Field day

A field demonstration on conservation tillage is scheduled for Tuesday, May 24, hosted by the Logan Creek Special Study. The tour will leave the parking lot of St. Peter's Lutheran Church (1/2 miles west of Pender), starting at 2 p.m.

Five fields, showing no-till corn into soybean stubble, no-till corn into alfalfa sod and no-till corn into oat stubble, will be studied.

The field day will include a "mini-clinic" on measuring residue cover and a demonstration of the rainfall simulator to show how effective residue is in preventing soil erosion.

Specialists from the University of Nebraska Cooperative Extension Service and Soil Conservation Service will answer questions on conservation tillage.

Follow-up tours will be scheduled to visit the same fields again throughout the growing season. On future tours, the herbicide programs and planter performance, for working in residue, will be evaluated.

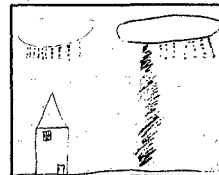

At Wayne-Carroll commencement Diplomas and honors presented to graduates

Wayne-Carroll High School graduates of 1988 barely managed to hang onto their hats Sunday afternoon as winds gusting to 30 miles per hour greeted them as they marched into Wayne State College's willow bowl.

The high winds failed to keep a large crowd of parents, grandparents, other relatives and friends from witnessing the awarding of diplomas to the 47 graduating seniors.

Amy Anderson, daughter of Tom Anderson of Wakefield and Pat Malcom of Wayne, was announced as valedictorian.

Salutatorian was Bethany Keidel, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Keidel of Wayne.

IN INTRODUCING this year's valedictorian, Principal Donald Zeiss pointed out that Anderson is a third generation valedictorian.

Her father and grandmother also were recipients of the valedictorian award.

In her valedictory address Sunday, Anderson focused on the class motto, "Today We Follow, Tomorrow We Lead."

"Throughout our school years we have proven that we can be good followers," Anderson told her classmates.

She cited several examples, including following examples set by their elders, following parents' orders (most of the time), following teachers' instructions (most of the time), following favorite teams, new fads and fashions, and following the crowd.

"But where and how will we show our leadership abilities?," questioned Anderson.

"Maybe some of us will be whizzes in the field of math and computers, the engineering field, the teaching profession or the medical field.

"Wherever we lead, I know we will be the best due to our education, upbringing, and encouraging family and friends."

Anderson reminded her classmates that no matter how great of leaders they become, they must always remember to follow their dreams.

SALUTATORIAN BETHANY Keidel also spoke Sunday afternoon and told fellow graduates that commencement is neither an end nor a beginning.

"We have been 'going into the world' for 18 years or so now," said Keidel. "Our first step, our first day of school, confirmation, getting a

driver's license — each was a further step into the world."

Keidel said commencement is yet another step in the process of maturity — of "going out into the world."

She said that with graduation comes more freedom — freedom to be part of the problems, or part of the solutions of the world.

"How will we handle this freedom?," questioned Keidel. "Responsibly, I think. Because if you're like me, you're one of the lucky ones to have been raised with love and care.

"I have been given enough freedom to fail and enough encouragement to succeed.

"We live in a community that cares about young people. Now it's our turn to make those choices."

Keidel closed with a poem by H.S. Harp, entitled "Wreckers," and challenged each of her classmates to live responsibly and be a part of the solutions in the world.

GIVING THE invocation and benediction at Sunday's ceremony was the Rev. Keith Johnson of the First United Methodist Church in Wayne.

The processional and recessional were played by the Wayne High School varsity band, directed by Brad Weber.

Special music included "Let All Our Lives Be Music," sung by the Wayne High School varsity choir under the direction of Mrs. Kathryn Ley.

SUPERINTENDENT Francis Haun introduced Dr. Irv Omtvedt, vice chancellor of Ag and Natural Resources at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, who presented the graduation address.

"Today is a major transition in the life of graduates," said Omtvedt. "We will look to you with excitement and anticipation for future leadership."

Omtvedt asked the graduates to keep in mind that they as individuals can play a significant role in molding their lives.

He also told the graduates not to be disillusioned if at this point they don't know exactly what to do with their lives.

"About two-thirds of the graduating seniors at UN-L complete their degree in an area other than they intended when they first enrolled.

"Explore new horizons and respond to new discoveries. Establish a foundation that will provide opportunities in years to come."

US Ecology says no areas singled out

For now it appears that the city of Wayne is one of the areas that will not be a potential site for a low level radioactive waste storage facility.

