This is the third year of existence for the 33-voice choir, which will be performing songs in English, Latin, German and Spanish, according to choir director Rob Stuber.

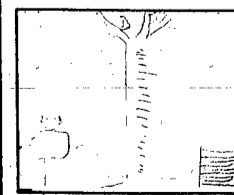
Screening

Karnes concentrating on the positive aspects

U.S. Senator David Karnes said Tuesday his tracking polls show him consistently leading Republican challenger Hal Daub by four or five percentage points in the race for his first full term in the United States Senate.

Karnes, during a brief stop at The Wayne Herald, said the next few weeks before the primary will find him concentrating on positive aspects — what he has accomplished in the past and what he hopes to accomplish in the future.

Karnes added that he has been frustrated by remarks his Republican opponent has made "distorting" his position on a variety of issues, including taxes.

"I have not initiated any personal attacks," said Karnes, "but I was compelled to respond when my opponent came out and said I felt we should increase taxes.

"What I in fact said, was that Nebraskans are very frustrated about the deficit not going down and many have told me they would pay more taxes if they knew the money would go dollar for dollar to decrease the deficit."

KARNES, A Nebraskan with an agricultural background, said many Nebraska farmers are confused about provisions in the farm bill

which require landowners to arrive at a conservation management plan by 1990.

Recently, Karnes invited Wilson Scalling, director of the Soil Conservation Service, to visit Nebraska and take a firsthand look at the various soils and conservation practices currently being utilized.

"A lot of farmers are concerned that if they don't have a plan approved they won't qualify for the farm program."

Karnes pointed out that there is enough flexibility in the existing law to allow many conservation practices now being used to continue and still meet the federal requirements.

"WASHINGTON HASN'T forgotten about us," pointed out Karnes, "and Washington has a commitment to conservation — as do the farmers."

Karnes, a member of the Senate's agricultural committee, added that maximum flexibility is the key. "We want the plan to work, but we also need to be flexible when it comes to interpretation."

Karnes said if a farmer feels his conservation management plan is being unfairly scrutinized he should contact his office as well as the State Conservation Office.

Altercation will result in WSC investigation

Wayne State College Associate Dean of Students, Curt Frye, reported Friday that the Wayne State student services office is investigating the report of an altercation last weekend in Wayne that apparently involved seven Wayne State College students.

Frye said a confrontation erupted late Saturday night in an off-campus residence in Wayne and later carried over into a Wayne State College dormitory. He said his office is investigating

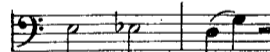
the report and it will make recommendations to the student standards committee later this week. It is the committee's responsibility to examine evidence that was gathered by the dean's office, then determine the level of each individual's involvement.

According to Frye, the student standards committee has the right to make appropriate sanctions and the recommendations go to Frye's office for implementation.

In district music contest

Area schools gain Superiors

With the first half of the high school District III Music Contest at Wayne State College completed, one thing is for certain — area band instructors have to be pretty proud of their school's performances.

Five of the full bands in The Wayne Herald coverage area — Winside, Allen, Laurel, Wakefield and Wayne — achieved superior ratings following performances Friday morning and afternoon.

Other performances slated for Friday included bands, vocal solos and ensembles, jazz bands, piano and string solos.

Performances slated Saturday included choir, instrumental solos and ensembles, swing choirs, glee clubs and madrigals.

In other results of Friday, the Winside and Wayne high school jazz bands each achieved superior

ratings. Results on the other area schools competing in jazz band were not available at press time.

Other schools in attendance at the district contest include Bancroft, Beemer, Homer, Newcastle, Pender, Ponca, Randolph, South Sioux City, Walthill, West Point, Winnebago, Wisner-Pilger and West Point Central Catholic.

If the sanctions are handed down, the students involved in the altercation can appeal to the Wayne State College president.

"The administration will review all the incident reports," said Dr. Joseph Fleck, interim president of Wayne State College. "All recommendations from the dean of student services and the student standards committee will also be analyzed."

"Further discussion with members

of the administrative council, faculty senate and student senate will follow. They will determine whether or not specific strategies need to be implemented to eliminate any problem that might exist," said Fleck.

"While we don't believe that racial differences were the underlying cause of that specific incident, I think we need to assess how adequately the campus serves the needs of all students," he said.

"We also know the weekend inci-

dent, which involved an extremely small percentage of the Wayne State student body, did involve alcohol. And alcohol, not racial differences, could have been the underlying cause of the problem.

"Until members of society adopt a more responsible behavior regarding the use and control of alcoholic beverages and other harmful substances, the problems that rise from substance abuse will continue to confront our colleges and communities," Fleck said.

