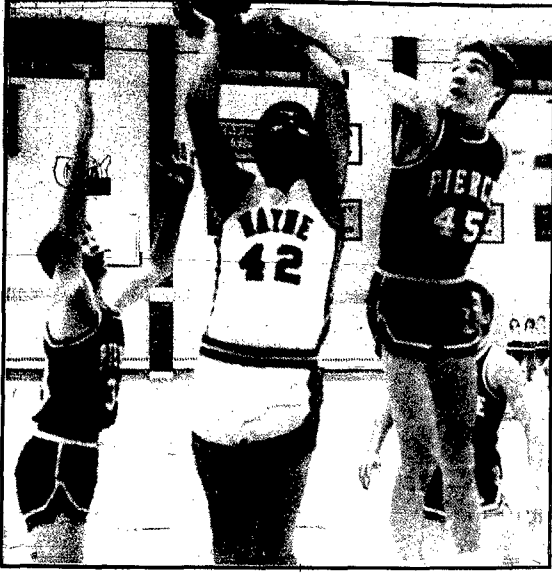
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JED REEG grabs an offensive rebound, and gets fouled on the follow up shot.

Top rebounders for the Blue Devils were Wood, Engelson and Doug Larsen, each with seven; and Hammer with six.

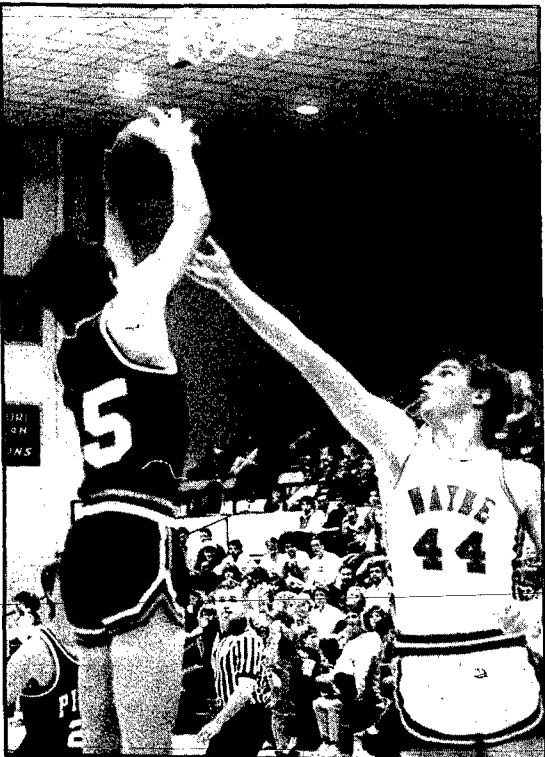
The Blue Devils outrebounded Pierce, 35-28. Wayne committed 14 turnovers compared to Pierce's 21 turnovers.

"We've got good balance on our team. It's just that we're trying to find a combination that plays well together," mentioned Eaton.

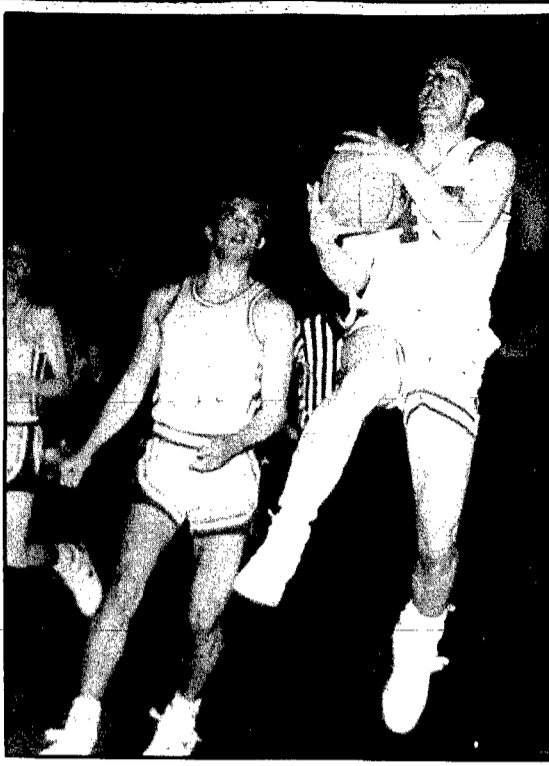
Wakefield was outrebounded 39-23 by Osmond. Leading the Trojans in the rebounding department were Nelson with six and McQuistan and Clark, each with six.

Winside was 8 of 16 from the 3-point stripe.

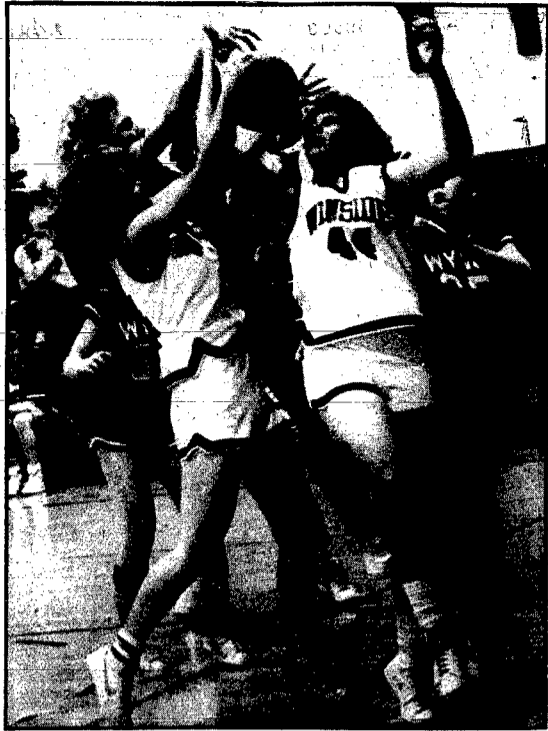
The Wildcats trailed Wynot, 37-36 at halftime after leading 21-17 at the end of the first quarter. Both teams scored 17 points in the third quarter.

