## Traffic count

The Wayne County Sheriff's Department has released information from the Nebraska Department of Roads concerning 1987 motor vehicle accidents throughout Nebraska and specifically, Wayne County.

Sheriff LeRoy Janssen reports that in 1987, there were a total of 38,070 motor vehicle traffic accidents statewide. That total is up 3 percent from 1986.

In 1987, there were 297 fatalities in Nebraska, which is about a 3 percent increase from the previous year when 259 fatalities were reported.

The statistics reveal that although the fatalities and accidents have increased, the fatal accident rate decreased by 9.5 percent per 100 million miles traveled by motor vehicles in Nebraska. This simply stated means that the more exposure (miles traveled) there is, the more likely accidents will occur.

Janssen noted that of the Nebraska fatality statistics that are completed, it reveals that about 6 times as many people died not wearing seat belts as opposed to those who were wearing seat belts. Approximately two times as many people were injured not wearing belts as opposed to those who were.

In about one of every 14 accidents across the state, alcohol was involved and related to at least 97 fatalities and 1,565 persons being injured.

There were a total of 10,770 rural road traffic accidents from which 184 fatalities occurred. These figures indicated that only about 28 percent of the accidents occur on rural roads, but 187 of 297 (over 61 percent) of the fatalities did occur on the same rural Nebraska roads.

Farm tractor or farm equipment accidents took an approximate 20 percent decrease over last year. State-wide, however, there still were five fatalities and 30 injuries resulting from these accidents.

Sunday morning, from midnight to 3 a.m. seems to be the most accident prone time of day on rural roads. Fifty percent more fatal accidents happened at this time than at any of the other time slots throughout the week.

Janssen said that in 1987, there were 117 total accidents in Wayne County (outside the city limits of Wayne). Approximately 24 more accidents occurred on rural roads as compared to the highway system. Seventy percent of the persons injured were involved in accidents on rural roads.

In 75 percent of the accidents where alcohol was involved, someone was injured. Janssen said that, of the Wayne County statistics, it is shown that twice as many people were injured not wearing their safety belts as compared to those who were wearing belts.

Janssen said the three major categories of contributing circumstances leading to accidents in Wayne County included: speed too fast for conditions, failure to yield and improper driving. Eighty-two percent of the driver's involved in accidents in Wayne County were within 25 miles of home.

Janssen said that the above information has been provided to make drivers more aware of areas they need to pay particular attention to while traveling Wayne County and across Nebraska.

With the summer travel season approaching, we should all pay particular attention to our driving habits in order to share the roads in the safest manner possible.

As Janssen mentions: Buckle up and drive carefully in 1988, 1988.

## Asbestos deadline extension sought

Representative Doug Bereuter has introduced a bill that will extend for six months the deadline for school districts to provide management plans for eliminating asbestos hazards. The bill leaves in place the July 1989 deadline by which schools must begin to encapsulate or remove asbestos.

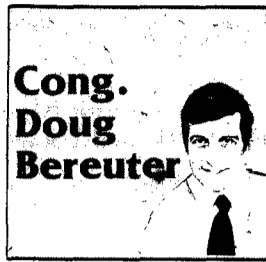
Bereuter's bill also would provide funds to states to hire additional qualified personnel to adequately review management plans and provide encouragement for training of school personnel to become accredited inspectors.

In addition, the bill would provide for reimbursement of certain categories of schools for the costs of contracts entered into before May 15, 1988, for inspection and management plan development services. This pro-

vision addresses inequities that have been created because some schools have already entered into contracts to meet the requirements, while some have been idle in the hopes that Congress will rescue them by modifying the requirements and others have not had the resources to proceed.

"While school and state officials have expressed concern that they cannot meet the October deadline, many parents and national organizations share my concern about extending the July 1989 deadline for beginning the removal or encapsulation of asbestos," Bereuter said. "No one wants children and staff in schools containing this hazardous material exposed to it one day longer than is absolutely necessary."