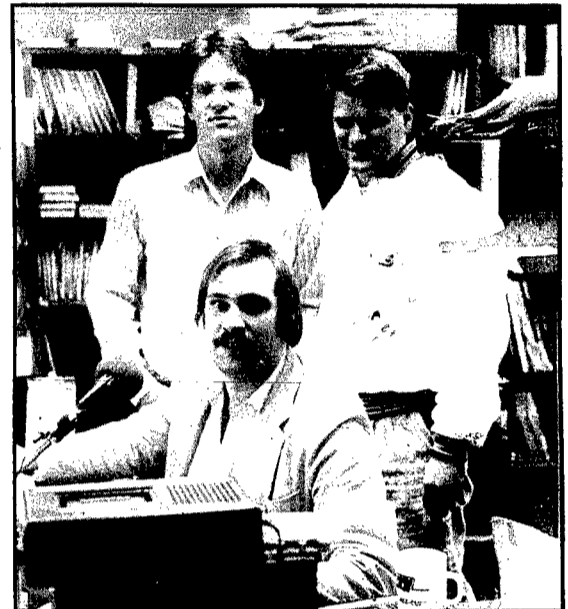
On June 1, 1978 the stations were purchased by KTCH Inc., one of the members of the corporation being Dean Craun who managed the station until Aug. 1, 1986.

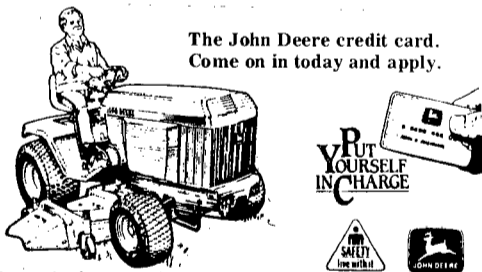

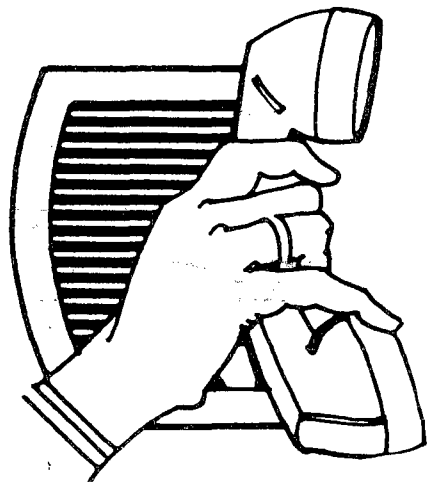

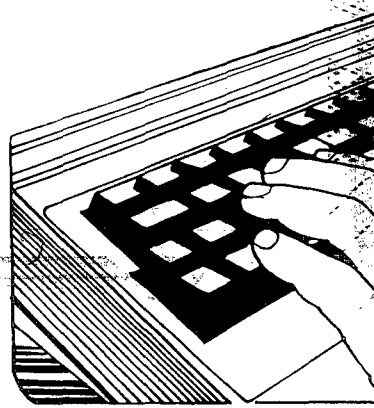

Winside woman donates oxygen tank

The Winside Rescue Squad recently received a portable oxygen tank purchased with a donation from Mrs. Norma Brockmoller in memory of her late husband Kenneth Brockmoller.

The rescue squad has purchased an engraved plaque to place on the case designating Mrs. Brockmoller's contribution.

The rescue squad recently purchased for the unit a folding scoop stretcher with telescopes to accommodate the tallest patient. It is designed so attendants can uncouple either end of the stretcher and gently scoop up the patient using a scissor type closing motion ideal for difficult body pickups.

A high-tech custom backboard, CPR board, adult and child resuscitation kits for CPR training, cervical collars and other miscellaneous supplies also have been purchased at an approximate cost of \$1,400.

THE WINSIDE Volunteer Rescue Squad purchased a newer unit in September 1987. The old unit, however, continues to be used as a backup.

A spokesman for the squad said because the old unit is being used as a backup, additional equipment is needed for the new one.

"The main item we would like to purchase yet is air bags used in extracting traffic accident victims from vehicles," said VerNeal Marotz, Winside squad captain. Marotz said the approximate cost for the item is \$1,200.

THE SQUAD ALSO mailed surveys recently to area residents asking their opinion on purchasing a defibrillator for the unit.

"We've only received about 35 responses to date," said Marotz, "however 90 percent of those responding are in favor of purchasing the item."

Marotz added that the estimated cost for purchasing the defibrillator and training personnel is \$9,000.

"We're still discussing the issue and would like more input from the community."