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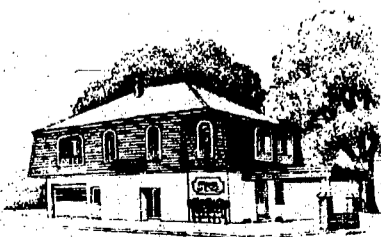

# Rural community home financing help proposed

Actions in Congress recently provide a unique break-through for families who want to live in rural communities, according to Representative Doug Bereuter. Provisions in the continuing resolution passed and in the Farm Credit bill passed should make it much easier for rural residents to obtain home mortgages.

An amendment introduced by Bereuter that will help residents of small, rural communities obtain mortgage money and mortgage insurance was included in the continuing resolution passed. Bereuter's amendment earmarks up to 10 percent of existing authorized funding in a Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) rural housing program for unsubsidized guaranteed home loans for moderate-income families. People who live in any community too small to be covered by Federal Housing and Urban Development programs and who have income within 80 percent to 100 percent of the median income for the area would be eligible for the FmHA guaranteed loan program if they could not obtain a home mortgage loan elsewhere.

"This provision, in combination with the secondary market or Farmer Mac provision included in the Farm Credit bill creates a significant new opportunity for the private sector to provide home loans to families who want to live in rural communities," Bereuter said. "It is virtually impossible for moderate and low-moderate income people living in our rural communities to obtain home mortgages," he said. "I discovered that when I returned to Africa after serving in the Army and wanted to purchase a home. Without a VA loan, there would have been no resources available to me and my family. Since then, I have talked to many Nebraskans who face this problem."

Representative Doug Bereuter has called for an accelerated highway construction program in Nebraska and has encouraged a "fiscally prudent but aggressive" use of highway revenue funds.

Among his suggested early priority road corridor projects are "a development-potential corridor I called to the attention of the Department of Roads 20 years ago — Norfolk to Wayne to South Sioux City."

He said on Monday that "It is absolutely necessary to restore Nebraska's competitive major highway network if we anticipate a bright future for the state."

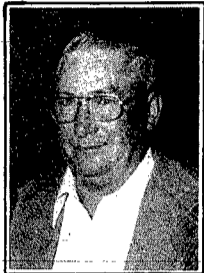

Are your children home alone, either once in a while or every day? If so, be assured that you aren't the only parent who must leave children unattended. All over America, tens of thousands of children look after themselves regularly, such as during the time after school and before parents get home from work.

Once in a while you hear of such children coming to harm, but most of them do just fine. You can increase the chances that your children will be okay by teaching them a few simple rules and making sure they follow them. For example:

- Tell children they must come straight home after school—or to a specific place you've decided in advance.
- Have children call you at work or call another responsible adult when they get home from school—just to check in.
- Direct them never to open the door to anyone they don't know while they're home alone. You might even want to tell them never to answer the door when you aren't there.
- If the telephone rings, they should never tell the caller they are home alone. Have them say, "My mother (or dad) can't come to the phone right now," and take a message.
- If you allow after-school snacks, set aside food that is already prepared or that requires only simple preparation (no cooking) and declare all other foods off limits.
- Set strict safety rules, such as don't turn on the stove, don't play with matches, and so forth. Look carefully around the house to spot safety hazards.
- Lock away any prescription drugs and liquor. Children love to experiment—don't tempt them.
- Set rules about who, if anybody, can visit the house while you aren't there.
- An after-school routine can help children feel less at loose ends. Teach children to straighten up their rooms and do their homework right after school. Then they can be free to play after you get home.
- Be sure to have emergency telephone numbers posted next to the telephone. These should include your work telephone, police and fire departments, doctor, and poison control unit. Also post the numbers of responsible adults children can call, such as a relative or close friend. Try to line up at least two or three such persons, so someone will always be there if your child needs help.
- When it comes to calling for help, teach your children that they're "better safe than sorry." If they have any doubt about whether to call for help—they should call.
- Studies show that a cat or dog can help children feel less lonely. If fear is the main problem, a big dog is best. If children aren't afraid, but are lonely, a small cuddly dog or cat may be better. But be sure children are responsible enough to care for a pet and treat it well.
- Notes or occasional treats left for children to find after school will remind them that you love them and are thinking about them even when you're not there.
- Children who stay home on their own often become mature and responsible for their ages. To an extent, this is desirable. But remember that children need to be children—no matter how grown-up they seem, they need your attention and support. They also need time to play, free of worry and care. Be sure they get it.

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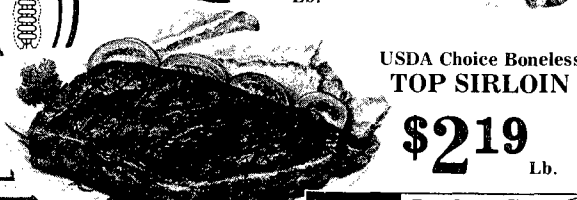