The Wayne community was blacked out as one of the sites considered excluded because it is a population center, as was indicated on a map used during a presentation at the US Ecology workshop in Norfolk's Villa Inn Monday evening. Wayne is considered a population center since its population exceeds 5,000.

However other areas surrounding Wayne (within the entire northeast Nebraska area or many locations throughout certain sections of the state) have not been ruled out as potential sites.

RICH PATON, vice president with US Ecology — a firm which has been selected to build the low level radioactive waste storage facility — said there have been several Nebraska communities who have expressed an interest in hosting the site. He did not mention the communities during the workshop.

"We have not singled out any part of Nebraska [east or west]," said Paton.

Those areas which would be excluded, he said, would be 100 year flood plains; dedicated lands such as state parks or historic landmarks;

critical habitat for threatened endangered species and urban areas.

The 100 or more people attending the workshop were given opportunities to ask Paton about the past performances and current operations of US Ecology and the facility it proposes to build in Nebraska. Members of the audience were also permitted to comment on the feasibility of establishing a waste storage facility in northeast Nebraska.

MOST OF THE comments were directed against locating the facility in northeast Nebraska. Deb Wragge of Creighton told Paton that the northeast Nebraska area is highly susceptible to erosion by water and quoted the average rainfall to be 24 to 30 inches per year. Gravel channels and perched aquifers exist, she said.

Wragge said that more than 10,000 names have been gathered on a petition requesting that the site not be located in the state.

Lavon Schrant of Winside said that Nebraska's geological features and climate would "break down the barriers of safety."

Studies by scientists and geologists, she said, reveal that the low level radioactive waste should be disposed of in dry arid regions. She said almost all sites have been unsuccessful east of the Rocky Mountains.

Another from the audience voiced concern about how the waste site

would affect livestock production in northeast Nebraska, which is also an area where 825,000 crop acres is irrigated and where there remains nitrate problems in some locations.

Paton said the waste site will not necessarily be located on what is considered as Nebraska wasteland. "We'll need a good technical site that is well-drained and free from environmental limitations," he said.

The primary consideration in site location, he said, is groundwater. Other considerations are surface water, geology, urban growth potential, dedicated land, overall natural resource conditions and cultural resources such as historical sites.

PATON OPENED the two-hour workshop on the topic of radiation, saying that radiation can be attributed to about 33 percent natural sources, about 44 percent to medical sources and the remaining from fallout or other sources.

The average U.S. citizen gets a dose of about 160.81 millirems a year. By law, the waste site cannot release, based on the worst possible situation, more than 25 millirems per year, he said.

"Low level waste is not the following: high level waste, reprocessing waste, spent fuel, transuranic waste, mill tailings or national defense waste," said Paton.

OMTVEDT TOLD the graduates to be players in life, but to also be contributors.

"The question needs to be asked," said Omtvedt. "What are we going to pay back to society?"

There's growing bi-partisan support for eliminating or curtailing the "earnings test" for Social Security recipients. Persons between ages 62 and 65 lose \$1 in Social Security benefits for each \$2 earned over \$6,000. Those between 65 and 69 can earn up to \$8,160 before the penalty goes into effect. Republicans Jack Kemp of New York and Hal Daub of Nebraska, and Democrats Barney Frank of Massachusetts and Ron Wyden of Oregon, are among those who have introduced legislation to reduce penalties for senior citizens who receive Social Security benefits yet also want to work.

A study recently conducted at the University of Maryland School of Pharmacy found that about one out of three calcium supplements passes through the stomach before it can become effective. The research suggests that for older women, who are the most susceptible to osteoporosis, consuming lowfat dairy products such as yogurt and skim milk is the best way to fulfill calcium needs (at least 1,000 milligrams daily).