"While there are several bills pen-



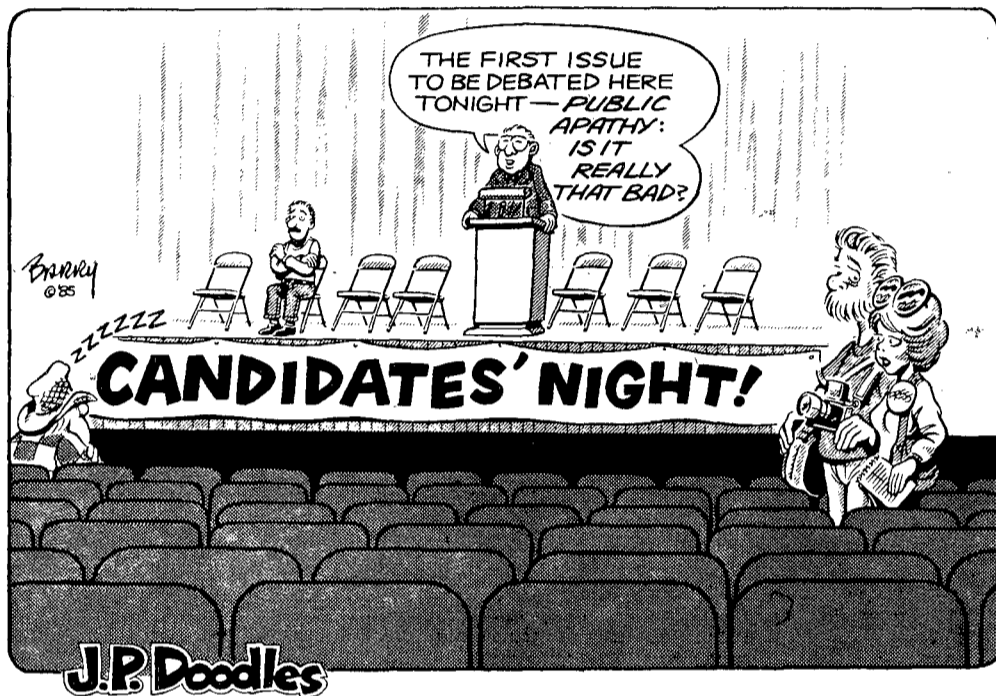

ding in Congress that would extend both of the deadlines for complying with the law, I am concerned that simply extending deadlines will do nothing if we fail to address some of the serious problems states and school districts face in trying to com-

ply with the law," he said.

"This bill addressed the problem of lack of availability of trained personnel for asbestos inspections and for review of management plans. It also addresses my concern that states may simply be reimbursing a few of their most needy schools for the purchase of inspection services, rather than trying to train a large force of school personnel who would then be on staff and available to monitor schools for asbestos problems and perform the subsequent three-year inspections required by the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act.

"With a few refinements in this law, I believe the Federal government can work with the states to insure that the goal of ridding the nation's schools of dangerous asbestos materials," Bereuter said.



## Story of Ft. Robinson invasion told

It was 1943. The invaders came from the east, flying low in the bright morning sky. Some of the planes carried paratroopers, nervously preparing to jump. Others towed gliders at the end of thousand-foot ropes. As the planes neared the target, parachute silk dotted the sky. Cut loose, the gliders coasted to rough landings. Troops poured out, some with bicycles. The invasion had begun.

The scene was not western Europe, but western Nebraska. Fort Robinson was invaded, not by Axis soldiers but by troops from near-by Alliance air base. The objective of the maneuvers: to penetrate to the heart of the Fort's operations.

Even though it wasn't a real invasion, the event made a lasting impression on both those who took part and those who watched. Their reminiscences have been collected by Tom Buecker, Curator of the State Historical Society's Fort Robinson Museum.

For two days airborne troops and soldiers and dogs from Ft. Rob's K 9 units played cat-and-mouse. "The airborne troops were surprised at the dogs' ferocity," one soldier recalled. "I remember the Colonel in charge, who jumped, landed in a tree and was captured by a K-9 soldier with a dog. Made him made, too."

THE NEWSPAPER reported, "It was a wonderful sight," but the maneuvers weren't flawless. "They cut the gliders loose fairly low and did not give the pilots much time to find a level place to land. You could see them trying to pull up and then come down 'ker splat' in a big cloud of dust," one observer said.

There were numerous injuries, and many close calls. "My wife worked in the PX, and she told me that the glider pilots were shaking so bad they couldn't hold a cup of coffee. They had to lean down and slurp it up from the cup off the counter."

At the maneuvers' end, the invaders were judged victorious. "I heard that the enemy penetrated the C.O.'s office," one veteran recalled. "They left a note on the Colonel's desk," another wrote.