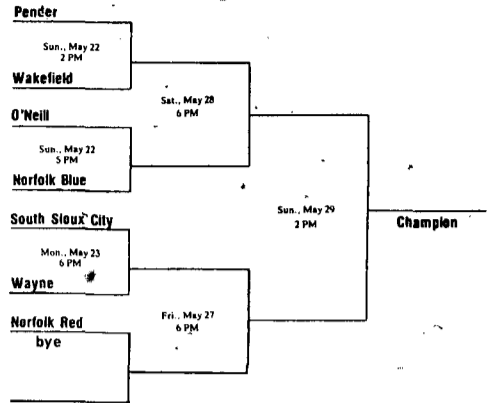

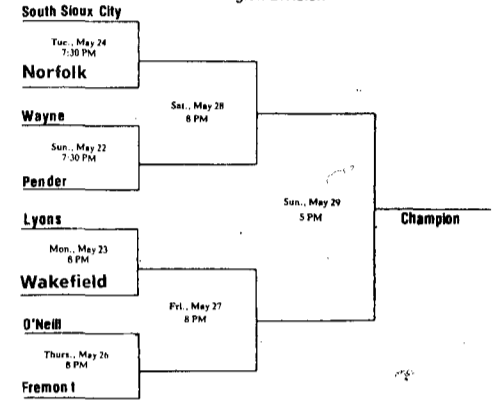

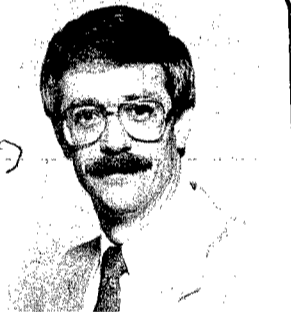

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Planting for wildlife

Wildlife in Nebraska probably isn't experiencing the winter and early-spring "pinch period" as much as in some years, but summer is coming and now's the time to think about planting something for wildlife to feed on next winter, which may not be as mild as '87-'88.

Planting a wildlife food plot near shelter is a good way to help. A food plot cover can help wildlife survive winter periods when other foods may be in short supply.

Considerations when planning a food plot include:
—Plant in a long, narrow shape, 10 to 30 feet in length, along the edge of a field.
—About 1/8 to 1/4 acre is a good size.

Several food patches distributed over an area are better than one large patch.

Plants that stand up well should be included so there will be food above the snow.

Plots should be planted near cover. The plot will receive more use if cover for shelter from weather and escape from predators is nearby. A plot in the middle of a large, bare field would be used very little. A shelterbelt is good planting site, particularly if it has good cover near the ground. Another good site is along a fence row, ravine, stream or odd area — especially those with grass and shrub cover to provide protection.

A mix of food varieties will dependably serve more wildlife needs. Grains to consider are millet, milo and a cultivated variety of sunflower. Millet is excellent for quail, pheasants, mourning doves and many kinds of turkeys. Sunflowers are especially attractive to songbirds and a cultivated variety won't spread and take over the farm.

Seeds for wildlife food plantings will be available free of charge this spring from the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission. The seeds will be distributed through the Cooperative Extension Service and the SCS in Dixon and Wayne counties.

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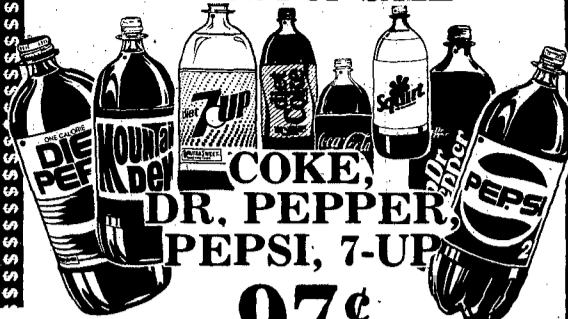

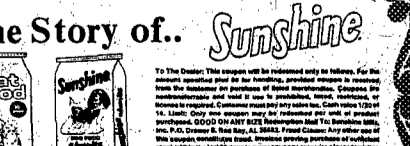

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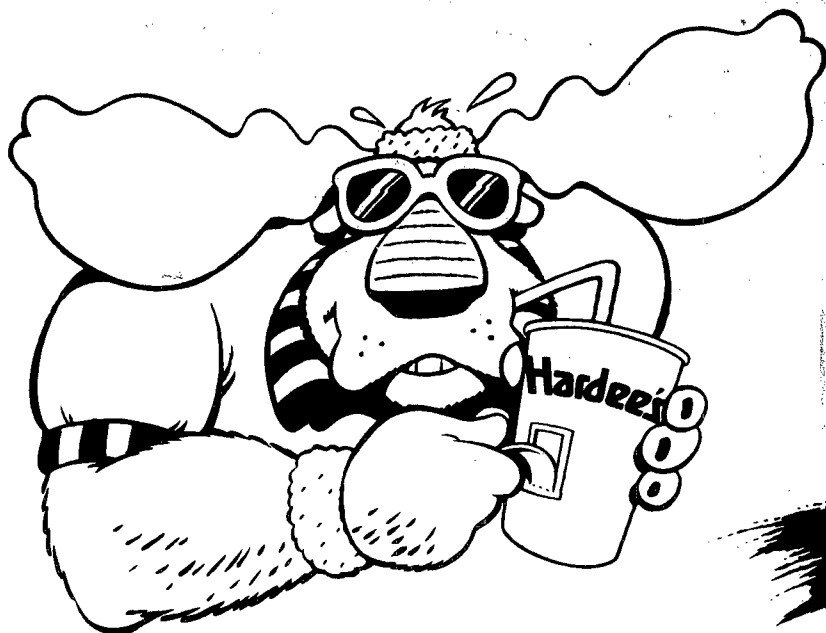

The cruel world which brings war, crime, AIDS can be disappointed, he said, if the graduates "live their life according to their thoughts or goals."

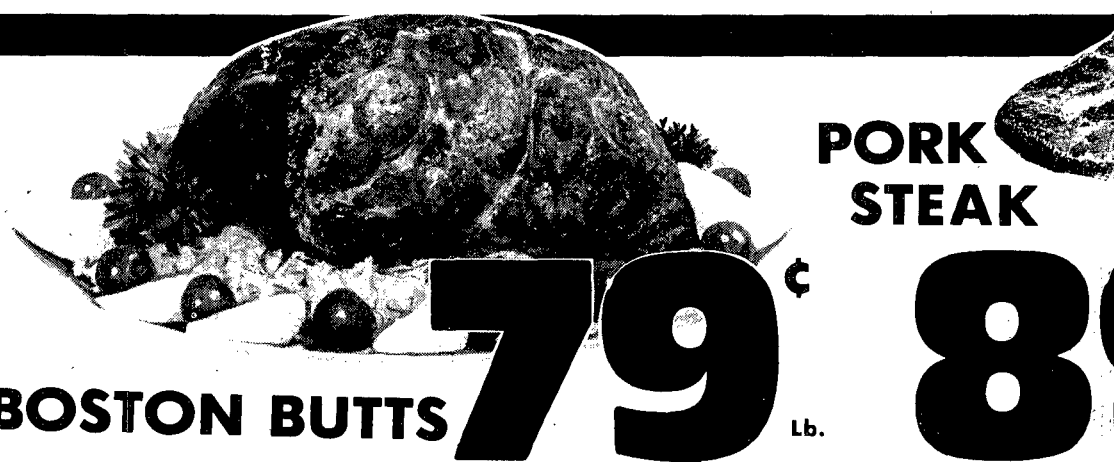

In other action in Monday's meeting and the regular meeting held last Wednesday the council approved a bid of \$11,150 from Guarantee Roofing of Sioux City to repair the roof at the Wakefield Health Care Center. The roof will be of rolled rubber covered with rock and gravel. The council received bids from two of three companies contacted.

Also discussed were several proposals being worked on with the Board of Wakefield Health Care Center from the transfer of funds to the hospital for operation and

maintenance and the 1988-89 fiscal year budget.

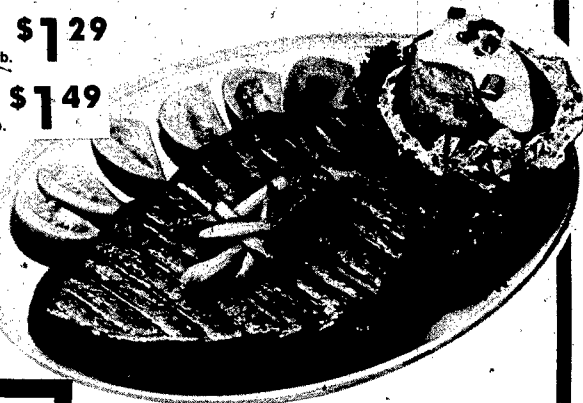

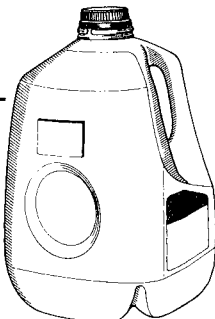

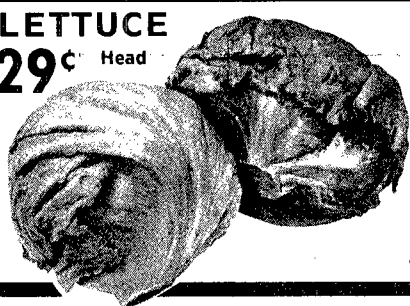