The invaders' presence was felt in town, too. One Crawford woman reminisced, "The paratroopers invaded with no respect for anybody or anything. They insulted women on the streets, ripped up pool tables, etc. My folks kept me home till they left."

Photographs of the mock invasion are featured in a new exhibit at the Fort Robinson Museum. Opening to the public May 28, the new exhibit emphasizes the Fort's many-faceted history since 1900.

## Check shelves for Humco brand

## Health department warns about ipecac

The Nebraska State Health Department is asking hospitals, nursing homes, emergency squads, poison control centers, doctors' offices and parents of small children to check their shelves for Humco brand ipecac syrup.

The syrup has been recalled by the federal Food and Drug Administration (FDA) because some of the bottles have been found to contain eucalyptus oil instead of ipecac.

Ipecac syrup is used — mostly for young children under four — to induce vomiting after the ingestion of a poisonous substance or an overdose of medicine. Eucalyptus oil is commonly used in minute amounts in vaporizers, nose drops and cough drops. It is safe for these purposes, according to the FDA, but it should never be ingested because even small amounts can cause convulsions and coma.

As little as a teaspoon can be fatal, according to Marla Augustine, public information officer with the Department of Health.

Last week the FDA issued an appeal to parents to search their medicine cabinets for "one-ounce bottles" of Humco ipecac syrup. Up to 400,000 of them have been shipped from Humco Laboratory in Texarkana, Texas, since February, 1987.

Up to 200,000 of the bottles are still in the channels of distribution, while another 200,000 are in the hands of consumers.

Bottles of the syrup have been found in Nebraska, but it is unknown how many may have been distributed here.

Will Davis of Sav-Mor Pharmacy said his business had stocked the Humco ipecac syrup, and they are returning the product to its manufacturer. "There are companies other than Humco that make it (syrup to induce vomiting)," said Davis.

Some of the Humco one ounce bottles have been distributed as part of health fair promotions, primarily in the areas of poison control.

In the nightcap pitcher Jeff Pasold won his sixth game of the year against two defeats as he witnessed

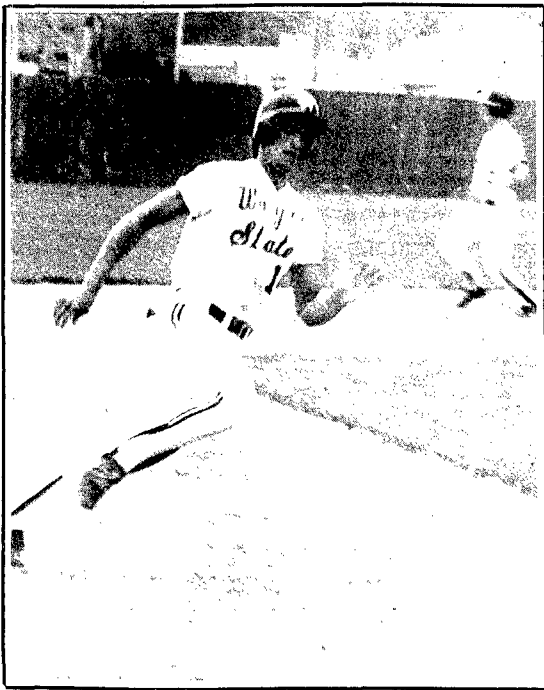
his teammates rap numerous hits including home runs by Destry Jaeger and Randy Yarke.

**Nicotine Gum For Smokers**

Nicotine gum therapy appears to be a safe and effective way for some smokers to gradually give up smoking. The gum (prescription only) is available in 2 milligram (mg) pieces. Physicians who prescribe nicotine gum often ask smokers to stop smoking before starting to use the gum. Nicotine gum does not taste as good as regular chewing gum, and users may require several days for adjustment to its taste as well as the way it should be chewed.

At first, as many as 20 to 25 pieces of 2 mg gum may be chewed in a 24 hour period. The gum should be chewed for about 10 to 20 minutes, in order to allow the nicotine to be released from its slow-release base. Placing the gum between the teeth and the upper cheek after it has been chewed is an excellent way to insure the absorption of additional nicotine into the bloodstream.

While many nicotine gum therapy programs run for about 3 months, heavy smokers sometimes require 6 months or more of treatment. Nicotine gum, when used alone or in conjunction with other programs (e.g., psychological treatment), has been found to produce good results in those who want to quit smoking.
